

"AMOR" (2:51) [Peer BMI—Skylar, Ruiz, Mendez]
"SOUVENIR OF MEXICO" (2:10)
[Valley, Progressive, Trio BMI—Pomus, Shuman]
BEN E. KING (Atco 6203)

"Amor" looks (and sounds) like King's third smasher-in-a-row ("Spanish Harlem" and "Stand By Me") since taking his solo run. It's the lovely evergreen, "Amor," that sports a captivating, teen samba-styled string-filled showcase and a grade "A" vocal job by Ben E. Coupler's a happy-go-lucky Latin beat newcomer that also rates attention. Splendid Stan Applebaum ork-choral assist on two sides culled from artist's new "Spanish Harlem" LP.

"WITHOUT YOU" (2:06) [Ridge BMI—Tillotson]
"CUTIE PIE" (2:13) [Ridge BMI—Tillotson]
JOHNNY TILLOTSON (Cadence 1404)

Johnny Tillotson is back on the wax scene with tremendous ballad-with-a-beat opus that could soar way up the hit list in no time flat. It's a romantic heartbreaker, with a mid-deck recitation, that Johnny puts across with telling effect. The hard beat, string-filled Archie Bleyer ork and choral showcase is just great. "Cutie Pie" is a contagious rocker that can also step way out. The talented Tillotson clefted both ends.

"GIRLS, GIRLS, GIRLS" (Part 2) (1:51)
[Progressive, Trio BMI—Leiber, Stoller]
"GIRLS, GIRLS, GIRLS" (Part 1) (2:07)
[Progressive, Trio BMI—Leiber, Stoller]
THE COASTERS (Atco 6204)

The novelty hit-makers, who recently scored with "Little Egypt," serve up another delightful ditty that should be headin' towards hitsville in the weeks to come. It's a two-part'er all about "Girls, Girls, Girls." The thumping, quick beat Part 2 holds a slight commercial edge over the shuffle-rock Part 1 side.

"TURN ME ON" (2:23) [Acuff-Rose—Loudermilk]
"LONELY ISLAND" (2:17) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Bryant]
MARK DINNING (MGM 13024)

This is one of Dinning's most powerful performances to date. Tune, tabbed "Turn Me On," is an overwhelming beat-ballad romantic pleader that finds the songster in top dramatic form. Excellent choral & ork support. Tearful but enchanting dual-tracked lilter on the lower half. Lovely item.

"GEE OH GEE" (2:00) [Greta, Glodis BMI—Laurence, Elgin, Denson]
"ANGEL OF MY HEART" (2:00) [Greta BMI—Boyle, Morrissey, Duffy]
THE ECHOES (Seg-Way 1002)

The Echoes can duplicate their "Baby Blue" success with this similar soft cha cha beat ballad stand. It's a very pretty romancer, tabbed "Gee Oh Gee," that the teeners should cotton to on first listen. Coupler's another inviting ballad smoothie.

"MILFORD" (2:05) [Alamo ASCAP—Monnot, Piaf]
"OCEANS OF LOVE" (2:08) [Mayfair ASCAP—Sigman]
JORGENN INGMANN (Atco 6205)

The "Apache" man Jorgen Ingmann is back with another sensational sounding instrumental that has that 'top ten' feel. This time it's the oft-recorded Continental all-timer, Edith Piaf's "Milord," that's treated to Ingmann's tricky, multi-track guitar-work. A platter spinning must. "Oceans Of Tears" takes an ear-pleasing toe-tapping route on the potent underlid. Also bears close attention.

"I ONLY WANT YOU" (2:15) [Audicon, Tampico BMI—Evans]
"ONE LOVE" (2:43) [One O'Clock BMI—Malis]
CATHY JEAN (Valmor 11)

Cathy Jean, of "Please Love Me Forever" chart fame, can have a real big summer item in this fetching revival of the Passions' while-back coin-catcher, "I Only Want You." Thrush's high-pitched tones softly caress the romancer set in an easy-going teen beat cha cha showcase. Deck's from Cathy's (and the Roomates' "At The Hop" LP). "One Love" is a warm, ballad-with-a-beat stand.

HENRY JEROME ORCH.

(Decca 25523)
(B+) "THEME FROM 'BRAZEN BRASS'" (2:05) [Northern ASCAP—Jerome] Maestro Jerome, who has produced the label's successful "Brazen Brass" LP's, heads a very likeable swing arrangement of his own ditty from his "Brazen Brass Brings Back the Bands" LP. Sure to please lots of jocks and rack up loads of juke box coin.
(B) "SLEEPY TIME GAL" (2:38) [Leo Feist ASCAP—Lorenzo, Whiting, Alden, Egan] Dreamy band treatment of the standby. Track is from the first "Brazen Brass" LP.

DOROTHY COLLINS

(Gold Eagle 1809)
(B+) "NOT ONE TEAR" (2:31) [Sarah ASCAP—Bell] Thrush goes after the teen trade with a good-sounding blues-styled vocal of the disenchanting opus. Funky band sound is effective. Could come-up with solid spins.
(B) "THE LOVER" (2:17) [Sounds ASCAP—Reardon, Layton, Kuter] Sprightly portrayal of a cute continental-styled ditty.

RAY ANTHONY ORCH.

(Capitol 4603)
(B+) "MOLIENDO CAFE" (2:03) [Morro BMI—Manzo] Tune, a smash in Argentina, is catchy folkish ditty which the Anthony crew delivers with a very rhythmic Latinish sound. A tasteful ork stint that could come-up with U.S. chart action.
(B) "CHAMPS ELYSEES" (2:38) [Ludlow BMI—Schachtner] Smooth sax-led arrangement of an attractive opus reportedly making noise in Europe. There's also a wordless gal chorus.

DORE ALPERT (RCA Victor 7918)
(B+) "GONNA GET A GIRL" (1:58) [Miller ASCAP—Lewis, Simon] Engaging brisk bounce portrayal of the catchy oldie by the songster and full ork-gal chorus backing. Deck can attract adult as well as teen attention.
(B) "DREAMLAND" (2:19) [Ultra BMI—Sheeley] Kids ought to approve of this interesting upbeat romantic stint with strings.

B-B (Cover 19613)
(B+) "HUMDINGER" (2:08) [Quilted BMI—Cunningham] Exciting rapid-fire stand by the instrumentalists, with the ivory and sax men solidly upfront. The Memphis label, which has had previous action with the group, could have a chart success here.
(B) "THE KING OF HEARTS" (2:14) [Hut BMI—Cunningham, Taylor] Soft-beat tune is handled by the sax.

AARON NEVILLE (Minit 631)
(B+) "LET'S LIVE" (2:37) [Minit BMI—Neville] Original-sounding Latinish-blues ballad arrangement backs-up Neville's teen-wise wistful vocal. Deck can move with sufficient station time.
(B) "I FOUND ANOTHER LOVE" (2:18) [Minit BMI—Neville] Strings are included in this attractive romantic softie.

JON THOMAS (ABC-Paramount 10238)
(B+) "FLIP FLOP AND FLY" (2:29) [Progressive BMI—Turner, Calhoun] The old Joe Turner hit is done with lots of upbeat R&B finesse by the songster, who turned the Top 100 trick recently with "Heartbreak." Could step-out in the R&B field.
(B+) "BOSS HOSS" (2:36) [Pamco BMI—Thomas] Swingin' blues organ is big instrument in this driving, all-combo showing.

JOE JONES (Roulette 4377)

(B+) "(I've Got A) UH UH WIFE" (2:20) [Tryrol & Curtore BMI—Sherman, Butler, Jones] The "You Talk Too Much" songster presents another marital novelty with a happy beat. Kids will like the merry-rock manner here.
(B) "THE BIG MULE" (2:07) [Tryrol BMI—Glover] This teen dance lesson has the busy quality of "A Quarter to Three."

THE GO-CARTS (Hope 1003)
(B+) "BLUE MOON OF KENTUCKY" (2:08) [Peer BMI—Monroe] Familiar country oldie gets a solid Johnny & The Hurricanes-type sock-rock instrumental outing. Rockin' organ and sax are the top sounds. This portion can score. Label is based in Nashville.

(B) "ROCKIN' LIZA" (2:23) [Hillsboro BMI—Tuttle, Hunley, Moss, Robbins] Guitars and piano are featured in this interesting upbeat stint from the combo.

JERRY NORELL (Amy 827)
(B+) "TTSY BITSY CHA CHA" (2:17) [Republic BMI—Jay, Barrett] Sprightly rock-a-cha novelty, an outgrowth of last year's "Itsy Bitsy" hit, tells a tale of gal and guy who dance the cha-cha with caution because they spent too much time in the sun. Can get around.
(B) "YO YO" (2:02) [Republic BMI—Jay, Barrett, Magerl] Speedy rocker about a love that has its ups-and-downs.

HOLDER NEWTON (Capitol 4601)
(B) "ON SAFARI" (2:03) [Exbrook BMI—Moffett, Shauer] Against a catchy jungle-type sound from the combo, Newton does a cool teen narrative ala the recent "Allez-Oop" hit.
(B) "LOST ON THE RIVER NILE" (2:09) [Exbrook BMI—Summers, Moffett] Chipmunk-like (or "Pygmies," as the label copy says) voices are included in a somewhat similar laff stint. The "Apes" get accompaniment credit on the top-half.

RUSSELL FAITH ORK & CHORUS (Chancellor 1083)
(B+) "THEME FROM FRANCIS OF ASSISI" (2:35) [Robbins ASCAP—Nascimbene] The beautifully dramatic theme of the just-opened pic is superbly portrayed by the Faith outfit with Frank Hunter at the conducting-arranging helm. Should fill the airwaves.
(B) "MIRA (CAN YOU IMAGINE THAT)" (2:28) [Robbins ASCAP—Merrill] This charmer, from "Carnival," finds a soft cha cha beat setting.

LOUIS PRIMA & KEELY SMITH (Dot 16249)
(B+) "BECAUSE OF YOU" (2:09) [Gower BMI—Hammerstein, Wilkinson] Famed act do a bright revival of the oldie, with Sam Butera and The Witnesses supporting with a colorful Latinish backdrop. Solid joyride for the jocks.

(B) "ABSENT-MINDED LOVER" (2:50) [Planetary ASCAP—Segal, Vance] Bouncy romantic novelty.
THE GOSPEL CLEFS (Savoy 4161)
(B+) "SO GOOD" [Savoy BMI—Lumpkins] A dynamic gospel performance that could arouse pop interest. Side's got a steady walking beat over which the group offers its fervent shouting pleas. A compelling deck for any listener.
(B) "TO HEAL THE SOUL" [Savoy BMI—Lumpkins] Group again exhibits a gripping dynamism. Here it's on another infectious gospel item of more than ordinary interest.

LAVERN BAKER (Atlantic 2109)

Take your pick here. Miss Baker offers two potent follow-ups to her recent chart outing, "Saved." One side, "I Didn't Know I Was Crying," finds the gal at her emotion-packed beat-ballad best. The other, "Hurtin' Inside," is a dynamic blues belter that Lavern socks out with money-making authority. Watch 'em both.

"MEXICO" (2:37) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Bryant]

"HOT SPOT" (2:25) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Bryant]

BOB MOORE (Monument 446)

It's a delighter that's sure to make the jocks sit up and take notice. The chorus joins in with sans lyric chants on the catchy undercut, "Hot Spot."

Could be a back-to-back biggie.

FREDDY KING (Federal 12428)

King, whose instrumental outing, "Hideaway," is still racking up loads of dual-mart pop-r&b spins long after its release, can be in for more of the same here. Side, tabbed "San-Ho-Zay," is a funky rhythm shuffler that the King crew works over in enticing manner. "See See Baby" features King in a sock blues vocal spotlite. Can come thru big too.

"WHAT SHOULD I DO" (2:07) [Tree BMI—Tex]

"THE ONLY GIRL I'VE EVER LOVED)" (2:35) [Tree BMI—Tex]

JOE TEX (Dial 3000)

Tex, whose had a host of r&b-pop noise-makers in the past, can really crash into the bigtime with this London-distributed Dial release. Side, titled "What Should I Do," is an exciting, fast-moving jumper that Tex and the ork-chorus rock out with solid teen enthusiasm. Joe switches to a beat-ballad pace on the flip and turns in another strong performance.

(B+) "DON'T YOU SWEETHEART ME" (2:20) [Kemo BMI—Hurdon, Hurdon] A Canadian master purchase by the label, deck is a catchy teen bounce affair with a plaintive plot. Effort, reportedly making noise in Canada, might do important business here.

JIMMY MOIKEHA (Paradise 100)

(B) "MYNAH BIRD" (3:02) [Aloha State—Todaro] Hawaiian vocalist (label is based in Hawaii) does a take-off on "Yellow Bird," on the current Arthur Lyman (Hi-Fi) smash.

(C+) "ALOHA, MY HONOLULU" (2:34) [Aloha State—Todaro] Swingin' tribute to the city.

BOBBY JOE (Flag 5001)

(B) "LIVING STONE" (2:25) [Flag BMI—Futch, Robertson] Young singer heads a colorful rock-a-string (& chorus)-backed display of an upbeat countryish romancer. Label headquarters in Lucedale, Miss.

(C+) "HAYFEVER" (2:33) [Cedarwood BMI—Carruth, Ball] Novelty rocker without strings.

LOHN RITCHIE (20th Fox 269)

(B) "FIVE" (2:26) [Bourne ASCAP—Martin, Martin] Years-back inspirational-like romantic gets an honest portrayal from songster Ritchie, who is backed by a good semi-dramatic teen-market combo-chorus stint.

(B) "GONE, GONE, GONE" (2:01) [Shawn ASCAP—Martin, Beebe, Kahn] Nice plaintive ballad outing here.

THE PRECISIONS (Strand 25038)

(B) "YOU CAN'T PLAY GAMES" (2:15) [Rensark BMI—Martin, Krasner] A catchy Latinish teen romantic in which the lead gives-out with the lyrics and fellow songsters mostly chant.

(B) "DREAM ON" (2:10) [Rensark BMI—Zahn, Barrett] Softer Latin-styled stint. Tune is pleasing.

CLINT MILLER (Headline 1013)

(B) "A GIRL WITH A RIBBON IN HER HAIR" [Inter-Continental ASCAP—Miller] Catchy rock-a-billy doings by the songster and vocal-musical setting. Tune tells of a guy's search for the right-gal.

FRANKIE SANDS (Mastersound 50002)

(C+) "YOU TAUGHT ME HOW TO REMEMBER" (2:05) [View BMI—Liblick] Straight ballad performance. Label is from L.A.

JIMMY STEWART (Ace 632)

(B) "I'LL REMEMBER YOU" [R&T BMI—Toombs, Abbott] Singer reads the romantic against a bouncy Nashville rock sound from the combo-male chorus.

(C+) "WINNER TAKE ALL" [Southern ASCAP—Wayne, Fresck] Shuffle-beat ballad doings here on the oldie.

ELSIE WHEAT (Jab 101)

(B) "MY EVERY PRAYER" [F.A.A. BMI—Johnson] Label intros the songstress who exhibits solid blues knowhow and a shouting vocal attack. Turn here is a steady-paced romantic ballad. The Jimmy Johnson combo assists stylishly.

(B) "CUBAN BLUES" [F.A.A. BMI—Johnson] Latin beat affair is engagingly explored by the thrush. Johnson combo excels again in the instrumental dept.



ALL ABOUT DISK JOCKEYS

Jim Ameche continues to expand his syndicated productions with the addition last week of shows by Pat Boone and Jane Morgan. Both Boone and Miss Morgan will be taping a backlog of hourly shows for Jim Ameche Productions, which will be made available to stations on a five day a week basis. Boone will concentrate on singles; Miss Morgan on albums. Harold Spina, Jr., is handling music coordinator and program director chores for the two shows. . . . WRCV-Philadelphia still pushing hard to revive "live" big band gigs. Latest in this series of endeavors is a remote broadcast skedded for July 27 from the Philadelphia Naval Station auditorium featuring the 4th Naval District dance band—an eighteen-piece aggregation of talented musicians. Hal Moore will emcee the broadcast portion of the date.

Cigar smoke hovers thickly over WHK-Cleveland (and has been for most of the year) as two more babies joined the official family. The latest additions were to the families of business manager Charlie Massella (his fourth girl) and acc't exec Joe Zingale (his third). Earlier this year librarian Neil McIntyre and program director Terry Ford became poppas for the first time. Actually, we think someone spiked the water cooler. . . . Ron Sunshine up from WROV-Roanoke, Va., for a couple of days, dropped in to pass along the info of the station's new Saturday morning "Teen Town"—a radio bandstand type show. Ron hosts the show while also handling the 6 PM to midnite stanza. He would like artists planning to be in the area to contact him for possible personal appearances on the show.

An introductory letter from Graham Miles marked him as a forward-looking disk jockey at 2LF-Young, N.S.W., Australia. Graham is trying to build his programs to include the latest releases from the U.S. but being with a small station and on a limited budget finds it extremely difficult to buy them as the larger capitol cities stations do. Therefore, Graham would greatly appreciate any complimentary copies of new records and promises a good reception for them. Studios are located at 24 Lovell St., Young, N.S.W., Australia. . . . Bill Bennett, WLOL-Minneapolis/St. Paul, was for the second-year-in-a-row the official track announcer for the Minneapolis Soap Box Derby. . . . KATZ-St. Louis has initiated a new Sunday evening series entitled "Great Negro Artists." Hosted by Gloria Pritchard, the show will present music performed by leading figures in the entertainment world.

Nearly 165,000 pieces of mail bombarded the KQV-Pittsburgh offices during the past eight weeks as the station staged a giant trading stamp giveaway. Over 2 million stamps were given away through a twice daily award of 12,000 stamps and a grand prize of 100,000 stamps during the eight-week period. The station averaged 4,100 pieces of mail daily. Mostly, probably, from housewives who just couldn't resist building the biggest stamp collection on the block. . . . To demonstrate how a modern Indian lives, KORL-Honolulu's Dick Spangler is spending the next two weeks in a wigwam, bedecked in feathers and Indian costume. Lauderdale taping interviews is Ann Smith, who with her companion poodle, is keeping WWIL listeners alert on the news and views of visiting personalities. She also handles public relations for the station—a better choice could not have been made. . . . Jimmy Meyers (WTOP-Washington, D.C.) and wife, singer Ruby Lee, expecting an addition to the family. . . . KVI-Seattle's Jimmy Carver is one of 16 finalists remaining from 80,000 original participants in the Toastmaster International speech contests. Carver, past president of chamber 540 of the Seattle Toastmasters, won the speaking title from his zone and will compete July 27 against other zone winners. The world-wide organization is devoted to encouraging and developing the art of public speaking—more disk jockeys could benefit from its program. . . . To aid the Red Cross obtain more blood donors during the slack summer season WWDC-Washington, D.C. originated the July 18 edition of the Fred Fiske show from the Red Cross Blood Donor Center and presented each donor with record albums. Included among the donors were several contestants in the Miss Washington contest, which WWDC sponsors annually. . . . KTLN-Denver's Ray Durkee and Johnny Rowe led over 1,000 people to the airport last week to greet the arrival of Tommy Sands and wife Nancy Sinatra.

After a seven year stretch, Lucky Pierre exits WBNY-Buffalo, N.Y. for a post with KHJ-Los Angeles, effective Aug. 1. . . . Billy Foxx moves crosstown from WSID to WWIN-Baltimore, angling into the Sat., 8 PM to 2 AM slot. . . . KTLN-Denver has acquired the services of Al Julius to replace the departing Bill Pierson, who's going to devote full time to his expanding broadcasting school. . . . KTLN also added former free-lance promo man George Tews to the staff as publicity and promo director. . . . New general manager for KWK-St. Louis is Alan Henry, who held the same position at WCKR-Miami and WNHC-New Haven, Conn. . . . Staff Sergeant Don Sturgis, host of ABC's Air Force "Moods in Melody" for the past two years, leaves July 28 for new duties with Armed Forces Television in Okinawa. Replacing him on the Sunday afternoon show will be Staff Sergeant Tom Shaw. . . . Recently appointed program director at KBLU-Yuma, Ariz., is Gary Todd. . . . Johnny Canton was appointed regional program director for the Good Neighbor chain—WNOV-York, Pa., and WRAW-Reading, Pa. Canton, currently PD for just WNOV, will now guide the program destiny of both outlets. . . . Ken Collins, program director of KXYZ-Houston who read in the local press that he was no longer with the station, currently has a couple of irons in the fire: he's doing FM consulting, and expects to revive his "Expressions" audience opinion show. . . . 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

POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK



"SWING ALONG WITH ME"—Frank Sinatra—Reprise R-1002

The most swingin'est Sinatra here, cavorting with a collection of bright bouncers. Billy May supplies the pungent brass punch as Sinatra swings along with "Falling In Love With Love," "Don't Be That Way," "Have You Met Miss Jones" and "Granada." A ballad or two are quieting interludes.



"COME SWING WITH ME!"—Frank Sinatra—Capitol SW 1594

Previously beckoning to "Fly" and "Dance" with him, Sinatra now invites a swinging date and couldn't have done a better job. He's got the bold and brassy Billy May band backstopping him vigorously on such tasty tidbits as "Day By Day," "I've Heard That Song Before," "Five Minutes More" and "Almost Like Being In Love." A real swinging roundup of great tunes by a great artist.



"PAUL ANKA SINGS HIS BIG 15"—Vol. 2—Paul Anka—ABC-Paramount ABC-390

Anka's second encore album. As the multitude of Anka fans responded to the first "Big 15," this followup edition also promises a bonanza sale. It includes the songster's reprise of hits "My Home Town," "Tonight, My Love, Tonight," "The Story Of My Love," "Summer's Gone," "Dance On Little Girl" and others.



"JUDY AT CARNEGIE HALL"—Judy Garland—Capitol SWBO 1569

The long-awaited two-disk package cut at the history-making April 23rd Carnegie Hall concert lives up to its pre-release touting. It contains a solid hour-and-a-half of fabulous entertainment by "Miss Showbusiness" playing directly to her fans. Naturally there are performances of such Garland traditionals as "The Trolley Song," "You Made Me Love You," "For Me And My Gal" and "Over The Rainbow" as well as a host of other excellent songs. Should be one of the big LP's of the year.



"RAY CHARLES AND BETTY CARTER"—ABC-Paramount ABC 385

All the ingredients point to a tremendously successful album: Ray Charles' gripping vocal portrayals, Betty Carter's vibrant warbling, Marty Paich's intelligent orchestrations with the Jack Halloran Singers written in in vital spots. The tunes all lend themselves to the duet treatment and Ray's and Betty's styles fit neatly together. Among the selections are "Ev'ry Time We Say Goodbye," "For All We Know," "Alone Together" and "We'll Be Together Again." Has chart status.




"DANCE 'TIL QUARTER TO THREE WITH U. S. BONDS"—Legrand LLP 3001


"RUNAWAY WITH DEL SHANNON"—Big Top 1303


"BROADWAY, BONGOS AND MR. 'B'"—Billy Eckstine—Mercury SR 60637

Of all her vocal attributes, "soul" is her biggest commodity and she communicates this earthy feeling in all her work, both ballad and upbeat. Other noteworthy selections include "Dance With Me," "Fools Fall In Love" and "The Masquerade Is Over." Could be a big one.



"BLUE MOON"—Louis Prima—Dot DLP 3385

The Prima solo trumpet here in instrumental stylings of a dozen pop tunes. Prima plays a sweet, melodic horn and is faithful to the melodies of "Blue Moon," "Tenderly," "I'm In The Mood For Love," "I've Told Ev'ry Little Star" among others. An ork-chorus backdrop is a flavorful addition to the picture. An easy-on-the-ears musical date.



"THE WORLD'S GREAT WALTZES"—The Clebanoff Strings—Mercury SR 60237

The Clebanoff strings at their best here in a fine stereo reading of twelve charming waltz evergreens. Maestro Herman Clebanoff has charted a lilting string course for "Drigo's Serenade," "I Love You Truly," "True Love" and "Maria Elena" among others. Saleable merchandise in all markets.



"MAKIN' THE SCENE"—The Zeniths—Atlantic 8043

Bowing in on Atlantic, the Zeniths can easily claim to be one of the most exciting new vocal groups in recent years. Their smart, sophisticated approach to better pop songs is thoroughly refreshing and inventive and they prove adventurous in performing a handful of standard blues tunes. They maintain a relentless pace right through from the opening "Sugar Plum" to the closing "My Funny Valentine." Other selections include "Little Girl Blue," "Roll 'Em Pete" and "Smack Dab In The Middle." Of big interest.



"PROVOCATIVE PIANO"—Vol. 2—Dick Hyman and his Orch.—Command RS 824 SD

The Dick Hyman piano is showcased a second time performing personal interpretations of famed piano pieces. With a full string ork as a backdrop Hyman treads lightly and spiritedly on the melodies of "Soft Summer Breeze," "Theme From The Apartment," "Boogie Woogie," "Kitten On The Keys" and "Moonglow/Theme From Picnic." Command's stereo is large and consistent and plays an important role in the set's commerciality.



"KERMIT SCHAFER PRESENTS BLOOPERAMA"—Vol. 1—BL-1

Kermit Schafer, who parlayed other peoples mistakes into a fortune-earning LP series, "Pardon My Bloopers," has edited this series down into one package purported to contain the best of the lot. And it does contain a host of hilarious radio and TV slips that will be entertaining for many.



Album Review



"A NIGHT WITH RUDOLF FRIML"—Earl Wrightson, Lois Hunt, Frank DeVol Orch.—Columbia CL 1630

Operetta composer Friml is represented here by twelve of his most famous songs. They're accorded, thankfully, operetta-like readings which put them in their proper perspective in the pop music field. Wrightson is a vibrant baritone, Miss Hunt, a splendid soprano, and Frank DeVol is compelling in his orchestral work. Selections include "Songs Of The Vagabonds," "Rose Marie," "Only A Rose," "The Donkey Serenade" and "Indian Love Call." Show music and operetta fans have a choice item here.



"ENGLAND'S ENCHANTING BEVERLEY SISTERS"—Capitol ST 10286

The whispery soft, smooth harmony of England's Beverley Sisters are introduced to the American disk market via twelve quiet ballad performances here. The girls virtually float cloud-like through such evergreens as "I'm Always Chasing Rainbows," "The Nearness Of You," "Once In A While" and "For You." 
"PACHECO Y SU CHARANGA" Vol. 2—Alegre SLP 8050

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Gallagher Named Marketing Veep In Columbia Mdsng Integration

NEW YORK—Topped by the appointment of Bill Gallagher to the newly-created position of marketing vice-president, Columbia Records has integrated its merchandising activities via a major realignment of its sales force. Announcement was made by Norman Adler, the label's executive vice-president.

Reporting to Gallagher will be all retail activities of the label other than direct mail sales. These include: Columbia sales, with Jack Loetz newly appointed as director; Columbia Record Distributors, Inc., the company's wholly-owned branches, under the direction of vice president Kenneth Glancy; the Columbia Home Music Library test project, with Milt Selkowitz as general manager; and the newly-established Columbia Special Products, consolidating sales of premiums, promotions, exec gift programs and other sales activities related to Columbia label product, with Albert Shulman newly appointed as general manager.

"We are confident that this reorganized Marketing structure, under the direction of Gallagher, will produce an integrated and dynamic merchandising force which will insure the continued growth of Columbia Records' sales," Adler stated.

Named vice president in charge of Columbia Record Sales in June, 1960, Gallagher has been associated with the company since 1952. He has served, successively, as district sales manager, sales training director, field sales manager and director of sales.

Jack Loetz, as newly appointed director of sales for the Columbia, is responsible for formulation of sales programs and policies, as well as management of both the company's New York staff and its national organization. Associated with Columbia Sales since 1956, Loetz has served as manager of sales administration, staff assistant and, most recently, general manager.

Other appointments announced in the realignment are:

Maurice L. Hoffman has been promoted to the position of national sales manager, with responsibility for Columbia's field sales organization under the direction of Joseph Lyons. Assisting Loetz in planning and directing merchandising programs, Hoffman will also be responsible for sales training and direction of Columbia's national promotion managers. With Columbia since 1958, Hoffman has been district sales manager and regional sales manager. Before joining the company's staff, Hoffman was associated for seven years with independent Columbia distributors.

Charles Schicke has been named national promotion manager for Columbia Masterworks, a function reactivated in the national sales organization as a result of increased sales efforts in the classical market. Reporting to national sales manager Hoffman, Schicke will be responsible for promotional direction of field sales forces and distributors in connection with Masterworks product. He will also coordinate artist tours with the company's product managers for classical albums. Schicke was formerly director of classical albums and national manager for Epic Records.

Lawrence Owens has been promoted to the position of regional sales manager for the North Central Region, which includes Detroit, Peoria, Chicago, Milwaukee, Kansas City, St. Louis, Des Moines and Minneapolis. Reporting to field sales manager Lyons, Owens will be responsible for sales and promotion activities in his new area of activity. Owens joined the Columbia sales organization in March, 1959, as district sales manager, after eight years' experience in record sales and distribution.

Richard Lionetti has been promoted to the position of district sales manager for the Detroit and Milwaukee market area. Reporting to regional sales manager Owens, Lionetti will be responsible for sales activities of distributors within the district. Lionetti joined Columbia Records' New York distrib staff in March, 1958, as a phonograph sales clerk. A year later, he was promoted to the position of salesman in the Newark branch. In March, 1960, he joined Columbia's staff as assistant manager of sales statistics.

Pearson was brought to Walter's attention by Roger Carroll, a disk jockey on Los Angeles' KMPC, the station which broadcasts the Angels' games.


Chi's Cole Corp. Forms Diskery

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SORD Holds 4th Annual Meet

Randy Wood, Art Talmadge And Stan Gortikov Address Record Dealers

CHICAGO—The Society of Record Dealers of America (SORD) held its fourth annual national meeting last Tuesday evening, July 18, in the Crystal Room of the Palmer House Hotel, during the running of the convention of the National Association of Music Merchants (NAMM) at the Palmer House. The affair was highlighted by addresses to the record dealers by Randy Wood, president of Dot Records and vice president and director of RIAA; Art Talmadge, vice president and general manager of United

Artists Records and president of ARMADA; and by Stan Gortikov, general manager of Capitol Records Distributing Corporation. Present with Randy Wood was his young son, John Wood.

A temporary tense feeling permeated among the assembled guests when Stan Gortikov was introduced.

SORD is involved in legal litigation with the Capitol Records firm over record club activities. However, Gortikov immediately eased the tense and uncomfortable situation with a clearly stated introduction explaining that "since I personally am relatively new to the record business, having joined CRDC about a year and a half ago, I am clean and blameless for the ailments of our industry. So, it is quite comforting to stand before you wearing my white cloak of virgin purity."

The meeting was opened by SORD national president Howard Judkins of Los Angeles, who immediately introduced past presidents Mike Spector and Charles Summers, and the secretary-treasurer Lou Shapiro.

Art Talmadge opened the manufacturers' portion on the dais representing himself to the assemblage in his dual cloak in the manufacturing of phonograph records and as the driving force of ARMADA. He amply discussed ARMADA's accomplishments in the vigorous prosecution of record bootleggers thru the courts and with the aid of Congressman Emmanuel Celler of New York City.

He tendered an invitation to SORD's officers, urging them to meet at any time with ARMADA's officials to attempt to iron out many of the problems record dealers are faced with.

In the cloak of vice president and general manager of UA Records, he announced the introduction soon to record dealers of a new rack, which is displayed with the emphasis on attention and desire. However, he strongly stressed the crying need for more aggressive merchandising in the nation's record stores.

He closed his speech by asserting most emphatically that United Artist will continue to promote its product vigorously, and will always strive to maintain the best relationship with distributors.

In his address to SORD, Gortikov warned that "dealer requests for preferential treatment and extra discount are counter to the law and counter to the principles of SORD."

"Such requests," Gortikov said, "create a negative environment for a dealer-distributor relationship and create the precise problems you as an organization are so militant in fighting."

"Price alone won't build new artists. Price alone won't build customers. Price alone won't provide entertainment value and repeat sales."

Gortikov covered the various programs Capitol & Angel had—and will—undertake to help the dealer, including the new policy of a few LP releases each week rather than "one big stack" each month, a "more logical demonstration and exposure of material," artist-of-the-month promotions, and CRDC's 100% basic stock protection.

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

When Randy Wood rose to the dais he stated initially that he had decided to speak "off the cuff," bypassing his previously prepared address, since "I come to you as a veteran record dealer—as well as a manufacturer. And as a dealer I am quite familiar with many of the problems you are faced with.

"One thing we should never lose sight of," he continued, "and that is to continue to operate with integrity, honesty and the very utmost in endeavor; and to always do everything we can to uphold the greatness of the record industry."

He placed great stress in his address on the continued need for creativity in product and in merchandising and promotion of the product. "This," he said, "is the challenge of today."

Wood further spoke about the various deals Dot Records has been—and will continue to offer dealers. In fact, thru deals of the past year Dot sales has increased by about 26% during the first five months of this year. He reminded the record dealers that Dot offers a 100% return privilege to dealers, along with a very strong cooperative advertising program constantly.

At this point in the agenda, Howard Judkins read a telegram to the assemblage which was sent by Errol Garner assuring the dealers that he is still squarely behind them in their fight against the record clubs.

During an election of officers for the next period the members unanimously voted to retain the present slate of officers.

Furthermore, on a motion by Mike Spector to the effect that the executive committee should be reduced to six directors instead of the nine member panel, the membership unanimously carried this vote. The reason for this move was prompted by the lack of mobility among the committee since they are so far removed from each other throughout the country. This necessitated a modification to the by-laws of the SORD charter. Furthermore, all local SORD associations were admitted to associate membership to the parent organization by unanimous vote.

Before the meeting adjourned, charters were presented to the local assns present by Judkins and Shapiro. The SORD cities represented were: Buffalo, Cleveland, New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Dallas and the state of Florida.

Geoffrey Hawkes, London Publisher, Dies

LONDON—Geoffrey Hawkes, chairman of Boosey & Hawkes, music publishers and instrument firm in London and New York, died in a London hospital last week (17) at the age of 66.

Besides his post at B&H, Hawkes was a past president of the Association of Musical Instrument Industries and, at his death, was also chairman of the educational group of the Musical Instrument Association and an executive of the National Music Council of Great Britain.

Surviving are his widow and a sister.

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Columbia To Bow 24 LP's In Aug.

NEW YORK—Columbia Records has set 24 albums for release next month, including 12 pop, nine Masterworks and three in the label's Latin American "EX" series.

Popular product features "Portrait of Johnny," a Johnny Mathis album which includes a deluxe gold framed brush stroke oil painting reproduction of the cover portrait, "Somebody Loves Me" by the Ray Conniff Singers and "Mucho Gusto!" performed by Percy Faith and his Orchestra. Frank DeVol and the Rainbow Strings perform on the album, "Radio's Great Old Themes," comprising 36 themes from radio shows and including a special photo and text enclosure; the music of Duke Ellington is played by Andre Previn and his Orchestra on "A Touch of Elegance"; Mahalia Jackson performs on her tenth Columbia album "Every Time I Feel the Spirit"; the Harmonicats are heard on "Peg O' My Heart"; Michel Legrand and his Orchestra perform "The New I Love Paris"; and organist Ken Griffin and his nephew Kirby Griffin play "The Enduring Hymns."

The August releases include three albums by newcomers to the Columbia label: "Everybody Loves the Lover," by the popular French balladeer, Sascha Distel; "Getting To Know You" by the French entertainers, Varel and Bailly and Les Chanteurs de Paris and "The Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem," selections by the well-known Irish folksingers.

Two albums with Leonard Bernstein and the New York Philharmonic head the classical list. On the first, symphonic dances from "West Side Story" and the symphonic suite from the film, "On The Waterfront" are heard. The second album consists of Robert Schumann's Symphony No. 4 and "Manfred" Overture.

Eugene Ormandy conducts the Philadelphia Orchestra in a stereo version of their previous performance of

Berlioz' Symphonie Fantastique; on another album they perform Richard Strauss' "Ein Heldenleben, Op. 40 (A Hero's Life)." Bruno Walter conducts the Columbia Symphony in Mozart's Symphony No. 41 ("Jupiter") and Symphony No. 35 ("Haffner"). On a second album, Walter conducts the New York Philharmonic in a performance of Schubert's Symphony No. 8 ("Unfinished") and leads the Columbia Symphony Orchestra in Schubert's Symphony No. 5.

Eileen Farrell is heard in an album of Verdi arias, Leonard Rose is soloist with Leonard Bernstein and the New York Philharmonic in Schumann's Concerto in A Minor for Cello and Orchestra and with Eugene Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra in Bloch's "Schelomo." Alexander Brailowsky is soloist in Chopin's Concerto No. 1 in E Minor for Piano and Orchestra and Liszt's "Todtentanz" with Eugene Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra.

The Latin American "EX" product is: "Ambassadors of Song," Trio Los Panchos; "Aqui Esten," Los Cincos Latinos and "De Mano En Mano" Coco Sanchez.

In addition, the label could pre-sell its new product for distributors, thus "assuring the manufacturer the best sales job possible."

Glen C. Becker, of Music City Record Racks, Los Angeles, is the convention chairman.

NEW YORK—What is believed to have been the largest shipment of LP's ever to cross the Atlantic was received last week by London Records. Almost 400,000 LP's were shipped from England aboard the SS Mauretania, which arrived in New York at week's end.

London execs said the shipment reflected back orders created by the "outstanding" success of the label's recent classical-opera LP sales program. In addition, the LP's include the first shipment of London's new LP series for the fall. The execs wouldn't elaborate on the nature of the latter albums.

Roulette Distrib Meet In Chicago

NEW YORK—Roulette Records will hold its annual distrib meet this weekend at the Edgewater Beach Hotel in Chicago. At the meet, the company will unveil new sales policies dealing with both album and single sales which will guide the company's future sales programs, as well as present new album and single product scheduled for release in August.

One of the features of the sales conclave which was successfully introduced at last year's meeting will be separately held private sales confabs and seminars with each individual distributor. These individual meetings

will follow the general sales meeting on Friday, July 28, and will carry through to Sunday, July 30, until all the distrib meets have been covered. According to Joe Kolsky, executive VP, these private meets enable the company to cope with the business problems unique to one distrib, but perhaps of no great concern to another distrib. According to Kolsky, "it isn't enough to just sit around in open discussion debating in general terms the ills of the industry. Unless the manufacturer gets to the heart of the matter with each of his distributors on an individual basis, no real action on any one problem can be expected."

Joining Kolsky at the meet will be Morris Levy, label topper, Bud Katzel, sales head and director of advertising and publicity, A&R men Henry Glover and Teddy Reig and comptroller Howard Fisher.

Kapp Distrib Meet Combines Hard Sell & Pleasure

NEW YORK—Business and pleasure were neatly combined by Kapp Records at its two-day distrib meet here at the Savoy Hilton Hotel on Friday, July 14 and Saturday, July 15.

The informal opening of the conclave, attended by reps of Kapp's national and world-wide distrib organization, was a performance of "Donnybrook," the Dave Kapp co-produced musical which ended its run on July 15.

On Sat. evening, the gathering was entertained by Kapp artists Jane Morgan, Bill "Jose Jimenez" Dana and Julius LaRosa.

At Sat. afternoon's business meet, label topper Dave Kapp presented his "Profitless Prosperity" speech (see last week's issue).

To illustrate the "Kapp Concept" of "good product and sell it at a profit," Phil Skapp, managing director of sales introduced new Kapp albums using a colorful slide-sound presentation.

Copies of the presentation have been made available for distrib meetings, as well as a taped copy of Kapp's speech.

The new Kapp albums, set for release on August 1, include dates by Roger Williams, Pete King Chorale, Joe Harnell, The Four Lads, Les Brown and Vic Schoen, Billy Mure, Warner Mack, Emanuel Vardi, Art Kassel, Daniel Ericourt, Richard Ellsasser, The Kapp Sinfonetta, Roger Voisin and others.

A merchandising display was also shown to the distrib meets.

The remainder of the afternoon was taken-up by private meets with individual distrib meets under Skaff's direction.

Consumers To See Red In New Time Albums

NEW YORK—Putting into practice the theory that consumers can't distinguish one album from another because of the "sea of white covers," Time Records will use a "brilliant" red background for its LP product beginning with its August release of "The LP's."

The albums which will bow the new covers include Jerry Fieldings' "Magnificence In Brass"; Maury Laws' "Laws For Dancing"; Stanley Wilson's "The Great Waltz—American and Continental"; the Chorus Della Piazza's "Italian Festival"; and third release in the label's Contemporary Sound Series, including works by Luigi Nono, Bruno Maderna and Luciano Berio.

20th Fox To Push For The Teen Market

NEW YORK—20th Fox Records is going after a bigger slice of the teen-market sales melon with an "all-out" drive which includes a new department for singles activities, new artists, indie produced masters and foreign-produced records.

The new department will have the responsibilities for the production, scheduling, recording and promotion of singles.

Henry Onorati, president of the label, which has previously concentrated on LP product, said that in recent weeks several masters had been purchased from indie producers, and these will form the nucleus of the new campaign.

Onorati also said that the label is signing new talent, including Canadian songster Dean Morgan. The waxery recently inked former RCA Victor vocalist Johnny Restivo.

20th Fox will produce some of the new singles but not all. Onorati is inviting several new indie producers to search for tunes and artists and produce finished masters.

Conceding his personal musical tastes do not cover the rock 'n roll field, Onorati said that "the slogan on our label is 'All You Hear Is Beauty' . . . but these teenage single records don't fall into that category for me, and I don't feel that I could put into them the aura of excitement and enthusiasm that can come only from performers and producers who have a feeling for the music and sounds that seem to appeal to the teenagers of the sixties."

Foreign singles will come from 20th Fox's licensees in 20 countries.

The label said that the new teen singles would appear on one or more newly-created labels, thus "minimizing the risk of a good recording not getting distributor attention and air play simply because it happened to be released with another goodie on the same label."

VJ Gets Destiny Single

CHICAGO—VeeJay Records has taken-over the Destiny disking of "Found Love" and "Where Are You" by The Infatuators, it was announced last week.

Capitol Sues Sinatra Over New Reprise "Swing" Album

HOLLYWOOD—Capitol Records last week (14) filed suit in Los Angeles Superior Court against Frank Sinatra and five co-defendants over the singer's new Reprise album, "Swing Along with Me," which, the complaint says, closely resembles in concept, type of repertoire, style, accompaniment, and title an album Sinatra cut for Capitol last March 20-22, and tagged "Come Swing with Me!"

The suit asks the defendants be permanently restrained from further distribution of the Reprise LP under its present title.

After Capitol presented its case, Judge Gordon L. Files issued an order to show cause why a temporary injunction should not be granted halting further distribution of the Reprise LP. A hearing was set for Friday morning (21).

The suit further charges Sinatra,

William Morris Acquires Europe's John Mather Organ

NEW YORK—The William Morris Agency last week announced a major expansion of its global operations with the acquisition of the John Mather Organization, leading talent representatives in Continental Europe. Abe Lastfogel, president of the Morris Company, in announcing the deal, said that Mather, and his associates would become known as the William Morris Organization, to conduct its operations in Continental Europe.

Mather will be at the head of the new setup on the Continent, headquartering in Rome and supervising operations of existing offices in Rome, Paris and Madrid.

The formation of the William Morris Organization and Mather's absorption into it mark the first time William Morris will operate its own office outside the U.S. Heretofore, the firm has worked through affiliated talent management firms in other countries.

In announcing the acquisition of the Mather Company and the establishment of the William Morris Organization, Lastfogel said: "... The William Morris Organization, like the William Morris Agency, will be steadfast in its devotion to the principle that all assets resulting from a client's creative efforts remain solely the client's property..."

Heading up the William Morris Organization offices on the Continent will be John Mather and Mather's partner, Ferruccio Ferrara, and Michele Pietravalle in Rome; Sandy Glennon in Madrid; and Giovannella Zannoni and France Degand in Paris.

The formation of the William Morris Organization will not alter WMA's long standing associations in England. The Christopher Mann Ltd. will continue to operate for William Morris clients in the motion picture and dramatic legitimate field, and the Harry Foster Agency continues its representation for Morris-managed talent in the variety and musical comedy fields in Great Britain.

Negotiations began several months ago after meetings in New York, Los Angeles and Rome between Mather and members of his organization and Abe Lastfogel, Nat Lefkowitz, Morris Stoller, Sam Welsbord, Howard Hausman, Joe Schoenfeld and Phil Kellogg of William Morris' exec staff.

Reprise Records, Essex Productions, like Reprise also Sinatra controlled, Bristol Manufacturing, manufacturer of the LP, Record Sales Co., L.A., Melody Sales, two Reprise distribs, with gross breach of trust and confidence, unfair competition, and wrongly interfering in Capitol's business relations.

Sinatra said last week that "Reprise and Capitol are in a highly competitive business. Contrary to Capitol's interpretation of the facts, I do not at all feel I have acted in anything but the highest business ethics."

"Album titles," Sinatra continued, "are difficult to come by, particularly a swing album."

"The title 'Swing Along with Me' is the theme for the Reprise Record Company, key line being 'Swing Along with Reprise'."

Adding to Sinatra's statement, Reprise's Jay Lasker said that "in addition, all the display material in conjunction with Reprise Records' eight album release has been built around the theme, 'Swing Along with Me.'"

Capitol also complained of the similarity of the "swing era" material, the full-color, head-and-shoulders photo of Sinatra on the covers, and the presence of arranger-conductor Billy May on both sessions.

Capitol said its conflict with Sinatra came to a head with Reprise trade-paper ads last week which said that Sinatra was now "emancipated" and, according to Capitol, suggested that, in previous sessions, Sinatra had been "fettered, confined and trammelled."

Sinatra has cut exclusively for Capitol since December, 1955. The contract was amended in February, 1960, Capitol said, to allow him to record for Reprise. Under the terms of the new contract, Sinatra must still record additional albums for Capitol.

Commenting on the entire incident, Capitol vice president Alan W. Livingston said:

"We regret very much having to take legal action forced upon us by the release of the Reprise album. We hesitated to take the matter to court for the obvious reason that Frank Sinatra has been, since 1955, one of Capitol's top recording artists. However, we feel that, as a matter of principle, we must protect our investment in any album, and we feel that the Reprise release constitutes a serious and unreasonable threat to Sinatra's new Capitol album, 'Come Swing With Me!'. We have every hope that the matter can be settled amicably, and that a cordial relationship with Mr. Sinatra can be restored."

Jamie Gets Palm Master

NEW YORK—Harry Finfer, head of the Jamie/Guyden labels, said last week that Jamie had purchased a master from Palm Records of Phoenix, "Roll Over Beethoven." Deck is being released on the Jamie label immediately.

New Jazz Deal

BERGENFIELD, N.J.—A 20% discount on New Jazz Records, the Prestige affiliate, has been announced by Prestige topper Bob Weinstock. The distrib deal, which also includes the label's usual 5% discount, runs through August 4. Minimum orders vary with distrib location.

NAMM's Chi Music Show Sets Attendance Record

CHICAGO—The 60th anniversary Music Industry Trade Show, sponsored by the National Association of Music Merchants (NAMM), at Chicago's Palmer House last week set a new Chicago attendance record for the show.

With attendance at 11,878, the show's order-taking and the trade show's emphasis on marketing, indicated to NAMM the probability of "record gains for the music industry in the business year ahead."

Ted F. Korten, president of Korten's, Longview, Wash., was elected NAMM president and other officers and directors were also chosen.

Previous Chicago attendance high was last year's 11,382. The attendance included an estimated 85% of the nation's music merchants, and manufacturers exhibited \$2½ million in musical merchandise and reported a "brisk pace of order-taking."

Stereo FM, unveiled to the music industry at the show, was a special highlight. The show came close on the heels of the Federal Communications Commission's go-ahead signal for stereo FM broadcasting and was the music industry's first opportunity to learn first-hand about this new development. One manufacturer had a stereo FM radio ready for display at the show, and others introduced new stereo FM-phonograph combinations. Actual broadcasts, both on the air and on a special closed circuit were heard, and a symposium on "The Facts About Stereo FM" was presented by the Electronic Industries Association, exploring various aspects of stereo FM from FCC expectations to broadcasters' plans to technical advantages and marketing opportunities.

New musical instruments attracting special attention ranged from flat

drums with a single head to lightweight fibreglas sousaphones.

A brand new invention, the Electra-Chord, a device enabling anyone to play "instant piano" was also unveiled.

More than 450 different models of pianos were on display.

Furniture styling figured importantly not only in pianos, but in phono and TV sets, and more color TV was exhibited by more manufacturers than at any previous show.

In the election of officers, Korten was named to succeed Philip Werlein IV of New Orleans as NAMM president.

Korten, who served as NAMM vice-president last year, heads the big music store, Korten's.

Paris Meet Sets Mercury-Phillips Int'l Disk Plans

PARIS—A meeting was held in Paris from July 12th through July 17th, at which Irving Green, president of Mercury Records, brought part of the A&R staff of Mercury, namely, David Carroll, Quincy Jones, Shelby Singleton and Jack Tracy, to meet with Willem Lagenberg, president of the International Record Group of Philips Phonografic Industrie. Lagenberg was represented by his executive committee of the Philips group as well as the A&R staffs of the many countries represented.

The purpose of the meeting was to set up international plans for the recording of material required to launch the Philips label in the U.S., launching of which is to take place later this year. Those represented in the conclave were Dr. Schrade, Germany; Les Gould, England; M. Lebbink, Brussels; C. Baron, Italy; George Meyerstein, France; N. Sampetro, Spain; O. Hamberger, Scandinavia.

Various pop and classical recordings will take place throughout the world during the next few months so that Mercury may have sufficient recorded material for release of record product under the Philips label in the U.S. Recording contributions will be made by such countries as France, England, Germany, Spain, Holland, Belgium and Italy.

Such international artists will appear under the Philips label in the U.S. in the future as Michele La Grand, Ives Montand, Sasha Distel, Juliet Greco, Marty Wild and many others. In the classical department, such international artists will be represented as Sviatoslav Richter, the famed Russian pianist, as well as Kondrashin, the Russian Conductor, and in addition such artists as the violinist, Grumieux, the instrumental group I Musici, and the orchestral conductors Haiting, Sawalisch, Jokum and Dorati. It is intended that Byron Janis record piano concertos with the Amsterdam Concertgebouw and the London Symphony Orchestra with the conductors mentioned above.

It is also intended in the future that such recordings which are released in the U.S. under the Philips label, will simultaneously be released through the Philips group of companies throughout the world.

Mercury, at present, is readying its sales and promotion staff and setting up a completely new distribution arrangement for the launching of the Philips label in the U.S. More details will be furnished at a later date, the label said.

NEW YORK—Bea Kaslin of Hull Records, this city, has announced the appointment of two new distributors: Chatton Distributors, San Francisco; Records Inc., Boston.

Westminster To Offer 15 LP's On Aug. 15

NEW YORK—The first Westminster product, consisting of 15 albums, to be released since its acquisition by ABC-Paramount Records will be made on August 15.

The release, to be marked by new sales, merchandising and promotion programs under the director of Westminster sales manager Howard Stark, will include LP's by Chinese pianist Fou Ts'ong (to tour the country this

fall with Leonard Bernstein and the New York Philharmonic), classical guitarist John Williams, and conductor Hermann Scherchen. Other disks will include "strong novelties aimed at getting strong attention in music and sound markets."

Kurt List, the label's A&R head, is currently recording in Europe (i.e. Vienna, Budapest) for future Westminster releases.

Decca Issues "Brazen Brass" Theme As Single

NEW YORK—Reacting to reported deejay, juke-box and dealer demands, Decca Records has released "Theme from Brazen Brass" from the Henry Jerome orchestra's fourth "Brazen Brass" album, "Brazen Brass Brings Back the Bands" LP. The fifth LP in the successful series will be issued shortly, the label said.

NEW YORK—The disk, not the deal is the thing, Enoch Light, head of the Grand Award-Command operation, said last week.

"The objective for the record industry," Light feels, "is to produce better and more exciting albums, not pile up troubles for dealers and distributors."

Repeating their Indiana performances were Marion Williams and The Stars of Faith of Philadelphia, who won over the large audience with their warmth, vitality and humor.

Candid Extends "Jazz Bonus" Deal

Under the deal, distributors receive three free albums of their choice with every 20 they purchase. The entire catalog of the Cadence jazz affiliate is included.

Doumanian, well known on the local record scene for several years, had been associated with CRDC, in a similar post, for a period of four years (1954-1958) after which he joined Columbia Records here where he remained until the present time. He assumes his post August 1.

Special UA Racks To Be Shipped Aug. 1

NEW YORK—The first 1,500 specially-designed United Artists dealer record rack merchandisers, and pre-pack of records to be featured on the rack will be shipped by August 1, according to Art Talmadge, vice-president and general manager, and Andy Miele, national sales manager.

Pre-packs will include 12 records, ten to be bought on a full guaranteed basis by the dealers, and the other two at no charge to dealers. The initial album featured is "Great Motion Picture Themes" Volume Two, a follow-up to the current best-seller. Each rack will hold 12 of the albums, with UA shipping 18,000 albums with the racks, then following with an additional 50,000 albums for distribution without the specially-designed polyethylene bags. The latter group of 50,000 albums were ordered by distributors at the recent UA sales meeting in Florida for distribution through normal channels.

Initial distrib and dealer reaction to the merchandiser has been so great, Talmadge said, that re-orders on the racks are already being pushed so as to meet the demand. Initially the racks were placed on an allotment basis, Talmadge said, but to date every distributor has increased his orders over the allotment necessitating the rush to manufacture the merchandisers.

"We are giving the dealers one of the most exciting albums ever produced by United Artists Records," Talmadge said, "in the knowledge that the combination of this excellent merchandiser, carrying a top demand album will definitely increase the dealers' sales, create eye appeal to his interior, and, most importantly, give him two free albums for every ten purchased, with a full guarantee on each record bought."

The "Great Motion Picture Themes" follow-up album will include such names as Ferrante & Teicher, Don Costa, Louis Armstrong, Al Caiola, Andre Previn, Marilyn Monroe and Elmer Bernstein, and covers themes from such outstanding films as "Never On Sunday," "Goodbye Again," "Paris Blues," "Elmer Gantry," "Moulin Rouge" and "One-Eyed Jacks."

Last week saw the first concert of the annual season of Henry Wood Promenade Concerts at the Royal Albert Hall. Sponsored by the BBC under the guidance of Sir Malcolm Sargent, the season continues for eight weeks with nightly performances by leading Symphony Orchestras and the world's top classical soloists. The low price of admission affords many teenagers an opportunity to become acquainted with the best in classical music and together with extensive TV and Sound coverage by the BBC, these concerts undoubtedly encourage the sale of classical LP recordings.

Equire Records has extended its rhythm and blues catalog by signing an exclusive contract with Bandera Records of Chicago. First releases due shortly on the Starlite label will be singles by artists such as Bobby Davis, Dusty Brown, Jimmy Lee and The Diatoners. The catalog also contains several country items to be issued in due course.

After several years in the iron curtain countries, British songstress Gery Scott has returned to England. A recording contract with Supraphon Records of Prague has established her as one of Russia's top female vocalists with disk sales well over the 4,000,000 mark. The MGM film "A Matter of Who" starring Terry Thomas and Alex Nicol had its London preview last week. Roy Castle, who sings the title song over the credits, has recorded the number for Philips—an instrumental version by John Barry on Parlophone is due in August. Published by Southern Music.

Visitor to The Cash Box Office: Philip Anderson of Arc Sound Ltd. of Toronto, Canada. Distributors and manufacturers specializing in low priced LP's, Arc also represents Somerset Records in Canada. Anderson is anxious to acquire material with a Scottish, Irish or national flavor. In London, he visited many manufacturers including Pye and Oriole.

BENELUX

Albert de Backer of Helia Music, who founded Helia Records in St. Niklaas, Belgium, reports that the label 'Helia' is now the German market. Helia's latest development is Blitz Recording material recorded from imported American tapes.

Best selling single records of Fonior-Brussels in the month of July are: 1. **Wheels** (String-A-Longs); 2. **Runaway** (Del Shannon) (Machucambos); 4. **La Bamba** (Los Machucambos); 5. **Pep Top EP** was "La B. E. Bamba" (Les Aymara), top LP "Garden of Eden" (Dalida).

Artone's first releases on the newly acquired Chancel label are "Grapevine"/"David And Goliath" by Fabian and "On The Street"/"For Sentimental Reasons" by Frankie Avalon. Paul's current success, due to "Tonight My Love, Tonight," with "Dance On Little Girl." Initial orders were so big, Artone had to press the disk in order to meet local demand.

The dynamic and eye-catching "West Side Story"—music has attracted enthusiastic crowds in Amsterdam's Carré-Theatre. It's a great promotion of the ballet music of Leonard Bernstein's "West Side Story," the Warner Bros. LP of which was awarded by the Edison Foundation Grand Gala Du Disque last year. The cast will also perform at the end of the month.

Bovema's Imperial label will surprise the jazz market in Holland with strong and nostalgic New Orleans Jazz in the Oscar Peterson album played by his Tuxedo Jazzband. Four numbers will be selected according to Gerry Oord Jr., Imperial's label manager.

Pick of the L. C. Phonogram releases on the London label are "Please Stay" (The Drifters), "Blue Tomorrow" (Billy Van Zandt), "Depend On Me" (Louis Prima), "Yellow Bird" (Lawrence Welton), "George de Fretes" on steel-guitar with instrumental accompaniment. Harry de Groot is heard on four titles on a new Decca LP, "Menestrels" were in Holland some days ago and enjoyed great success. Latest EP contains "Les Poètes," a beautiful chanson by Léonard, featured during their visit here (Fontana).

Is "Tomawak" going to be equally successful as "Kili Wak" version by The Tramps is a quick seller in Belgium and in Holland at this moment. Another catchy tune that caught the Fontana label. Most popular street organ on Dutch Fontana is heard in a medley of recent hits on a 45 single, among them "Tommy Uit Tennessee," "Sucu Sucu" and "Wooden Heart."

With "But I Do" still riding high, the second Clarence Henry smash, "You Always Hurt The One You Love," was released on the label early in July. What with strong initial reaction by key-dealers, disk had a flying start, in spite of the fact that it is usually considered slack months in the local record business. Director of Artone's Funckler Department, further told that the label's activities in the country field. "I began devoting a lot of programming to country music several years ago," Fellemann in charge of the Capitol label. In my opinion, the market for country music not only is a sound one, but will continue to grow. Fortunately, therefore, to have excellent Nashville-Tennessee recordings at disposal: that of Hickory records." Recent releases from the (issued on Funckler in Benelux, Germany & Switzerland) are "Man" & "Make Me Realize" by Rusty & Doug and "Hey, Mi One Really Cares" by Joe Melson, while Bob Gallion's "Worth This Broken Heart," released early in spring, has become a top seller since.

Re-released is one of the most delightful albums Edmund Anderson's "Perfect For Dancing," with great standards in Latin-American music. The label is Decca, which is distributed in Holland by L. C. Phonogram album by Stanley Black, a piano, with Latin-American rhythm. Percussion." Mantovani is also present on the Decca label, with "Italia Mia." These Italian favorites, beautifully played, a colorful album with snapshots Mantovani made during his visit to his homeland Italy. Winifred Atwell is heard playing several boogies on "Double '7". Album is in the Decca Ace of Clubs.

Bovema's Warner Bros. label will shortly release the music of which singer Connie Stevens plays a major part.

Delta's Hans I Kellerman just signed contracts for the first Delta-release in Holland under the new contract: The version of "Peanut Butter."

Latest rock sensation in Holland is Johnny And His Combo, an exciting instrumental group, recently heard and seen on Dutch TV. They have "Exodus" and "Melody in f-rock" on Decca.

Paul Visser, publicity manager of Artone, told The Cash Box that recording with the songs from "De Jantjes" (Holland's first popular musical, dating back to 1919), recorded for the first time the sensational TV-performance of the typical Amsterdam musical — with the original TV-cast, Beppie Nooy's Amsterdam musical, recently released, received tremendous response from trade and public. Due to the nature of the material, the disk also should be popular to the many Dutch emigrants in various parts of the world. Campaign to build the soul and R&B artist locally, Visser has a new EP release by Ray Charles. The disk includes the Top News "For You" and "One Mint Julep," as well as the "Moanin'" version.

"Hello Walls," Faron Young's newest disk in Holland, is the strongest seller in Capitol's singles repertoire. Capitol's C. Hundepool has the opinion that country music is very much in vogue. Special single-covers for Holland will give this musical genre a boost in the market. Also a great success is Capitol's 10" LP set to about 20 records, for which Bovema's Capitol label has a strong market.

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FRANCE

And it was a very successful cocktail party that the entire Philips organization threw recently. Among the invited guests were publisher Salvat, Robert Salvat, journalist and TV bigwig, Felix Marouani, Jacques Brel's impresario, R. Devos, Juliette Greco, etc. Also on hand was George Brassens, who so seldom appears at this type of Parisian get-together, and whose every record constitutes an event in the music world here. Jacqueline Francois, who is currently making a big come-back of which the result can not yet be predicted, was present. We also saw Gainsbourg, whose promising talents will perhaps one day find their real outlet, and many other stars of the Philips label, including general director Georges Meyerstein. The party was given in honor of orchestra leader Percy Faith, who was passing through Paris. Meyerstein took advantage of the occasion to announce two important pieces of Philips news: firstly, the ties which now link Philips with U.S. Mercury, and secondly, the renewing of the Philips contract with Columbia. Meyerstein did not go into the far-reaching consequences of these two agreements, but it appears that on the one hand, Philips French production will benefit from a more powerful and national outlet in the U.S. and that on the other, Philips position on the French market will find itself considerably reinforced. It may be that these accords will have as a concrete result here a certain modification of the equilibrium of the market and certain repercussions on the latter which it is much too early to predict. The post-vacation season will throw full light on the question for everyone.

Meanwhile, the record and music world continues to move along more and more slowly as the holidays take over. The Cash Box scribe sought and obtained a little interview with Nicole and Eddie Barclay for a first-hand report on their recent visit to the U.S. Firstly, Barclay will release here, among other issues, all of the United Artists film sound tracks. Secondly, although talks between Audio Fidelity and Pathé-Marconi seemed well-advanced, Barclay has signed a general contract with Audio Fidelity based on a minimum of guaranteed releases annually and which will insure us the pleasure of listening to this fine high fidelity repertoire in France. Another contract links the Barclay firm with Allegre. The Barclays also renewed for another three years their ties with the Mardi Gras label. They have signed with a new U.S. rock 'n roll singer Rocco Matero, who will record for them in French in the U.S. Barclay will distribute Matero's sides in all the French-speaking countries. In addition to these prospects for Barclay distribution domestically, there is the other side to the moves: namely, the Barclay French recordings which will see the light in America. Columbia is ready to market the first Charles Aznavour album, as well as two orchestral issues, one by Michel Magne, the other by Michel Legrand. Rather than overall general contracts with U.S. firms, the Barclays seem to prefer the leasing of individual albums, artist by artist. Hence, United Artists will market albums by Les Barclays and Christian Legrand, Atlantic has chosen Raymond Lefevre and Stephane Grappelly and MGM will launch Los Matecoco, one of France's most popular Latin-American combos. Kapp Records seems more interested in the albums of Paul Mauriat and Rika Zarai, the young Israeli singer who seems to have what it takes to become a real, international best-seller. Several U.S. firms are dickering for Dalida's recordings, of which the first U.S. issue was on Verve, under the title "Her Name Is Dalida." Finally, the original tape of "Guns of Navorone" will be released on the Barclay label here and the same firm will handle the music publishing rights in France.

Last-minute flashes: The Travellers, young rock 'n roll orchestra which sings and plays for youth groups and at the end of the school day outside the different Paris high-schools ends up every evening at the nearest Police Headquarters. Richard Anthony is accompanying the Tour de France cycle race around the country and sings for the public each evening outdoors at the end of the day's lap. He is currently trying to put "African Waltz" on the hit lists. BMI's Geiringer was passing through Paris a few days ago. Another recent visitor was Francis Wolff, vice-president of Blue Note Records, here for conversations with Odeon-Arteco on promotion of his jazz label. Odeon has signed Pierre Frachet, whose songs are especially popular with French teen-agers. Frachet is himself a talented singer. "Endlessly" now has been doted with French lyrics which evoke the popular TV quiz show, "Le Petit Train." Janine Wolf has recorded the tune for Odeon. Odeon singers Jacques Varières and Jacques Laroy have been chosen to represent France at the Third International Song Festival at Knokke-le-Zoute, in Belgium.

ARGENTINA

Neil Sedaka in Buenos Aires July 15 and 16. The young singer and composer performed at the Opera Theatre and at dance parties organized by the advertising agency that owns the "Escala Musical" radio program. He has also been in Montevideo and Santiago de Chile, where he worked at Radio Minería and Waldorf.

Some radio magazines say Elvis Presley will be here in October. However, this seems rather difficult as we were told that Colonel Tom Parker wants ten million pesos (125,000 dollars) for one week of performances, which is too high for this market.

Dizzy Gillespie's performances at the Coliseo Theatre weren't as successful as everybody expected. Jazz critic Francisco Mujia Jackson explained that this happened because Gillespie brought musicians that were not known by local jazz fans.

The phenomenon of folk music is astonishing everybody in the recording industry. Its popularity has increased a lot in the last year—mainly because of folk music clubs, called "peñas"—and folk records are being sold in big quantities. An unexpected fact is that teenagers are beginning to dance to folk songs in the same way they do for other rhythms. Traditionally, folk music was danced in a very different way, and this made is very difficult to play zambas and chacareras at dance parties, because nobody danced it. Now, this change may change substantially the industry's attitude towards the market, and bring golden years for this type of music.

Fernando Iriberry, Jr. and Benjamin Teran have registered a new machine that makes thin records, at a cost of 8 cents a piece. These records, we were told, are as good as standard ones and are being already used for kiddie disks. Some promotional uses are being planned.

Ian Morris, manager of Famous SRL, went to Brazil to get in touch with the Musidisc people of that country. He signed new contracts with them and selected some new records from the firm's catalog for release in Buenos Aires.

Waldo de los Rios is composing the music for "Martin Fierro," a film based on the Jose Hernandez poem. Leopoldo Torre Nilsson will direct the picture, and Alfredo Alcon will star.

RCA will present Los Chalchaleros with a gold record, due to the sales of their records and the many years of success they have been enjoying. The folk quartet will receive it at the opening of TV11, Buenos Aires' fourth television channel.

Hector Varela and his tango orchestra are celebrating the eleventh birthday of the group. They have already sold three million records, and are now starting their fourth series of performances at the Glostora Tango Club, on Radio El Mundo.

Latest TV statistics inform that 59.4% of Buenos Aires homes have television sets, and that 95% of these sets are switched on TV13 when the "Show de Pinocho" is telecasted. Recording companies look with much interest at these statistics because TV has proven to be a good way to promote instrumental waxings. In some cases, TV promotion is more important than the one made through radio.

"Quiero Amanecer," Colombian tune cut in that country by Sarita Lascarro, may become a smash hit in some weeks. The song is receiving big air play, and RCA is making all efforts to promote it. Another important RCA release is "Fugitiva" (Runaway), cut by The Rocklands (local group) and by Rocky Pontoni. These were the first versions of "Runaway" put in the market. The original one—by Del Shannon—is now also available. Many disk jockeys have been playing Shannon's waxing for a long time.

Ariel Records is preparing a big promotional campaign for Ray Charles. The diskery will put on sale an LP with material selected from Charles' two albums, suitable for the market. The main titles are "Georgia on My Mind," "Ruby" and "Sweet Georgia Brown." As it's difficult to turn an artist into a star in Argentina, this seems to be a clever idea. The label is also very happy with the success of "Tonight, My Love, Tonight," by Paul Anka, which may climb the charts very soon.

New Philips releases: "Angelica," sung as a bolero by Carlos Michel; "Caltutta," by a local group Mechicolo; "El Alamo," by Roy Baxter; "Le Mille Bolle Blu" by Norman Maine; we were told that the difficulties with Dimsa Records because of Carlos Argentino who signed contract with Philips without fulfilling the one he had with Dimsa, seems to be over. According to our information, Philips will be allowed to release an LP cut by Argentino.

Columbia announced these releases: "Tammy" by Ray Conniff (this record has already shown big sales); "Julia" by Mexican rock 'n roller Enrique Guzman; "Noche de Luna Muriente" by the Cuarteto Astoria, recently inked to the label.

Dimsa has inked some new artists: Estela Lemos, Mario De Marco and Conjunto Indoamerica. This label will start releasing single 33 records in August.

Baby Bell went to Spain to perform for a month at Spanish radio and TV-chains. However, she won't take part at the Benidorm Song Festival, where she has been invited.

Frankie Avalon's performances in Santiago were a sensation. Thousands of teenagers waited for him at Los Cerrillos Airport and at the Carrera Hotel. When Avalon went to a press conference at the "Almacenes Paris," the company that bought his radio program, a mob that tried to get into the building broke one of the shop's windows. Avalon had to stay in Santiago two extra days because of his success. (He didn't perform in Buenos Aires).

Julio Jaramillo was expected for July 15. He had to go to Santiago after a tour of several Argentine provinces. Other well known artists performing in Santiago are Lalo Guerrero, Mexican singer, Marisol and Lenny Eversong.

Sara Montiel will record in Spain three songs from "La Pergola de las Flores," Chilean musical-comedy being played with big success in Chile and Spain. "La Pergola" will be performed in Buenos Aires next October.

Important new releases are: "Nature Boy" by Bobby Darin; "Dance On Little Girl" by Paul Anka; "I Feel So Bad" by Elvis Presley; "Nuestro Concierto" by Roberto Yanes; "Moliendo Cafe" by Alberto Rey.

CANADA

[The following article (including other articles in the series) is based on opinions gathered by Cash Box from the Canadian disk industry.]

Last week, this column introduced the first of three articles dealing with the problems caused by the three levels in the industry, the dealer, the distributor, the manufacturer. We took a look at the dealer; this week we will examine some of the problems caused directly or indirectly by the manufacturer.

1) Mass Production—this problem creates confusion at all levels of the industry. The disk jockeys have too many releases to choose from, therefore, many good recordings are forced out of the picture. This does not necessarily mean that records having less quality are played instead of the better ones, but, the overflow of records certainly makes it harder for the disk jockey or programming director to choose the records which are deserving of air play. The consumer is also confused by this mass production. The consumer is placed in such a position that the product which he is buying is literally forced on to him. The rule holds true that only the product which the stations are spinning is saleable, therefore the consumers choice of singles is limited to what the stations play. This is a contributing factor to why there is a decrease in sales to the records which don't make the Top 10. Finally, the product which can't be sold at regular price is later dumped by the manufacturer, at less than cost price, to the dealers. The dealers suffer because some customers would rather buy dump product (5 or 6 records for a dollar) than to pay a dollar a single. It is wrong to have the customer confused on the price of records. There should be one price only for the sale of singles. If the manufacturer has overstocked, then he should scrap this product, instead of creating more problems. The dealer's hands are tied. How can he refuse to buy dump product when the manufacturer would sell it to racks if he didn't buy?

2) Record Clubs—there is no need to elaborate on this point. This problem has been brought up time and again by the dealers. The big three, RCA Victor, Columbia, Capitol, are reaping fabulous rewards through these record clubs. They are too far in to pull out of the clubs at this stage. But, it isn't too late to include the dealer by making these clubs buy through him (the dealer).

3) Price Structures—It is no secret that manufacturers are selling at different prices to different customers. The distributor should be his only contact. Including rack jobbers and the large accounts in his business only creates friction between himself and the distributor. If the distributors and manufacturers are to compete between themselves then how can we expect to have a healthy industry?

4) Cover Records—In Canada we find a large amount of cover records in the French field. Examples: "Garde-Moi La Dernier Danse," which is currently No. 4, has six versions, "Cou-Couche Panier" also has six versions, "24,000 Baisers" has five versions, etc. The problem here is that the dealers don't know which versions to buy, the disk jockeys don't know which version to spin, and the consumer is confused. Furthermore, the original manufacturer loses sales because of the covers.

5) Protection To Dealers—Are manufacturers allotting enough return privileges to the dealers? The dealer must have protection if the manufacturer expects him to order. Dealers have enough problems to contend with. The dealer is the most important asset to the manufacturer, this is why the manufacturer should protect both their interests. Failure to do so results into bankruptcy for the dealer.

The problems mentioned above, of course, do not hold true in all cases, nor is this list complete. But each of the above contributes greatly to the problems of the industry. We are attempting to present these problems so that everyone in the industry can be made aware of the conditions that exist. This column would be happy to receive any criticism or comments that would benefit the industry. Please write.

Piere Senecal just signed a recording contract with Trans Canada Records. He was previously with RCA Victor.

Pierre Noles, who recently had a hit album with "Palmares Dansant" on London, recorded another volume in this series for RCA Victor.

Carlos Ramirez, international star, will soon be leaving Columbia Records. Negotiations are presently being made with Trans Canada Records.

RCA set for a big sales kill with its "On The Border" Cramer. Cramer has notched up a big number one smash of his singles "Last Date"; "On The Border" Antonio Rose."

Also among the new album releases on RCA is the stereo issue "The Belafonte Folk Singers At Home."

Dave Bridge, one of this country's leading groups, the Col Joye group The Joy Boys has his first single "By The Dave Bridge Quartet, the "A" side is a 12" "My Lou" and is coupled with a composition by Bridge.

Young English star Mark Wynter, who recently had a very successful personal appearance tour of Australia, is set to follow up his present chart rider, "Drum Major" with another version of "Exclusively Yours," the new hit—and a new ballad, "Warm And Willing."

EMI here should have its album presses gear up for the release of Bobby Rydell's LP, "The Great Escape" of fans that are sure to be interested in this singer here right now with "That Old Black Magic" album to go on a single. Rydell's stablemate Col Joye's album "It's Pony Time" released on HMV.

Still the hottest single across the nation is the smash release on London "Hello Mary Lou" by Ricky's first hit in a long while in Australia and a new hit for the young star.

Young Eddie Hodges seems likely to have a new hit with his debut disk "I'm Gonna Knock On Your Door" on the London label. This record has taken a few weeks but looks good for a successful run.

Popular local singing idol Col Joye—current chart leader with "Going Steady"—has a new single release on Festival predicted for the big time is a re-run of the "Gal"; it's coupled with "Honky Tonk Girl."

Also on Festival is the Patsy Cline single "I'm Gonna Stay" which is out strongly on The Cash Box Top 100 chart. This time on the Top Rank label—is Andy Stewart's "Tunes Of Glory." Stewart had a tremendous hit with his version of "A Scottish Soldier"; the new release will keep Stewart on Aussie charts.

The word is very strong that The Embers—led by a great importer of talent—has set a milestone in the industry and the story is that Art Blakey's group will follow suit and will surely be jumpin'.

W&G Records, having a pretty good spin on the charts, reports brisk sales action with "Teen Scene" and "The Beatniks" a dual effort by the instrumental group The Three Notes. The album composed by American recording star (Ampar

ITALY

Across Italy, the records most played in the juke boxes are those by Connie Francis, Nico Fidenco and Peppino Di Capri. These names also fill the best positions on our charts of sales each week. Miss Francis has three smash hits in this territory at the same time—"Jealous Of You," "Roman Guitar" (both old Italian songs) and "Where The Boys Are." She is at the top of her popularity here. Fidenco, discovered a year ago, has quickly reaped big success, becoming the number one singer of RCA Italiana and one of the best in Italy. He started with "What A Sky" (250,000 copies sold) and through a series of minor hits, among them "The World Of Susie Wong," he keeps repeating with his latest "Legata Ad Un Granello Di Sabbia" (Tied To A Grain Of Sand), already on the chart. As far as Di Capri is concerned, he has cut another hit with a very old Neapolitan song, "Parlami D'Amore Mariu'" (Speak To Me Of Love, Mariu'). He has just released another song picked up from the old Neapolitan catalog, "Piscatore 'E Pusilleco," together with "Gurdando Il Cielo" (Looking At The Sky), which is already known in Italy via the record performance of Caterina Valente, and "Noi Due" (We Two), a tune penned by Umberto Bindi.

Out of ten songs listed on the chart, four are revivals of old Italian songs—"Surrender," "Jealous Of You," "Roman Guitar" and "Parlami D'Amore Mariu'." Because it is not a single case in a particular week, but has been happening for several months, there is a trend of picking up old Italian tunes, not only by our domestic singers but even internationally.

Mina, our best vedette, will leave at the beginning of August for Venezuela in the company of her mother and pianist Gigi Cichellero. Her contract provides an initial stay from August 7 through August 20, but she is likely to also perform in Brazil and Argentina. In Venezuela, she will perform each evening in the best night clubs and will take part in five TV shows.

The best selling record on Durium remains "Mule Skinner Blues" (Top Rank), followed up by "Little Lonely One" (Santa Lucia), interpreted by The Jarmels. A new Top Rank hit has been released—"A Quarter To Three" by U.S. Bonds (Legrand).

Titanus publishers of Rome had two songs at the last Naples Festival—"Mare Verde" (Green Sea) and "O Lione" (The Lion). The first, as already announced, got the second prize sung by Mario Trevi (Durium) and Milva (Cetra) and has become a hit in southern Italy, while the rights to the second song, which was interpreted by Joe Sentieri at Naples, were already sold all over Europe and in Japan.

At Decca, many hope for the latest release by Caterina Valente—"Over The Rainbow" coupled with "Non Dimenticar Le Mie Parole," which is an old Italian song. Decca has also launched the American smash "100 Pounds Of Clay" by Gene McDaniels.

The Festival of Ancona was won by Federica Monti Arduino with the tune, "Mai Mai Mai" recorded on Bluebell. Casetta believes that this singer will be a success.

On his stay in Milan, London publisher David Toff paid a visit to his Italian rep. Ladislao Sugar, with whom he arranged for the exploitation of the new instrumental, "Sunset," written by the English composer J. Woodman. Toff then visited Franz Leonardi, who is currently exploiting the film theme of "John And Julie" recorded by Eddie Calvert. From Edizioni Musicali Mascotte (managed by Panzuti & Sciorilli), he acquired the rights of E' Ritornato Il Sole" (The Sun Came Back) and "Campana A La Tonnara," which could easily become another "Scalinatella," according to Toff. Other publishers he saw and acquired numbers from were Mr. Boschetti of Fono Cine and Mr. Farini of Can Giusto. Before leaving, Toff told us that everyone had been most kind and he is looking forward to his next visit to Milan. In Italy, he was accompanied by his wife, who was Toff's Italian interpreter.

Lady Beierlein, the wife of Hans R. Beierlein, who is a music publisher in Monaco, came to Milan to visit with our publishers. Edition Montana, the name of Beierlein's firm, recently acquired the rights to "Banjo Boy" performed by Jan & Kjeld, which received a gold record.

GERMANY

The big news at present is the planning of the annual Radio-TV-Phono Industry fair being held from August 25 to September 3 in Berlin. The entire industry will be represented including the radio and TV stations and record companies. Many shows are being planned and Teldec alone reports that on August 26 Ted Heath, Mantovani, Los Machucampos, Vico Torriani, Boyd Bachmann, Connie Stevens, The Schmidt Family and perhaps Caterina Valente and Silvio Francesco will be presented. This is probably just a small part of the program as we do not have the list of artists appearing from other labels. Every day a TV show will be broadcast between 2 and 3 p.m. There'll be jazz shows, pop shows, operetta shows and many others. The Cash Box will be on hand to give a complete report on this major event.

One of America's top composers—A&R men and publishers, Norman Petty, arrived in Germany for talks with Johann Michel and Bruno Boettcher of Francis Day and Hunter here. Petty was accompanied by his English partner Mr. Crawford. His tune "Wheels" now tops the German Best Sellers. Peter Schaeffers reports his publishing house has both sides of the new Freddy record from the film "Only The Wind." The record will be a best seller as Freddy enters the charts with every record of his. Gerd Hammerling of the firm reports top action on the new Lou Van Burg and Barbara Kist waxing of "Alles Gute, Alles Liebe" written by Hans "Pepe" Wittstatt. The firm also reports top action on American hits "Moody River" and "I Feel So Bad." Both selections also have German cover versions. The Schaeffers house also had plenty of visitors in the last days. Norman Newell, the composer of the top hit "Portrait Of My Love," visited and wrote a new tune "This Will Go On" with Hans Wittstatt which is already recorded in London for Columbia Records. Billy Wilder dropped by the house to pay his respects as did Dr. Peter Gradenwitz from Edition Illan Melody Press in Israel. Two house productions from Schaeffers were bought by Nomar Records in New York. The tunes were cut with Orchestra leader Peter Erwin and the titles are "The Prayer Of An Angel" and "Erwin's Theme." Also a new tune from Werner Scharfenberger "Bleib Bei Mir" (Stay With Me) has been set for an American recording by Mercury Records.

Jazz critic Joachim E. Berendt has put together a group of "European All Stars" for a TV shot, a recording session for Teldec and a few concert appearances. They include Erik Amundsen-bass-Norway, Arne Domnerus-alto saxophone-Sweden, Ronnie Ross-baritone saxophone-England, Albert Mangelsdorff-trombone-Germany, Hans Koller-tenor saxophone-Austria, Sadi-vibes-Belgium, Martial Solal-piano-France, William Schioppe-drums-Denmark, Dusko Gojkovic-trumpet-Yugoslavia, Franco Cerri-guitar-Italy and Maffy Falay-trumpet-Turkey. The songstress with the band is Monica Zetterlund from Sweden.

Speaking of jazz, English critic Eric Dolphy is coming to Germany for TV and radio shots as well as an appearance at the Radio-TV-Phono Fair.

Neil Sedaka has made his first record in German and the industry is waiting to see if he'll have the success of Connie Francis and a few others. The first two Deutsch sides are his current stateside hits "Little Devil" and "I Must Be Dreaming" with German texts handled by Kurt Herta from Munich. Swedish teenage top songstress Lil Babs is getting top promotion on her first German waxing by Polydor. The songs sound great and the young gal is on her way to a big career here.

Gus Backus and Peter Kraus are readying short films for TV record hops in the states since it is too expensive for the teenage pair to go for a few personal appearances. The Dick Clark show is included in the broadcasts lined up.

Bert Kaempfert is beaming about his "Pick Of The Week" in The Cash Box with his new stateside waxing for Decca there. Ivo Robic dropped by The Cash Box office with the following goodie. Doc Pomus and Morty Shuman's "Save The Last Dance" in German, by Ivo, sold over 1/2 million here. To thank the American pair, Ivo's new American record will be texted by the Pomus-Shuman team. Both sides of the Ivo waxing were penned by German colleague Bert Kaempfert.

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MEXICO

The President of México, Don Adolfo López Mateos, officially opened the Núcleo Radio Mil, a beautiful new building where four of the most popular radio stations in México City are operating. These stations are Radio Mil, Radio 590, Radio Eco and X-E-O-Y FM. Escorting the President were Guillermo Salas, general director of the Núcleo Radio Mil, ministers of state, top execs of advertising companies and the most popular artists of México, including Andy Russell, Lucho Gatica, Constanza Hool, The Castro Brothers, César Costa, Enrique Guzmán, Emily Cranz, Carlos Campos, Pablo Beltrán Ruiz, Marco Antonio Muñoz, The Sandoval Brothers, Martha Rangel, Titina Romay, María Elena Sandoval, Ricardo Roca, Dyno, Lola Beltrán, Los Galantes, Los Tribunos, Locos del Ritmo, Vikings, Teen Tops, Hooligans and many others. Record execs present included Rogerio Azcárraga, Luis Adell, Alejandro Siegrist and Paco de la Barrera of Orfeon; Mariano Rivera Conde, David Crump, Raúl del Valle and Mario Molina Montes of RCA; Guillermo Buerekle, Fritz Hentschel, Panchito Méndez and Fidel A. Vista of Peerless; Bernardo González, Chuck Anderson and Edgardo Obregón of Columbia; Jose T. Muñoz and Josefina Contreras of Gamma; Héctor Gonzales de la Barrera, Jose Luengo from Musart and Gabriel Mendoza of Decca. Hosts were Francisco Ibarra, manager of Radio Mil, Carlos Flores, manager of Radio 590 and Radio Eco, Francisco Villalpando, manager of X-E-O-Y FM and Martín Martínez Ríos, manager of Radio Satélite and others who work for these stations. The press was also represented by Carlos Haro, Alejandro Guzmán Mayer, Edmundo Valadéz and many others. Columbia Records gave to Guillermo Salas, general director of the five stations a trophy in recognition of the "wonderful" job his stations have done over the years. Other members of the society which owns these stations, Josué Sáenz and Adrian Lajoud, were recognized too. This, obviously, was one of the most important events in the radio history of México.

Three new young singers just bowed in the Mexican disk market. The first was Martín Roca, who cut for Peerless Records the Spanish version of Paul Anka's "Tonight My Love, Tonight" with the Cuarteto Armónicos's vocal group accompaniment. The second was Ricardo Rocca (brother of Cesar Costa), who recorded for Columbia Records "A Certain Smile" and "Because Of You," sung in Spanish with the Rafaél Carrión orchestra. The third is Dyno, the youngest, only 17-years-old, who cut for Musart Records the Italian song "Pullover," and the American song, "Sleepwalk" (Sonámbulo) with orchestra directed by Jorge Ortega. More new singers, including females, may appear this week.

Chuck Anderson, popular musician who used to play with top bands in the United States and who now lives here in México, just finished a new LP for Columbia Records. He included in this album only songs of Mexican composers, but treats them with rhythms like swing, fox-trot and blues.

After a long and successful performance in Las Vegas, the Mexican vocal group The Castro Brothers returned to México City and signed to appear on TV, night clubs and to cut new recordings at Cisne Records. They will cut rock 'n roll numbers.

Mario Freidberg, president of Tizoc Records, left the Mexican capital to fly to Los Angeles and San Francisco to arrange new representation contracts with American labels. Mario will begin to press American singles in México City (he already presses LP's).

Emily Cranz, now exclusive artist with Orfeon Records, made her first single with the Spanish version of "I've Told Every Little Star" (Se Lo Platiqué A Cada Estrellita) in a beautiful arrangement of Gustavo Pimentel. Emily just left for Los Angeles and New York for performances in those cities.

Musart Records is going to send a musical caravan to Mérida with its artists The Columbus, Linda Vera and Dyno. Carlos Campos, conductor for the company, is planning now to record a new album with American arrangements of American songs. Campos has the number one tropical orchestra in México.

After being in New York and Argentina with his representatives, Rogerio Azcárraga, owner of Dimsa-Orfeon Records, returned to México City. Rogerio is trying to introduce his labels in Argentina, where he has found some difficulties.

Trying to find acceptance with the Mexican public, Jose T. Muñoz of Gamma Records pressed French songs sung in Spanish by French artists Charles Aznavour and Dalida. Also, new Eddie Barclay records appeared on the market. And talking about Gamma Records, we have been informed that Fernando Bell (brother of Monna), who is a well known singer in Spain and Chile, just recorded in México with Bebo Valdez's orchestra. Russia's Moiseyev dancers are performing here with great success.

Japan sent the "Japón Espectacular" show, which disappointed Mexican audiences because it is thought to be only a bad imitation of an American show with just a few original ideas of Japan. This show is playing at the Terrazza Cassino and this week will include Cuban singer Olga Guillot.

BRAZIL

We had a real American Jazz festival in Sao Paulo with American jazz musicians like: Coleman Hawkins, Jo Jones, trio with Tommy Flanagan, Curtis Herbie Mann Afro Sextet with Ahmed Abdul-Malek, Ball Trio with Davey Bailey, Ben Tucker and the "Voice Of America," Willis Conover. The sessions were enthusiastically received by Brazilian public.

Following the jazz fete, Sao Paulo will have an American star: Vic Damone. Very well known here.

Columbia Records issued two new Ray Charles "S Different," the latter with Billy Butterfield here. Since the first album released by Columbia records became big hits, "S Music" is still on top.

Angela Maria, one of the greatest Brazilian singers, recorded by Continental Records. Among the Angela waxed seven Brazilian compositions and music, including her smash hit "A Noiva" (The album was just released with Cid Gray and his orchestra and arranger Renato De Oliveira, who uses Brazilian music. The selections were cut as Brazilian songs the moment "Palhaçada" and "Boato."

The famous TV series "Bat Masterson," with Brazilian public, forced our record companies to use the "Bat Masterson" theme. So far, three records were released: Continental with Waldir Azevedo and two by orchestra and with Carlos Gonzaga—this one is popular in Brazil and his records are top sellers.

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The Record Manufacturer and the Juke Box Operator

The vast changes which have taken place in the record industry have affected both the type of music recorded today and the manner in which the product is promoted. Never before have so many record companies competed for the sale of these records and therein lies the basic reason for a recent turnabout on the part of the record manufacturer toward the juke box operator.

As recently as five years ago, the juke box operator was considered an important means of promoting a new record. The one-half million machines on location throughout the nation have been responsible for the success of countless million-record sellers and many other commercial successes.

However, with the changing market and the modern means of distribution and retail sale, the juke box operator dropped in importance as the disk jockey and other promotion outlets gained in stature as a prime means of introducing a new record to the listening public.

Times change, and an interesting switch seems to have taken place during the past two weeks with several record firms announcing that new releases will be made available "exclusively" for the juke box market.

The reason for this move is obviously to increase the sale of records to juke box operators who have been programming machines from top-selling records manufactured primarily for a teenage market. Rock and roll doesn't always fit the location and the tavern catering to an adult crowd may possibly want different music for entertainment.

In any event, United Artists and Columbia Records have announced new releases for the juke box operator with titles such as "My Gal Sal" and "Tavern In The Town." In some instances, former hit singles such as "Exodus" and "Never On Sunday" will be issued on one single with a hit on each side, in the form of a bargain buy.

Record firms began paying more attention to the juke box market two years ago when Seeburg started its "Artist of the Week" plan whereby various record companies issued special packages of 33 singles culled from top-selling LP's, and not available on 45 rpm. The program is still being promoted by Seeburg and regular releases of 33 rpm single material are made available from participating record firms. The basis for the plan was the type music available for programming as opposed to the rock and roll sound that dominates the top-selling charts.

Several other record firms have been reportedly working on similar plans in order to recapture the juke box operator as an important market. Various surveys reported here in the past have shown that today's operator replaces less than two new records on each machine each week in the regular course of servicing and programming machines. With a market of one-half million phonographs on location and the abundance of music available, this figure has always left a lot to be desired by the record manufacturers. We're glad to see that they plan doing something about it.

Rock-Ola Distrib Meetings In NYC, New Orleans, Start Of Sales Program For '61 Program

Firm's Execs Head For West Coast, Then Chi

NEW YORK—Rock-Ola distributor regional meetings began last week in New York City when the firm's wholesalers from that area met at the Park Lane Hotel on Monday, July 17, for a one-day session which included a preview of the firm's new 1961 phonograph line.

The machine was presented by Ed Boris, vice-president of Rock-Ola, who outlined sales plans for the year to the distributors in attendance. Meetings were held in private.

A luncheon was served to the guests before the sales meeting and the program included a service session conducted by Jack Barabash, Rock-Ola service manager. Sales manager Frank Mitchell assisted Doris who was accompanied by Donald Rockola, designer of the Rock-Ola phonograph models for the past several years. Ralph Wyckoff, advertising manager, outlined the firm's promotion plans for the coming year, and advised of special-type advertising programs that would be made available to the distributors.

Absent from the meeting were representatives of the Vic Conte distributing organization in upstate New York due to illness, and members of the B. D. Lazar firm who were out-of-town at the time.

The Rock-Ola entourage was scheduled to repeat the meeting with southern distributors in New Orleans on Thursday, July 20. The remainder of the trip will cover the west coast on Monday, July 24, when the west coast distributing organization will meet at San Francisco's Mark Hopkins Hotel. Midwest distributors will meet in Chicago on Friday, July 28 in the Congress Hotel. Canadian distributors will fly in for Saturday meetings following the midwest group.

Operator showings will start in distributor territories on August 13th, Sunday, and will continue through August 19th. Plans were already set for individual showings as many wholesalers scheduled dinner-type meetings to introduce the new phonograph to the operators.

Italian Movie-Juke Will Be Used For Industry, Education—No Ops

NEW YORK—The Italian juke box which features a movie screen reflecting the performer in color while the music is played will not be used for commercial purposes concerning the juke box industry but rather for use in industry and for educational purposes serving advertising presentations and instruction. The machine was originally announced as a juke box and is called the "Cinebox."

NEWARK, N.J.—Myron Sugerman, export manager, Runyon Sales Company, this city, announced last week that he will leave the country on

August 5 for an extended trip to Europe where he expects to visit with coin machine firms in eleven countries. The trip will take 6 weeks.

The purpose of the trip is to cement present relations with regular export customers and to expand the firm's number of outlets for coin machines. In addition, Sugerman will attempt to stimulate the sale of vending machines through his present export outlets. Runyon operates extensive vending machine routes in the New Jersey area here and therefore is in a position to accumulate machines for

Tavern-Type Selections, 2-Hit Disks

Record Firms Announce New Singles Exclusively For Jukes

NEW YORK—Juke box operators are getting more attention from record manufacturers these days and the results are expected to pay off in extra disk sales for the recording firms.

United Artists has announced a specially designed package for juke boxes to be known as "Silver Spotlight Series."

Art Talmadge, v.p. and general manager of the diskery, advised that there will be 35 releases in the initial series. "None of them have ever been issued before as singles," said Talmadge, coupled in this manner with a hit on each side." Talmadge advised that the firm has drawn from many of the top UA artists and Ultra Audio stars for the new series.

A sample disk available in the releases will include "Never On Sunday," Don Costa hit single, coupled with another smash, "Exodus" by Ferrante and Teicher. "Theme From the Apartment" by Ferrante and Teicher and "Magnificent Seven" by Al Caiola is another disk.

Steve Lawrence and Eydie Gorme will be teamed on four records. Tito Rodriguez and his Orch. and the Sauter-Finegan Orch. are scheduled for disks. Terry Snyder, leading LP

seller will be made available for single use by operators. Piano star Til Dieterle and a special sound track excerpt from "Wonderful Country" is paired with Don Costa's hit, "The Unforgiven."

Talmadge stated that the firm selected only the top artists and the best music available from the firm's catalog. "The long planning and production period which preceded the actual release of the new series was devoted to developing a type record which could be of the greatest possible benefit to juke box ops."

The Silver Spotlight series was unveiled during the recent ARMADA meet in Miami Beach and UA distributors reportedly asked that the release date be upped by several weeks.

Columbia Records has offered the coinmen a special package designed exclusively for juke ops, entitled "Playtime." The new series includes performances of pop standards such as "My Gal Sal," "Stardust," "Tavern In The Town" and many more, according to Columbia officials. The "Playtime" series will be made available in 33 and 45 with some also available in stereo.

sale. In addition, Runyon distributes the Rowe cigarette machine and several vending lines which substantiate the large inventory necessary to provide an export demand.

Sugerman will leave for Tel Aviv on Saturday, August 5 and remain in Israel until August 11 when he will leave for Athens staying at the Grand Bretagne Hotel until August 14. His itinerary will then take him to Hamburg's Atlantic Hotel until August 25 when he will leave for Copenhagen. Sugerman will leave the Palace Hotel for Helsinki's Palace Hotel on August 28, and remain in Finland until August 30.

On September 1, he will leave Stockholm's Grand Hotel and then move on to Brussels (Hotel Century) where he expects to remain until September 8. From there he'll enroute for Paris and stay at the Hotel Grand until September 12. The final stop is set for London's Park Lane Hotel where Sugerman will spend two days and leave for home on September 14.

He advised that the export market warrants a trip through the outlined countries based on the potential in sight. Some countries, according to Sugerman, are just starting to move large volumes of equipment and are in a position to increase orders now. The export market in general is fine, he said, and the growth factor evident is a strong one.

Runyon currently supplies its foreign customers with all types of coin-operated equipment, shipping from Newark directly overseas. The firm instituted an export program just two years ago and has developed the division into a profit-making segment of the vast Runyon organization which distributes the AMI phonograph, the Bally amusement machine line, the Keeney and Irving Kaye games. Myron Sugerman, son of the president, Barney Sugerman, originated the plan for increased export business and has since that time headed the department.

Susman Leads Texas Organization In Fight To Establish Uniform Tax

Statewide Group Highly Cooperative and
Successful In PR and Legislative Programs

DALLAS, TEXAS—Texas Amusement Operators Organization, a Statewide organization of coin machine operators, has been extremely effective in its efforts to uplift the image of the coin machine industry in its state, as well as effect changes in State legislation bringing financial benefits to its operators.

Headed by T. A. Webb, president, the organization boasts of approximately 500 members thruout Texas. There are many local area organizations, members of which are also members of the State organization. These local organizations cooperate closely with the State group in overall tax and license problems, and have been

doing a great job in each area contacting local representatives and senators, projecting their importance in local matters, as well as bringing their business problems to them.

Abe Susman, the guiding light in State affairs, is a registered lobbyist and public relations man with the State. Susman, who has been devoting most of his time to effect legislative changes benefiting the state's coinmen, has been spending practically every day in the State capitol, Austin, since the beginning of the year.

Legislation now being considered in Special Session of the State legislative body would bring about a change in the law which would put into effect a uniform tax of \$10 per year, per machine, regardless of the denomination of the coin being inserted into the machine. The law now in effect since 1935, demands taxes of varying amounts, all of which are higher, depending on 1¢, 5¢ or 10¢ play. Now with practically all machines operating at dime play, the present tax is inequitable and unfair.

"Changes of passage of this legislation look extremely favorable," advised Susman. "Not only have our State coinmen been working very diligently, but we've had the most wonderful cooperation from coinmen in every area organization. One factor greatly in our favor is that Texas is absolutely free of equipment needing \$250 Federal Tax licenses, and legislators and officials of the State of Texas are fully aware of this situation. And, they know we intend to keep it clean in the future."

Overseas Expansion Moves By Vending Mfrs. Seen As Profitable Long Range Planning

NEW YORK—The expansion of vending machine firms into the export market has been at such a rate that even the commercial papers outside of the trade are carrying feature stories on it.

Latest article to appear outlining the European plans of such firms as Canteen, Universal Match and Vendo, among others, is the Journal of Commerce, nationwide business newspaper.

The attraction for doing business on the continent either on a licensing agreement, wholly owned subsidiary, or contract understanding with a foreign firm, is obviously for profits.

First off, the European section of the world is probably the Continent that will show, or is showing, the fastest growth rate, and is expected to continue this rate for the time being. Secondly, with production costs at a slower rate, and US tax law being what they are, many US firms can operate at a high rate of profit.

Canteen and Rowe, parent and sub-sid, have expanded recent operations in Europe to embrace business in three countries. In addition, Canteen has strengthened its position through operations of other European countries. These firms include Automatische Kantinen Companie, G.M.B.H. of

Frankfort, Hamburg, Bochum and Wiesbaden, Germany; Automat For-saljning of Stockholm, Sweden; Automatic Canteen-Benelux, Antwerp, Belgium, and Cortina Canteen Service of Basel, Zurich, Fribourg, Lausanne and Bellinzona, Switzerland.

Canteen has already granted licenses to companies in Mexico, France, Italy, Japan, Jamaica, Australia and Canada. Canteen's Norval Rader, International chief, was reportedly quoted as expecting a one-third increase in sales for fiscal 1961 from Europe.

Recently Universal Match Corp., parent firm of Glasco and National Vendors announced new distribution firms in Fisher-Ludlow, sub-sid of British Motor Corp. In addition, National Rejectors and Ferguson Machine Corporation have developed agreements with foreign interests which should help expansion of foreign interests somewhat.

National Rejector sales from its Buxtehude, Germany plant, have increased about 25% this year, a barometer of vending machine sales in Europe.

Meanwhile, Vendo has been striving for increased outlets with tentative acquisitions planned for Ger-

many and Japan. Mitsubishi Heavy Industries of Japan will manufacture and sell the Vendo line under a tentative agreement. The firm controls another manufacturing outlet in Mexico in addition to smaller operations in Germany, France, England, Belgium and other European countries.

Interstate Vending, in addition to expanding at a rapid pace here in the US, announced several months ago dealings with an English firm, Elliot Automation Ltd. whereby a tea vending machine would be cooperatively marketed in England.

The Seeburg Corporation, operating under its Seeburg International sales sub-sid, recently established a sales firm in Germany, Seebvend Automaten Vertriebs GmbH, after arranging for similar marketing facilities in Belgium, called Seeben. Both firms are intended to improve the marketing operations of Seeburg's phonograph, vending machines, and background music systems, in Europe.

The Rock-Ola Manufacturing Corporation is currently manufacturing equipment in Germany under an agreement with Nova, headed by A. D. Adickes, European representative.

NAMA Board Meet Discusses Balance In 21 Member Seats — Mergers Will Result In Termination Of Membership By One Firm At Election Time

CHICAGO—Make-up of the Board of Directors of National Automatic Merchandising Association received special consideration at the spring meeting of that group, June 22-23.

Passed unanimously was a motion to "assure equal representation of independent operators and national or regional operating companies and equitable representation of manufacturers and suppliers."

Charged by the Board with responsibility to secure this representation is the new 1961 Nominating Committee. Members include Carl Millman, Chairman, Automatic Merchandising Corporation, Milwaukee, Wis.; Jack Burlington, The Vendo Company, Kansas City, Mo.; Marcus Kaplan, VCS Automatic Vending Company, Roanoke, Va.; J. Richard Howard, Howard Vending Service, Inc., Indianapolis, Ind., and James W. Vipond, D & B Distributors, Inc., Scranton, Pa.

Nine persons will be elected to the Board this October and will take office January 1, 1962, according to Thomas B. Donahue, NAMA president. He reported that of the nine, seven will fill terms expiring this year, and two will fill existing vacancies.

"One of the seats on the Board will be reserved for a representative of NAMA's 'Allied' membership category for a one-year term. This representation on the NAMA Board is in recognition of the fine work being done for the industry and for the Association by our Allied members," Donahue said.

He pointed out that the NAMA Bylaws, amended by the Board last January, state that a manufacturing or operating company may have no more than one seat on the Board.

"This was done because mergers of companies which involve Board members might cause the merged corporation to have several Board mem-

berships and thus impair the equal representation of all industry segments," Donahue said.

However, individuals who had been elected to the Board before the change in the Bylaws will be allowed to complete their terms. Only two members of the Board are in this category and their terms will expire in 1962, Donahue reported.

He pointed out that should any member of the Board merge during his term of office with a company already represented on the Board, he may serve only until the next election, thus assuring balance of the Board at the beginning of each year.

The NAMA Board now consists of 21 directors.

New directors will be elected during the Association's annual meeting, October 29 at Chicago's McCormick Place Exhibition Hall, site of NAMA's largest-ever Convention.

Vending Public Health Exhibit At Sanitation Convention

CHICAGO—Public health experts throughout the country recently viewed a special vending-public health exhibit at the 1961 convention of the National Association of Sanitarians, July 11-13.

The special vending exhibit was sponsored by National Automatic Merchandising Association and manned by David E. Hartley, public health counsel.

The booth featured NAMA sanitation materials and a demonstration hot beverage vender.

The exhibit at the sanitarian's conclave is just one of many year-round vending-public health educational projects undertaken by NAMA, according to Everett Newcomer, NAMA public health committee chairman.

New Dollar Bill Changer Announced By ABT

CHICAGO—A new model dollar bill changer, designed to help coin-operated vending and laundry operations boost sales with convenient change facilities, has been announced by AC Automatic Services, Inc., a subsidiary of Automatic Canteen Company of America. It was pioneered by the A.B.T. Manufacturing Co., now part of Automatic Canteen.

The new model 6 "silent cashier" reportedly offers greater flexibility in converting dollars into change than earlier units. It also contains many engineering refinements that cut down servicing costs, and increase its dependability.

To help make its \$150 change reserve last longer, the dollar bill changer's 16 change tubes have been re-engineered so that there are four rather than two 25-cent tubes, and six rather than eight 5-cent tubes. It also contains six 10-cent tubes.

A total of 10 change combinations are possible with the new Automatic Canteen dollar bill changer. Improved currency detection devices increase its reliability in rejecting counterfeit money, foreign currencies, and U.S. bills of higher than one dollar denomination.

Better burglary protection is provided by a heavier steel cabinet, hardened steel locks, and channel-type construction around the door and hood which effectively seal the cabinet.

AC Automatic Services, Inc., leases its dollar bill changers to vending operators who install them as a volume-building convenient service on location.

Shore-Calnevar Changes

LOS ANGELES—Major corporate management changes to implement an expanded manufacturing and sales program of its various divisions and subsidiaries have been announced by Shore-Calnevar Inc., national automotive products manufacturer and parent firm of Atlas Automatic Vending Co.

According to Fred Plotkin, president, Joseph L. Sillman has been appointed corporate vice president in charge of marketing, and Paul G. Smouse has been named as Corporate general manufacturing manager.

Atlas Auto., L.A., Installs Cafeteria In Ford Plant

Parts Div. Employs
250 Employees—Service
Capable Of 350 Staff

First Of Its Kind In
Any Ford Motor Facility

LOS ANGELES—Atlas Automatic Vending Corporation has installed an automatic cafeteria in the Ford Motor Company's L.A. parts depot.

The automatic cafeteria system, called Dine-Atron, is operated on a daily basis, dispensing a variety of hot or cold dishes from a series of modern vending machines.

Ranging from hot main entrees—cooked for employees by a microwave Radarange oven—to pastries and desserts, the cafeteria meals are prepared in advance by Atlas Vending at its main commissary in Los Angeles and then distributed to the plant. Atlas is a wholly owned subsidiary of Shore-Calnevar Inc.

SERVES EMPLOYEES

The new installation, located in the center of the depot, serves Ford's present force of approximately 250 employees, but it is capable of handling more than 350 persons at any meal time. Formerly, the parts depot had no cafeteria facilities and the new feeding unit is expected to be used by the majority of its employees.

Lowell Parmentier, vice president and general manager of Atlas, said that Ford is the latest installation of several made recently at other industrial and commercial firms in the Los Angeles area. Among the companies which now have Dine-Atron systems in operation are Phelps-Dodge Copper Products Corp., Columbia Studios, Certified Grocers' warehouse, USC School of Medicine, and Safeway Stores' receiving and distributing warehouse.

The trend to automatic feeding, Parmentier explained, is also extending into the field of general public use. He said that Food Giant Markets has recently opened an Atlas installation in one store with others being considered for the food chain's supermarkets.

Parmentier also indicated that the vending company foresees no let up in demand for in-plant feeding systems. Among the benefits, he points out, are savings in cost of operating full cafeterias, elimination of slow-moving food lines and freeing floor space for other uses. The installation features automatic coin and dollar bill changers.

The installation at the Ford Depot is typical of the selection of different foods offered to employees. Food items, available for breakfast, lunch or dinner, include hot and cold cereals; fruit and juices; five different hot sandwiches, five different cold sandwiches; five hot meat and vegetable entrees; and small salad dishes of cottage cheese, jello, etc. In all, 184 different dishes are served by Atlas on a rotating basis.

Richard T. Crawford, manager of the depot, located at 4940 Sheila Street in Los Angeles, said that the automatic cafeteria provides the employees with convenient facilities for meals which previously were not available.

He added that to the best of his knowledge the installation is the first of its kind to be opened in any of the Ford Motor Company's facilities.
