Officially, and especially for purposes of the calendar, the new year started on January 1.

In short, with the average publican having more time on his hands, he is bound to gather with his fellows at their usual gathering spot and, they reason, he will invest a nickel or two or more in the game, "if," the games pleases him, attracts him, offers him something he wants to do for the period of time he has on his hands.

That's why so many have switched to more entertaining equipment. The general belief thruout the field is that there will be even better, even greater, even more entertaining new equipment shown by the manufacturers at this '49 show.

The entire industry feels the hopeful lift ahead. It also feels that this is the year when all can recover from the readjustment period and come thru with flying colors for one of the most profitable years in the history of the industry.

No longer will any contest the fact that this past year was one of steep ups and downs. Now these same men believe, that they have adjusted themselves to a more economical operating base, is the time when new equipment can help zoom collections upwards.

That is why interest is so great everywhere in the industry for this forthcoming show. The operators, jobbers and distributors feel that at this show they are going to find just what they have been seeking to lift them out of the adjustment period.

They know that the answer is "somewhere at some booth at the '49 show." And all are coming there eager, even anxious, to seek the answer . . . prepared to do everything they possibly can to get going . . . and get going "big" again.

The new year starts Monday, January 17, 1949 for the coin machine industry.

TRADE LOOKS TO CONVENTION FOR MIGHTY FINE '49

Interest High in New Equip't as Entire Field Looks Forward to Year's Biggest Event.

Never before in the history of the industry has interest been as high as it is at this moment. Never before have coinmen been as eager, even anxious, to see what the convention will offer them.

There is a quiet and unspoken belief everywhere in the field that this is bound to be "a mighty fine '49", provided, of course, that the manufacturers present the new equipment to which the trade looks to pick the average operator out of the slough of despond into which he has fallen and gives him that necessary "lift" to boom his spirits and his profits to new and ever higher peaks.

The feeling is general that there is sure to appear the new type machine somewhere on the convention floor. This feeling is inspired by the fact that many are of the belief the manufacturers have kept careful tab on what happened during 1948 and realize just what the operators need to assure themselves a greater year.

The entire industry, therefore, looks forward to the CMI convention. This is the exhibition where new equipment will be on display for all to study and buy. This is the convention where everyone can count on something that will assure a new year of greater income.

The more time the public have to play, they will play amusement games, listen to automatic music, enjoy vending machines, and this means greater profits for all concerned.

This field readjusted itself while others were still zooming blithely on ahead. With this readjustment now comes an almost desperate demand for equipment of an entirely new and different nature to assure those men who have gone thru readjustment "a mighty fine '49".

Whether it is, or is not, apparent, there is still greater optimism in the coin machine business than what the statements of some of the men engaged in this field convey. The general impression is that all are low and forsaken.

This is not so, it is not so because all are looking forward to this '49 show for "the answer" to what will be needed in 1949 to assure them a steady upward climb . . . returning to better times . . . returning to the boom days which the coin machine industry has always enjoyed.

Never before has interest been so high in what the manufacturers will present. This was most emphatically indicated by the sudden buying slack which came about weeks prior to this forthcoming convention.

Operators who, in former years, continued to purchase new equipment right up to the very opening hour of the coinshow . . . stopped buying weeks ago. Why? Because they believe that the "answer" is at this show.

There is no doubt that "the answer" is at this 1949 CMI convention. The men know it. They are anxious to see it. They are eager to go ahead. To reach for those new heights which they believe will be theirs if they find what they want to carry on ahead for the year to come.

Some operators have even indicated that this is one convention when they expect a return of "the old days." When they expect to laugh and have fun. When, they feel, they will, as in years gone by, make their deals, buy the new machines, and get back into harness to "cash in" on what they ordered during the show.

This, as one noted leader in the coinfield stated, can prove to be one of the great, old time shows. The kind of shows when operators looked carefully, bought shrewdly, and worked hard to make the business more prosperous, more steady, more solid.

The field is going ahead, regardless of what any pessimist here or there may think. It is going ahead because of the high interest being shown in the new equipment which is expected at this show. And this interest continues to grow to fever pitch as the opening day of the CMI convention approaches.

The coin machine business is one business that never lets down for an instant. It just can't let down. As an industry it is once again returning to a more solid, a more normal stride. An industry that is constituted to go on ahead because of the type of promotional minded men engaged in it . . . men who seek an angle regardless of what general conditions may be in their territories . . . to revive interest, to gain greater attraction, to bring bigger profits to their locations . . . as well as to themselves.

How, then, can an industry lose out when interest continues to pile up every minute of every day?

It will pay everyone of the nation's coinmen to be present at this 1949 show.

The juke box ops of the country are especially interested for this is the year when MOA (Music Operators of America) have stepped forward on a most complete, national basis.

It is the first year when amusement machine ops are going to look longer and more carefully than they did before and they, too, now have a national interest in the creation of CMOA (Coin Machine Operators of America, Inc.)

In fact, from any and every angle, this is one show when all will find it to their greater profit to be present to see, to hear, to believe, to have faith . . . for the products they are seeking will be there for the buying.

"A Little Bird Told Me" (2:23)
"If That Isn't Love, What Is?" (2:45)

JERRY WAYNE—JANETTE DAVIS
(Columbia 38386)

● Vocal duet by Jerry Wayne and chirp Janette Davis shows excellent manner here, as the team offer the pleasure to be found in "A Little Bird Told Me" and "If That Isn't Love, What Is?" Top deck, a hot juke box favorite at present, is done up with a ton of magnetic charm, as Jerry's and Janette's pipes seep thru in first rate style. Hand clap in the background adds to the luster of the disk immensely. Coupled with an oldie, the combo come back once again to purr some tempting tones of vocal splendor. It's fanciful stuff that should find best play in those soda sipping spots where youngsters gather. Listen in.

"There Is Time" (2:51)

"Who Are Ya Gonna Dream About Tonight, Baby" (2:44)

PAUL CHAPMAN
(DC 1200)

● Some wax that may prove to be a "sleeper" is to be found in this recording by piper Paul Chapman. Titled, "There Is Time" and "Who Are Ya Gonna Dream About Tonight, Baby," Paul delivers some flowery vocal tones that should find a mountain of favor with music ops. Wax, if aimed at those tavern spots should find lively play. Top deck, a ballad makes for first-rate listening pleasure, with Paul aided by The Melody Men in adequate manner throughout. It's slow stuff that makes 'em weep in their beer—and then come back for another earful. The flip, an oldie picks up in tempo a bit, with Paul wailing the lyrics in able manner once again. The platter is one of those items that bear watching—and more.

"Anticipation Without Realization" (2:57)

"Everybody's Friend But Nobody's Sweetheart" (3:00)

LOUIS PRIMA ORCH.
(RCA Victor 20-3276)

● Orkster Louis Prima in the spotlight, and the cute refrain of "Anticipation Without Realization" worming its way thru the wax. It's more pleasant novelty material that Louis offers, with the vocal coming thru in top notch manner. Louis' nasal, rasping pipes dress the double-tongue lyrics up and add to the luster of the deck. Heavy beat in moderate tempo, with the band filling in, rounds out the side. The flip, with Cathy Allen sharing the stage with the maestro, slows down a bit and turns up as some more mellow wax. Title gives off the bill of fare with both Cathy and Louis spooning pleasantly. The many Prima fans are sure to go for this piece.

"Pretty Baby" (2:59)

"Funny Little Money Man" (2:55)

SAMMY KAYE ORCH.
(RCA Victor 20-3275)

● Some wax which music operators should listen in on is this platter offering by maestro Sammy Kaye. It's light, delightful echoes on both sides of the waxing, and should find favor with music ops and the many Sammy Kaye fans. Top deck, the standard "Pretty Baby" gets a fair sendoff via

HARRY JAMES ORCH.
(Columbia 38380)



HARRY JAMES

● We're really going out on a limb with this one! Not since the lush days of the band business, when juke box fans were clamoring for "Music Makers," "One O'Clock Jump" and "Back Beat Boogie" have we heard anything like this. It's Harry James and his wonderful crew on deck with a number that should have phono fans, music lovers and the kids who love to jump going wild. James, long missing from the music machine spotlight, seems a cinch to rocket to the top once again via this hunk of wax. Titled, "Redigal Jump," Harry and his boys display a ton

of musical pleasure, some wonderful instrumental licks and a first rate fill of excellent orchestration to make this disk a winner. It's straight instrumental stuff, loaded from start to finish with more infectious rhythm than we've heard in many a moon. Repeat chorus of the opening measure of the tune, mixed with a spot solo by the maestro on trumpet, makes this piece glow and dazzle. The driving rhythm behind the tune makes you bounce all over the place as you listen to it. Orchids definitely go to arranger Ray Conniff, who has come up with a musical masterpiece. It's top drawer material that will keep music ops' machines filled with silver. On the other end with an oldie in "Love" (Your Spell Is Everywhere), chirp Marion Morgan steps out to come up with another boffo winner for music fans. The gal's pipes pitch true throughout, with maestro Harry flourishing on a trumpet solo that is plu-perfect. It's a blue-ribbon winner for Harry James—and a platter that music operators will reap harvest with. By all means—get this hunk of wax!

Charlie Wilson and a vocal chorus, with the Kaye musical pattern flowing easily. The flip, with the Sunday Serenade Sweetheart doing the vocals, is loaded with coin-calling potential. It's cute stuff, done up in slow, sincere style, with the lyrics worming their way right at you. It's a grade A musical offering by maestro Kaye—one that should be listened to.

"I'm Just Wild About Harry" (2:24)

"Good Fellow Medley" (3:04)

THE AMES BROTHERS
(Coral 60017)

● The Ames Brothers back again with some more wax, with "I'm Just Wild About Harry" and "Good Fellow Medley" seeping thru the platter. Top deck is done up in rollicking fashion, with the boys purring the light, happy lyrics in mellow tempo. It's gay stuff to which the tavern set can keep on singing, whistling and toe-tapping. The flip, a medley of tunes comprising "Hail, Hail The Gang's All Here," "For He's A Jolly Good Fellow," and "Aud Lang Syne," might meet with ops' approval. The vocal work displayed here is effective enough. While the platter certainly won't stop traffic, it should earn its fair share of silver.

"Galway Bay" (3:02)

"One Sunday Afternoon" (3:04)

JANE PICKENS
(RCA Victor 20-3238)

● Pair of sides done up in the light vein, and aimed at those more quiet, sedate locations, are these rendered by chirp Jane Pickens. The nostalgic refrain of "Galway Bay" shows Jane's vocal pitch to fair advantage on the top deck. It's smooth, soprano vocalizing set down in attractive manner. Wax spins in slow tempo with ade-

quate instrumental and vocal chorus backing. The flip, the title tune of the Warner Brothers picture of the same name, is a light, dainty piece weaving around the title. Wax is there for the asking—music ops take it from here.

"These Will Be The Best Years Of Our Lives" (3:00)

"From The Land Of The Sky Blue Waters" (2:51)

BUDDY MORENO ORCH.
CHARLES SPIVAK ORCH.
(RCA Victor 20-3277)

● The coupling of the Buddy Moreno and Charlie Spivak orchestras on this platter is bound to meet with ops approval. Top deck with chirp Perry Mitchell spooning the vocal pleasure of "These Will Be The Best Years Of Our Lives," is definitely one of the better items this week. It's beautiful singing, offered in graceful, relaxed manner. Tune is very infectious, with the simple and deeply invigorating lyric ringing true throughout. The flip, a straight instrumental number, avidly displays maestro Charlie Spivak in fine light, with his horn leading the way on this standard. Ops who have the spots that go for first rate instrumental platter should look in here. Both sides rate heavily—get 'em.

"Moonlight Cocktail" (2:50)

"I'd Love To Live In Loveland" (2:41)

GLEN GRAY & THE CASA LOMA ORCH.
(Coral 60002)

● Long missing from the phono spotlight as a name attraction, orkster Glen Gray gets a fresh start here, with this re-issue of a pair of tunes that scored widely many moons ago.

Glen's smart musical patter should be recalled as some of the best of years gone by, with these songs offered ably serving the maestro well. Top deck, "Moonlight Cocktail" is done up in refreshing manner which makes for a ton of nostalgia. The soft, glowing musical dish of tasty measures makes for first rate listening fare. Flip, "I'd Love To Live In Loveland," with piper Kenny Sargent doing the vocal chores, also proves that the orkster's music still lives on. It's top drawer material that should prove to be a repeat play winner for music operators.

"Far Away Places" (3:02)

"Lorelei" (2:22)

THE AMES BROTHERS
(Coral 60016)

● Vocal combo rapidly climbing in popularity throughout the nation is the Ames Brothers, on deck with a first rate offering that should find favor with many music operators. It's the scintillating, comely refrain of "Far Away Places," superbly rendered, that should keep the Ames boys in the limelight. Vocal harmony in the very best of fashion is the wax story here. Ditty itself is currently a hot one. This version should boost the rating of the tune yet higher. The flip, tagged "Lorelei," rolls smoothly throughout, with the Ames Brothers spooning vocal pleasure galore. Top deck is the side to ride with. Ops who haven't as yet caught the tune should get with it pronto.

"Sunflower" (2:54)

"Brush Those Tears From Your Eyes" (2:51)

JACK KILTY
(MGM 10339)

● Pair of sides which might crop up to be first rate coin winners are these offered by balladeer Jack Kilty. It's Jack's first wax on MGM, and it shows up well enough to warrant ops' listening time. Titled, "Sunflower" and "Brush Those Tears From Your Eyes," the platter turns up to be a pleasant one, rendered with sincere vocal depth and feeling. Top deck whirls about Kansas, the Sunflower State, with Jack's pitch fair and effective. The flip, well known to most music ops, should serve as another rendition of this pop hit that may score on the phonos. Small combo accompaniment offers some mellow toe-tapping rhythm throughout the dishing. Ops who are in the market for light material should lend an ear in this direction.

"Down Among The Sheltering Palms" (2:30)

"Put Your Arms Around Me, Honey" (2:30)

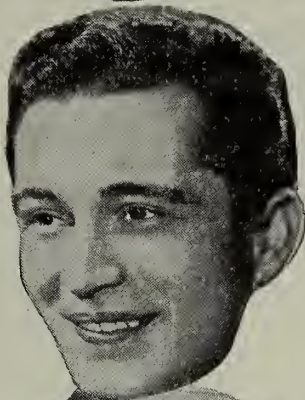
DICK KUHN ORCH.
(Coral 60013)

● The set up of a pair of oldies, offered by that grand old orkster Dick Kuhn and the pleasant refrain of "Down Among The Sheltering Palms" and "Put Your Arms Around Me, Honey," is headed ops' way. Top deck, currently being revived and one of the nation's better hits, should meet with wide approval. It's done up in light, flowing manner that should have the older folks reminiscing. Ditty is definitely a comer, especially so where the tavern trade is concerned. The flip, another tune that should be widely remembered, gets another able workout by Dick and the boys, with a vocal trio hogging the glory on the side. Ops who have the spots that go for this brand might do well to listen in.

It's smooth stuff throughout, the kind that you can easily take to. Top deck is an oldie that should be well remembered by ops. Those who still have a call for this tune would do well to listen in to this version. The flip slows a bit and is done up in ultra smart styling by the group with a whistle spot and the use of an echo chamber adding to the luster of the disk. The platter rates ops' listening time.

The gal's pipes purr the ecstatic vocal in plu-perfect tones that count, with some melodious beguine tempo sifting thru the background. Faint quiver in her tonsils, added to the beautiful wordage, should have her many fans howling. The flip, "Where's The Man," shows as a possible winner for Patti too. It's slow stuff, ably rendered in top notch vocal style. "So In Love" will ring the bell.

● Here's Frank Sinatra with a coupling that seems destined to find a top spot on music operators' machines. From the musical production "Where's Charley," Frank offers the widely talked about "Once In Love With Amy," and does so in such fine manner as to beckon some heavy coin play. Ditty fairly overflows with cute lyrics and takes a new twist from the usual run-of-the-mill girl songs. Vocal styling is superb throughout, with Frank, aided by the Mitchell Ayres ork, delivering a first rate cookie. It's a platter that you can early warm up to, and one that seems fairly certain of becoming a hot favorite. The flip, tagged "Sunflower," is a repeat grade A performance for Frank, and is patterned in much the same manner as the top deck. It's an ode to Kansas, the Sunflower State, delivered in the very best of Sinatra vocal manner. Top deck, "Once In Love With Amy," should win loads of silver.

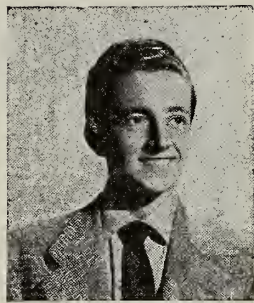

Song, titled "An Old Magnolia Tree," is one of the most beautiful ballads we've heard in oh, so long. Vic's smooth piping of this dainty tid-bit is nothing short of sensational. Vocal phrasing by Vic is captivating, as he purrs the rap-

Frankie's versatile tonsils. Top deck is the one that should cause an avalanche of jitney in the boxes. Frankie's jazz vocal on this piece, done up with some mellow rhythm and beat furnished by the Carl Fischer ork, makes this piece all the more a winner. Lyric is tops throughout, with the spotlight shining down on Frankie in well deserving manner. Flip, an original Laine ditty, slows down, and gets Frankie's tonsiling in superb fashion. It's a romantic air that should garner a zillion nickels. Both sides bid for a barrel-ful of moola—grab 'em.

● Gene Krupa on deck with a pair of instrumental sides that may grab off some jitney. Wax, tagged "Up An Atom" and "Calling Doctor Gillespie," is in there in fair fashion all the way, with some mellow licks and spots served up by the boys in able manner. Top deck spins in moderate tempo with a flourish of brass and a ruffle by Mr. Krupa. The flip slows down with spots of bop, in slow tempting style, seeping thru. It's wax aimed at the jazzophile trade. Ops who have the spots—take note.

● Always a hot contender for top phono honors, Kate Smith steps out with a pair that bid for their fair share of coin play. It's one of the best things that Kate has offered in quite some time that Kate spoons here, and should find its way into ops' ma-

turous wordage in tones of plush sentimentality, lined with the fragrance of prepossessing musical pleasure furnished by the Glenn Os-ser orchestra. Singing strings, toned down to match Vic's sincere, meaningful vocal rendition, add to the heartfelt pleasure to be found in this dinking. Not since Vic's recording of "I Have But One Heart" have we heard such vocal beauty. It's an inviting platter, one that makes you want to keep on playing the disk time and time again. The vocal splendor which Vic displays on this recording is sure to cause a ton of excitement and create a world of attention toward this tune. On the other end with "Susy," Vic bounces back with a pleasant bit in this cute "girl" song. Vocal chorus on the platter add to the wax incentive offered ops. It's slow, romantic stuff, with Vic doing a chorus of the tune in Italian. We go for the top deck, "An Old Magnolia Tree," in a big way. We're sure you will too—load up for a real money-maker.

Top deck beckons all the coin play.

Both tunes are done up in light, dainty mood and make for lasting moments of musical pleasure. It's the kind of platter that makes for easy listening, and is one that can be taken to quickly. You've gotta listen to this bit to really appreciate it—and that's just what we recommend.

THREE INDIE DISKERS CREATE FIRST COOPERATIVE DISTRIBUTING ORGANIZATION

Miracle, Aladdin & Specialty Records Establish Distrib Office In Detroit. See Possibility Of Other Indie Labels Following

CHICAGO—Three of the better known indie diskeries have just opened their first cooperative distribution office in Detroit, Mich.

The firms which have cooperated in opening this first office are Miracle Records of this city, Specialty and Aladdin Records of Los Angeles, Calif.

According to the triumvirate, Lee Egalnick of Miracle, Art Rupe of Specialty and Leo Messner of Aladdin, this first office at 74 W. Montcalm, in Detroit, which will be known as Central Record Sales of Michigan, is only the first in a chain which these firms intend to open in territories where they have not been getting the distribution they believe their records deserve.

Offices will be opened in the near future in Chicago, St. Louis and in Los Angeles.

These firms are driving for intensive coverage of these markets and will continue this cooperative policy to make such coverage definite.

As these men stated, "This does not mean that we will, in any fashion whatsoever, affect our present distributorship set-ups. We believe that these offices, where we haven't been getting the distribution we need, will act as an impetus to future sales. They will bring our disks into the market with the prominence which is due them."

Present distrib set-ups of Miracle, Aladdin and Specialty will not be hurt.

The firms are working very closely together and will only arrange for distribution of their disks in those areas where they need better representation than what they have re-

ceived heretofore.

The possibility of other indie platteries following suit or taking similar action was seen by members of the trade upon learning of the joint action by Miracle, Aladdin and Specialty. It is well known to many in the trade that independent platteries have often had to depend upon distrib, regardless of the type of job they may have been doing, because of the unpredictable table of events and business which indie platteries normally do.

Columbia Records Sign Al Trace - Renew Pastor

NEW YORK—Columbia Records, Inc., this city, this past week disclosed the signing of Al Trace to a recording contract.

Trace, who clicked in '48 with his rendition of "You Call Everybody Darlin'," is currently one of the hotter "corn" orks in the nation. Altho terms of the contract were not revealed, it was reported that the deal set with the orkster call for two years with options.

In addition to signing Trace, it was learned that the plattery had renewed the contract of orkster Tony Pastor, whose contract ends in March of 1949. In recent months the Pastor ork has been a steady seller on wax for the plattery. Recent click for Pastor is "It's Like Taking Candy From A Baby." Reports concerning Pastor's vocalist, Rosemary Clooney, who was rumored to be prepping a single act, could not be affirmed at press time.

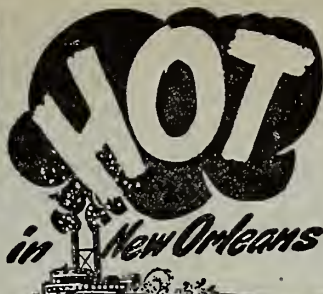

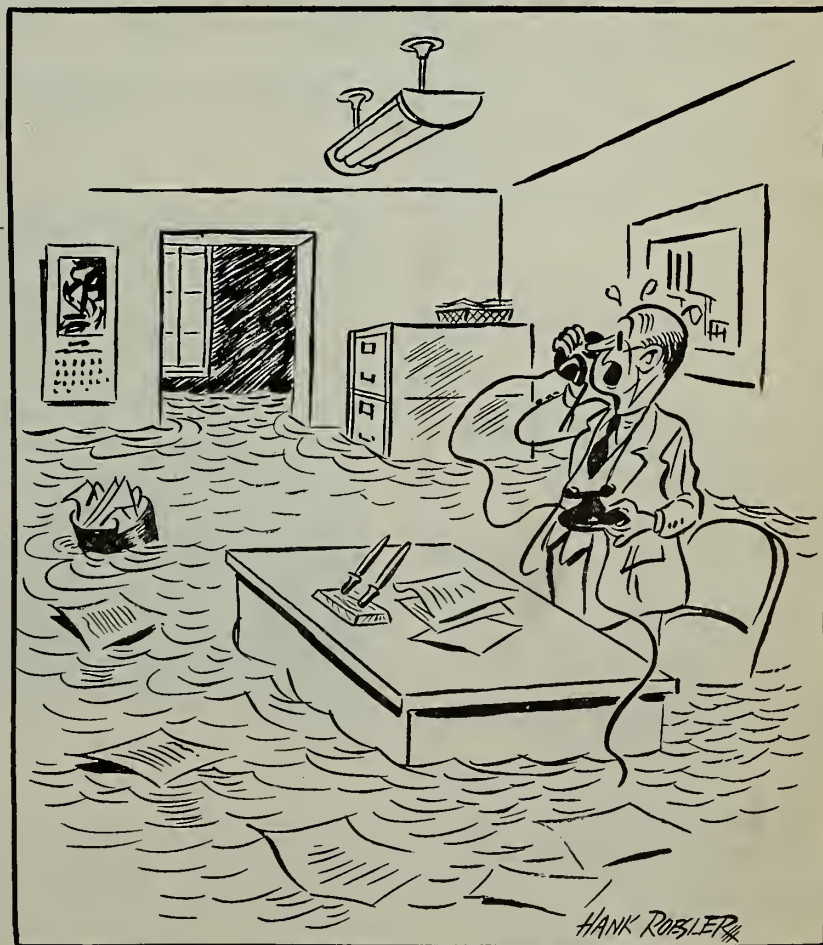

"Multi-Bell is in full production at this time," Jenkins stated.

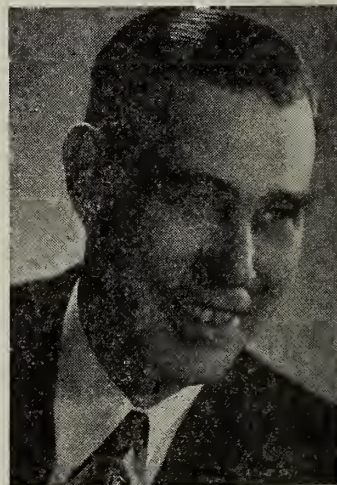
Television To Open In Pittsburgh, Pa. Jan. 11

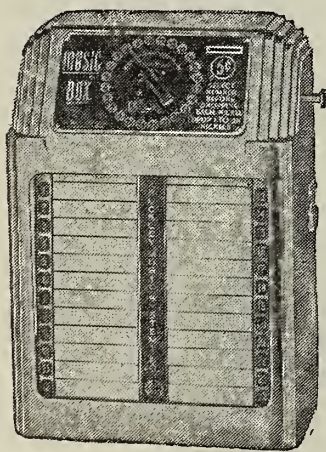

Prices continue to be very widely divergent these days. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, condition, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, etc., must all be taken into consideration. The C.M.I. Blue Book reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: The C.M.I. Blue Book should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price for the week: Second price listed is highest price. Where only one price appears this should be considered lowest price.

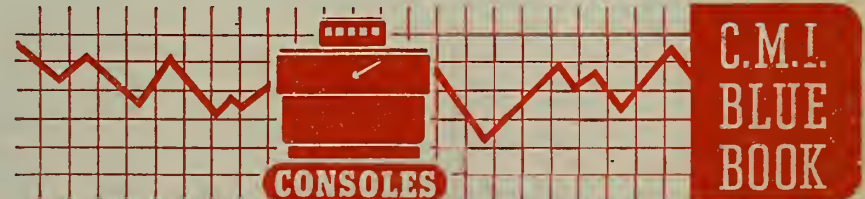

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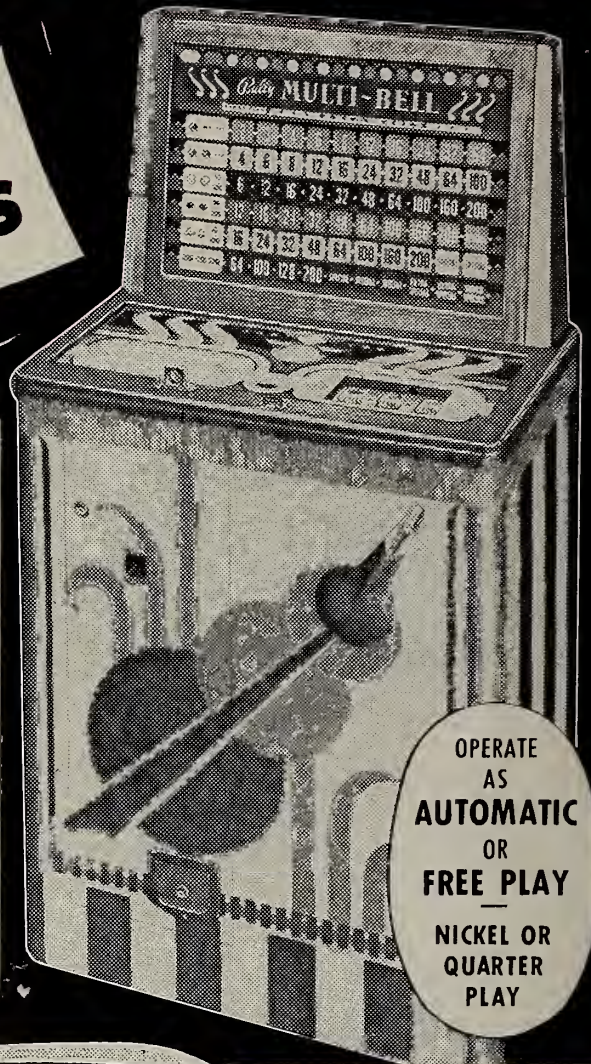
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
