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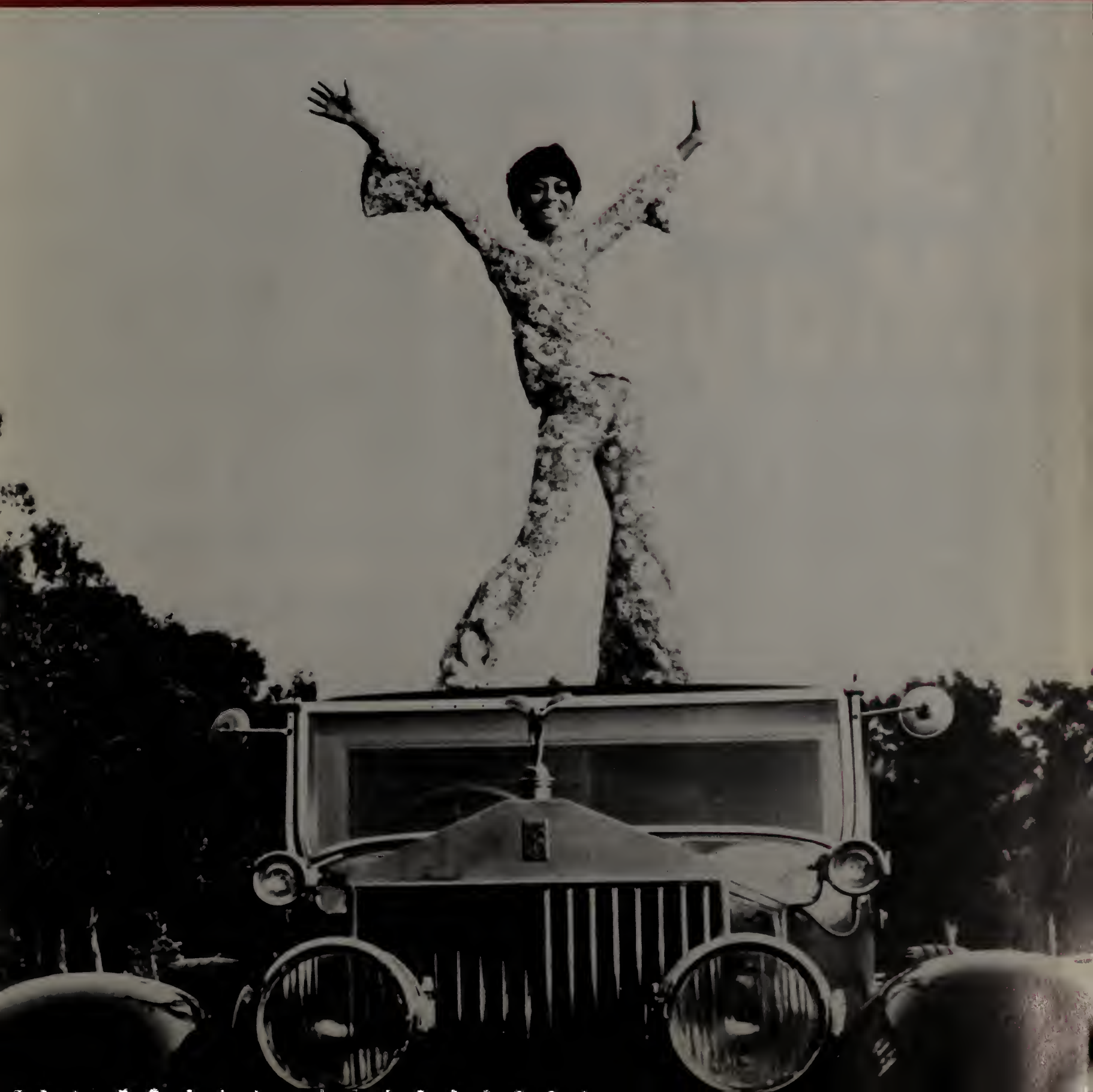
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## How To Get Even More Sales Mileage From Super Acts

From a purely business point of view, super stars mean super sales. Individual artists and groups so designated have made the once vaunted milestone of 1 million copies of an LP sold a matter of course, so much so that we'd hate to be at a sales meeting called to "explain" a super-star LP that's run its course at, let us say, 700,000 copies.

Yet, perhaps the time has come for an exploration of how LP's by the industry's heavies can go far beyond their present sales strength, perhaps half again as much volume. We think this is possible through a reevaluation of the impact of super-star LP's on the market. While it may still hold true that the peak sales life of most LP's may span a period of 90 days, this duration, labels with super-star acts have informed us, is considerably shorter for albums featuring their leading sellers. Excitement and demand for these albums can peak over a 14-day period. The reason seems to be that youngsters want to be the "first on the block" to possess super-star albums and might defer the purchase of one that's released at the same time, but is only available in large quantities at a later date. Columbia Records, for instance, reported that sales of Simon & Garfunkel's "Bridge Over Troubled Water," had reached a remarkable 1.9 million copies sold nine days after the release of the LP. The heart of the

matter was Columbia's anticipation of this kind of early volume by initial pressing orders for the LP that the marketplace could absorb over this period.

The super-star, then, deserves super treatment from his label in the manner of getting as much product out there as possible from the very beginning. True, selling a million copies of an album is not, as some in the trade might say, "chopped liver," but the industry shouldn't bask in the glory of new sales milestones when it's been stated time and time again that the potential of record sales in the U.S. alone is nowhere comparable to a market that possesses more than 55 million phonographs, not to mention millions of 8-track and cassette units. Speaking of tape, it's been suggested to us that one of the most efficient ways of combating rampant tape bootlegging and piracy is for a label to get out as much product as it can as soon as it can (super-star status LP's, at least) so as to have its product reach marketplace saturation before the bogus disk/tape thief can hit the stands with his goods.

To strike a more positive note, however, the industry's super-stars can achieve even greater sales penetration of their wares if their product receives wide exposure over a critical span of a few weeks. Then we may have to refer to these heavies as "super-duper" stars.

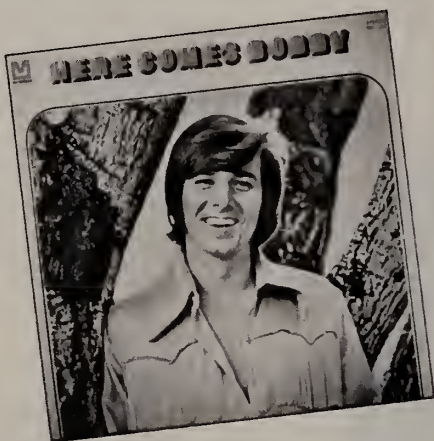

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# Woodstock 'Freedom' Image: Kornfeld-Lang Co.'s

NEW YORK — Aside from the sociological impact of last summer's Woodstock rock fest, its producers, Artie Kornfeld and Michael Lang, can claim a varied show business entity.

Two companies, one largely in the hands of Kornfeld, the other a specialty for Lang, are handling the K-M collaboration. In essence, Kornfeld observes, both units reflect the "freedom of expression" he feels was a hallmark of the Woodstock venture, a "happening" for more than 400,000 kids in upstate New York.

Kornfeld-Lang Adventures, the operation under which fall record, publishing and a soon-to-be-realized ad venture, has made "freedom" a key of its new label setup, Eleuthera Records, the name of which derives from a Bahamas out island that stands for "freedom," since its original settlers sought and supposedly found their version of "freedom" there.

The label, which is being distributed by Buddah, will open shop with a Bert Sommer LP. The vocalist was reportedly the only act to appear at Woodstock not signed to a label. In addition to Sommer, the label has other acts, instrumentalist Buzzy Linhart and His Band, Rachel and Robert Lee, also a Woodstock attraction.

Kornfeld, often describing the "family-like" philosophy of the enterprise, says the K-L units continue the Woodstock teaming in personnel, too. Besides such execs as Charlie Tuna (Kornfeld's exec assistant and head of Eleuthera promo), a number of designers and placement people are also involved in K-L's activities.

## Bigger Than Woodstock?

As for Lang, he's running — at a lower Manhattan triplex apart from Kornfeld-Lang Adventures offices at 1650 Broadway — the firm known as Michael Lang-Artie Kornfeld Productions, which concentrates on concerts and film and TV production. Concert-wise, Lang (and Kornfeld) have just bowed out as co-producers of the July Toronto rock fest along with John Brower, but Kornfeld promises a European fest this summer that will surpass Woodstock in size and scope. On the film and TV end, several properties have already been acquired, with Kornfeld seeing a finished feature film later this year.

Kornfeld-Lang Adventures runs two publishing firms, Lovelin (BMI) and Jamilin (ASCAP), with Bruce Rothstein, former Beechwood Music exec, in charge. Including Kornfeld, there are 10 writers under contract.

Kornfeld is preparing himself for an "intensive year's work" in putting Eleuthera over. He'll make constant road trips to key markets and travel to California and London, where he expects to setup branch offices.

The future may well include a purchase of the entire Kornfeld-Lang operation by a firm that recently started penetrating the music field.

## Dick James U.S. Talent Hunt As Rosner Enters Unit As Mgr.

NEW YORK — Dick James will enter U.S. talent and writer acquisition and development for the first time as a result of a partnership deal that brings Dave Rosner into James' state-side publishing setup as manager of all music and exploitation activities in the U.S. and Canada.

These companies include all songs written by John Lennon and Paul McCartney (Maclen Music, Inc.); the songs of Roger Cook/Roger Greenaway and The Hollies (Maribus Music, Inc.); the Gerry Bron catalogs which include the Juicy Lucy and Colosseum groups, in addition to the Dick James Music Limited catalog, of which the local introduction of English performer/writer Elton John on Uni Records will be a major initial project. Rosner will also act in behalf of all Dick James U.S. recording activities, including the Bell Records' distributed Page One and DJM labels.

Rosner's affiliation also signals James' first venture into the area of U.S. talent and writer acquisition and development via Daramus, Inc. Daramus is Rosner's publishing/production company and, in partnership with Dick James, now becomes a part of the James Group. Started six months ago by Rosner, the company currently directs the writing and recording activities of Margo Guryan (writer of the recent Oliver hit "Sunday Mornin'"); Layng Martine, Jr. (Decca Records); and John Martine (CTI Records), among other new talents.

Rosner will be located in the Dick James offices at 1780 Broadway and will immediately begin supplementing a promo and exploitation organization equipped to service song material and secure air play on a nationwide basis.

Rosner entered the business in 1960 as music director of Newark's WNTA Radio (now WJRZ). In 1962 he joined the sales department of Columbia Records and became Columbia's single records' Product Manager. He transferred within the CBS organization to the April/Blackwood music companies in 1964 and acted as Professional Manager from 1965 through 1968. He left CBS to pursue the formation of his own business with Neil Diamond in the summer of 1968 and established Daramus in the fall of 1969.

Currently Mendell's Liberty/UA responsibilities include the international sales division, the overseas companies, Sunset Records, the labels' tape operations and public and consumer relations. He is a member of the firm's operations committee, a member of the Trans-America marketing committee and a member of the Trans-America international committee.

During his eight year tenure with the Liberty complex, he served as west coast district manager, director of Liberty's branches, national LP sales manager and general manager.

## Consumer Electronics Sales Slip Downhill

WASHINGTON — Distributor consumer electronic sales to dealers were generally off the high pace set January 1969, reports the Electronic Industries Association.

Total phonograph sales decreased 46.7 percent in January over the same month a year ago; 233,208 units to 437,320 units. Total radio sales to dealers declined in all categories.

Distributor sales of color television sets to dealers were down 26.1 percent during January 1970 as compared with sales during January 1969. In January 380,841 sets were sold to dealers compared with 515,169 the same month last year, EIA reported.

## Nyro Repls Reply To Legal Decision

The following is a reply from representatives of Laura Nyro regarding a story in the March 28 issue of Cash Box:

The March 28 issue of Cash Box contained a most misleading report on the lawsuit between Laura Nyro and Celestial Music. Three contracts were involved on appeals by both parties to the Appellate Division of the New York Supreme Court. On two of them, an exclusive management contract with Celestial and an exclusive recording contract with Milton T. Okun, Inc., the Court affirmed a decision that the singer had properly nullified the contracts. That part of the decision is not mentioned in the Cash Box story. As to the publishing contract, all that was held is that there has to be a trial on the question whether she is bound by it.

The three contracts were signed by Miss Nyro when she was 18 years old, and disaffirmed a year later. The Court held her not bound by the management and recording contracts because they were for a term of five years. As to whether the five-year publishing contract is one that she properly repudiated, the Court held only that the statute on which Miss Nyro relied does not make that contract illegal as a matter of law. A trial will decide whether it was reasonable and prudent when made. The trial is not likely to take place for several months. In the meantime, there has been no disposition of the disputed publishing proceeds.

## Don England Heads Capitol M'kting

HOLLYWOOD — Don England has joined Capitol Records as vp and general manager of Capitol Records Distributing Corp.

England, headquartered in the Capitol Tower, will report to Sal Iannucci, president of the label. He comes to the label from National Tape Distributors, Inc., the distributor firm, where he served as exec vp.

Iannucci said that with the appointment of England as head of marketing, the firm's senior exec group is now complete. ## GRT'S Fiscal Half A Strong Gainer

SUNNYVALE, CALIF. — Net revenues of \$16,263,358 and after-tax earnings of \$811,729 (equal to 33 cents per share of common stock on 2,496,711 average shares outstanding) were reported last week by GRT Corp. for the first six months of the company's 1970 fiscal year, ended Dec. 27, 1969. Assuming conversion of all options and warrants, earnings would be 28 cents per share on 2,922,526 outstanding common shares, options, and warrants.

These results compare with first-half fiscal 1969 net revenues of \$5,219,592 and earnings of \$364,621 (equal to 20 cents per share on 1,824,628 common shares then outstanding, adjusted for a four-for-one split). Assuming conversion of all options and warrants, earnings per share for that period would have been 16 cents per share on 2,294,373 outstanding common shares, options, and warrants.

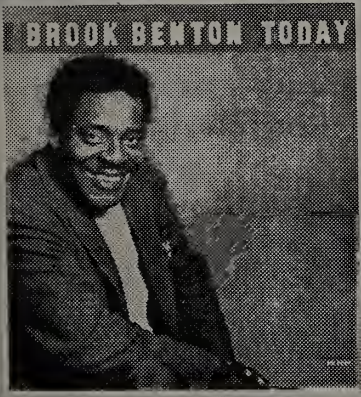

Indie producers already set are Tommy Cogbill and Perry Botkin, Jr. Botkin co-produced an album featuring the Mike Curb Congregation, an 18 voice choir described by Ray as "a 1970 version of the Mitch Miller sing-a-long" and Cogbill recently cut a single featuring Angeline Butler ("Keep On Keepin' That Man") aimed at an R&B-pop market. Other acts not yet set with outside producers are Bernie Schwartz and the Wheel and Hansel Terry. Terry, a 21 year black singer, is presently one of the leads in the Doodletown Pipers. Bernie Schwartz and the Wheel is described as a middle of the road folkpop act along the lines of Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young.

CoBurt's ASCAP (House of CoBurt Music Pub. Inc.) and BMI (CoBurt Music Inc.) arms are not involved in the MGM pact.

## NY Disk Musicians Support NCRA Goal

NEW YORK — At a strategy session on Thursday, March 26, nearly 200 recording musician representatives of AFM local #802 met at the Americana Hotel for a briefing by the National Committee for the Recording Arts president Stan Kenton and national coordinator Doug Neal.

The purpose was to provide the recording musicians with information regarding the facts and disposition of the Williams Amendment to the copyright revision bill. This amendment, presently in the Senate Judiciary Committee for deliberation, will provide royalty payments to performers, musicians, arrangers and record companies each time their records are played anywhere for profit.

Spearheading this segment of local #802 is Gene Orloff, Bernie Glow, Joe Malin, Jules Schachter and Dick Heyman. All in attendance were in complete accord with NCRA strategy and offered their full cooperation, beginning with an extensive letter writing campaign to all Senators and Congressmen urging their support.

As spokesman for the recording musicians, Orloff stated that he was confident that other similar factions in the major recording areas, i.e. L.A., Detroit, Nashville and Chicago, would call their own members together and invite Kenton and Neal for this important industry presentation.

Newly enrolled since New Years Day 1969 are Glaser Music and New Keys Music of Nashville, Beckie Music of Memphis, Earl Barton Music of Springfield, Mo. and Lowery Music of Atlanta, in addition to such well-known names as Al Gallico Music, Screen Gems-Columbia Music, Lisauer Music, Fairlane Music, Antigony Music, Ivan Mogul Music and Metromedia Music, among others.

## Yew Buys 2 Masters From Lionel Ent.

NEW YORK — Yew Records has purchased two masters from Lionel Entertainment, reports Shy Rakin, the label's exec vp. Tony Ricco produced "Mocking Bird Hill" by Eddie Woods, a new artist; the second master is "Something You're Tryin' To Hide" by the Onyx, a San Francisco group. Deal was made by Frank Mancini on behalf of Lionel Entertainment. Yew has had success with diskings by the Intrigues and the Village Soul Choir, the latter appearing on Yew's Abbott label.

HOLLYWOOD — Viva Music Publishing has taken the theme for their spring campaign in publishing from their own logo, "Viva Music." Viva is the publishing arm of Snuff Garrett Productions.

The organization has 2,500 tunes in its catalogue such as Mark Lindsay's new Columbia single, "Miss America," which was penned by Viva writer Jim Kelly. Another Viva writer, John Cale, wrote "After Midnight" for Eric Clapton and his forthcoming Atlantic album. Other material goes to such artists as Al Hirt, Jerry Fuller, Gary Puckett, Dwayne Blackwell, John Wilkinson Blackwell and Possum.

CHERRY HILLS, N.J. — Phil Mast, president of Cougar Record Enterprises in Cherry Hill, N.J. has named vet record man Herman Kaplan, as general manager of the record division.

### Students Compete For Scholarships

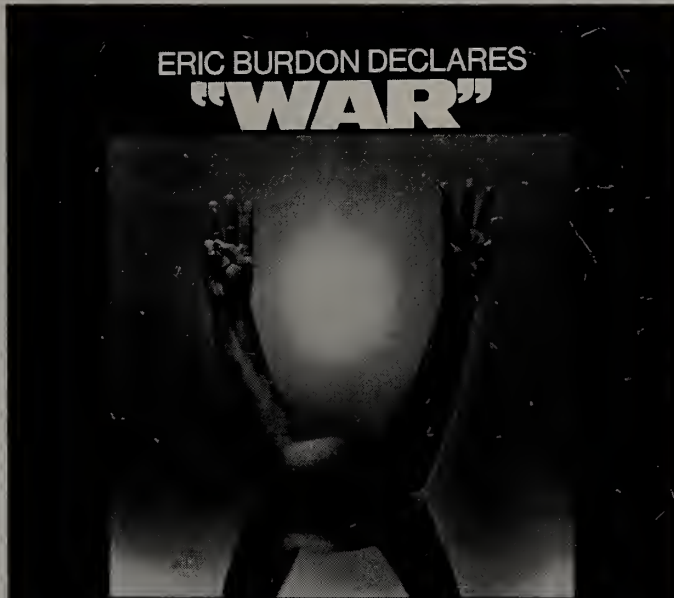

### Travelers Warned Of Snow Hazards

A warning has been issued to skiers, motorists, vacationers and travelers in mountain areas of the Southland to beware of hazardous conditions at higher elevations created by record-breaking snow levels, heavy rains and high winds associated with the recent storm.

Southern California Edison Company said snow is piled so deep in some areas that it almost reaches energized high-voltage electric power lines.

"Some of our power lines may even be partially buried by the record snowfall," an Edison spokesman said.

The record breaking rainfall and strong winds in some areas have toppled facilities, bringing energized conductors precariously close to the ground.

"People traveling, vacationing or working in mountain regions should remember that any wire found close to the ground is potentially dangerous and should be avoided," the Edison executive said.

He urged mountaineers to maintain a safe distance of at least ten feet from any energized facilities. "We advise extreme cau-

tion and urge everyone to remain within supervised recreational areas in the mountains whenever possible," he said. "While the utilities are making every effort to repair damage promptly and restore electric service disrupted by the storm," the Edison spokesman said, "it may take some time to finish the job particularly in remote, hard-to-reach areas. Until service is back to normal or the huge snow drifts melt down to more normal depths, all mountaineers should be especially careful," he said.

"We urgently request the full cooperation of the public in order to avoid serious accidents," he said. Recent snow depths in mountain areas served by Edison have included 46 inches at Big Creek, 161 inches at Huntington Lake, 167 inches at Rush Creek and 208 inches at Badger Flats.

"These measurements are, of course, at relatively even levels," the Edison spokesman said. "The snow drifts nearly covering some of our power lines in certain areas are piled as high as 30 feet deep or more."

### THEME FROM "Z" AND OTHER FILM MUSIC — Henry Mancini — RCA LSP-4350

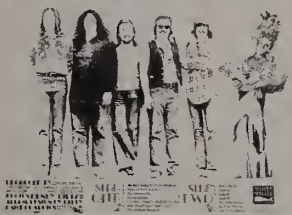

### LET'S BE FRIENDS — Elvis Presley — RCA Camden CAS-2408

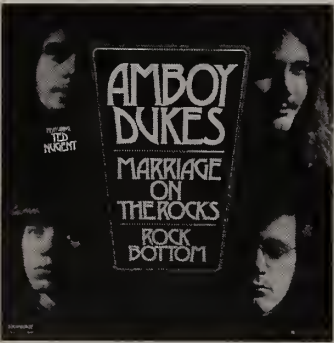
Elvis' millions of fans will rush to welcome this package, which is offered at a budget price on RCA's Camden label. A number of these tracks are from Presley films and all the cuts on the set have previously been unavailable on record. There is the handclapping "Stay Away, Joe," along with the melodic ballad "Almost" and the infectious easy rockers "Change Of Heart" and "Have A Happy." Elvis' performance rings true and sure throughout on an LP which could generate sizeable chart action.

### THE TURTLES SOME OLD ONES AND SOME FAIRLY NEW ONES



### MORE GOLDEN HITS — The Turtles — White Whale 7172

This is the second volume of hits from The Turtles' camp and is appropriately sub-titled "Some Old Ones and Some Fairly New Ones." The collection covers their activities over the past two years or so, revealing a style that differed a bit from their original hit work. Some of their top tunes on the LP are "You Showed Me," "She's My Girl," "Elenore" and "Lady-O Lady-O." Should do just fine.



### MARRIAGE ON THE ROCKS/ROCK BOTTOM — Amboy Dukes — Polydor 24-4012

The Amboy Dukes have just come onto the charts with this album. The set is heavily instrumental. A three-part piece called "Marriage" starts the LP, and the listener is presented throughout with energetic hard rock whose appeal is testified to by the presence of the package on the charts. "Breast-Fed Gator," "Non-Conformist Wilderbeast Man" and "The Inexhaustible Quest For The Cosmic Cabbage" are three of the other titles.



### SOMETHING'S BURNING — Kenny Rogers & The First Edition — Reprise 6385

The pleasant, clean sound of the quintet comes across full-guns on their latest offering. The title song is in the Top 20 and will help the LP sales with that extra pull. This is one of those albums which incorporates cuts using both full orchestration and simple, folk-style background. The results, when coupled with the group's easy vocals, makes a solid pop market deck. Set is already on the charts.



### THE SINGING STORY TELLER — Johnny Cash — Sun 115

Out of the Sun archives come eleven more Cash tracks, including "You're The Nearest Thing To Heaven," "Hey Good Lookin'," "I Could Never Be Ashamed Of You" and "Goodbye Little Darling." Johnny is dynamic, whether in vintage material such as this, or songs he recorded this morning. This economy-priced LP captures the vitality of the man and his music. Johnny is riding the crest of huge popularity now; deck should become a charter.



### MOONDANCE — Van Morrison — Warner Bros. 1835

Contemporary singer-songwriter Van Morrison has been around for awhile, and a couple of years back he had a single hit, "Brown-Eyed Girl," on the Bang label. He dropped out of national sight, but built up an underground following, and now he is back on the charts with a single, "Come Running," which is included on this album, and the LP itself, which has just broken onto the charts.



### ON TOUR — Delaney & Bonnie & Friends With Eric Clapton — Atco SD 33-326

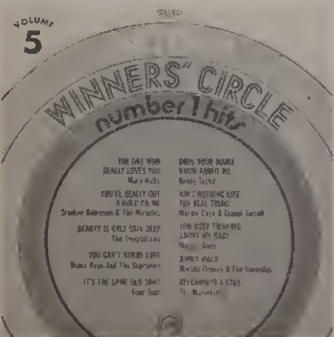
It's been a long time coming, but look out it's here! A super album, recorded live in England, from a super assemblage of musicians. From the opening bars of "Things Get Better," when the shout of "Come on everybody" is heard, this is a keg of dynamite. Everyone works together to make this a powerhouse entry, and when "everybody" includes the likes of Delaney, Bonnie, Clapton, Dave Mason, Rita Coolidge, etc., then there is reason to celebrate. Group's recent single, "Coming Home" is featured, as is an unforgettable "That's What My Man Is For" and a stomping Little Richard medley. Album should shoot up the chart.

## Pop Best Bets



### LET THE SUN SHINE IN/MIDNIGHT COWBOY/AND OTHER GOODIES — Paul Mauriat and His Orchestra — Philips 600-337

The French pianist/composer is back with us again, giving the title songs and such tunes as "Je T'Aime . . . Moi Non Plus," "Sweet Charity," "Sunshine And Seashore" and "Que Je T'Aime" his own popular interpretations. This LP should find its way into the markets soon and will probably be a good radio item. Could make a chart appearance.



### MOTOWN WINNERS' CIRCLE — NO. 1 HITS VOLUME 5 — Various Artists — Gordy 950

Gordy Records digs back a few years to put together this collection of top R&B and, in some cases, pop hits. A rundown of them shows you what to expect: "Beauty Is Only Skin Deep" by The Temptations, "You Can't Hurry Love" by Diana Ross and The Supremes, Smokey Robinson & The Miracles' "You've Really Got A Hold On Me", Four Tops' "It's The Same Old Song", "The One Who Really Loves You" by Mary Wells, "Jimmy Mack" by Martha Reeves & The Vandellas and four more. Should be a nice item.



### NASHVILLE BY CARR — Vikki Carr — Liberty LST-11001

Vikki steps out with a Nashville flavor on her latest LP and a fine step it is. Always a strong MOR artist, she could now add country fans to her legions. Styling wins the day as the talented thrush does "Yesterday, When I Was Young," "The Tip Of My Fingers" and the current Neil Diamond charter "Until It's Time For You To Go." Special treat is her sensitive version of "Sunday Mornin' Comin' Down." Deck could put in a chart appearance before very long.



### JOHN PHILLIPS — Dunhill DS 50077

As leader of and chief writer for the Mamas and the Papas, John Phillips played a major part in creating some of the most exciting and successful rock music ever to be recorded. The Mamas and the Papas are gone now, and, judging by this album, John has been unsuccessful in casting his talent into a new mold. His songs and singing are uninspired, and there is none of the magic of the Mamas and the Papas in this record. Phillips' name will sell copies of this set, however, so keep it around.

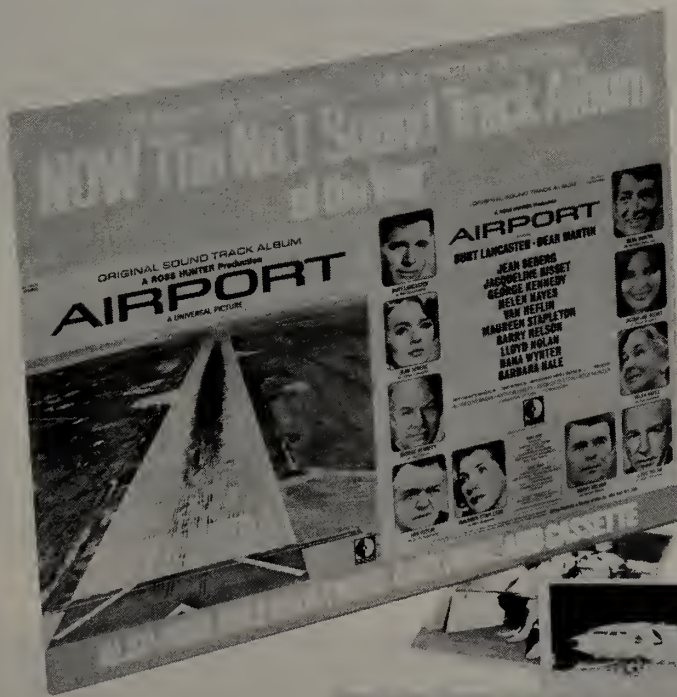
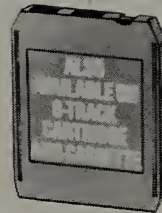

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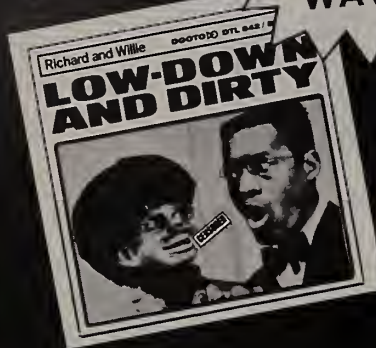

## Pop Best Bets



### WEEDS — Brewer & Shipley — Kama Sutra 2016

This song writing and performing team working with acoustic instruments, and assisted by some excellent musicians including keyboard wizard Nicky Hopkins, shows that they could become a very popular act. In addition to their own compositions, they've included a standout rendition of Bob Dylan's "All Along The Watchtower." "Weeds" could easily sprout into a sizeable chart blossom. An excellent folk-country rock package.

## THE DAMNED



### THE DAMNED — Original Sound Track — Warner Bros. 1829

Composing a score for Visconti's spectacular film, "The Damned"—one which would reflect the lush yet grotesque nuances of the movie—would seem an insurmountable task for many composers. But Maurice Jarre has succeeded; his score actually serves to enhance the film. This is a sound track album which throbs with intense vitality. Among its highlights is a charming "Lullaby For Lisa," a tune of music box delicacy which practically cries out for lyrics. Jarre himself conducted on the LP. All in all, a superior work.



### ALONE — Francoise Hardy — Reprise 6397

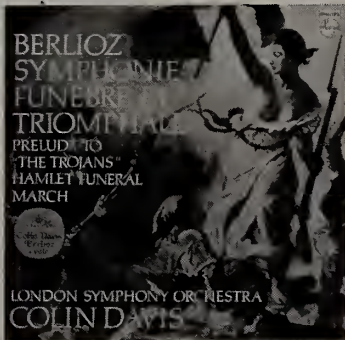
International singing star Francoise Hardy has recorded an album which contains a sparkling collection of songs on the theme of being alone. She casts a magical spell, treating Leonard Cohen's poetic "Suzanne," and on her own composition, "Midnight Blues," she adds a touch of country which is pure delight. This is an immensely listenable LP which could prove quite popular on the MO front.



### SILVER METRE — National General 2000

This is a powerful album by a new group made up of an American and three Brits. There are some very tasty guitar tracks here as well as two country-flavored ditties "No They've Found Me" and "Country Comforts." The group also gives a very faithful rendering of the recent controversial chart tune by Murray Head, "Superstar." This disk has the potential for finding action.

## Classical Picks



### BERLIOZ: SYMPHONIE FUNEBRE ET TRIOMPHALE — London Symphony Orchestra Colin Davis

Three significant works by Hector Berlioz are excellently presented on this album by Colin Davis as a part of his Berlioz cycle. "Symphonie Funebre Et Triomphale," a work in three movements, is the major piece on the album. The other two entries are "Prelude To 'Les Troyens A Carthage'" and "March Funebre, Op. 18, No. 3, Pour La Dernier Scene D'Hamlet." Fine album.



### FAVORITE ARIAS — Mirella Freni-Vanguard Cardinal VCS 10068

Lyric soprano Mirella Freni offers seven of her favorite arias on this album, and both her selections and her performances of them are praiseworthy. Puccini and Bellini are represented with two arias each, and works by Mascagni, Bizet and Verdi fill out the set. The artist is ably assisted by the Bavarian Radio Orchestra, Ino Savini, conductor.

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## NEW YORK — THE MEDIUM'S NOT MASSAGING

Rock just cannot be funneled through the tube. That much seems clear now. Television is definitely not rock's medium. But the message isn't getting through to tv producers or rock performers. It's probably hard to understand. Especially so when a rock performer or group figures that one tv shot will probably reach more people than 20 personal appearance tours.

That's all very true. So what. In the final analysis, the rock music going out on tv reaches its audience in a diluted, less dynamic version than it would in a concert appearance, certainly, or even a recorded rendition. Still, massive exposure seems to be terribly important to many rock performers. But should it be? At this point, probably not.

There are a number of pitfalls in the presentation of rock music on television. To begin with, rock is an immediate, almost tactile form of entertainment. Sounds like a natural for television, the most immediate of our media. It doesn't transmit that way however. The controls have been transferred. What we hear out in television land is determined by the station's technicians. Sure, the volume control can be adjusted at home, but the intensity and modulation of the music, the real heart of rock, are totally divorced from the source in transmission.

Mountain put in an appearance on a segment of NET's "The Show" which was broadcast a couple of weekends ago. To dip into the jargon of rock, Mountain is definitely a "heavy" group. They are so heavy in fact that the mere volume of their music has been known to drive people from the front sections of theatres in which they happen to be playing. For "The Show," Mountain chose to lead off with their current single release "Mississippi Queen." Now, "Mississippi Queen" ain't exactly a ballad. In order to really appreciate what's going down in the song, you should hear it played at the thunderous level at which it was recorded. "Mississippi Queen," as transmitted on "The Show" lacked the vitality the song was meant to have. Mountain is one hell of an exciting group. That's another thing you wouldn't really have known after seeing them on "The Show."

So, what good did their appearance do the group? For those who were familiar with Mountain and its work, it was disappointing. And, the performance did not seem to do a whole lot in winning over that part of the audience which was not previously into Mountain.

The television camera has a strange way of reducing, minimizing and isolating things. Any medium that can diminish the physical enormity of Leslie West has got to be going some. One of the delights in seeing Mountain is watching gigantic Leslie West work out, his girth dwarfing his big guitar. On the small screen however, this tremendous disproportion was missing.

This is what was so disappointing about the recently demised "Music Scene" series. Ideally, "Music Scene" was the show which should have grabbed off the entire rock audience. It didn't simply because the vitality and excitement of the rock artists which the show's "natural" audience knew was there did not come through. And all the trick camera work and gimmickry in the world could not reproduce that. Interestingly enough, this excitement is not dissipated on the large theatre screen.

"Woodstock" is of course the prime example. The rock segments of the film are probably as exciting as the actual performances must have been. But, of course the performances depicted in the film do not undergo the awful physical reduction which those broadcast on tv must. And, there is the sound. The sound of "Woodstock" was everywhere in the theatre. Just as it was in Bethel, New York. As an experiment, it would be wild to see the transformation "Woodstock" would undergo if the film were shown on tv and all that sound was squeezed through the tiny speakers of a conventional tv set. The result would have to be disappointing as hell.

## HOLLYWOOD — WITH A TOUCH OF NEW YORK

When people go out of their way to tell you how good an album is, and it isn't their album, then you know something's up. This is what's been happening to us with the **Melanie** album. So, we went to a Melanie expert, **Richard Robinson**, to find out where Melanie is at:

"Until recently most people either loved Melanie or hated her. Her voice and the songs she sang left no common ground, no take it or leave it. Just violent reactions split pretty much down the middle between good and bad.

Her third album, "Candles In The Rain", has broken down a lot of walls. Her singing isn't as sharp and biting, her songs aren't as one sided and child-like. Melanie has grown up for this album. She can still be cute when she sings "Alexander Beetle", but her womanhood is apparent with "Candles In The Rain" and "What Have They Done To My Song". And now she doesn't have to write a song to convey a feeling, her version of "Carolina On My Mind" equals James Taylor's original for true emotion.

Many things have happened between the first two albums and this new one, things which account for it being so good, for people saying, "I don't like Melanie but I love the album." She has become a star in Europe. Received awards, been given gold albums, done her own hour long television specials. She has worked a lot singing for people who came to be shown, who came not because of any superstar type but because they somehow dug the chick and her blush and the way she slowly closed her eyes while she sang.

The new album is a wonder in many ways. It combines everything Melanie always was with the excitement and mature emotion that were missing for many of us before. Her song lyrics hold up now, she carries it through from the first word to the last. She began by singing alphabet songs, now she's using the letters to make words and she's singing those with experience.

The title song for the album is the most exciting of all. After her appearance at Woodstock Melanie wrote what she thought about the experience. It came out "Candles In The Rain". She recorded the song with The Edwin Hawkins Singers. The result is a combination of the feeling of joy that was "Oh Happy Day" and the youthful conviction that was Woodstock."

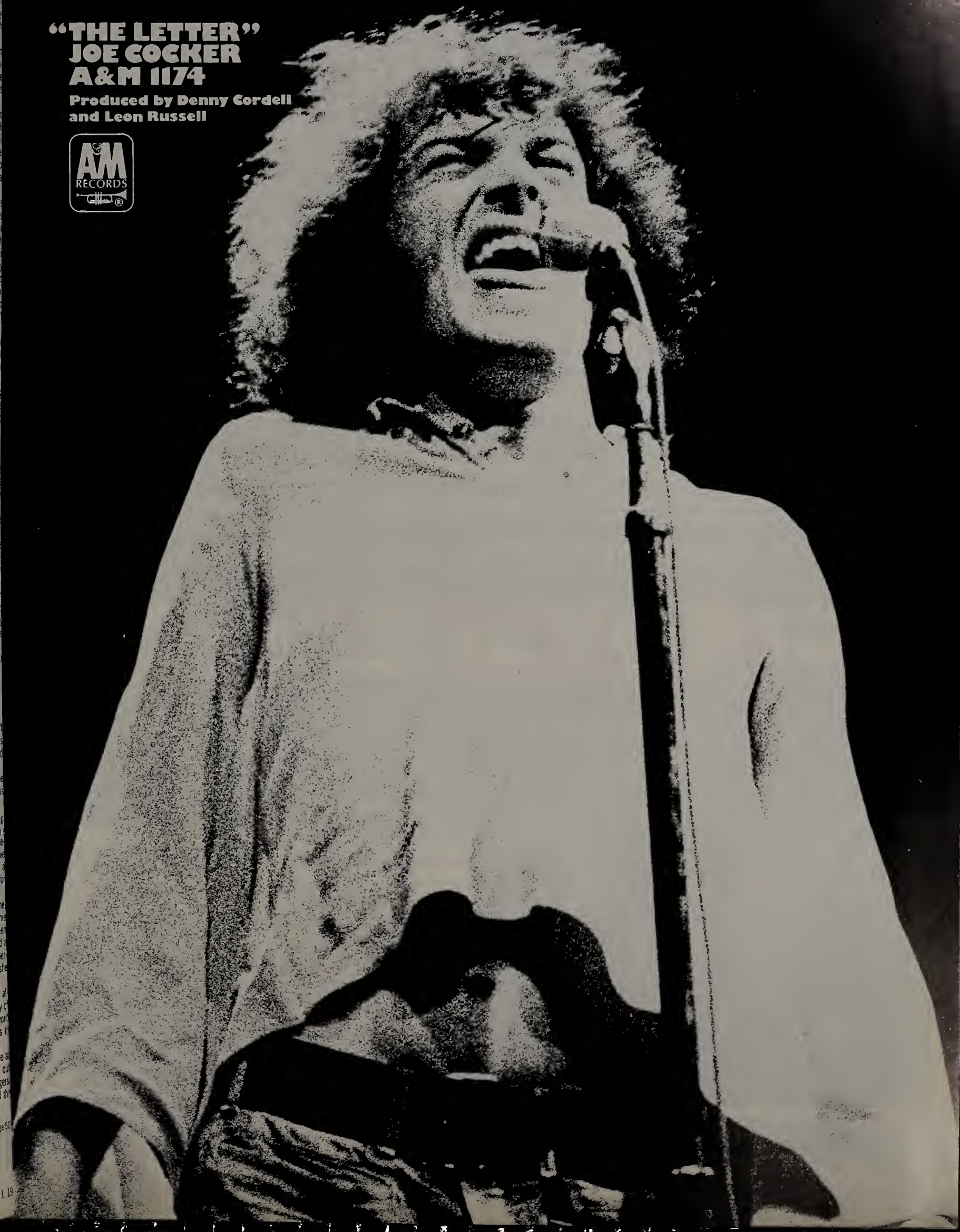

BITTER END, NYC — Dion has a problem of identity. During his recent engagement here he was an entertainer unsure of his style, stage personality and audience.

Rather than allowing his audience to respond spontaneously to his folk and country blues style, the Warner Bros. recording artist was continually feeling out his audience, attempting to adapt to its tastes.

Consequently, his folk songs were bland and at times listless. Accompanying himself with guitar, he was indistinguishable from a youngster playing the village cafes solely for exposure.

Genuine audience enthusiasm was generated during Dion's finale, his former number one song "Runaround Sue." The audience accepted Dion's invitation to hand clap, and a few people couldn't resist attempting the vocal background of the Del-Satins. Again, however, Dion showed a lack of confidence in his performance and audience, and abruptly terminated the program midway through the number.

## Gary Bonds Victim Of Mistaken Ident

NEW YORK — A national wire service story released in late March erroneously identified singer Gary "U.S." Bonds as a similarly-named man arrested in Hartford, Conn., charged with multiple felonies.

Bonds, who has been performing at night clubs and colleges mainly on the east coast, learned of the erroneous reports while at his Brooklyn home here, preparing to leave for an engagement in Cleveland.

Bonds said the agencies that handle his bookings stopped calling him for several days until the confusion was cleared up. WABC radio in New York broadcast a correction shortly after the wire story was printed in several newspapers.

According to Bonds' producer Jerry Williams, some disc jockeys have stopped playing Bonds' latest release, "One Broken Heart" and consequently that sales have been adversely affected.

## PHIL OCHS

CARNEGIE HALL, N.Y. — Phil Ochs made his reputation as a writer and singer of folk-styled songs, and though he is not merely a protest singer, he is perhaps best known for that aspect of his art. At his recent controversial pair of Carnegie Hall concerts on March 27, he added to his own material chunk of Buddy Holly songs, an Elvis Presley medley, a Conway Twitty number and Merle Haggard's "Okie From Muskogee." The Holly and Presley numbers elicited objections from many members of the audience who had come to hear Ochs sing his own songs, not old rock 'n' roll numbers. Ochs explained that his greatest influences had not been folk singers but the rock 'n' roll stars of the '50's, and that he wanted to play rock 'n' roll because he liked it and he thought it was worth hearing.

In an article in the New York Times, Ochs said, "At 15, my idol was Elvis Presley. Then, in college . . . I became infatuated with folk music. I've been a folk singer and political singer ever since . . . Eventually I found myself in a stale position . . . after Chicago I became so depressed . . . that I just went crazy and didn't care anymore. I decided to do just what I wanted to do. I thought, 'Wouldn't it be fun to come out in a gold suit like Elvis Presley?'" It was a leap into fantasy, into a musical area that I really like."

At the 8:00 concert, which I attended, Ochs did not succeed in getting the audience to dig his new thing. At the later concert, according to the press, he conquered the crowd's initial hostility.

My own judgment of the matter is this. Because Ochs did the Holly and Presley songs straight, without adding anything by way of changes in arrangement and style, he did, to my mind, something that was not worth doing. When Creedence Clearwater did Screamin' Jay Hawkins' old hit, "I Put A Spell On You," they turned it into a hard rock song and added exciting instrumental breaks. All Ochs did was to imitate Holly and Presley, and what's the point of that?

Ochs' nostalgic return to the '50's has not been entirely fruitless. His song about actor James Dean, which he drew from talks he had with people who knew Dean, is worthwhile, and is a product of creativity rather than imitative identification.

I think I know how Ochs feels. My blood, too, was made hot by Holly and Presley, but I wouldn't get up on a stage and try to do what I couldn't possibly do as well as they did.

Mention the WUNI bird anywhere in the Mobile, Ala. area and people will direct you to the radio station which, in recent Pulse surveys, has measured up as number one among 18-49 year old listeners. At 1410 on the dial, there is currently a celebration going on, marking 40 years of broadcasting to Mobile audiences. The WUNI bird, symbol of the station, has played an important role in the success story, since it has become an instantly recognizable sign of WUNI's presence in the community.

The station's sound has been described as modern country. It features the most progressive of the country records, the new Nashville sound, plus a touch of MOR, all laced with the chatter of personality jocks. Says general manager "Rocky" Reich: "We have a modern approach to the country format. We are not beyond playing any artist, although we draw the line if it is a real screaming rocker. Our guys are not backwoods types, but distinct personalities. I guess you could say we stay as loose as we can."

"Staying loose" includes getting involved in community activities such as the Greater Gulf States Fair and the Boat, Sports and Vacation show, both held regularly in Mobile. The station has also enlisted approximately 50,000 people in their WUNI Listeners Club. Members are eligible to win prizes through drawings held on the air each hour, and all are sent free WUNI bird pins, which may be used by men as tie clasps.

The station is also very sports oriented. It broadcasts numerous local high school basketball and football games. Through its NBC affiliation, WUNI airs a great many of the big college contests and through their membership in the Atlanta Braves network, they broadcast baseball.

Newswise, the station carries the NBC casts on the hour, in addition to their own local news on the half hour.

### Greater Response Found Among 'Soul' Stations

**NASHVILLE —** The response of "soul" radio stations to the needs of the black community has increased during recent years, according to a study conducted by the Race Relations Information Center of Nashville.

The report cited the following as among the major changes in responsiveness on the part of the stations: "public affairs, advertising, news broadcasting and equal opportunity." The study added, however, that "few broadcasters showed any willingness to move until prodded by black sentiments and new Federal Communications Commission vigilance and some still have moved only very slowly."

The study, entitled "How Soulful Is 'Soul' Radio?" also found that a great number of black-oriented stations have been slow in appointing blacks to key positions, and for the most part, are owned by whites. The report stated that the stations are generally weak in the fields of news reporting and public affairs.

### FCC Acts To Block Combos

**WASHINGTON, D.C. —** The Federal Communications Commission has moved to curb new combinations of radio and tv stations in the same urban market area. The commission also indicated that it would look into a proposal by the Justice Dept that existing multimedia combinations be broken up.

Under the commission proposals broadcast owners would have five years to reduce their holdings in a single such market to a radio combination, a tv station or a newspaper. It is expected that such a proposal, if put into effect, would meet with considerable opposition from the communications community.

In explaining its announcement the FCC said that the single market ruling was designed "to prevent undue influence on local public opinion by relatively few persons or groups."

# Talent On Stage

## JOE COCKER WITH MAD DOGS & ENGLISHMEN STONE THE CROWS — RONNIE HAWKINS

FILLMORE EAST, N.Y.C. — Is nothing sacred anymore? Joe Cocker with brass, Joe Cocker with a soul choir, four drummers, concertmaster, over thirty friends, children, and, if you can believe your eyes and ears, a dog. Has Joe finally overstepped the bounds of good taste to become pompous and pretentious? Will Fred marry Evelyn?

Fear not, dear hearts and gentle friends. After an unutterably boring first half (despite the fact that Stone the Crows and Ronnie Hawkins appeared, the only entertainment on this part of the bill came from a delightful Loony Tunes cartoon) Joe arrived to save the evening from seeming disaster.

Cocker has never stood still. His first superb album was made by him and some close friends. It was over a year in the making and by the time it was released, Joe had a backing group called the Grease Band. With them he recorded his second highly successful LP. But on that record a certain name kept popping up: Leon Russell. He was to be instrumental in helping Joe escape from the rather confining clasp of a four-piece group. Apparently big things were in the works. Last Friday and Saturday (28-9) everyone found out just what those things were.

From the opening notes of the set it was profoundly evident that Joe had surrounded himself with some of the finest musicians working today. Chris Stainton, the only hold-over from the Grease Band, on organ and piano, Jim Price and Bobby Keyes, the brass section previously with Delaney & Bonnie, two drummers and two percussionists, and a set of four truly extraordinary backing vocalists. Coordinating this group, playing excellent guitar and piano, is Leon Russell, resplendent in his now familiar stovepipe hat.

Joe was at peak hour as he clawed his way through "Delta Lady," a gossamer "Bird on the Wire," and brought down the house with a fantastically arranged medley of Ray Charles' "Drown in My Own Tears" and Otis Redding's "I've Been Loving You Too Long." At this point Joe introduced the beautiful, incredible and highly underrated Rita Coolidge for her solo "Long Ago and Far Away." The velvety-voiced Rita is one of Joe's soul choir.

Cocker ended the stint with both sides of his new single "Spaceman" and "The Letter" and returned for a standing ovation duet with Leon on Bob Dylan's "Girl From The North Country."

### L.A. SCENES

ROUBADOUR, N.Y. — The current edition of the Paul Butterfield Blues Band (and we wonder if anyone has a hunch on how many groups there have been) is by far the best we've seen.

The new group, though it may not contain any superstars, is very together and lays down those old Chicago blues in a fine new style. Butterfield, as usual, was master of his harmonica.

Jeffrey Comanor, on the same bill, was one of the more interesting singer/songwriters around, although he has a tendency to talk too much. With the competition as heavy as it is at the moment, he's not going to rise to the top immediately, but if he sticks it out and can grow and change with the times, he could be important in the long run.

Neil Diamond followed Butterfield into the club. Neil seemed slightly worn down this time around, and his show was not quite as dynamic. Even tired, Neil put on a terrific show, and should be complemented on varying his material and his presentation. Carol Hunter, on lead guitar, is getting musically more interesting, but also seemed a little down. Randy Sterling

Everything Joe did had such drive and power and the ferocity and joy with which the new band attacked each song drove him to stratospheric vocal heights. Until now Cocker has been in second gear. That, I had thought, had been quite sufficient. No more. After seeing his new maxi-family revue, with Cocker in high gear, I know what I've been missing. Dear Joe, leonine Joe, Super Joe.

The Fillmore audience received an extra dividend in the form of Polydor's jazz oriented rock aggregation Stone The Crows. The group, 4 of whose 5 members are Scottish, displayed a strong blues background in the half dozen numbers they essayed during the evening. Lead singer and frenetic tambourinist Maggie Bell has to be singled out for comment.

Decked out in what looked like a red sweatshirt and black toreador pants with spangles down either side, Maggie comes on like the captain of the Armstrong Tile Company's bowling team, women's division. But that's all right. As soon as she starts wailing, who the hell cares what she looks like. Unfortunately, Maggie is going to have to stomach comparisons with every female singer from Bessie Smith through Janis. She will withstand the comparisons. She is her own woman. Her duets with bassist Jim Dewar were really exciting. And the band members display a good, tight understanding of each other's desires and capabilities. Whether they have been or not, Stone The Crows sound like they've been playing together for a long time.

If Maggie is the captain of the team, then Ronnie Hawkins would have to be the bowling team's coach. Hawkins has a way of walking around the stage while his band members are playing and encouraging them with little, impromptu pep talks and occasional pats on the rear. Just like any good coach would. In the main, Ronnie Hawkins and his backing group are a good timey outfit. This is not to say that they should be playing rooms like Your Father's Moustache. But, at the same time, Hawkins presents his music in a way that discourages serious considerations.

But who cares? The audience dug it and the band seemed to be having a great time. Enjoyment, after all, is probably the most important aim of music.

### PAT SKY

Town Hall, NY — Pat Sky's appearance at Town Hall last weekend proved one thing. It proved that there is still an audience, small but fiercely loyal, for the kind of unadorned folk music which was so popular ten years ago and which Pat Sky personifies.

Sky has not been very active in the past few years, but his concert showed that there is still an audience for him. Sky sings in a monotone-like style of themes that are familiar to traditional folk songs. Sky's winning quality however is the warmth of his personality and his unassuming manner. It was this quality that seemed to be responsible for the audience's extremely warm reception after each selection since neither the material nor the performance deserved it.

Sky was accompanied on guitar by "Blind Erik Flatpick" (nee Erik Frandsen) who joined the headliner for a bright madrigal in one of the two encores which the audience demanded. It looks like Pat Sky will find receptive audiences wherever he appears if this concert was any indication. His forthcoming Capitol records should enjoy the same type of welcome.

## TOM JONES

COPACABANA, NEW YORK — New York was a festival of contemporary sight and sound last week. On Wednesday, for instance, youngsters on Easter school vacation flocked to see the "Woodstock" rock fest film, and, sad to say, many were turned away from a matinee performance of "Hair" (SRO), while others stood in line desperately hoping for a cancelled reservation. The third item of crowd-gathering impact concerned one person, namely Tom Jones. The place was the Copacabana, where Jones made his third appearance in three years. Following a 26-week TV shooting schedule for his immensely popular program — part of which the Parrot disk star caught after his opening din-

ner show — Jones is ready to resume a heavy U.S. appearance schedule, including what is billed as the most lucrative show business tour in U.S. history this summer. His Copa opening proved beyond a doubt that Jonesmania retains its remarkable impact (one that literally had much of the overflow patrons dancing in the aisles) and that Jones himself is fully charged to supply his ecstatic U.S. following with the full force of his singing dynamism. And much the same can be said for his own instrumental team, led, along with the fine Copa orchestra, by his arranger, Johnny Spence. Are you ready to shake, rattle & roll with Mr. Jones, America?

## ELLA FITZGERALD

EMPIRE ROOM, N.Y. — Even Ella Fitzgerald was unable to overcome the apathy of the Waldorf Astoria orchestra and the coldness of the "new" Empire Room (located across the hall from the old room). The situation was not helped by Louis Armstrong, who planted himself on stage for several numbers, much to Ella's discomfort.

Ella's closing tunes, done with only her own rhythm section, were far superior to the rest of the show, which

relied on the local horn section. In introducing the band, Miss Fitzgerald forgot their names and we wisely followed suit. Even on an obvious horn tune, like "Spinning Wheel," the band was unable to cope. Ella, who can still sing and scat with the best of them, deserves much better treatment. She gets it on her most recent album, on Reprise. It's a better buy than a night at the Waldorf.

## Musical Theatre Review

### 'MINNIE'S BOYS'

IMPERIAL THEATRE, NYC — Broadway musicals, on Broadway, are facing a generation gap which makes the top forty-easy listening hiatus appear a minor rift. The generation that saw musicals flourish with Cole Porter, Rodgers and their ilk will settle for little less than the best in a genre brim full of warmed over ballads—and the young are neither affluent enough or interested enough to spend (or spend for) a night of last decade's material.

The few musical successes of this last year have based their appeal on either the characters, the performer of a star stature or a young MOR sound approach. "Minnie's Boys" rates A-minus in the first bracket, satisfactory in the second area. It also has music.

The truth of this story is hard to judge. If the Marx Brothers were really as much the same off-stage as on; if mother Minnie was really as typically Jewish in her ambition; if their career was actually so neatly fitted and their personal dilemmas could all be solved with punch line scene endings—then the show is valid as biography. If not, then it comes across only as cute comedy raised from vaudeville oblivion by the brilliant portrayal of Groucho by Lewis Stadlen.

So fascinating is Stadlen's grouch

and so fascinating is the vocal slapstick that became Groucho's trademark that one overlooks the shallow characterizations of all the other brothers. There are also a handful of really grand scenes, almost all showing the on-stage development of the Marx Brothers as comic talents, that the viewer tends to forgive lesser-light scenes.

Even the contrived close, with a sudden revelation of the silent Harpo, the Italian Chico, the flashy Zeppo and a moustachioed Groucho can be excused as an appeal to the audience's sentiment, as is the "Signing of the Declaration of Independence" vignette as a finale for "1776" since sympathetic viewers will have been won over by the charm and cuteness of the play.

But, for overall impact, the show lacks depth. And, most of all, it lacks musical power. For a musical that is near fatal.

A few songs may survive the show to become occasional nightclub numbers. "Mama, A Rainbow" is the closest thing to a showstopper in the Grossman-Hackady book, but the entertainers who specialize in reaching over-35 crowds will also find meat in pleasers like "Rich Is" or "Where Was I When they Passed Out Luck" for a change-of-pacers.

### SERGIO FRANCHI

ROYAL BOX, NYC — Sergio Franchi's voice was like a well-stropped straight-edge razor when he opened here March 31. Soft and lathery at times with powerful vocal strokes at others, Franchi's performance was delivered with the personality of a polished, self-confident, ebullient barber.

The capacity audience was in his grasp throughout the performance and Franchi knew it. Excellent vocal contrast and versatile lyric phrasing drew alternate bravos and sighs and humorous one-liners incited laughter and good-natured heckling.

The irrepressible vocalist did not stick solely to singing, but no one objected. He sang "If I Were a Rich Man" from "Fiddler on the Roof," complete

with finger snapping and Jewish gestures.

After numbers like his vibrant "To Give" and a shattering aria from "Tosca," Franchi received uninhibited shouts of "Bravo." When he began "The Impossible Dream," sighs were audible throughout the Royal Box.

Franchi also sang his current United Artists release, "More than Strangers," a solid number embellished with rich Italian choruses. During his finale, "Al Di La," he paused for a self-compliment, exclaiming, "What a voice!" Not one dissenter was heard, unless a standing ovation can be construed as an argument.

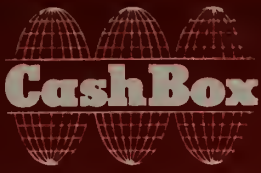

Dubbed the Mini-8, Lear Jet's compact-8 holds up to 30 minutes of recorded material in a case that is standard size when unfolded, but only half the normal cartridge volume when folded over upon itself. It can thus be played on all 8-track equipment now in existence.

Avsco president and Lear Jet Stereo vp/gm Ed Campbell stated "we sincerely feel that with new development we have opened up a whole vast new recorded music market. Inasmuch as the tape cartridge exists only in the LP album format at this time, we are accommodating singles or mini-albums."

## Landry Tops New Team Managing Int'l. Tape

NEW YORK — H. John Landry has been named the chief operating officer of International Tape Cartridge Corp. In this position, Landry heads a new management force consisting of himself and three other vice presidents: James Tyrell (sales), David Murphy (financial affairs) and John Cowen III (plant management).

Under Landry, who had been a vice president and director before with ITCC, the team hopes to counteract the financial problems that have been besetting the firm. Most recently, ITCC lost its contract with Buddah Records, one of its principal music-rights deals.

Landry succeeds Gary Salter who resigned as president a month ago shortly after the company sold to him and his father its stock in two Canadian subsidiaries (Modern Tape Cartridge Corp. Ltd. Ltd. and Int'l Tape Cartridge Corp. of Canada Ltd.). These firms were sold for some \$250,000 in cash and notes plus 50,000 shares of the company's common stock earlier delivered in connection with the prior acquisition of Modern Tape.

NEW YORK — Ampex' consumer equipment division has just made its award winning 244 omni-directional microphone available as a separate accessory, placing it into distribution through a network expanded by addition of seven new distributors.

The low impedance microphone was given a design excellence award by Industrial Design Magazine. Selling for \$7.95, the mike stands 4½" high and comes with a detachable "poker chip" base for use as a stand.

Among the companies added to handle the sales of the firm's complete line of recorders, players, speakers and accessories are: Alltapes of Dallas; Boyd in Denver; Aylward in Edina, Minn.; Gorman Engineering of El Paso; Devlin-Drew in Fresno; Roskin of East Hartford; and Sound Classics in Indianapolis.

Alan Woolf has also been named the eastern regional sales manager for the consumer equipment division, according to Pugh. Formerly an industrial manufacturers' representative for 20 years, Woolf will operate from New York and be responsible for product sales in New England, N. Y., Maryland, Delaware and parts of Pennsylvania and Virginia.

## Maxin's Cascom Tape Operation Goes From Kiddies To Concertos

NEW YORK — Arnold Maxin's Casette Communications Corp. is making a strong bid in the tape cartridge market.

The company, recently formed by the former head of the label and music publishing operations at MGM, is offering music in all categories via licensing deals with Golden (kiddie), Vox (classics) and Orpheum (pop, jazz and folk). Under the label identification of Cascom, the company is paying particular attention to its line-up of kiddie sounds. The attempt in this area, Maxin explains, is to give the dealer a kiddie section "that takes care of itself" out from under lock and key. Maxin feels that putting kiddie tapes under tight security is a devastating blow to tapes in this field.

Cascom offers two types of kiddie packages in either 8-track or cassette configuration. A Golden Kiddie Library, listing at \$4.95, offers five children's stories along with five Golden book counterparts that usually sell individually for 29¢ each. The com-

plete package is housed in a plastic tote bag. A \$3.95 line offers a complete story or musical feature (e. g. Tubby the Tuba, The Jungle Book) housed on a 12" LP-sized board that also contains a magic slate board and a child's connect-the-numbers drawing on the book.

According to Maxin, the Golden Kiddie Library was a star attraction for the company at the recent NARM convention. The company's six month projection in printing up the books was actually used up in two weeks, and now the forecast is for the sale of 100,000 of each Library in a year's time.

Maxin is pinning the overall success of the firm's tape commitment on avoiding the "mistakes" in this field, such as "the buck shot method of grabbing in all areas, offering big guarantees." "This field needs specialization rather than running with the herd," Maxin says.

The two other lines in the Cascom catalog sell at a list of \$4.95. From the Orpheum catalog, the firm has obtained sessions by Nina Simone, Jane Morgan, Dick Gregory, Staple Singers, Sonny Terry, Oscar Brand, Louis Armstrong, Bix Beiderbecke and Jelly Roll Morton. Twenty-five classical "warhorses" comprise the current catalog of Vox material. Coming up, Maxin noted, is a series of tapes from the Living Language courses.

In a breakdown of configuration popularity, Art Denish, vp of sales at CCC, noted that the kiddie line shows a 70% margin in favor of cassettes (50-50 on the west coast, however); the classics line runs 50-50, while the pop line is at least 12 to 1 in favor of 8-track.

CCC, which has filed with the Security Exchange Commission (SEC) for a public stock offering, also engages in custom duplicating. This area is under the direction of Jack Somer, vp and general manager of the firm's plant and engineering section.

CCC, according to Maxin, plans to move into general leisure-time activities, some of which not involving the music scene.

## Recoton Shows Record '69 Sales & Earnings

NEW YORK — Recoton Corp. has concluded its biggest sales & earnings year with a continued acceleration through the entire fiscal '69. President Herbert Borchardt reported that Recoton racked up an 81% increase in profits on a 52% sales increase for the year ended December 31, 1969.

Net sales totaled \$2,716,653 (compared with \$1,792,546 for '68) and a net income of \$110,460 (43¢ per share) compared with \$60,860 (24¢ per share) in the previous year. All figures include the results of the Eldeen Mfg. Corp., a wholly owned subsidiary.

Borchardt said that though the main portion of growth could be attributed to the growth of tape for which Recoton markets a line of recorders, he still aims at steady growth in the disk area where Recoton is noted both for its phonograph line and its 700 different types of needle replacements.

## Audio Fidelity To Manufacture Its Own

NEW YORK — Audio Fidelity Records of New York will now manufacture and distribute directly its own lines of cassettes and 8-track cartridges. The move toward independence in the tape field begins with immediate release of a "First Component" series featuring classical recordings in both configurations.

Herman Gimbel, president of the publicly owned company, said that the initial release consists of ten cassettes and cartridges being offered to dealers and distributors with full-mark-ups based on a suggested \$3.98 retail tag.

Backed by an advertising and promotion campaign with dealer displays and promo materials, the first "First Component" selections will include symphonic works by Brahms, Tchaikovsky and Beethoven; Mussorgsky's "Pictures at an Exhibition"; Strauss waltzes, popular overtures and Tchaikovsky ballet music among others.

## Johnson Heads GCC

PHOENIX — Bill Johnson has been appointed president of General Cassette Corp. here.

Johnson assumes this new post after eleven years with Ampex Corp. His latest position with Ampex was assistant to the general manager of Ampex Stereo Tapes.

Johnson had earlier spent several years with Capitol Records and the VM Corporation. At Ampex he also held positions in the audio and video divisions in the southern region.

General Cassette Corporation is a newly formed custom duplicator located at 1324 North 22nd Avenue, Phoenix. GCC works in three tape formats: open reel, 8-track cartridges and cassettes.

## Sack Leads Mkt/Sls At Stereodyne, Inc.

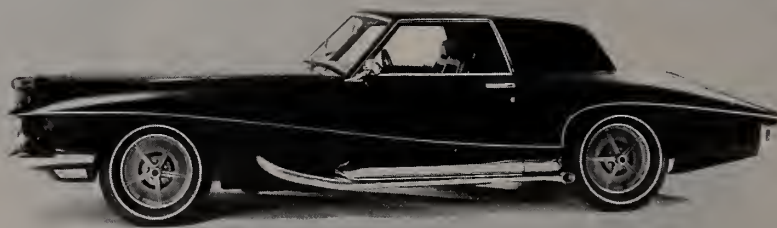

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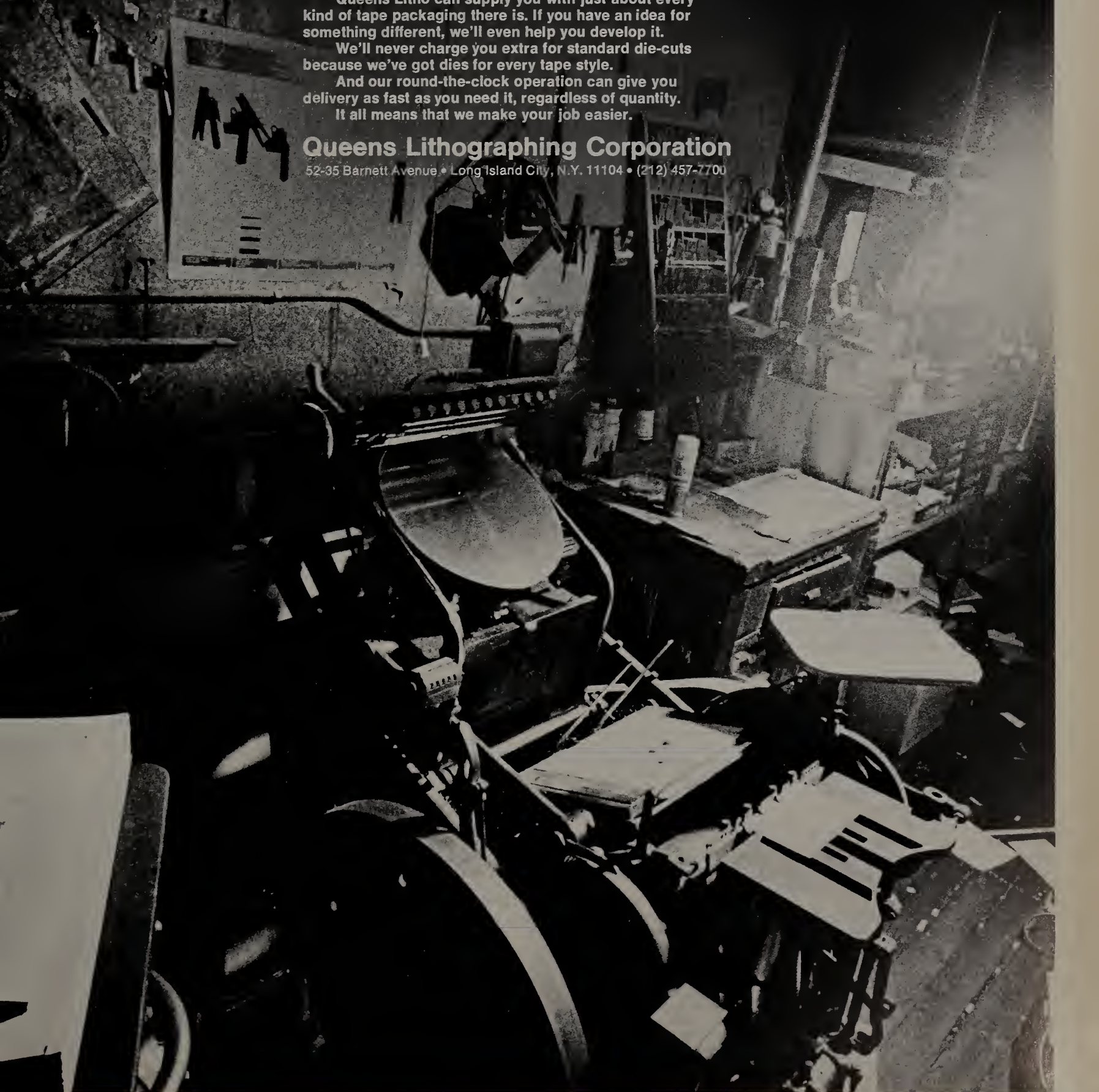

A few weeks ago, the Vanilla Fudge, after a few false finishes, performed their final farewell gig at the Action House. At the time, we noted that musical offshoots containing Fudge alumni would probably begin to sprout in the near future. The first bloom is here in the person (or groupage) of Boomerang. Assembled by former Fudgite Mark Stein, Boomerang includes Stein as lead vocalist and organist, Rickey Ramirez on guitar, drummer Jim Galuzzi and Sal D'Onofrio on bass.

Mark and Rickey were in the lavish Cash Box celebrity lounge (formerly the coin machine room) last week to talk about Boomerang. If there was anything that was clearly discernible as we talked, it was a sense of real excitement and happiness in Mark's and Rickey's voices as they spoke about Boomerang and its focus. **boston lives — in honolulu**

When I was a young publicist and record promoter, I was slightly involved with the well-known and oft put down 'Boston Sound.' Working with **Orpheus**, I watched them come close to a national hit with "Can't Find The Time," which did 100,000 copies in New York in its initial release over two years ago. Last year, as an aspiring young trade journalist, I watched the record come close to hitting again, as it racked up a 35,000 copy sale in Boston. Now, as a grizzled disk vet, I'm watching in astonishment as the record is starting to break out for the third time, now in Hawaii where it has sold over 10,000 copies and is #3 and climbing on the KPOI charts.

The record, which for some reason is regarded as a genuine oldie (it's even included in the new WOR-FM oldie album), had been getting oldie play on the Honolulu outlet. Without any effort on the part of the station (or MGM for that matter), requests for the record suddenly reached current-hit proportions and it was added to the playlist, with the aforementioned results. KPOI is at least partly responsible for breaking "Born Free," "Georgy Girl" and "Oh Me, Oh My," and may now be responsible for justifying MGM's investment in the Boston sound. Needless to say, producer Alan Lorber is very happy.

**the other festival flick**

The Woodstock film is out, and through it each of us who was at the festival has our own ideas of what the film should have been, most of us seem to be satisfied with what it is. The three hours passed very quickly, and though I nodded out once or twice, I think I would like to see an even longer version of Woodstock in the future. In the meantime, there was another festival, not so spectacular (there were only 5,000 people, and two Highway Patrolmen took care of traffic) but according to those who have seen it on celluloid, just as enjoyable. The film, by Carl Gottlieb, is called "**Celebration — The Big Sur Festival**," and features Joan Baez, Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young, Joni Mitchell, Dorothy Morrison and the Comb Sisters, John Sebastian, Mimi Farina Melvin and Sal Valentino. Gottlieb has a mixed list of credits (he won an Emmy for work on the Smothers Brothers show, but was also head writer for Music Scene) but the film will add another positive one. We'll catch a screening when we get back to the Coast, and give you a full report.

**lime-y flavored bubblegum**

For several years, English 'studio' disks, while occupying the local charts steadily, only made occasional inroads in America. English 'bubblegum,' (for want of a better word) has always been one of my favorites and I'm glad to see it starting to appeal to the rest of the natives. The Dutch sound furor has kept word of the new English invasion from leaking out, but a quick look at the charts shows that in addition to the Top 5 Edison Lighthouse, England is also represented by the Marmalade (their label switch paid off), Vanity Fare (who sound slightly more than studio) and White Plains. Maybe now, somebody can break Dave Dee, Dozy, Beaky, Mick and Tich.

The **Nice** have just completed their fourth album, "Five Bridges," which will be released as soon as they find a label to replace the recently sunk Immediate. The LP was cut live at Fairfield Halls in Croyden during a concert with Joseph Eger and symphony orchestra . . . Albert King, Cold Blood and Salt & Pepper join **John Mayall** in the third Olympic Auditorium concert on April 10 . . . ### Paul Cohen, Country Pioneer, Dies At 64

ASHVILLE — Paul Cohen, a pioneer country music, died on Wednesday, April 1, in a nursing home in Bryan, Texas, after a long illness. He was 64 years old.

With Decca Records as a producer over a quarter of a century, Cohen signed to the label a roster of acts that includes a sizable number of country greats. Among those he produced are Ed Foley, Webb Pierce, Kitty Wells, Poretta Lynn, Jimmy Wakely, Bob Mills, Ernest Tubbs, Jimmy Davis, Oldie Hill, Bobby Helm, Mel Tillis and the Wilburn Brothers. Cohen was a long-time friend and associate of Owen Bradley, who now heads Decca's Nashville office.

Cohen left Decca to form his own label, Todd Records, in 1960, and among

those he signed to the diskery was Mother Maybelle Carter of the famous Carter Family. Cohen disbanded his company and went to work for Kapp, and following that, he was with ABC-Paramount.

The famed producer was president of the Country Music Association in 1957.

Funeral services were held on Friday, April 3, at Callaway Jones Funeral Home in Bryan, Texas, and Cohen was buried in College Station Cemetery in College Station, Texas. His family requested that donations intended for flowers be sent instead to the American Cancer Society.

Cohen is survived by his wife, Cecilia; a son, Paul, Jr., a sister, Rose; and a brother, David.

"Welfare Cadillac", termed by one welfare commissioner as "derogatory" to welfare recipients, was included in a group of three requests; the others being "A Boy Named Sue" and "Okie from Muskogee".

After a great deal of deliberation, Cash asked the President to allow him to omit "Welfare Cadillac" from the show. Whereupon Guy Drake, writer and artist of the hit song, who states the song was written for amusement only, offered to attend the reception and perform his "Welfare Cadillac" for the delegation.

To date President Nixon has made no comment.

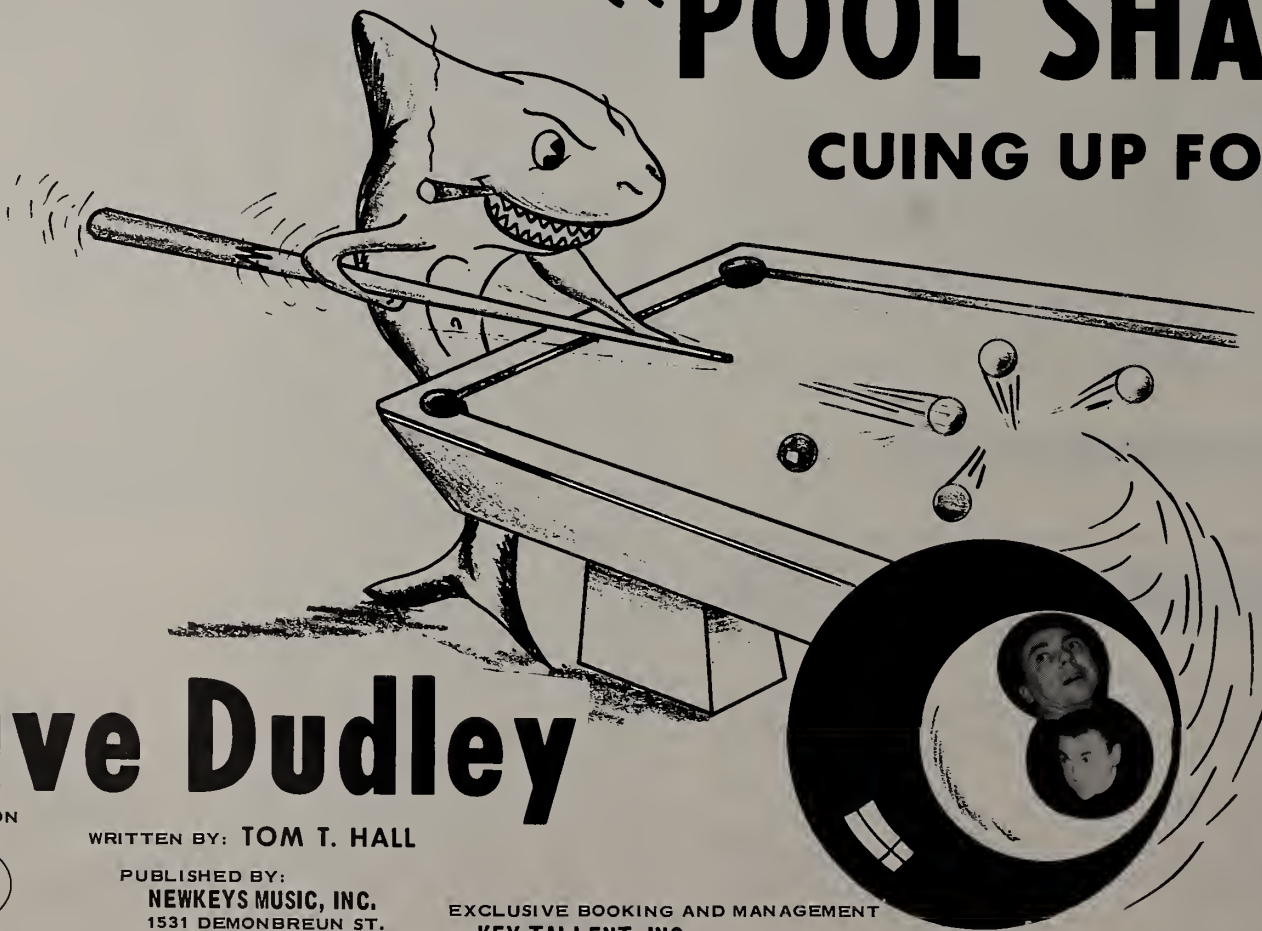

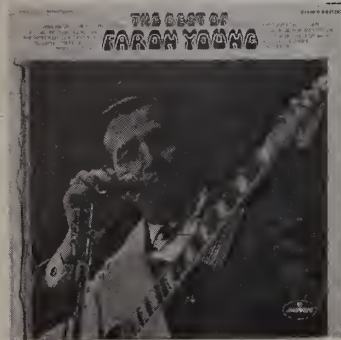


# CashBox Country LP Reviews

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Big suspense, overflow passions and a public nearly out of control, at the packed Teatro de los Ferrocarrileros, was the frame of the closing performance of the II Festival de la Cancion Latina en el Mundo. It was, no doubt, Jose Jose whose possibilities of making first place for him and for Roberto Cantoral's "El Triste" was one of the main reasons for the full house that night.

Things came out quite differently; Jose Jose hardly made third, while Venezuela reached second with Mirla singing "Con Los Brazos Cruzados" and the place of honor went to Brazil with "Cancion de Amor y Paz" in Claudia Brasil's beautiful voice. The surprise number was "Soy un Ciego" with Mauricio Pena from Nicaragua that reached 7th place ahead of some of the big favorites such as Claudio Villa of Italy. Here are the Festival's final results: 1. "Cancion de Amor y Paz", Claudia Brasil, (Brazil); 2. "Con Los Brazos Cruzados", Mirla, (Venezuela); 3. "El Triste", Jose Jose, (Mexico); 4. "Perdido Por No Encontrarte", Roberto Darwin, (Uruguay); 5. "Te Amo Como Entonces", Sergio Denis, (Argentina); 6. "Belle Tortorelle", Pilar Tomas, (Francia); 7. "Yo Soy Un Ciego", Mauricio Pena, (Nicaragua); The Best Female Interpreter Award to Claudia Brasil; the Best Male Interpreter Award to Claudio Villa (Italy); The Best Score and Words Award to "Cancion de Amor y Paz" (Brazil); the Best Arranger Award to Aldemaro Romero (Venezuela) for his score of "Con Los Brazos Cruzados".

On its way to Malta, in the Mediterranean Sea, is an important shipment of Capitol records. The order came from a broadcasting station, asking, among others for Cesar Costa's "Paloma Negra". Posters and other advertising material are being sent, too, the Int'l Division of Discos Capitol de Mexico reported.

Discos Peerless have granted exclusive rights to Trova Industrias Musicales, S.A., for all product distribution in Argentina beginning April 1, Mr. Renne Vera, Peerless Int'l. dist. manager, reported. Promotional activities were personally coordinated by Trova's general manager, Alfredo I. Rodoszynsky and Alejandro Zaldivar, Peerless Delegate General Manager, during his stay in Buenos Aires. The first releases include material by Mexican artists such as Marco Antonio Vazquez, Rosario de Alba and Los Babys.

Abilio Manoel, Brazilian chanter now in Mexico, will soon cut an EP for Discos Capitol with four of his numbers translated to Spanish for local consumption. Abilio Manoel is one of the genuine representatives of the romantic Brazilian folklore. One of his big hits is "Mi Calle".

The applause of the week to RCA which, as soon as The II Festival de la Cancion Latina en el Mundo was over, released five numbers in their original versions. "Con Los Brazos Cruzados" with Mirla (Venezuela); "Per Te Amore" with Claudio Villa (Italy); "Tocaran Mi Guitarra" with Oscar (Spain); "Todas Las Mananas" with Morucha (Spain) and "El Triste" with Jose Jose (Mexico).

The death of Felix Lipesker, manager of Korn Publishers and one of the leaders of the music publishing business in Argentina, last week, has been deeply regretted by the whole trade. Lipesker had recently suffered an hepatic illness, and couldn't recover from it.

As one of the results of the last trip of RCA's General Manager, Adolfo Pino, to Italy, the diskery is starting its own artist managing enterprise, although the name of its director hasn't been disclosed yet. The managing agency will operate mainly in the International market, arranging tours for its artists, and with the TV channels. Among the names already signed for it are Donald, one of the top charters of 1969, Tormenta and Diego Verdager.

Music Hall's Luis Calvo infos about the release of the album by beat group Trocha Angosta in Venezuela, and contacts established with other Spanish-speaking countries where the Music Hall reps are interested in releasing beat music from Argentina. MH has a strong roster, with names like Banana, Luz de Mercurio, La Barra de Chocolate, Sabu and newcomer Percy, and finds exportable values in many of them.

Speaking about beat music, Disc Jockey has released the second LP by the group Pintura Fresca, produced also by Ricardo Kleinman. The first LP by this group has sold very well, and since their latest single, "Looky Looky" has been also a good chart rider, the same results are expected by DJ's topper, Rodriguez Luque.

Fermata's Mauricio Brenner feels enthusiastic about the sale of "El Arc de Noe," the strong San Remo tune recorded by the label's Sergio Endrigo. The tune is on the charts and is climbing fast. On the Brazilian side, there is a new single by one of the top names of that country, Jorge Ben, "Que Maravilla"; from Italy, once more, another single by Claudio Villa: "Sole Dal Mattino".

Phonogram infos about the contracting of producer Hector Techeiro, previously with CBS, who will handle pop recordings for the diskery, and the trip of folk group Los Fronterizos to the States, for performances at the Carnegie Hall in New York. Other folk artists, Jaime Torres and Ariel Ramirez, will also travel to the States, for appearances in Washington.

CBS infos about its new April releases which include an LP chantress Amelita Baltar, with music composed by Astor Piazzolla, and a selection LP tagged "Beat 70" and carrying tunes by groups like Los Nuafragos, Hielo (recently contracted by CBS), duet Pedroy Pablo and successful group Safari.

Odeon is releasing the new single by John and Ono Lennon, "Instant Karma", which appears as a sure winner, and a new LP by vet tango chantress Tita Merello, one of the strongest names in the tango field. There is also the soundtrack from "Hawaii Five-O" and a new single by British chanter Mel Williams, currently living in Argentina, and also a new one by the Trio Galleta, with "Travelling Band", cover of the Creedence Clearwater Revival hit.

Peppino Giannini has informed that Reprise and CGD have agreed to extend the term of their contract to the end of the solar year, prolonging it for 9 months. Giannini has declared that he hopes that Reprise will continue its collaboration with C.G.D. for many years to come.

Concerning contract renewals and new representations of American companies in Italy, we heard that Ri-Fi and Kama-Sutra are reaching an agreement. Conversations started during last MIDEM.

Italy is the country of music festivals and song contests. Sanremo is just over, and "Un Disco Per L'estate" (A Record For Your Summer), Italian TV and A.F.I. (Italian Record Industries Association) race is approaching. This contest is organized by A.F.I. with R.A.I. (Italian state controlled sole radio and television company), on a very characteristic basis: A.F.I. members may have one, two or three entries, according to which category they belong i.e. a company which has certain qualifications (like: an important catalogue, recording facilities, pressing plants, "chiffre d'affaire", etc.) will be admitted to A.F.I. in the first, second or third class. Each company will present the records it judges interesting, and a board will consider only the censorship side of the material presented, leaving to the industry the "artistic" and commercial aspects. Next week we expect to be able to give a full list of entries.

In the meantime, the 12th Zecchino D'oro, a contest of songs for children was held at Bologna on March 19th. It was won by a couple: Stefano Romanelli (four years old) and Antonella Baldini (three and a half) with: "La Nave Gelsomina Dirindirindina". The records will be released by Ri-Fi. A song of last year "Volevo Un Gatto Nero" has been published in Japan with title Ku-Ronoko No Tango and has been leading the charts for months. We have been told that it has reached 2,500,000 copies sold! The "mini"-contest (mini is referred to size of "artists") was seen in Eurovision and will be broadcast soon in Japan and Argentina.

From various parts we have been asked why Italy has so many music competitions. We will try to give an explanation. Probably two reasons are involved:

I) Italians have always liked contests and competitions of any kind, and this can be traced in all our history. This was probably the first cause to originate song contests.

II) Situation of our Television: It is very difficult for the Italian music industry to plan the promotion of their products, because it is nearly impossible to fix a television appearance (through "routine" programs) in advance, without problems of choice of songs and singers from television authorities. For this reason, record companies participate in festivals that may guarantee a television display for their records. Actually R.A.I. broadcasts such programs as they are (or nearly) without cuts. It is then very important to be present; mainly to promote young new artists, who would meet major problems getting on tv programs. This is probably the reason why song contests have become so important for our industry.

This week we wish to draw attention to the success "La Prima Cosa Bella" is having: it is leading the charts. Keeping the 8th position is the group Ricchi E Proveri, the sole new group that is selling very well after Sanremo.

Another great Italian artist is entering the charts this week — Mina. Her other two records, not from Sanremo, are on the charts: Venus and Let It Be. We have had the opportunity to listen to Numero Uno's last release, an album by Formula 3, with the title "Dies Irae". The group is made up of three artists, who are the sole interpreters both vocally and instrumentally. The record, produced by Lucio Battisti, has a remarkable appeal and original sound. We must admit that we have been quite impressed by this record and we expect that it will become a success. The record is distributed by R.C.A., which has a long term agreement with Numero Uno.

From this week on, our chart will be prepared with material we are getting directly and the hit-parades prepared by Italian radio and the professional Italian magazine Musica E Dischi. All this will assure the maximum possible credibility to our chart, in the CB tradition.

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# Cash Box



April 11, 1970



Yet another Gold Disk was recently received by maestro Mantovani, this time for sales of over 30,000 for his "The Best of Mantovani" (Decca) album in Holland. This month, Mantovani undertakes a nation wide s.r.o. British tour including two concerts at the Royal Festival Hall, and he is just completing a series of 13 TV spectaculars for the BBC which will be syndicated throughout America. March was selected as "Mantovani Month" in the United States with special promotional tie ups.





Speculation, verbal and fiscal, has begun again in Stock Exchange circles on the possibility of a bid for Decca. Sparking the conjecture this time is the hefty borrowing activities of International Standard Electrical, the wholly owned subsidiary of the huge American International Telephone and Telegraph. Strengthening the rumors is the fact that ITT has been the agent for American Sales of the Decca Navigator Omnitrack system of aircraft navigation and although no longer marketing, this system, ITT is still handling Decca's marine radar business in the States. The company is nearing the £50 million mark in its borrowing, a sum sufficiently near the amount necessary to initiate a bid for Decca.

Warner-Reprise is bowing a new budget album line called Valiant in May. The LPs will be available in stereo only, and will cost 19 shillings and eleven pence — one penny short of £1. The bulk of Valiant product will be drawn from W-R's back catalogue featuring star names such as Sammy Davis Jr., the Everly Brothers, Count Basie, Trini Lopez and Allan Sherman, but several albums will be new to the British market. CBS will handle the distribution of the Valiant line, which will be released in batches of twenty LPs four times each year. W-R managing director Ian Ralfini said he chose CBS on account of the fact that it is the only manufacturing and distributing company which does not have a similar line of its own and because he admires the CBS approach to marketing and promotion. The trade anticipates swift success for Valiant because of the selling names at its disposal becoming available at a cost which will be even more attractive now that full-price albums are about to increase in cost.

Precision Tapes — the joint venture between Pye Records and GRT of America — has set its second manufacturing and distribution deal. From May it will begin releasing A & M product in both cartridge and cassette form under the pact agreed with A & M London chief Larry Yaskiel. Artists figuring in the first release will be Herb Alpert, Sergio Mendes, the Sandpipers, and Judith Durham.

Penny Farthing Records chief Larry Page has signed the Dutch group called George Baker Selection to a three-year deal for Britain. The group's current American hit "Little Green Bag" will be released here by Penny Farthing this month. The label has already issued "Mighty Joe," the follow-up to "Venus" by another chart-parading Dutch group, Shocking Blue. Page has named Bruce MacLean as the newest addition to Penny Farthing's exploitation department. American-born MacLean joins from Sonet Music, and prior to that was an Aonoff-Rose staffman. Terry Noon, in charge of Penny Farthing's publishing subsidiary Page Full of Hits, has named Dave Williams as professional manager. Williams, formerly with Chappell Music, has latterly been working on promotion and record production for Nems Enterprises.

BBC radio's "Jazz Club" paid tribute to the late Ted Heath March 29th with a concert played by 21 former members of his orchestra conducted by Jack Parnell, his first drummer. Disk jockey Alan Dell hosted the show, the recording of which in the BBC's Camden Threater studio was attended by Corporation executive including Douglas Muggeridge, Donald MacLean, Mark White, producer Teddy Warrick, Terry Henebery and Yvonne Littlewood from BBC TV, and Mrs. Moira Heath and other members of the bandleader's family. The program was broadcast on the BBC's Radios 1 and 2 channels and in stereo on Radio 3. Others in the audience comprised people connected with Heath's career in music and young jazz groups and students.

Radio Andorra is the latest foreign-based station to try infiltration of the British airwaves. On the morning of March 22nd it broadcast a three-hour test transmission tagged "Manificent

Morning Machine" hosted by disk jockeys Sebastian Stone and Christopher Jay. Thirty minutes of the program was devoted to UPC label product featuring Shakane, Barbara Windsor, Tikki, Takki, Suzy and Lies, Peter and the Wolves and the Marcello Minerbi orchestra. Meanwhile the department of the Director of public Prosecutions has been notified of the activities of Radio Nordsee, based aboard a boat off the Dutch coast.

Carlin Music's London chief Paul Rich has realigned his promotion team following the appointment of Dave Most to run his brother Mickie's Enquiry Music enterprise under Carlin's administrative banner. The team is Bill Fowler, Don Reedman, who recently joined from Welbeck Music, and Ian Warner, and former Cyril Shane Organization staffer. Reedman also has responsibility for placing copyrights with disk producers and artist managers. Rich has set deals for two more subsidiary companies called Solmusica and Big John Music. The first is in partnership with accountant Larry Drizon and songwriter Charles Blackwell, and one of its initial properties is Blackwell's "Baby I've Come Home" recorded by Lee Vanderbilt for the Chapter One label. Big John Music is in conjunction with Johnny Goodison, formerly a CBS staff producer and now independent. An upcoming Carlin copyright is the next single by The Hollies called "Can't Tell The Bottom From The Top" which was written by Guy Fletcher and Doug Flett and will be released this month.

Hit parading Jamaican duo Bob and Marcia are here for two months on a schedule arranged by Trojan Records and Commercial Entertainments. They scored here with "Young, Gifted And Black", and their producer Harry Johnson accompanied them to record a single and album here before the twosome start a round of club and cabaret dates and TV spots.

Milton Samuel's Beacon Records is launching a series of LP's with a non-musical concept beginning this month with a study of student leader Tariq Ali which has been produced by disk jockey David Symonds. Samuel plans a total of six albums in the series this year, including one by the controversial Northern Ireland Member of Parliament Bernadette Devlin. Lawson Associates has been set up as part of the Beacon organization and will handle Beacon acts including Bobbie Bridger and Black Velvet. Samuel and Don Lawson are co-managing directors of the new division.

Chappell Music pop division head Stuart Reid has fixed two deals for subsidiary publishing companies under the Chappell aegis. One is Keyboard Chappell in partnership with Lord Derby's Keyboard Music enterprise, and will publish copyrights by Harlan County, who record for the Carnaby label. The second is Our Songs, which will handle material by Fairfield Parlor, contracted to the Philips group progressive label Vertigo.

Brian Auger has signed a pact with RCA through his new Nasty Production company, whose managing director is his manager, Mafalda Hall. The deal covers Auger and his group the Trinity and two other artists whom Auger will produce. His first LP is set for May release, and the pact marks RCA's entry into the progressive music market.

Welbeck Music chief Len Beadle has upped promotion man Eddie Levy to the post of professional manager, and named songwriter Ron Roker as Levy's successor in the exploitation department. Welbeck, Pye's publishing arm, is becoming active in the progressive field as a parallel project with Pye's Dawn label, and Beadle has signed Dawn acts such as Welcome, Noir, Trader Horne, The Good Earth and Demon Fuzz to exclusive writing contracts. Welbeck hosted a party March 19th for Don Kirshner, with whom it has a catalogue deal.

Philips, Polydor and CBS have announced their price increase and left EMI somewhat out on a limb in the process. The key factor - the 5% returns allowance - which EMI has abolished altogether is retained by Philips and Polydor on their singles and kept by CBS on all product. This allowance, the abolition of which did most to provoke the ire of the disk retail trade, is regarded by many as being the last hope of new artists in breaking through. With virtually no exposure outlets available to the new acts in radio or TV, this provision is about the only inducement for disk dealers to take a chance on stocking singles by unknowns. Polydor, however, has tempered the retention of the allowance by hiking its single price from eight shillings and sixpence to nine shillings and threepence - the only company to do so to date. Polydor managing director John Fruin declared that the company will be very selective about its single release policy, and reckons that good singles will sell as well as the new cost as they did at the old. Polydor is reorganizing its LP operation into four categories: a bottom price line at 19 shillings and ten pence, the classical section of which will comprise repackaged and reissued best selling material from the Heliodor label which is to be axed; Polydor Standard, which will cost 29 shillings and ten pence - a reduction from 37 shillings and sixpence - and carry standard repertoire and new acts; Polydor Super, which will cost 42 shillings and

sixpence, will issue top sellers like the Who, Cream, Bert Kaempfert and James Last, and Polydor De Luxe which at 47 shillings and sixpence will carry classical repertoire and special sets. Philips is keeping its single and budget line prices the same, raising its mid price 28 shillings and seven pence material to 29 shillings and eleven pence, and its pop LPs climb from 37 shillings and sixpence to 39 shillings and eleven pence. Its progressive Vertigo line goes up by two shillings and sixpence to 45 shillings, which is the new price of its classical repertoire. CBS pop albums and classical material rise by the same margin, its mid price classical range and the Realm jazz line become one shilling and five pence dearer at 29 shillings and eleven pence, and its multi record sets are also climbing by various amounts, depending on material. Decca is making no alteration, and Pye is awaiting the Budget details from Chancellor Roy Jenkins before deciding on any charges.

A keen bid battle is developing around the future of Novello and Co. Music Sales (UK), the first interested party, has hiked its offer by £2.10.0 to £27.10.0 for each Novello Ordinary share; the Granada Group is offering its A Ordinary shares or £30 per share to Novello stockholders, and the latest entrant in the fiscal fray, Mount Securities, is campaigning at £31.10 shillings for each ordinary share in the big educational publishing firm. Before this latter bid became known, the Novello board was recommending stockholders to accept the Granada deal, and another improved offer from Music Sales (UK) is considered likely.

Immediate Records went into voluntary liquidation March 18th at a crowded meeting of creditors with an estimated deficiency of £264,993. Immediate director Andrew Loog Oldham attended the meeting and it was announced that the other director, Tony Calder, had resigned last December. The reasons given by Immediate for its present position was the rising cost of studio and recording facilities, inadequate book-keeping and excessive expenditure on advance royalty payments to artists. A liquidator and a committee of investigation were appointed to conduct further investigations into the company's affairs in behalf of the creditors.

Singles stopped slumping last November, according to Ministry of Technology statistics. The 45 r.p.m. production total for the month was 4,303,000, 13% up on November 1968. LP production rose by only 3% at 6,237,000, and overall production was 7% higher at 10,550,000. November sales were the same as for 1968 at £3.8, with home sales 5% higher but exports slumping to 20% below the previous year's record total. In the eleven months ending last November, sales showed a 6% increase on the corresponding period in 1968, with exports 14% higher.





## Phonogram Wins Bootleg Battle

AMSTERDAM — Since early Feb. six major retailers in Holland have been selling a bootleg Bob Dylan album called "Little White Wonder". Tapes for this album arrived in Holland through underground channels and were recorded as demos by Dylan in a Woodstock basement.

In mid-Feb. a group of major retailers advertised in Holland's underground weekly Aloha with the forthcoming release of a bootleg Rolling

Stones album, called "Berkeley Concert", recorded live during the recent Rolling Stones U.S. tour. The official release-date was March 16. Later a retail price of 12.80 guilders (\$3.50) was announced. However, on March 12 N.V. Phonogram Amsterdam (as distributor of the Decca label) decided to take action. The company sent out letters to all Dutch retailers, stating that the recording was a pirate LP made without the knowledge or permission of the Rolling Stones. Release of the album would be illegal, the letter said, and N.V. Phonogram would not hesitate to take action against any retailer selling the album.

N.V. Phonogram succeeded in stopping bootleg records at this early date. On March 13, some of the major retailers withdrew from the bootleg business, while the others delayed the release date. A few days later they also decided to withdraw officially, which meant the end of selling bootleg records through official retailers in Holland.

## Phonodisc Appointments

TORONTO — Don McKim, president of Phonodisc Limited has announced new appointments and personnel moves involving its eastern and central division staffs.

Aside from playing cabaret and concert dates in England, he will also be appearing on television. Buddah released his recording of "Sweet London Lady" in Great Britain to coincide with his appearances. The singer's dates were set up by the Arthur Howes Agency in England.

The New York Rock & Roll Ensemble will embark on their first European tour April 26 at the Golden Rose Festival in Montreux, Switzerland, and continuing with many universities and clubs in England. The group will be in Europe for 13 days.

The Ensemble's latest album, "Reflections" will be released by Atco Records in England, to coincide with the groups tour.

## CAPAC Lights Up Darkened Centre

TORONTO — CAPAC, in conjunction with record companies, has set up a series of Saturday events to bring life to the sometimes darkened new St. Lawrence Centre. Other days of theatre darkening will also be considered by the Saturday, Sunday and Sometimes Committee. Kick-off show featured GRT's Magic Cycle, The Tote Family from the newly bowed CHUM production house, and Brutus from Quality Records. CAPAC's Lou Applebaum explained the purpose of the showings were to familiarize the groups with local audiences, who will pay \$2 per head for the concert.

The first three groups, all represented by CAPAC writers, have had mild to excellent action of their disk releases. The Magic Cycle, who picked up national chart listings with their release of "Groovy Things" are expected to release a follow-up shortly. Bob Robertson, CKXL Calgary personality believed in the disk so strongly, it has now been revived as an "oldie". Brutus have had a good showing with their release of "Funky Roller Skates" and the Tote Family are expected to release shortly.

## Brit. Disk Output Up In Nov.

LONDON — Latest Board of Trade figures show that pressings of records in November at 10,559,000 were 7% higher than in the corresponding month of 1968. Production of 45 and 33 1/3rd rpm records increased by 13% and 3%, respectively. During the eleven months to the end of November 1969, production was 7% higher than in the equivalent period of 1968 with pressings of 45 rpm records 6%

## Canadian Rock Fests: 'Peace' Passe By Spring's End?

TORONTO — Toronto promoters, as usual, are jumping on a bandwagon with enough enthusiasm and competition to kill it. Shaping up is the biggest exploitation and killing of "peace" that could make the very word, passe, by the time all the peace festivals, and trains are set to bow.

Although John Lennon's initial proposals for a Toronto Peace Festival were honorable, it has mushroomed into a hub of catch alls. First indication of unrest was the sudden pulling out of the Toronto Festival by Lennon and his mate Yoko. Apparently Lennon wanted this to be a free deal. The other promoters connected with the Festival however, came up with some pretty astounding cost figures levied by the Ontario Government which would make the Festival a financial disaster even before opening day.

In spite of these problems, promoters for the original Peace Festival '70 are going ahead, that is, if they can have the event through the approval of county laws which have been the big threat to date. One Festival with "peace" removed from the title but nevertheless included in the promoting was the Toronto Rock Festival Mar. 25-26. Held at Varsity Arena the lineup included: Canned Heat, MC5, Amboy Dukes, Raven, Bloodstone, Parliaments, Luke and The Apostles, Brutus, Duck, Leigh Ashford, Whiskey Howl and many others. Another Varsity event is Peace Festival which is skedded for June 19 through the 21st. A very monied group have come up with the idea of a mobile caravan which apparently won't be dubbed "peace" in any way but observers are betting on many "peace" overtones. This "sound train" will apparently take many big names to stadiums in Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver. Dates have tentatively been set as

from June 24 through July 5th.

The only sound project, The Mari-rosa, an annual folk get together is set for July 24 through the 26th and expected to be even bigger, in acts and crowds this year.

Meanwhile, Montreal promoters continue to make their counterparts in Toronto look small potatoes. Montreal still leads the way for presenting the big crowd draws with Vancouver running a close second.

## GRT Montreal Offices

MONTREAL — The opening of GRT of Canada's new Quebec branch offices, in Montreal, saw one of the wildest and fun lasting get togethers of press, radio, key dealers in many a moon. GRT hired out the popular Laugh-In discotheque and with free booze and food for all comers, threw open the doors which filled the club within minutes. Helping the kick-off ceremonies was Ron Scribner's group, Detroit's Funkadelics and Parliaments. The Funkadelics record for Westbound which will now be distributed by GRT of Canada. Hosting the show was GRT's Canadian president Ross Reynolds and tying in the whole show with artist and audience coordination was the label's national sales manager Ed LaBuick. U.S. reps from Chess Check, GRT and many others connected with GRT were in attendance including Mort Wax, New York publicist.

After a free swinging and exhausting session up stairs in the club, everyone moved downstairs for food, more booze and a listen to the Flirtations, a large brassy and well put together group with nine members hailing from Montreal.

Jim Corbett is the new branch manager for the Quebec operation and is backed with a fully bilingual sales and promotion staff.

## Metromedia In Spain Via Fabrica Discos

NEW YORK — Ivan Mogull has negotiated representation of Metromedia Records repertoire in Spain through Fabrica de Discos Columbia, S.A. Enrique Garea of Fabrica said he plans immediate exploitation of the label in his country. Representing Metromedia in the deal was Jay Morgenstern.

## Canadian Productions Increase 25%

TORONTO — What is turning out to be an obvious affront to Canadian broadcasters and without any intent is the stepped up record production and its acceptance across Canada.

Although foreign produced Canadian content is still prevalent, the home grown variety is now starting to become preferred. "You Me And Mexico" by Capitol's Edward Bear, taped at Toronto's Eastern Sound Studios, is leading the way for 100% Canadian produced sessions. The Gamma lid of "To Love Means To Be Free" by Anthony Green and Barry Stagg, taped at RCA's Montreal studios has gained good exposure across the country. The Poppy Family are still showing good form with their London deck "That's Where I Went Wrong" which was cut at Vancouver's R&D Studios. Another Vancouver group, Spring, have also been picking up excellent airplay with their Coast single "As Feelings Go".

Sebastian, popular Montreal singer, is now being recognized after months of release of his Apex single "Now That It's Over". Reason for recognition of this 100% Canadian

Ralph McTell had a good start after a radio and TV performance. "Barbara's Boys" by The Four Tops was the BRT 2 Hitgolf pick of the week. Rush-released was the new Tyrannosaurus Rex LP entitled "A Beard of Stars."

In the classical field, the successful composer Francois Glorieux released his first record. There were more than 1000 pre-release offers. The Series "Music For Pleasure" was launched in Belgium with a press conference. Vogue released two national productions: "Morning Train" (Uzi) and "Prends Ma Main" (Cecile Forde). Polygram released the singles "Tchoo Tchoo Wang Wang" by Knokke member Kate, "Brussels" by popular Liesbeth List (a track from her LP "Liesbeth List Zingt Jacques Brel") and "Who Do You Love" by Juicy Lucy,

which was well-received. There is also a promotion LP with numbers from the various Island groups. This LP, entitled "London Pop News," is wrapped up in colour photos. Barclay's Michel Delpuch was in Belgium. Michel Polnareff is expected. "Woman Of The Ghetto" by Marlena Shaw (on Chess) was the RTB Formule J "Disque De La Semaine."

Great promotion is given to "Je Suis Tombe Du Ciel" by David Alexandre Winter, the Luxemburg representative at the Eurovision Song Festival. The flipside is the English version "Falling In Love." The music is by the young Belgian Yves De Vriendt, ex-member of the New Inspiration. The Flemish version "Ik Ben Verlieft" by Ronny Temmer was simultaneously released on Decca. Barclay also released the new LP by the Edwin Hawkins Singers. Rhoda Scott performed in the Ancienne Belgique. Her LP was released with the necessary promotion. Tony Joe White's LP "Continued" is selling strongly and his new single "Groupie Girl" is very well received on the radio.

Vogue released two French records entitled "A La Vie A L'Amour" (Jacques Dutronc) and "Il Faut Trouver Le Temps D'Aimer" (Petula Clark). The company has a discotheque-hit with Norman Greenbaum's "Spirit In The Sky."

CBS reports big sales for the LP's "Barbara Streisand's Greatest Hits" and "Andy Williams' Greatest Hits." Andy's single "Can't Help Falling In Love" gets a big promotion and will certainly become an enormous hit in Europe.

The single "Wandrin' Star", with which Lee Marvin has such a tremendous success in Great-Britain, was released here on the Paramount label. Polygram released an LP by Shelia. Most played is the track "Na Na Pa". The Dutch group Roek's Family had once a hit with this record under the title of "Get Yourself A Ticket." Polydor has three single-hits with "The Rapper" (The Jaggerz), "Io. Io." (The Bee Gees) and "The Seeker" Knock, Who's There? on Apple. Marc Bertrand's "Ne Prends Pas Le Temps Comme Il Vient" gets a big promotion. Just released and already much played are the singles "Brontosaurus" (The Move), "Des Jours Entiers A T'Aimer" (Julien Clerc), "Les Belles Dames" (Adamo), "Everybody Get Together" (The Dave Clark Five). The new Gramophone LP's are "Krokodil" (on Liberty), "On Time" (Grand Funk Railroad) on Capitol, "Four In Blue" (Smokey Robinson and The Miracles) on Tamla Motown. The (Marvin Gaye), also on Tamla Motown. The LP "Popcorn" includes numbers by The Temptations, Earl van Dyke, Gladys Knight and The Pips, Edwin Starr, The Jackson 5 and The Four Tops. On all these songs a new dance, entitled "Popcorn," is danced in Belgium and France. In this way the "Popcorn" LP will certainly become a bestseller. Another discotheque-hit is "You're The One" by Little Sister on Atlantic. Barclay released a new album "Up With The People" on Buddah. This group already performed in Belgium and is extremely popular.

At the moment biggest hit overhere is "Lay Down" by Melanie and The Edwin Hawkins Singers (on Buddah). Sales are so enormous that it will not be long before "Lay Down" becomes a million-seller in Europe.

LONDON — Cyril Gee of Belwin-Mills Music recently visited the States for discussions with American partners Martin Winkler and Al Shulman. Gee is accompanied by professional manager Tony Hill, writer and producer of the British charter, "United We Stand," which is also taking off in the U.S. They will be acquiring new mate-

rial for their British catalog and are currently working on "Diane" by The Golden Gate; "Wam Bam Alagazam" by The Bag O'Tricks (CBS); "Angel of Love" by The Flirtations (EMI) and "Say a Prayer" by Solomon King (EMI). Gee will also be taking several British masters for consideration by American record companies.





# Germany

After his America tour Charles Aznavour was guest star in Hamburg, Berlin, Vienna, Zurich, Munich, Cologne and Frankfurt. Along with the tour the LP "Aznavour Sings Aznavour" with English and French titles was released. In the next month Aznavour will chiefly be active on the European market.

The French Chanson star Gilbert Becaud will come to Germany for a 14-day concert tour. Furthermore, he will be in the popular TV-show "Der goldene Schub." A German version of his hit "Moi je m'en vais demain"/ "Je t'aimerai jusqu'a la fin du monde" has just been released.

Bill Martin, composer of "Puppet On A String" and "Congratulations," discussed in Munich his future co-operation with Edition Montana.

The Broadway-hit "Promises Promises," which was enthusiastically received in London last month, shall have a German premiere this spring in Berlin. Stage direction is by Wolfgang Spier, Germany's leading comedy stage-manager. Bibi Johns and Gideon Singer were engaged for the leads.

The first concerts of the Edwin Hawkins Singers in Germany were such a big success that tour organizer Hans-Werner Funke arranged four other engagements in Hannover, Hamburg, Berlin and Stuttgart. Also, the Edwin Hawkins Singers made two colour TV shows in Germany.

The Wiener Philharmoniker, exclusively under contract by Decca, shall record for the German Gramophone Company the complete Symphonies of Ludwig van Beethoven, directed by Karl Bohm.

Led Zeppelin came to Germany. On the occasion of this tour, Metronome released a low priced album, "1st & 2nd." The progressive band promoted their single "Whole Lotta Love." Until now more than 20,000 copies were sold.

Sandie Shaw was guest star on the TV-show "Paul's Party," and she performed her single "By Tomorrow."

A low-price album, about \$3, was released by the jazz clarinet player Benny Goodman titled "Swing, Swing, Sing" on Teldec.

During a short stay in Munich, U.S. star Henry "Manolito" Darrow from the TV-show "High Chaparral" got a TV-Bambi (special award) and recorded a single in German titled: "Heisse Kuesse — scharfe Schuesse." Furthermore, Henry Darrow promised to come again in two months for three big TV shows.

During a concert by Jethro Tull in the Jahrhunderthalle in Frankfurt, the fans got into such excitement that a material damage of about \$10,000 was incurred by them. Therefore the concert agency Lippmann and Rau cancelled all big arrangements (con-

certs of Led Zeppelin, The Rolling Stones and Flock) for the next month. Only Benny Goodman was allowed to play.

The single-best-seller of Metronome is Shocking Blue with "Mighty Joe." The Dutch band got a gold disk for one million sold copies in the USA.

"Stern Musik," founded in the spring of 1965 as service for 10.6 million readers of the big magazine STERN, sold three million copies on 150 LP's. "Stern Musik" became "Star Music" and was in all hit-parades. Until now the STERN presented the following artists: Abi and Esther Ofarim, Mireille Mathieu, The Bee Gees, Hildegard Knef, Udo Juergens and Peter Alexander. On the occasion of the five years existence of "Stern Musik" the five partners from the record trade, Ariola, CBS, Decca, Deutsche Grammophon and Liberty will come together and make a co-operative advertising. In April in 700 leading special shops in Germany and West Berlin extra decorations will be provided.

The latest single of the Archies, which are still good noticed with "Sugar Sugar," is "Who's Your Baby." It was just released.

The Hollies will make a big tour through Germany in March and April.

Edition Intro will prepare the international start of Ricky Shayne, who is very much requested by some active foreign firms at present.

The Rolling Stones, who will in May give concerts in Munich, Berlin, Hamburg and Essen, are leading in a big pop-poll run by the Vienna newspaper Express. In the first ten places were: Rolling Stones (7925 votes), The Beatles (7001), Udo Juergens (3448), Peter Alexander (2431), Adamo (2311), Led Zeppelin (1957), Roy Black (1789), Tom Jones (1534), Robin Gibb (1266), Archies (1248).

James Last, inventor of the "Party Sound," celebrated a jubilee in Hamburg. His 10th LP "Non Stop Dancing" was released by Polydor. Production chief Oskar Drechsler presented to James Last a golden cup during a super party celebrating more than one million sold LPs of "Non Stop Dancing."

Opera singer Anna Moffo will record her first LP for Ariola in Munich. This LP includes exclusive operetta songs.

On the 20th of April Caterina Valente will fly to South Africa for a six-week performance.

The American hit "Tracy" climbed up on the German hit parade. The interpreters of this song, The Cuff Links were in Germany for TV-shootings.

The English tune "Sign On The Dotted Line" by Graham Bonney was telecast by the Second German TV.

Happy times for the thousands of Creedence Clearwater Revival fans in Holland. On April 11 this phenomenal group will give two live-concerts in Rotterdam. One of the most played and talked about records which have been released in Holland lately is Tony Joe White's exciting "Groupy Girl." Boyema's Joop Visser expressed his high hopes for this single. Boyema recently released an LP with single-hits like "Hey Jude", "Can't Buy Me Love", "Lady Madonna", "Ballad of John & Yoko by The Beatles."

Last week it was Capitol Country time in Holland. Six attractive priced Country & Western samplers were released then. Heavy advertising, promotion and a good deal of airplay have already placed this series one week after release in the best-selling category.

The most famous E.M.I. tenor in the world Nicolai Gedda will visit Holland at the end of April giving three concerts in Amsterdam, Rotterdam and The Hague with the Dutch soprano Cristina Deutekom.

Immediately after the Eurovision Song Festival N.V. Phonogram rush-released the winning Eurovision Contest song "All Kinds Of Everything" by Dana (Decca). The first days sales of the record were very impressive. Dana was front-page news during many days after the contest and the record is on every station's playlist. She returned to Holland on March 31, to perform in "Voor De Vuist Weg", Holland's no. 1 TV-show.

U.S. Mercury star Jerry Butler arrived in Holland last week as a part of his European tour. N.V. Phonogram threw a press-reception at the Amsterdam-Hilton, while Butler was the featured guest at the Jam-TV-show. Blue Mink, Dave Dee and Brotherhood of Man arrived in Holland to promote their new records on the Doebidoe TV-show. The three British top acts gave N.V. Phonogram a fine share in the show again.

One of the top personalities on Dutch television is Eva Gloria Lopez, an actress on the national Spanish Language TV-course. The beautiful Miss Lopez recorded two songs, "Vamos A Ver" and "Mira Que Dia" for N.V. Phonogram, released as a single on April 3 (Philips). N.V. Phonogram released four albums from the English Nova Series (Decca/Deram): "Made In England" by Bulldog Breed, "Feel in' Free" by Pacific Drift, "A MH2"

by Andy Clark & Mick Hutchinson and "In From The Cold" by Ashkan. Famous instrumentalist Toots Thielemans recorded two new tracks for N.V. Phonogram: "Theme From Peyton Place" and "Midnight Cowboy" are both very popular themes in Holland and the record should therefore click with a wide audience.

The response from Dutch discotheque on the Buddy Miles' single "Them Changes" (Mercury) is fantastic. The response will possibly get the record on the Dutch hitparade. Juicy Lucy's "Who Do You Love?" entered the national Dutch charts this week at no. 40 (Vertigo). The group promoted the record on a TV-show several weeks ago.

Four weeks ago CNR records released — as the first company in the world — the single "Lay Down" by Melanie and the Edwin Hawkins Singers. Now this record is number one in the Dutch charts and has even beaten the Beatles' "Let It Be". Talking about Buddah — Melanie, Melanie did three fantastic live-performances in Amsterdam, Rotterdam and The Hague. She also did some radio and a half hour television special, televised by TROS. Melanie and the Edwin Hawkins Singers had the unbelievable opportunity to be in Holland at the same time and of course they gave TV-promotion to their current chartbuster "Lay Down". The happening took place in Willem Duys' "Voor De Vuist Weg" family TV-program. Also the Edwin Hawkins Singers did three concerts in Holland. After their appearance at the Grand Gala Du Disque the singers are the hottest group in Holland. Both of their albums are selling great and CNR is looking forward to have the Edwin Hawkins Singers back in this country.

News from 14-year old CNR singer Heintje keeps coming. With two films in the Dutch cinema's and one hit "Ik Hou Van Holland" (I Love Holland) in the top twenty Heintje is news. This week Heintje's fifth German film "Tomorrow The Sun Will Shine Again" got its premiere. Together with this film a new album will be released. Lou Christie came to our country to present his new single "Love Is Over" in "Doebidoe" teenage TV-program. This special was broadcasted on April 4th. One day before this single was released by CNR Records.

GRT's national sales manager, Ed Labuick, hosted a sizeable press party just prior to Charles Aznavour's appearance at Massey Hall (Toronto). The French giant pulled a capacity house. GRT officially opened their new Montreal branch (16) to be headed up by branch manager Jack Corbett. The firm hosted a giant opening night party at Montreal's top disco, Laugh In with reps from across Canada as well as U.S. execs in attendance. GRT now has a complete network of distributors from coast to coast in Canada. These are: Emerson Sales/Vancouver; Van Dusen/Alberta; A. A. Murphy & Sons/Saskatchewan; Laurel Records/Manitoba; their own factory in London, Ont., a sales office in Toronto, a new factory/office complex underway in Alliston, Ont., their own offices in Montreal; and Canadian Assemblies in Nova Scotia.

Terry Vollum and John deNottbeck, principals in the Music Company, have set Apr. 3 at 8 PM as the date for the recording of a gospel-rock message of peace, "People We Love," written by deNottbeck. The recording will be somewhat unique in that industry people and others have been invited to the recording site, St. Paul's Roman Catholic Church, (Toronto) to take part in the taping. Nimbus 9 Productions is also involved in the project through arrangements for the 15 musicians, supplied by Ben McPeck. Film coverage of the session for a half hour television special is expected.

Radio station CKDR-Dryden bowed its first survey and it has been enthusiastically received by Dryden consumers through the two outlets in the area. Peter L. Harding, manager of the station, arranged for "live" all day broadcasting from the town's new record bar, Sounds Of Music, whose opening coincided with the release of the new survey. On-air personalities taking part included, besides Harding, Bob Readings and J. Murray Jones.

As an assist to Canadian broadcasters, London Records' Dave Doucette has put together a catalog of available Canadian content recordings. This list covers recorded music in country, folk, classical, rock and spoken work categories and includes over 5000 selections. London's Ontario promotion manager Ken McFarland has been busy arranging for press, radio and television interviews with Susan and Terry Jacks of the famous Poppy Family. The husband and wife team was in Toronto for a couple of days of promotion and lining up tour dates for when they come back from Osaka, Japan, where they'll be representing Canada at the Canadian Pavilion. Their London disking of "Which Way You Goin' Billy" hit the Cash Box Top 100 and has apparently broken in three of the 14 major U.S. markets. Next single for the Vancouver group is a Terry Jacks penning, "I'm Gonna Capture You," and "A Good Thing Lost". The session was taped at Vancouver's R&D Productions. McFarland reports good provincial action on the Gamma lid, "To Love Means To Be Free," by Montrealer's Anthony Green and Barry Stagg. Gamma's Daniel Lazare reports U.S. leasing of the disk to United Artists. Gamma's top female artist, Pauline Julien, has been awarded the Grand Prix Du Disque for her album, "Suite Quebecoise". The award was presented in Paris Mar. 6.

Richard Glanville-Brown, national artist promotion manager for Capitol Records, teamed up with the label's Quebec branch and presented Glen Campbell to press, radio, and key dealers at a lavish bash in Montreal's Chateau Champlain Hotel. Also present were top jocks from French radio stations within an 80 mile radius of Montreal. Campbell also visited several French and English television stations prior to his near capacity showing at the Montreal Forum. Back in Toronto, Glen Blouin, recently

upped to the post of assistant advertising and sales promotion manager for Capitol, was busy taking Donna Ramsay on a tour of radio and television stations after her return from Nashville, where she taped enough sides for an album and single release. Gary Buck, also on the Capitol label, produced. Edward Bear now settling in nicely for national hitdom with their deck, "You Me And Mexico," are also experiencing good bookings across Canada.

Quality's Ontario promotion manager, Mark Robbins, was handed a passel of hit material which included: "Mr. Monday"/Original Caste; "Rock Island Line"/Johnny Cash; and "Cecilia" / Sweet Henry. Harold Winslow, promo super for the label, reports the Quality single release of "My Canada," by Canadian country favorite Doc Williams. Winslow also reports that Quality has picked up exclusive rights for distribution of the Little David label album, "The Devil Made Me Buy This Dress," by Flip Wilson. This LP is to be made available in 8 track and cassette form, and the label is readying an extensive national push on Wilson. 4 selections from the album will be cut onto an EP and sent out to all radio stations and dealers in Canada. Quality's Little Green Bag promotion has turned into a national success. The record was inserted with a drop of perfume into a green vinyl bag which was then inserted into an LP sleeve. A fluorescent sticker reading "You Can't Tell A Book By Its Cover Or A Record By The Bag It's In" was affixed to the sleeve. The Fifth Dimension's first album release for Quality, "Portrait," will be released shortly in a double fold jacket with four panels of color.

Lee Armstrong, executive director for The Compo Company, has launched an all out effort to establish Sebastian as a Canadian success before his newly released Decca lid, "Now That It's Over," becomes a smash in the U.S. The record was first released on the Apex label in October of last year, and Canadian broadcasters turned thumbs down on the Montreal produced single. The Maple Leaf System also turned it down. Armstrong and his A&R director, Ron Dykhof, who produced the single at RCA's Montreal studios, didn't give up and now it could pay off, which could be of some embarrassment to Canadian broadcasters.

Charlie Camilleri, Columbia regional promo mgr (Ontario) reports brisk action on Simon & Garfunkel's single and album, "Bridge Over Troubled Water," and Mark Lindsay's "Arizona" still holding strong. Breakout singles are "But For Love"/Jerry Naylor; "Me Without You"/Billy Joe Royal; "July 12, 1939"/Charlie Rich; "Odds & Ends"/Johnny Mathis; and the Marty Robbins country hit, "My Woman My Woman My Wife," now breaking into the pop charts. Canadian country group, The Mercey Brothers, have shown good form with their lid, "My Song For You".

Chat Medicine Hat personality John Oliver reports a "fantastic and unbelievable concert" by Vancouver's Collectors (7) which pulled a capacity house. Current London release by the group, "I Must Have Been Blind," is one of the top request items at the station. Breakout single at this important Alberta outlet is "Lucifer," by the Bob Seger System.

Story Forest recording artist Richie Havens made a successful appearance in Toronto and followed it up with an appearance on the CTV special, "Gentry One," with host Bobbie Gentry. Sharing the bill were Ian & Sylvia. Ottawa's Meadow group is gaining nationally with their Quality deck, "Oh Darling". The Animals' version of "House Of The Rising Sun," now in Quality's Golden Treasure series, has become a major chart item across Canada. Quality has launched the "Goldie Look Alike Contest" in conjunction with Columbia

Warner Bros have registered good national play on both sides of the Winnipeg produced Justin Tyme single "Child Of Dawn" and "Julie's Just A Friend".

## EDITORIAL: Much More Than Selling Machines

A favorite topic of conversation among coin industry people these days is the future of the distributing business. Whether independent or factory owned, many of these machine outlets are finding the financial mustard getting more and more difficult to cut as the years go by. Maybe one essential reason for the present problem is the trade's general view of the distributor simply as a "machine outlet".

The days when the demand for machines exceeded the supply are long gone. While the veteran operator is far happier to be romanced by the machine salesman, rather than the other way around, he just might inherit a whole passel of problems if the pinch continues to tighten, and the day arrive when good old Joe the distributor is replaced by a storefront machine depot run by a couple of factory service mechanics. Will he miss the financial advice and assistance Joe used to offer? Will he miss the chance to pester one of Joe's employees over the phone for everything under the sun? Will he miss that convenient place where he could inspect half the brands of games and tables on the market, all on one showroom floor, and trade or buy used merchandise? You bet!

And to be perfectly honest, before any distributor goes all the way under, he's going to fight like never before to stay his execution. Among other drastic steps he may take is the obvious one — direct selling to locations. It's going on already, right at some of our more "respectable dealerships". Transshipping machines into another dealer's "exclusive" territory is another obvious play going on at many dealers. While this doesn't mean much to the operating business, except a cheaper buying price, it directly affects the solvency of the dealer whose tomatoes are being picked by the guy in the next yard. And there's only one way to replace those tomatoes, isn't there?

When a dealer considers his company nothing more than a "resale store", he's in trouble. Granted, there are a number of machines on today's market which are so much in demand by operators that large back orders exist. But in general, nobody's knocking any dealer's door down to spend money on equipment, and the smart dealer must therefore pull every ploy out of the hat to attract that clientele. How? First by placing the word "service" next to "sales" and then doing something about it.

There are a whole load of services the dealer could offer his customers to stimulate additional business. For starters, he could relax some of the outlandish add-on interest on installment notes. Dealers make money from machine profits, not loans, remember? They could also beef up their service force to meet the growing electrical sophistication of modern music and amusement machines. We wonder how many additional hundreds of machines might be sold if the operator wasn't scared off by the blinding maze of transistors, contacts and whatnot inside the cabinets of some of these new machines. Wouldn't he feel more secure if that backup service advice and help was clearly visible at the distributor of said piece?

On this score, how about more dealer-oriented service classes on new machines. Sure there's factory-sponsored programs now, but wouldn't the operators feel more comfortable meeting in small groups at familiar showrooms being schooled by a familiar service employee?

Many dealers love to preach preventative maintenance to their customers, but it would do well if they'd apply it to their own businesses. Programs must be installed now to insure the patronage of customers in the future ...

## MOA Exhib. Meet

CHICAGO — MOA will begin "Expo Seven-O" (the 1970 MOA Music and Amusement Machines Exposition) with exhibitor meetings at the Sherman House Hotel here April 14 and 15.

The purpose of the meetings with exhibitors is to plan one of the MOA's most extensive promotion campaigns ever. Problems reported by exhibitors at the recent MOA board meeting in San Francisco will also be discussed.

Meetings will be held with phonograph exhibitors on the first day and with amusement machine exhibitors on the second. Fred Granger, MOA executive vice president, says that because record companies constitute a separate category of exhibitors, they will be contacted by MOA officials by phone or in person.

MOA president Lou Ptacek, who will chair the meetings, says, "We will cooperate with exhibitors in every way possible to make 'Expo Seven-O' one of the biggest and most successful trade shows we have ever had. Among other things, exhibitors will be asked for their own suggestions for promotion."

## Seeburg/NSM Settle

CHICAGO—The Seeburg Corp. of Delaware, NSM Apparatebau GMBH, K.G. and Specialty Sales Corp. of America, a Sub-Distributor of NSM Coin-Operated Phonographs, jointly announced that they have settled the action that had been filed by Seeburg in the United States District Court for the Northern District of Illinois against Specialty Sales Corp. of America alleging that certain coin-operated phonographs, manufactured by NSM and sold by said sub-distributor infringed certain Seeburg patents.

## German Associations Elect Leadership

HAMBURG — The North German Operators' Assn., Hamburg, held its annual meeting here March 10 with above-average attendance. The association, like the other German regional operators' groups, is a member of the ZOA, the German central organization which held its annual meeting in Frankfurt March 5.

The main issue at the North German meeting was that group's policy toward the ZOA. Carl-Heinz Wende was re-elected president and Edward Malzer was elected vice president. The new board of directors consists of Heinz Huhne, Erhard Bodi, Max Walden, Manfred Sandig and Lars Skriver, the last-named representing the amusement arcade owners. The new board is expected to follow a policy of cooperation with the ZOA.

The meeting of the ZOA, which comprises ten regional associations in Western Germany and Berlin, was attended by about 2400 operators. The entire board was re-elected, including president Werner Schmidt, vice president Willi Kretzler and Willy Muller, treasurer.

A proposal to repeat "German Automatic Day," which was held in Berlin last September in connection with an "International Coin Machine Exhibition," was discussed. The formation of several committees was also discussed. The committees will be concerned with legal questions on tax matters and amusement arcades.

ZOA members also discussed the two DM pay-out machines. Installed to meet rising operating costs, the machines are attracting considerable play.

## 50 Million People Expected at Osaka

OSAKA — The opening of the Japan World Exposition, attended by the imperial family, was held at nearby Senri Hills March 14. The inaugural ceremony was attended by dignitaries from the 77 countries which have sponsored exhibits.

An estimated 50 million persons will see Expo '70 during the next six months and as many as 600,000 are expected on weekends. The fair, the first held in the orient, has a basic

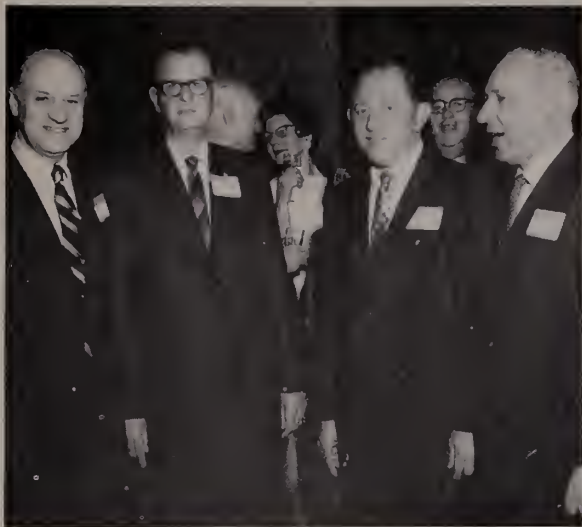
construction budget of \$145 million and a basic management budget of \$80 million.

A mid-March "Vending Machine Fair" sponsored by the Japan Vending Machine Manufacturers Association attracted 30,000 visitors according to JVMA executive secretary Sawatari.

The show was inaugurated at Tokyo's Science & Technology Museum in the presence of officials from the Ministry of International Trade & Industry and the Tobacco Monopoly Bureau.

Highlights of the exhibition were televised over NTV to a nationwide audience. Five seminars covering different categories of machines were held during three days of the Fair.

Several new machines were shown, reflecting the progress of both vending and music and games in Japan. Association officials termed the show an "overwhelming success."

### Midway Introduces 'S.A.M.I.' Target Game

CHICAGO — Midway has blasted into the 1970 arcade picture with "S.A.M.I.," the "surface to air missile interceptor," a single-player target game.

A control handle with a firing button moves the rocket launcher into firing position. As planes approach within range of the target area, the player can line up the launcher with the targets, sighting them with a target-seeking radar beam in the hit zone. Sounds accompany the firing of missiles and hits are scored.

The area of the hit zone is adjustable by jacks. The first four shots are programmed for easy hits and the next three are automatically programmed for a smaller hit zone. The time of the game is adjustable from one to two minutes in 15-second intervals with an adjustable extended play feature of one minute. When a hit is scored an explosion occurs and the sky around the target is illuminated. If the player scores from seven to 13 hits, depending upon the game's adjustment, he continues to play.

The standard coin entry for "S.A.M.I." is two plays for 25 cents. Included with each game are conversion plates for ten cent and 25 cent play. Two coin entry doors are available on special order.



### NAMA Supports Vendors In Court Case

CHICAGO — Support for vending and food service contractors in connection with bargaining over price increases in industrial locations was lent by NAMA when it filed a "friend of the court" brief in the Fourth U.S. Circuit Court in February.

At issue in the "McCall Case" is whether a corporation must bargain with a labor union over an increase in cafeteria product prices.

In previous action, the National Labor Relations Board ruled in favor of the union's demand, charging the McCall Corporation with an unfair labor practice. The company ap-

pealed the ruling to the Fourth U.S. Circuit Court, whereupon the NLRB filed a petition for enforcement of its own ruling.

In its legal brief as amicus curiae (friend of the court), NAMA supported the company's position and asked that the Court set aside the NLRB ruling favoring the union position.

The same Court had ruled against a union's position in 1967 on a similar case which involved the Westinghouse Corporation. The Court's ruling in the present case is expected within a few months.

CHICAGO — William Findlay, Rock-Ola's field service manager, recently took his traveling phonograph school to Charlotte, N.C. where he conducted a service school for the customers of LeSturgeon Distributing Co.

The instructors told their students that it is possible to remove and replace all mechanical and electrical components on location and that it is not necessary to completely remove the "Wurlamatic" record changer from the cabinet.

The horizontal record changer was discussed at length. "The selection accumulator contains a magnetic pin release, simplified adjustment, fewer moving parts and only two coils," Gregg said. He demonstrated the removal of the accumulator by taking out three screws, leaving the unit connected to the machine's electrical system and accessible for servicing.

## Coin Organ Props Up Army Show

FORT BRAGG — During recent years, emphasis in the coin machine business has been placed on the development of attractive, chromy streamlined machines. But in the "Gay '90's" comedy production, "S.S. Seafoam," performed here last season at the Footlighter Little Theater, prominence was given to a bulky, ornate machine of a bygone era.

A stage prop of a Wurlitzer band organ was employed in the production as a musical instrument that appeared to accompany songs and choreography. Each singer and dancer, before performing a number, simulated dropping a coin into the band organ. The prop immediately began flashing colored light and casting shadows through its translucent windows while a concealed live band played the actual tunes.

The history of the old musical instrument was researched by Don Frye. Design and construction was completed by musician Henry Williams and stage crew members painted and decorated the prop.

The Footlighters Little Theater was formed in 1946 and incorporated as a non-profit organization in 1967. Of the founding members of the original theater, only Ruth Bradbury and Thelma Fetters remain active. The Footlighters' 1970 season runs from May 9 through mid-October.

BLACKPOOL — The Ninth Northern Amusement Equipment and Coin-Operated Machine Exhibition was held here at the Gold Mile Centre in February. The exhibition, previously held at the Winter Gardens, was called a "bumper success" by promoter Jack Rose.

Held at the Centre for the first time, the exhibition attracted 75 stands, ten more than last year. The showing was successful in helping some participating firms receive orders. London Coin, for example, reported an equipment order of \$24,000 within an hour of the exhibition's opening.

The exhibition was officially opened by the mayor of Blackpool, Alderman Albert Stuart, who told the exhibitors, "This business of yours is the most important to our town. Sometimes when I look around you amaze me that each year you find new features and new machines which leave me gasping. This is a business which will go on and improve and it has the right people behind it to do just that."

TOKYO — An operations study group met here in mid-March to review and adopt methods for encouraging jukebox play on routes handled through SEGA's 40 branches in Japan.

Participants, under the direction of SEGA operations division director John Kano, discussed four main factors that stimulate jukebox play — imaginative programming calling attention to the phonograph through improved display, lighting, speaker placement, and wall boxes; motivating restaurant employees to suggest that customers play the jukebox and preparing graphic material that will focus attention on the jukebox and its records.

Ako Naito of SEGA's Art Section led the discussion on graphics, presenting drawings or "mock-ups" of 25 promotional items she had designed for possible use on routes.

Many of Miss Naito-san's items for stimulating jukebox play contained promotional phrases. Among the 25 promotional items considered were: Decals and stickers for table-tops, menus, and napkin holders; imprinted napkins and place mats, imprinted drink coasters resembling record labels, imprinted rubber or plastic anti-slip mats for drink trays, imprinted triangular cardboard message cards, imprinted messages on the backs of order checks, imprinted tumblers and dinnerware, imprinted chopstick and toothpick cases, "Record Topics" leaflets for placement on table, plastic swizzle sticks with

molded jukebox message, inexpensive salt and pepper shakers in the shape of miniature jukeboxes, buttons and tabs for waiters and waitresses with the message "Ask me for change for the jukebox," clock signs such as "It's jukebox time," and "time to play the jukebox," and slip-

on covers for seat backs (bearing a jukebox message.)

Many of the study group's recommendations will be adopted, according to K. Taguchi of SEGA's Operations Division. He said that some promotional items would be on the routes by April.

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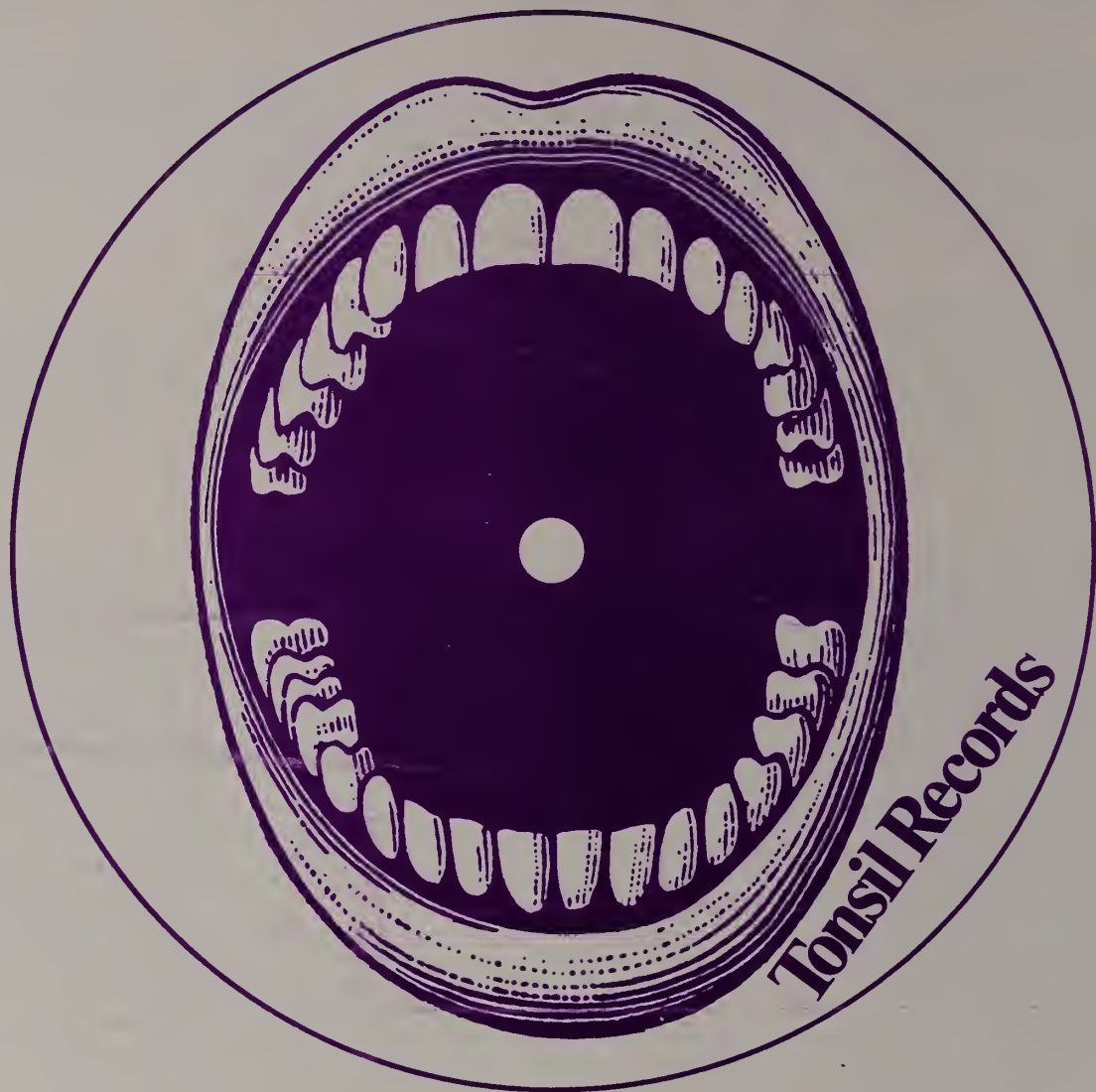
