Talking It Over

Everywhere we travel these days we come across the same phenomena. That of operators suddenly discovering that shuffleboards do have great money-making possibilities.

And the average op who suddenly enters into the field, usually because he hears that someone else is "cleaning up," is always worried about the "lasting power" of the boards.

In addition to the larger, regulation size shuffleboards, the smaller sizes are also getting into locations. It is well known that many of these locations that start with one of the undersized boards usually wind up taking in a standard size unit and find that this is what the players really want.

Of course, this has nothing to do with the shuffle and rebound games which are, today, clicking on the market, and are capturing ever more attention from all the industry.

These smaller units feature much amusement for team or individual play. They can be considered more in the "game" classification and, as such, have a definite and unique place in the field.

Furthermore, the shuffle and rebound games are being rushed into the field just as speedily as possible by the present amusement game manufacturers. These machines met with public approval in most instances and, as they grow in number, with ever more entertaining and interesting features, they are bound to win greater acclaim and thereby assure the operator better profits.

All this only leads back to the first question which is asked by operator after operator in territories where shuffleboards are first getting their initiation.

That question is, "Will they last?"

The answer is best backed by those who have had years of experience in shuffleboard operation. The fact remains that shuffleboards have been operating for over 14 years in the State of New Jersey and are just as popular today as when they were first introduced.

Of course it is well known that the most of the taverns own their own shuffleboards in this state, but, the greatest reason for this is the fact that there was no such thing as a "scoreboard" when these were first introduced.

Today, even locations in Jersey are switching to the newer and better boards being built at this time and are, at the same time, featuring scoreboards. The average location owner seeks additional revenue and the scoreboard has answered this problem for him.

There is, then, no doubt that the shuffleboards will last. They have already proved their "lasting power."

It will be more interesting to watch the rebounds and smaller shuffle games grow apace of the larger shuffleboards. Since they are an offshoot of the larger boards it will be rather thrilling to note whether they can, and will, surpass them in sales and grab the major attention of the players.

There is room for both the larger, standard size shuffleboard, and the smaller sized shuffle game. There will always be players who will show preference for each of these. (Just as there are people who would rather watch a football game than a baseball game.)

The one big fact remains—that shuffleboards and shuffle games have broken into the market in so big a fashion that they now command the most complete attention of the nation's operators and are opening, without any doubt, a path to a new and more profitable future for all concerned.

MUSIC BIZ PEPS UP

Reports Show Ops Buying More New Phonos. Many Distributors Caught Short as Used Market Action Speeds Up.

"It began the last two weeks in August," is the way one of the nation's leading automatic music equipment salesmen reports the surprising rise in sales now being enjoyed by most of the country's leading music machine distributors.

And since that time, according to many, the upward sales curve has continued to such a point that there is now general belief the trade is finding its way into a brand new music equipment boom.

It is also indicative of this new sales boom that the operator has, at long last, decided to replace old machines with equipment which assures him a much better chance for profits.

Some of the machines now on locations thruout the nation are almost fifteen years old. They have paid for themselves time and time again and aren't giving the patrons the service or the tone quality which means better profits.

At the same time the more progressive operators are now featuring the very latest music machines and this, too, has had its effect on removing some of this old and wornout equipment.

The average operator realizes that his amortization over the period of years he is granted means a constant profit for him amounting, in most cases, to approximately \$250 per year which means \$5 per week for him.

This, in itself, in addition to the fact that as he amortizes the machine he buys, he is also bringing his customers better music, finer tone quality and, at the same time, earning larger profits because with new equipment he is in position to exact a better percentage of the gross, as well as arrange for a flat service front money guarantee.

All this, in addition to the fact that the nation's music distributors are arranging for payment plans which make it much easier for the ops to get going with new equipment, has had its effect on sales, and the boom which has resulted tends to bring about a better market all around.

One very noticeable result of the sales boom which has started is the fact that most of the nation's coin machine distributors are caught short and just don't have used music equipment around of the later and better type.

The demand in this direction came first, according to many distributors, and has been continuing unhalting. The fact that prices went down to the very lowest point in years for the late model used music machines had much to do with this sudden shortage on the market.

Many distributors, to raise cash this past year, cut prices of good used machines to the very bone. In many cases actually below what they had paid for the music equipment. This stirred the first sales and as more ops started buying the sales curve rose with the demand gradually increasing the distributors buying from each other and thereby clearing away used merchandise.

As one noted distrib stated, "I would very much like to have the late model phonos I sold. In fact, I'd buy them back at the price I sold them for right now."

This is the condition of the used music machines market and, therefore, with prices and deals being arranged locally to meet local music ops' pocket-books and payment methods, the sales curve has gone steadily upward these past months to the point where many now admit that the music equipment field looks extremely promising for the months to follow.

In the meantime, the multi-record phonos are grabbing the spotlight, since they have met with the greater approval of the players. It seems that to get any territory started swinging into music the multi-disk machines are first to get the ball rolling.

Furthermore, as this happens, the trade experiences a sales splurge all the way down the line. In most cases there are trade-ins taken and these are rapidly rolled out of the distrib's quarters at unusually low prices with a jobber profiting in between in many cases.

The ops are happy to buy from the jobber for he will recondition the unit and will bring it to the operator in perfect working order.

Of course, what is most important is the fact that the entire phono business is showing new pep. It has started going ahead to once again overtake whatever sales leaders there are at this time in other divisions of the field so that it can recapture the leadership it held for so many, many years.

Also interesting is that there are just the major music machine manufacturers left at this time. These men are presenting a much better phonograph for the money and most of them have recognized the price factor and also arranged for easier payment plans for the operators.

As the weeks go by it will be interesting to watch the progress which will be made in the coin machine industry as far as the automatic music division is concerned.

Will this division of the field recapture its leadership? Will it continue to zoom ahead? Are new and better phonos forthcoming from the manufacturers? Will more multi-record machines appear on the market?

These and hundreds of other questions are being asked of phono salesmen wherever they travel, indicating that there is more interest, and certainly more pep, in the automatic music industry than there has been in many, many months.

"There's A Bluebird On Your Windowsill" (3:01)

"Twilight" (3:07)

CARMEN CAVALLARO ORCH.
(Decca 24772)

● Hot on the heels of his smash success with "There's Yes, Yes In Your Eyes," maestro Carmen Cavallaro comes up with the spark of another hit in this ditty tagged "There's A Bluebird On Your Windowsill." The tune has been around for sometime now and should be fairly familiar to music ops. Vocal work by Bob Lido is effective, with the ork lending top-notch musical assistance in the background. On the other end with "Twilight," the Cavallaro ork go off the deep end to turn in a thrilling rendition of this current winner. Both sides have it—ops should latch on!

"Bluebird On Your Windowsill" (2:54)

"I've Got A Lovely Bunch of Coconuts" (2:51)

FREDDY MARTIN ORCH.
(RCA Victor 20-3554)

● Long missing from the phono spotlight as a name attraction, maestro Freddy Martin comes up with a pair here that might turn the trick. Wax, tagged "There's A Bluebird On Your Windowsill" and "I've Got A Lovely Bunch of Coconuts" make for easy listening throughout. Top deck has been widely recorded and is currently picking up in popularity. This rendition should hold its own. The flip is a cute novelty ditty with Merv Griffin and a vocal ensemble wailing the smart lyrics in pseudo English voice. The many Freddy Martin fans will hold still for this duo.

"So Blue" (3:01)

"Bye Bye Baby" (2:31)

ART LUND
(MGM 10542)

● Pair of sides by Art Lund that appear headed for a featured spot on music ops' machines are these tagged "So Blue" and "Bye Bye Baby." Top deck, with vocal harmony added by The Quartones, is an oldie offered in fresh scintillating manner. Vocal by Lund is excellent, as the slow tempting tones of this ballad seeps thru the wax. The flip is from the forthcoming musical production "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes," and has Art giving his best on a great rhythm ballad. Both sides are excellent juke box material—ops should get with 'em.

"I'm Cooked, Boiled & Toasted" (2:37)

"Please Take Me Home This Moment" (2:30)

JUDY VALENTINE
(MGM 10546)

● Some cute novelty wax headed music operators way are these new sides by thrush Judy Valentine titled "I'm Cooked, Boiled And Toasted" and "Please Take Me Home This Moment." Top deck weaves about the title and has Judy wailing the tempting lyrics in her own unusual wee vocal style. Lyrics of the tune make for loads of wonderful listening pleasure, and should be greeted warmly by music fans. The flip spills in slow tempo, and has the lass turning in another effective performance on a cute romantic ballad. Top deck might prove to be a sleeper.

DISK OF THE WEEK

"A Man Wrote A Song" (3:10)

"Foolish Tears" (2:57)

ELLA FITZGERALD
(Decca 24773)



ELLA FITZGERALD

● Brand new ditty that shapes up as a big bet for juke box silver is this latest bit titled "A Man Wrote A Song." With chirp Ella Fitzgerald on tap to render the excellent vocal strains, the tune becomes all the more enhancing. It's a smart, slowly-woven torch tune that

should have the romancers cuddling real close. Ella's vocal spot on the side is hard to match. The gal delivers her bit in crystal clear tones that satisfy throughout, while a vocal chorus adds to the wax incentive in the background. It's a top notch sentimental ballad that is sure to meet with wide approval. The ditty itself is not one of the run-of-the-mill torch songs—it has a plaintive, somber effect, with a ton of meaningful lyrics that glitter. On the other end with "Foolish Tears," Ella comes thru for music ops again with another brilliant performance on an equally great ballad. Both sides of this recording spell top drawer coin play for the phonos—music ops should climb aboard the bandwagon—but pronto!

"I Never See Maggie Alone" (2:57)
"When My Sugar Walks Down The Street" (2:53)

BENNY STRONG ORCH.
(Capitol 57-750)

● Fresh wax by orkster Benny Strong and the set up of the popular "I Never See Maggie Alone" and "When My Sugar Walks Down The Street." Top deck is a current rave, and should meet with fair approval. The flip is an oldie offered in typical Strong manner. Both sides are better than average recordings and should hold their own in the phonos. Ops should take a look-see in this direction.

"The Man I Love" (2:44)

"Once In A While" (3:05)

SARAH VAUGHAN
(MGM 10549)

● Pair of standards by chirp Sarah Vaughan, and the set up of "The Man I Love" and "Once In A While" in the offering for music ops. Always a consistent coin culler, Sarah delivers her own unique vocal style on this duo in thrilling tones that satisfy from start to finish. Both tunes should be well known to music ops since they have always been in heavy demand. "The Man I Love" noses out the flip side on this waxing. Ops should get with it.

"The Merry Christmas Waltz" (2:44)
"An Old Fashioned Tree" (2:50)

GUY LOMBARDO ORCH.
(Decca 24770)

● Maestro Guy Lombardo set up with a pair of enchanting Christmas tunes that echo brightly and have the taint of juke box coin play about them, with this coupling titled "The Merry Christmas Waltz" and "An Old-Fashioned Tree." Both sides whirl in medium tempo and styled in typical Lombardo manner. Vocal work by Kenny Gardner on the top deck, and Don Rodney on the flip is extremely effective throughout the entire recording. "Merry Christmas Waltz" should draw some heavy silver.

"Festival Of Roses" (2:57)

"Three Rivers" (2:56)

MARGARET WHITING
(Capitol 57-748)

● Chirp Margaret Whiting offers ops a pair of new sides in this coupling of "Festival of Roses" and "Three Rivers." Topside is a slow romantic ballad that makes for fairly pleasant listening. Maggie's vocal on the side is smooth throughout, as is the ork backing under the baton of maestro Frank DeVol. The flip falls in the same pattern, and has the thrush offering a ballad in sing-song fashion. Top deck might catch some coin.

"You Wish Me All The Luck In The World" (2:50)

"I Don't Want To Be President" (2:56)

CHARLES LA VERE
(Decca 24774)

● Songstar Charles La Vere offers a pair of cute songs in this coupling of "You Wish Me All The Luck In The World" and "I Don't Want To Be President." The Jeff Alexander chorus and vocal harmony on both sides of this platter, to add to the wax incentive offered. Top deck spills in slow tempo and features a set of lamenting romantic lyrics. The flip is a smartly styled rhythm ballad that might catch on and go. Both sides are rendered in able vocal style—ops might listen.

"Johnny Bach" (2:46)

"The Hours I Spent With You" (2:43)

ANNE SHELTON
(London 479)

● Pair of pleasing sides by thrush Anne Shelton show with some promise here, as the lass sets her pipes around "Johnny Bach," "The Hours I Spent With You." Both sides are plush production numbers offered in smart vocal and instrumental manner. Lyrics weave about in tempting romantic tones and are easy on the ears. Vocal effect is added on the top deck by the Wardour Singers, with the Paul Fenoulhet ork turning in a brilliant orchestral bit on both sides. "Johnny Bach" is the better of the pair.

"If I Ever Love Again" (3:10)

"Love's A Precious Thing" (2:29)

EVELYN KNIGHT
(Decca 24771)

● Ditty that is a cinch to grab on and go like wildfire is this latest piece of wax by chirp Evelyn Knight. Titled "If I Ever Love Again," Evelyn gives out with some excellent vocal work on this slow romantic ode to set the stage for some heavy coinplay. The tune has been widely recorded, and should prove to be among the most popular in no time at all. On the other end with a cute piece of music in "Love's A Precious Thing," the lass comes thru for music ops again with a lightly styled rhythm ballad that should do well. The Jeff Alexander chorus lend vocal assistance on both sides to add glamour to this glowing piece of wax. "If I Ever Love Again" for the moola.

"Give Me Your Hand" (3:02)

"Pal Of My Cradle Days" (3:00)

CLARK DENNIS
(Capitol 57-745)

● The strong romantic voice of balladeer Clark Denis is shown in excellent light on this duo. It's the top deck we go for—and go for in a big way at that. Ditty is currently climbing in popularity—this rendition, with Clark spooning the glowing lyrics in crystal clear tones that satisfy, should catch an avalanche of moola. The flip is a standard that has long won music fans' acclaim, and had the balladeer turning in another top notch vocal performance. Ops should climb on to the top deck—but pronto!

Vocal work on the side is top drawer thru-out, with the Billy Butterfield ork backing the thrush in great style. The flip is a current rave fave and has Ralph turning in an excellent performance. Ops who haven't caught this platter yet should do so by all means.

Top deck, with a vocal chorus added in the background, is a slow ballad that makes for wonderful listening time. On the other end with "Nalani," Nat offers another ballad tainted with a bit of Hawaiian in it. Song is a tender one that should receive heavy play. Both decks are hot.

The coupling shines just as brightly and has Jon and Sondra turning in another wonderful performance. "I'm In Love" should reap harvest for music ops.

Italian folk theme that has long won favor with music fans throughout the land. Tony's sincere vocal effort on this side is hard to match. His strong resounding tones of sheer vocal beauty make for wonderful listening from start to finish. The side is offered in plush production manner with a section of singing strings seeping thru the waxing. It's the type of tune you stop and listen to attentively, and then come back for another earful. On the other end with "A Thousand Violins," Tony comes back with another great bit of wax for music operators. This side shows Tony's big voice off to excellent fare too. The tune is currently receiving heavy plugging—this rendition is one of the best around. The wax is a cinch to score heavily—ops should get with it!

"I've Gotta Keep Lovin' You" (2:30)

Fond hand clap makes the side a bit brighter. The flip has Jimmy and the boys in the band offering a south-of-the-border girl tune that might draw some silver. Both sides are there for the asking—music ops take it from here.

It's a wonderful rhythm ballad that should earn its fair share of juke box coin. The flip has Johnny Soltan knocking off another rhythm ballad in smooth vocal style. Wax should do exceptionally well as a filler item.

● Doris Day comes up with a pair of good tunes in this duo tagged "There's A Bluebird On Your Windowsill" and "The River Seine." Top deck is currently receiving wide attention thru-out music circles and should prove to be a big winner. This rendition, with Doris displaying her charming pipes in light vocal effort throughout the waxing is excellent. Vocal chorus in the background adds to the glamour of the side immensely. The flip switches to a slow tempo'd ode all about "The River Seine." Ops should get with both ends of this deck—they're hot.

● Thrush Patti Page comes up with a pair of excellent sides in this duo tagged "Just Got To Have Him Around" and "A Thousand Violins." Both ends of this platter show Patti's enchanting set of tonsils to top notch advantage. Top deck is a slow, infectious bit of music, with Patti purring the lyrics in smooth vocal style. Wordage weaves about the title, while Mitch Miller's ork lends top drawer musical assistance. The flip stays in the plush vein and has our lass turning in a brilliant performance on "A Thousand Violins," a ditty that is currently catching on in popularity. Ops should listen in.

"I Can Dream, Can't I" (3:00)

● Make no mistake about this one! Sure to catch on and go like wildfire is this indie dinking that will wear absolutely white in the phonos. Titled "Clarinet Mambo," with maestro Al Lombardy featured on clarinet, the deck resounds with a ton of juke box silver and incentive for music ops to get after. It's a wonderful bit of music that makes you wanna come back and listen time and again. Mambo tempo in the background is top notch from start to finish, as is the fine musicianship of the maestro on the stick. On the other end with "Bounce," piper Joe Derice takes the limelight to turn in a cute rhythm ditty that sparkles throughout. Band echo and a Latin chorus adds to the winning incentive found here. Take note of the vocal work of Joe Derice—the kid has what it takes to score. Ops should climb aboard the bandwagon on this one—especially so with "Clarinet Mambo."



Paul Weston To Be Featured As Solo Ork On Capitol Disks

HOLLYWOOD—In line with the present trend of emphasizing solo records by artists originally used for orchestra backgrounds, Capitol Records this week announced Paul Weston, its musical chief, and his band will be featured on regular single releases along with other top recording stars on this label.

Instead of being confined to instrumental albums, Weston's musical interpretations will be marketed as singles as well, the first disk coupling "I Know I Know I Know" with "Lingering Down The Lane." Jud Conlon Singers assist on both faces.

Coincidental with this release, Weston departs this month on a mid-western tour with Jo Stafford, the Starlighters and Red Ingle, all Capitol artists. In addition, Capitol releases a new and different Weston album, packaging music by Debussy, Ravel and Chopin. Permission was obtained in the case of Ravel and Debussy to record Weston's arrangements from the publisher M. Durand and Sons after copies of the selections went sent to Paris for approval. This is the first time such an agreement has been effected, allowing an American arranger to adapt this French material in his own style.

Also of interest in the "Weston department" is the production of his music for Capitol on 78, 45 and recently 33 RPM, introducing him as the first artist to have an album out on all three record speeds.

Automatic Music Industry Aids In V D Fight

Juke boxes are spinning to win Uncle Sam's fight against syphilis.

Their weapon in this war is a fast-loping ballad, "That Ignorant, Ignorant Cowboy," produced by the Communication Materials Center of Columbia University Press, for use by health departments in VD campaigns nation over.

Mercury Records Corp. "discovered" the disk, composed and sung by Balladeer Tom Glazer, with words by Erik Barnouw, national president of the Radio Writers Guild, leased the master, and is making enough pressings to cover the country through retail counter sales and coin machines.

Music Operators of America like the platter so well they endorsed it at their recent Chicago meeting, and are calling upon every member from Coast to Coast to put it on their turn-tables. Initial order from juke box operators is 100,000; demand is expected to whirl "Cowboy" on the nation's 500,000 automatic phonographs.

This gallop of a VD record from health department educational device to national hit proportions is considered the biggest news in public health since syphilis first came out from behind the curtain of silence. It's big music-trade news too, for it's the first time the phonograph operators have had the opportunity to put public service to music on a massive, nation-wide scale.

The Communication Material Center creates and distributes public educational material for use in all mass media. In addition to phonograph records, they are producing movies, television shows, radio programs, comic books, posters, pamphlets and display cards. Health departments in some 300 communities of the nation used these materials in 1949 summer and fall VD case-finding drives.

MGM In Heavy Push On "Rum & Soda"

NEW YORK—There's a four-cornered romance going on at the moment that may turn into one of the biggest record promotions of 1949. The romancers include M-G-M Records, Noro Morales, Puerto Rican rum interests and the club soda industry—and their reason for romance is "Rum And Soda," tune penned by Morales and waxed by him for M-G-M.

M-G-M caught on to the tune a couple of months ago when columnists like Walter Winchell and Dorothy Kilgallen spotted it as another "Rum And Coca Cola." The diskery held recording plans, however, until they were able to arrange for a big co-operative exploitation campaign on the number with the Puerto Rico Industrial Co., a Government agency sponsoring the promotion. Once plans were settled, M-G-M cut the tune with the Morales orchestra, put a rush release on it, and completed initial shipments of it to distributors within two weeks. At about that stage of the game, Canada Dry Soda spotted the promotion as a potential gravy-boat and hopped aboard, agreeing to share promotion costs with the rum interests and M-G-M.

The campaign itself led off with shipments of complimentary copies of "Rum And Soda" to disk-jockeys, columnists, and record reviewers. Each record shipped was accompanied by a miniature bottle of rum and a split of soda.

M-G-M salesmen have been equipped with enough back-bar streamers and

"Clarinet Mambo" Stirs Music Biz

NEW YORK — New indie label bowed into the disk spotlight this past week with a whale of attention surrounding it. New firm, headed by Gene Gold, is tagged Cobra Records.

The platter's first release, "Clarinet Mambo," was passed around to local disk jockey's and trade reviewers, and that's when the phones started buzzing. First reaction to the new tune was one of immediate approval, with most in the trade believing Cobra had a big hit on their hands.

Gold, prexy of the plattery, disclosed that the firm is currently engaged in setting up national distribution. At this stage he has already set up approximately eight distributors, with more to come in the near future.

Despite declining conditions in the band business today, Sammy Kaye and his Swing and Sway aggregation continue on their merry way of making the cash register ring loud and often wherever they appear.

Dick Linke, road promotion manager for the band, disclosed that Kaye has played to capacity houses throughout his recent swing of dates.

Kaye drew 3,200 people in Meyers Lake Park, Canton, O., on a Sunday night. However, if Kaye thought this was business he had yet to see the light, since he really outdid himself at the Deshler-Wallich Hotel, Columbus, O. According to figures handed out by Palmer Suddaby, manager of the hotel, the band drew 3,110 covers for six days. This is big business when you consider that the capacity of the room is only 460 and the turnover in towns outside of New York City is relatively low.

Taking everything into consideration, Kaye has definitely proved the old adage of giving the people what they want to hear. In addition, Linke contacts local music operators and dealers, who are invited to Kaye's engagements. Record sales and juke box play generally result in appreciable quantities.

Arco Records Bow

The new label, who will also handle the distribution of Manor Records, is currently engaged in setting up national distribution.

Connecticut Music Ops Meet At New Haven; Assn. Gets Under Way

NEW HAVEN, CONN.—A remarkably large number of Connecticut's music operators (over 50 men) gathered at the Hotel Taft, this city, to put the final touches to its formation of a state-wide association. Called together by Nat Cutler, temporary chairman, music ops came from every part of the state, and after listening to several speakers from New York and New Jersey, voted unanimously

to assess themselves, according to the number of machines operated, so that a substantial sum of money would be available immediately to begin functioning.

Cutler, acting as toastmaster, introduced the guest speakers. "Senator" Al Bodkin, member of the Board of Directors of the Automatic Music Operators Association, New York, was the first speaker, and his brilliant, sparkling, down-to-earth talk of the problems that beset the New York group at its inception, and how over the years they were overcome to a point where today the New York group is not only respected by locations, but where operators are making a substantial profit, was heard with rapt attention. Not only did the "Senator" impress the group, but his answers to questions from the floor were immediate and clear.

Eddie Burg, manager of Royal Music Company, Newark, N. J., operators of about 1,000 machines thruout New Jersey, followed Bodkin on the rostrum, talking about his firm's problems prior to the formation of the Music Guild of America, and how over the past two years since its inception, conditions have improved so greatly. Eddie spoke eloquently as one operator to another, leaving the gathering in a highly optimistic frame of mind.

Joe Orleck, *The Cash Box*, spoke briefly, pointing out advantages derived by the many other state associations thruout the country. Barney (Shugy) Sugerman, Runyon Sales Company (AMI distributor in the territory), closed out the guest speaker session. Adhering strictly to operator problems, Sugerman put the final clincher on the benefits of close cooperation among music machine operators.

The very successful meeting came to a close with the appointment of a group of the state's leading operators to assist Cutler in organizational matters. The men selected to serve are: Frank Marks, New London; Jimmy Telisano, Hartford; Joe Nicolario, Waterbury; Micky Nicholas, Bridgeport; Art Rodey, Bristol, and the hard working George Mara, New Haven.

Working at top speed, Cutler announced that another meeting will be held within ten days to two weeks so that no time will be lost in their efforts to serve the music operator.

Keeney Presents Rebound-"Line-Up"

Carom Type High Score Rebound Tested On Location For Period Of 8 Weeks

CHICAGO — Roy McGinnis, president of J. H. Keeney Co., this city, introduced the firm's first carom type high score rebound game to the industry this past week. The game is called "Line Up," and has met with the approval of the firm's many distributors, as well as jobbers and operators who saw it on location.

The model that was tested on location was 10c play and the collections continued to increase week after week.

McGinnis attributed this to the skill-play challenge of the game and the fact that the players continued playing game after game to obtain a perfect score. The game features skillful carom puck shooting action which is based on two lines of lights: red and green. The idea is to carom the puck so that it will pass over both the red and green light at the same time giving a score of 100,000, whereas by just passing over one light, the score received is only 10,000.

The game is very fascinating because of the various combinations of the red and green lights which come up each time. Yet the player must be skillful with his carom shot to pass over the two with the same puck to get the top score each time.

This is a definite challenge to the player's skill. The location tests proved that players would continue game after game in an attempt to prove that they could carom the puck perfectly over the two lights at the same time in the top and bottom lines.

By featuring high score, "Line Up" offers the players a very fine game for multiple play. Two, three and more players can play the game and let the total scores decide.

The collections on "Line Up" were remarkable and since they continued to increase week after week, caused execs of the Keeney firm to believe that "Line Up" will prove itself the longest lasting rebound ever yet presented to the market.

Bally Announces "Shuffle-Bowler"

Shuffle-Type Bowling Game Incorporates Bowling Rules

CHICAGO—Bally "Shuffle-Bowler," new shuffle-type bowling game, is based on an extensive player-survey, according to a statement by Jack Nelson, general sales manager of Bally Manufacturing Company, this city. "Bally fieldmen and distributors," Nelson explained, "visited bowling-alleys in all parts of the country and talked to hundreds of bowlers. They also got opinions from shuffleboard players in typical locations from coast to coast.

"The bowlers," Jack continued, "of course, insisted on official bowling rules. We had expected that, and Bally engineers had already worked out circuits to permit the automatic scoring of every kind of bowling blow—strikes, doubles, turkeys, splits, spares, railroads. These are all incorporated in the new Bally Shuffle-Bowler.

"More important was the comment on general construction. Bowlers and shufflers agreed unanimously on two major points: first, the alley must be long enough to approximate the skill-play of bowling or standard shuffleboard games; second, the game must have gutters. So Shuffle-Bowler is built according to players' specifications: (1) Played by official bowling rules; (2) 9½ ft. long with the alley alone only 3 inches short of 9 ft. long; (3) gutters on each side of the alley.

"Location tests prove that our survey was right. In bowling-alley locations, players are crowding up to play Shuffle-Bowler while waiting for alleys. Shuffleboard fans are enthusiastic, and the general public is fascinated by the combination of two great sports in one game. At ten frames for 10c, earnings are far ahead of recent novelty figures."

CHICAGO — Ted Rubenstein of Comet Industries, Inc., this city, reported this past week that the firm are at last getting under way and that they will have a stock of Daval counter games built up within a few weeks. The problem has been to segregate and label the parts which the firm took over when they bought the Daval plant.

At the same time, since first notification of the news that Comet had purchased Daval, inquiries have been coming in, Rubenstein reports, and the firm haven't been able to handle these.





Rowe Produces New Penny Inserter

NEW YORK—Perfection of a new electric penny-pushing machine, for inserting pennies under the cellophane wrappings of cigarettes, has just been announced by the Rowe Manufacturing Co., this city. The new machine, which has been exhaustively tested in action for the past six months, steps up the production per worker by almost one-third, it is claimed.

"In addition to speed," stated a Rowe official, "the new machine offers several distinct advantages over older types. Pennies are dumped into a round trough, which eliminates tedious tube-filling and the danger of spillage. From the trough, the pennies drop automatically onto a revol-

ving turntable, which forces the coins into a proper line-up for insertion into the cigarette packages. The machine will thus work as fast as the hands of the most nimble operator.

"By eliminating the push-pedal, workers are considerably less tired at the end of the day, and in the six-month experiment which we conducted, it was discovered that there was considerably less employee turnover, and few absences due to fatigue."

The new electric penny-pusher, because of its gentle finger-tip touch, is considerably easier on cellophane, and reports indicate that far less cellophane is mutilated.



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


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
