Show Some Appreciation For College Radio

In recent years many musical performers have achieved commercial success. And of course a lot of variables goes into play in achieving this success. These variables are; hard work, good promotion, and excellent showmanship to name a few. Subjectively, the most important is promotion; of which college radio stations plays a major role.

College radio helped to make several acts successful in today's music world, but many times it seems as if the music world is afraid to give college radio credit for its unbiased efforts. People should realize that most college students that operate college radio stations not only do it for the experience, but for fun, and not money. They play whatever is good and not what is played everyday on local commercial radio stations. By doing this, every good band gets an opportunity to be heard regardless of what record label they are on. After a band who is on a small independent label, as most college bands are, becomes popular; commercial radio stations start playing their music and major record companies begin to offer them attractive deals.

Most bands that achieve their success through the help of college radio, give college students a sense of fulfillment in that they know and feel good that have played a part in bringing that band with its unique sound to be accepted by a large mass of people. In some cases however, bands "sell out", that is they change their musical styles.

In light of this it would be nice sometimes for bands in concert to say thanks to college radios for helping out. It would sure bring on the butterflys to college students, especially those college jocks and music directors. Another way which record companies can show a little gratitude, would be at least to give college jocks complimentary passes for them to attend concerts. I am sure they would appreciate it, because most college students do not get paid to go to school, instead they pay to go to school. The average college jock is poor.

A case in point was a recent U2 concert at the Miami Orange Bowl Stadium. They played before a capacity crowd, which was not surprising, especially to those who have been keeping up with the band's career.

A few months before, while talk of the concert was in the air and no date or venue was announced, my friend and I, a fellow disk-jockey and music director of college radio WVUM (Voice of The University of Miami), talked of obtaining complimentary tickets and dreamed of getting backstage passes; but those were dreams and dreams indeed. The concert came, and like many students, financial dire straits does not

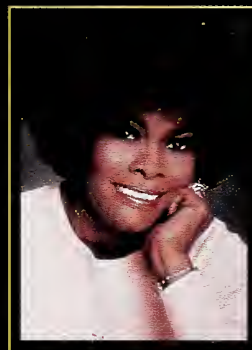

Primerica Agrees To Sell Musicland Group To Investors

LOS ANGELES – Primerica Corporation announced Monday (8) that it has signed an agreement in principle which would result in the sale of The Musicland Group, Inc. to a group of investors for \$36 for each outstanding share, or approximately \$410 million. If successfully completed, Primerica will receive approximately \$330 million for its 81 percent majority interest in The Musicland Group, with the remainder of the proceeds to be distributed to the other public shareholders.

Primerica expects to record an after-tax gain of approximately \$130 million, or \$2.50 per share, and intends to use the net proceeds to reduce debt.

The sale would be accomplished through a leveraged buyout by a group of investors led by the investment banking firm of Donaldson, Lufkin & Jenrette together with the senior management of Musicland.

The transaction is subject to the completion of certain financing ar-

rangements, execution of a definitive agreement, approval by the boards of the various parties and the shareholders of The Musicland Group, as well as other customary closing conditions. The transaction is expected to be completed in the second quarter of 1988.

The Musicland Group, Inc. is the largest specialty retailer of pre-recorded music and video home entertainment products in the U.S., in terms of both revenues and the number of retail outlets. As of December 31, 1987, the company operated 616 stores in 47 states under the names "Musicland," "Sam Goody" and "Discount Records." Its 1987 revenues were \$510.5 million.

Primerica, headquartered in Greenwich, Connecticut, is engaged in financial services and specialty retailing. Specialty retailing activities include the direct mail marketing of consumer products and sporting goods. Its 1987 revenues were \$3.8 billion.

SBK Publishes Comprehensive Professional Song Catalogues

NEW YORK – SBK Entertainment World is completing the production of the first two volumes in a comprehensive reference library of professional song catalogues, to be released to professional music users and song researchers beginning this spring. The catalogues will contain cross-referenced compilations of songs from the 1890s to the 1980s, music category descriptions and special song annotations, detailed discographies and exhibits of chart histories.

According to SBK president Char-

les Koppelman, the distribution of the first two volumes of the catalogues represents a new marketing drive for the company, whose holdings include the catalogues of Robbins Music, Leo Feist, Miller Music, Blackwood Music and others, as well as many of the songs from MGM and 20th Century Fox motion pictures. SBK also administers the music publishing interests of Michael Jackson's ATV Music Group.

The catalogues will be made available on request to all professionals.

C.E.M.A. Tests Pilfer-Proof CD Packs

LOS ANGELES – C.E.M.A. (Capitol/EMI-Manhattan/Angel) has tested the effectiveness of its new pilfer-proof 6 by 12 inch plastic holder for CD's. Feedback from retailers, one-stops, and rack-jobbers has been enthusiastic says Dennis White, President C.E.M.A.

"Up until now, retailers have been finding empty cardboard boxes with their bottoms slit in the browser bins," says White. "With this new packaging, there have been no reports of that - none of our accounts have reported finding any remains of the plastic container in or around their bins. The way we view this, based on the input we've had, is that the plastic packaging has done its job

in regard to the purpose it was designed for."

The pilfer-proof design was tested marketed with the CD version of Bob Seger's *Live Bullet* album. According to White, C.E.M.A. customers have been requesting that more products be released with this new packaging. Says White, "We've now requested that our labels choose key items to be released in this container. This will further test the viability of the packaging. (Also) Shape (the packaging's developer) has assured us that the depth of the package will soon be reduced by 10%. If the new package becomes an industry standard, I think the automation (for loading) is not far behind."

J.K. "Mike" Maitland

LOS ANGELES – J.K. "Mike" Maitland, a recording industry leader, died February 5 at Twin Pines Hospital in Santa Paula, CA. after a lengthy illness. He was 66.

During his many years in the industry, Maitland held top posts at Capitol, Warner Bros. and MCA records. After serving in the Air Force during World War II, Maitland got his start in the record business at Capitol's sales office in Detroit, his hometown. He rose to become Cincinnati branch manager, later heading the Detroit branch before moving to New York to assume the post of National Sales Manager. In 1955 he moved to the company's Hollywood home office and by 1959 he was Vice President of Capitol Records, Inc. In 1960 he was named President of Sales and Distribution for Capitol. Maitland left in 1961 to join Warner Bros. Records, where he served as the company's president until 1970. It was during his tenure that the acquisition of Reprise was completed in 1963. Maitland went on to become President of MCA Records in 1970 and continued there until his retirement to the Santa Barbara area in 1979.

Maitland is survived by his wife Carmel, a daughter, Carmel Whitman and son Mark who is Vice President/Promotion at Warner Bros. Records, as well as four grandchildren.

LOS ANGELES – A partial list of tour dates for the first leg of Bruce Springsteen and the E Street Band's upcoming "Tunnel Of Love Express Tour" have just been announced. The tour, set to commence in Worcester, Massachusetts on February 25, will be Springsteen's first in over two years.

Initial tour dates are as follows: February 25, 28 & 29 at the Centrum in Worcester, MA; March 3-4, Chapel Hill, NC's Dean Smith Auditorium;

March 8-9 at the Spectrum in Philadelphia, PA; March 13-14 at Richfield Coliseum in Cleveland, OH; March 16-17 at Chicago, IL's Rosemont Horizon; March 22-23 at the Omni in Atlanta, GA; March 26, Lexington, KY's Rupp Arena; March 28-29 at Detroit, MI's Joe Louis Arena; April 1-2 at Nassau Coliseum in Uniondale, NY; and April 4-5 at Landover, MD's Capitol Center. Additional dates will be announced shortly.

GRP/VMI Unveil JVC Records Label In North America

NEW YORK – JVC, the Japanese hardware manufacturer, is about to enter the software business stateside with the official debut of JVC Records. GRP Records is the North American licensee of the jazz/new age label, which will release seven titles – initially on CD and cassette only – on February 22: Gary Burton and the Berklee All-Stars, Oscar Castro-Neves' *Brazilian Scandals*, Malta's *High Pressure*, Masami Nakagawa's *Prelude for Autumn*, Masahiro Syama's *Play Me A Little Music*, Chin Suzuki's *Morning Picture*, and a sampler.

At a New York press party to announce the deal, Noboru Takayama, president of VMI (JVC's record division) said, "VMI has promoted and marketed GRP products in Japan for the past five years, during which time we have come to share many common feelings and attitudes. GRP's policy in producing music is to reproduce, without compromise, the sensitivity of the musician expressed through his or her music, and to pursue to the end artistry and quality. This ideal has widely per-

meated the Japanese market and is regarded highly by the Japanese public. Their policy closely coincides with that of ours, and this has provided the basis from which we are able to make this announcement."

Larry Rosen, co-president of GRP, said, "This agreement is the culmination of ten years of an ongoing working relationship between myself and David Grusin, and the hardware and software divisions of JVC. We are most proud to have the opportunity to launch the JVC label in North America and bring forth a wealth of musical talent and product to the marketplace. We are anticipating a minimum of 12 releases a year covering artists from all over the globe."

Distribution in the U.S. will be handled through MCA, with PolyGram handling the distribution in Canada. JVC, of course, has already made itself a presence on the U.S. jazz scene by its sponsorship of a series of jazz festivals, including the JVC/New York Jazz Festival and the JVC/Newport Jazz Festival.

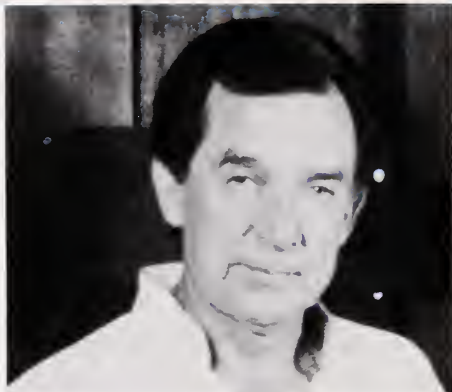

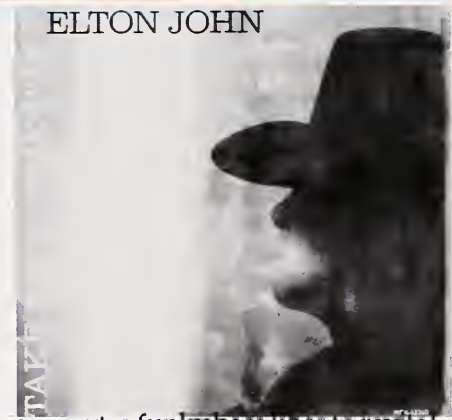

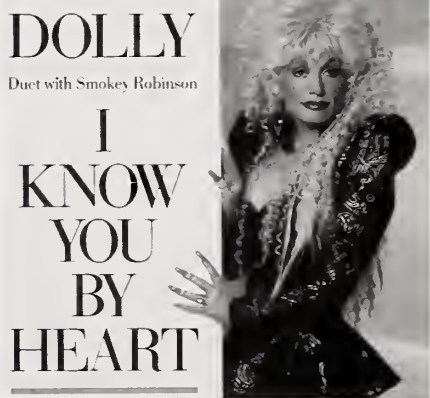

AC/DC

LOS ANGELES - There has always been something a bit ominous about AC/DC, an edgy volatility that goes beyond the sneering Angus Young's school-boy cap and knickers and the band's Third Reich-ish logo. In the seventies when Scottish-born brothers Angus and Malcom Young formed the band in Australia with lead singer Bon Scott, they were downright dangerous - all over-driven guitars and snarling vocals. On stage their legions of fans ate up Angus' head-bobbing foot-stomping antics on lead guitar. And Bon Scott's alcoholic ragings left him tottering at the edge of destruction (some say leading to his early death in 1980.) Remember how many times you saw the AC/DC logo spray-painted on walls and subways in those days? They were the bad-boys of metal, the champions of the street. At the same time, as their fame and fortune grew, among aficionados of metal, they were still considered the ultimate fun-party band, highly professional and always exciting. In 1988, the tradition continues with the release of their new Atlantic LP *Blow Up Your Video*, a no-nonsense serving of the same sort of meat and potatoes head-banging music. They're new line-up (bassist Cliff Williams, drummer Simon Wright, lead singer Brian Johnson and the Young brothers) maintains their standard of clean musicianship, consistent writing, and perspiration-flying metal.

"Heatseeker" is the first single from the new LP "Blow Up Your Video". It is produced by Harry Vanda and George Young, who last worked with the band on the *Who Made Who* album in 1986. The new LP was cut starting in August '87 at Miraval Studios in the south of France. The producers and the locale were a natural choice for AC/DC.

Says Angus Young, "Harry and George have always had that fun attitude with us and we feel loose and relaxed in their company. They also like to work fast as we do. We like to



get in there, get a sound, and get out"

AC/DC will support the new LP with a massive worldwide tour, including a homecoming - their first show in Australia in six years. Comments Angus, "There's a whole new excitement about this band these days, and there's a whole new generation of kids to be won over."

Not that it would be completely necessary - AC/DC's success is already almost unparalleled in the heavy-metal genre. The band began to gain international recognition in 1976 with the release of their first Atlantic record *High Voltage*. On the wings of triumphant tours of the U.K. and Europe, they released *Dirty Deeds Done Cheap* overseas, but U.S. distribution was passed over in favor of their first LP. (It would nearly five years before *Dirty Deeds...* would be released in the U.S. to a multi-platinum reception.) The next two years produced three increasingly successful LP's - *Let There Be Rock*, *Powerage*, and their blistering live album *If You Want Blood - You've Got It*. Through this period they toured relentlessly, building a reputation for delivering mega-energy live shows.

1979 was the year AC/DC hit the big time with the hit "Highway to Hell" on the LP of the same name. Bringing in producer Robert John "Mutt" Lange, the album is considered by many to be their crowning achievement. It was their first RIAA platinum seller world wide. Released in July, it would be only months later that lead singer Bon Scott would

LOS ANGELES - Sometimes actresses decide to pursue music... sometimes singers decide to pursue film careers... and only *sometimes* is the performer successful. Lisa Hartman can sing.

Considering her vast film and television work (most notably on TV's successful *Knott's Landing*), Lisa Hartman is known by most as an actress... Hartman is by no means another actress-turned-singer, but rather a singer temporarily sidetracked by an unexpected successful acting career.

NEW YORK - Sometime around 1983, when his rockabilly band Fin and The Sharks called it quits, Billy Roues decided to start a new band. He got together with Blackie Pagano, who'd been mixing sound for his old group, and The Broadcasters were born. The Earth didn't quite shake. So they turned up their amps. "We wanted to get into a more hard hitting sound," Pagano says.

After all, what else was there to do but play rock'n'roll? Alright, there was blues, too, and R&B, and doo-wop - all of which Roues and Pagano have performed together - but it had to be music. "This is what it life was from day one," says Roues. "I used to listen to doo-wop bands rehearsing out on the streets in Brooklyn...After too long a period of time doing your three month stints roofing, or landscaping, or working in a mail-room, down to washing dishes, that sort of stuff, I finally decided I'm either gonna make a living playing gigs, writing music, teaching guitar - I'm gonna do it with music - or just die."

Judging from the Broadcasters debut on Enigma, *13 Ghosts*, the guy is not going to just die. The album is strong, stripped down rock, bristling with power and urgency. "When we first started the record, we were shooting for an EP," explains Roues. "But," Pagano chimes in, "the only reason we started out to do an EP in the first place was because we didn't figure we could afford all the recording on a record. We had plenty of material. We had material that was burning to get out, that we just had to get down on vinyl."

Work on *13 Ghosts* began more than two years ago and was finished a year ago this past December. Wayne Kramer of the MC5 co-produced with Larry Alexander and the band. Kramer came on board when Broadcasters drummer Ed Steinburg was playing for a production Kramer was doing with Mick Farren. "We were looking for a

producer," says Roues, "and Eddie said, 'Well, I'm playing with Wayne Kramer.' I said, 'WAYNE KRAMER?!' He came down to see us at CBGB and an ironic thing happened. We enored with 'I Can Only Give You Everything,' the Van Morrison and Them song, and it turns out to be the first MC5 single back in '66. So he just said, 'We're going to record that one for sure.' We hadn't even thought of that when we did it."

13 Ghosts mixes everything from that garage band classic, to burning Stones-y two chord rock ("Down In The Trenches," "Endless Night"), to hooky updates of British Invasion pop ("A Darker Shade Of Night"). It's a roots rock record that's never confined by the past, sort of like the first Del Fuegos album. And it's filled with strong singles begging for radio play.

Roues and Pagano both write and split vocal and guitar duties. This band is overflowing with talent. And material. "Billy's got hundreds of songs. Hundreds," says Pagano of Roues. "And everybody in the band writes," Roues adds. "The president of Enigma records came out to our rehearsal and we played a bunch of new songs and he said, 'You have enough for a new album.' I said, 'We have enough for a box set.'"

her fourth LP and first for Atlantic, Hartman demonstrates amazing natural ability as a vocalist and gives us a hint to her prowess as a songwriter; *Til My Heart Stops* is a slick collection of quality pop gems that is guaranteed to turn more than a few heads. Hartman recently spoke to *Cash Box*, discussing the new album and her career.

To hear Hartman explain it, the acting came about quite accidentally, "I had to support myself and I didn't want to wait tables. I just started having a little more success as an actress and it sort of snowballed... every six months or so I would think 'wait a minute, what's going on here.' I mean it was wonderful and very flattering, but I would want to go back to the music." She's done just

that; the release of *Til My Heart Stops* marks the welcome return of Hartman to the recording world.

"I think [the album] has already started to pave a really good way for me from a musical standpoint. It's opened a lot of doors for me, I'm getting played at stations that wouldn't touch me before. I think if you make a good record, they're going to play it."

Hartman explained the creative freedom she was involved in during the recording of the album, "I was there for every track that was cut, everything that was laid. I have never been that involved in a project. I have to say that (producer) Bill Wray was very open and collaborative with me... I learned so much

"Trees of green, skies of blue, and the colors of the rainbow," stuff like that. A fond memory of life as it never was. Reminds me of all that "nostalgia as innocence" stuff on the last Tom Waits record. Weird thing is, Z100 here in New York added the song to its playlist two weeks ago. Must sound great during the Morning Zoo.

Cordell shared the writing credits with Tommy James and the late Bo Gentry.

2. APPROPRIATE THINGS CONTINUE TO HAPPEN - Tiffany, who has just signed with General Talent International, is no longer playing shopping malls. She kicked off her Spring national tour on February 12, with a performance at Disney World.

3. CHANDRA SIMMONS - She has a single out on Sleeping Bag right now, "Never Gonna Let You Go." It's got a throwaway lyric about love and devotion which Simmons croons with a tinny, lan-

guorous sensuality. It's also got a terrific mix by Mantronik. The main thrill of this pop-dance gem is its sweet but elusive hook. The only reason it's not cliched is because it's so hard to hold onto. You chase it through the song, past the hip-swaying rhythm guitar, past the sing-song electric bells, down into the propulsive bass figure, and before you know what's happened, it's got you.

4. THE HOUSEMARTINS - This ideologically minded pop-soul quartet from Hull, England, announced they were splitting up on January 12. The Housemartins considered themselves "a three year recording project," and decided to call it quits a year early. Their press release reads, in part, "In an age of Rick Astley, Shaking Stevens and The Pet Shop Boys - quite simply, they weren't good enough." Since they sold plenty of records in England, I can't figure out how ironic that's supposed to be. But there's something pathetically noble about all this, and certainly it's very steadfastly anti-cult-of-celebrity. There was also something pathetically noble about their last record, *The People Who Grinned Themselves To Death* (Elektra/Go! Discs), which buried some heartfelt personal politics beneath a deceptively charming surface, and was great. In this age of solipsistic pop, quite simply, they weren't bad enough.

5. I LEARNED SOMETHING - I finally figured out what Paul Westerburg is repeating over and over at the end of *The Replacements'* "Bastards Of Young": "make a choice, make a choice, make a choice, make a choice."

6. SPRING WILL COME TO NEW YORK CITY SOON - A cabdriver told me so.

7. SPIKE LEE'S AIR JORDAN TV COMMERCIALS - Spike Lee has directed two stylish b&w ads for Nike's Air Jordan sneakers. The big news here is the return of Mars Blackmon, the b-boy Lee portrayed in his first film, *She's Gotta Have It*. In one spot Blackmon is a sort a basketball griot, singing the praises of slam-dunk God Michael Jordan until Jordan, dwarfing the hyperactive Mars, shuts him up. Proof positive that TV ads are way more cool and better put together than most TV shows. And most movies.

8. MELE-MEL AND SCORPIO REJOINING GRANDMASTER FLASH AND THE FURIOUS FIVE - Album due on Elektra this month.

9. POPULAR MUSIC COLUMN IN THE NEW YORKER - As far as I know, this highbrow weekly hasn't acknowledged the existence of pop music since Ellen Willis's "Rock, Etc." column folded sometime around 1975. Mark Moses, critic for the *Boston Phoenix*, opens things up again with a piece on Aretha Franklin's career and her recent *One Lord, One Faith, One Baptism* (Arista) gospel double album.

American girl, Candy included cheerleading and acting lessons in her college curriculum, and began to foster a dream of stardom. Like many other young girls from all over the globe, she looked to Hollywood as the jumping off place from which she would begin her quest. Stardom did not exactly fall in her lap, and, after more than a year of working in a bank and sometimes depriving herself of life's little luxuries in order to study acting, voice and dance, she left the Hollywood dream behind to begin a modeling career in Europe.

It was while she was on the continent interviewing for Piere Cardin that she was asked to sing back-up on a recording session being produced by Alain Landry of ACA Records International. Landry was so impressed with Candy's vocal talent and style that he brought her back to America where he recorded her debut 12" single at Trax, Los Angeles.

Although Candy is well-content with her new recording career, Landry says, "Her acting career is just on 'hold.' I believe Candy has the potential to be a star in more than one area... the record industry is just the quickest and best way to introduce this talented lady to the entertainment world and the general public."

Candy has not followed the traditional road to fame so well acquainted with American vocalists. She did not grow up in the rural south or in an innercity ghetto. She did not sing in a gospel choir. She did not learn music at the feet of a guitar-strumming father or a mother who whipped up a little Chopin on a stand-up piano after dinner.

Her father was assassinated during the turmoil that resulted following the downfall of the Marco's regime in the Philippines, and she and her mother sought refuge in the United States, in the small town of Salinas in Northern California. In her desire to become an All-

The 'A' side, a Norman Whitfield production of a Billy Calvin tune called, "Wishing On A Star," which record buffs will remember as a hit for Rose Royce some ten years ago, has all the earmarks of a cut bound for commercial success. Jackson is well-acquainted with the criteria for a hit, and it's all here, from a well-chosen debut song with a singable melody line and a strong hook, to an intense and soulful vocal rendition, plus the distinctive production stylings of Whitfield, all wrapped up in radio-right length (3:52) and packaged in black-on-silver.

Jacksons Records will be headquartered in Los Angeles, with offices at 6255 Sunset Boulevard, Suite 716. The company's current staff includes Ben Brown, Executive Vice President, Marketing and Distribution and Silvie Bordeaux, Administrative Assistant. Further personnel will be added as needed to round out the promotion department.

Label pres Joe Jackson told The Independent Way that he is currently negotiating independent distribution, and is expecting to finalize all agreements within the next few weeks. Welcome, Joe Jackson... the world can always use another independent thinker.

Now that Enigma has purchased Jem Records, and as such is now the proud owner of an independent distribution system, will it let its Capitol Records agreement lapse at the end of the contract and become a mutant, an independent label with its own branches? Horse Sense & The Camellia Symphony THE HILLS OF MEXICO Kicking Mule Records (KM 340)

This highly acclaimed LP won the NAIRM award for classical album of the year in 1986. Combining the talents of Horse Sense and the Camellia Symphony, *The Hills of Mexico* gives meaning to the phrase "classical bluegrass" by integrating traditional American folk music with a "classical" orchestra.

Horse Sense is a duo featuring John Nielson on fiddle and mandolin and Justin Bishop on banjo, guitar and vocals. The Camellia Symphony, an orchestra comprised of volunteer musicians in Sacramento, California, is directed and conducted by Daniel Kingman. Kingman has received three resident fellowships at The McDowell

Colony in New Hampshire where he recently composed *The Hills of Mexico*.

The first side is a twenty-five minute concerto grosso for banjo, fiddle, guitar, mandolin & orchestra. An unusual synthesis by a rather innovative group of individuals. The composition is actually a smooth, delicate, consciously unfolding tribute to one of the oldest of American cowboy ballads. The flip side explores the same piece on "The Buffalo Skinners" in traditional vocal fashion, and on "The Crooked Trail To Holbrook," shedding yet another perspective, chamber music style.

Within these two compact disc recordings the impressive vocal talents of soprano Arleen Auger are given an excellent showcase. She is equally at home singing in the "heroic" style of the secular Italian aria as well as the sacred arias of Bach's *St. Matthew Pas-*

sion and Handel's *Messiah*. She shifts effortlessly from Italian and English text to German, her enunciation always clear and precise. With power and technique to spare Ms. Auger can negotiate the the most difficult of vocal passages, particularly in "Rejoice Greatly" from *Messiah* and "Piangero" from *Julius Ceasar*. Gerard Schwarz and The Mostly Mozart Orchestra give spirited readings of the secular arias and are appropriately restrained during the sacred selections. Because this is a chamber ensemble the overall sound is clear and transparent, resulting in a delicate balance between orchestra and soloist.

The Yale Cellos, led by Aldo Parisot, is a unique ensemble of thirty-five talented cellists. The cello is capable of great warmth of sound and a wide range of timbre and pitch; a cello choir emphasises and magnifies the instruments characteristics with striking results. Villa-Lobos' *Bachianas Brasileiras* is a series of nine suites for diverse instrumental ensembles, Suites 1 & 5 of which are scored for massed cellos. The scoring is effective in that the entire range of the cello can be heard. In addition, Suite No. 5 is also scored for a soprano. Ms. Auger has been nominated for a Grammy for her performance on this selection.

The Yale Cellos are an excellent ensemble that approach the music on this disc care and restraint, but still play with intensity and precision. Both of these discs are recommended for the listener who desires polish and virtuosity from soloist and orchestra.

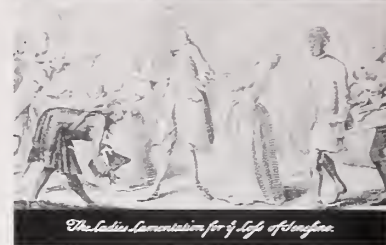
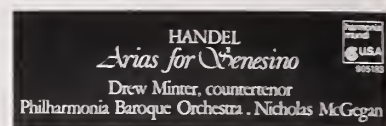

In the year 1727 J.J. Quantz wrote of the great castrato Senesino as having a "powerful, clear and sweet contralto voice with perfect intonation." In an age of vocal excess Senesino sang with refinement and discipline. On this recording countertenor Drew Minter sings eleven of the arias Handel composed specifically for Senesino with the same care and approach Senesino utilized two and one half centuries ago. Minter's delivery is

restrained and unadorned; his ornamentation is employed effectively. Likewise, the Philharmonia Baroque Orchestra, under



Nicholas McGegan, and playing on period instruments, approach the music of Handel with simplicity and relaxed splendor. This is operatic Handel as it was meant to be heard. It is unnerving to hear the male countertenor voice in a solo context on modern recordings, and although it was commonplace in the 1700's and early 1800's, one can only imagine the mesmerising effect that the heroic arias sung by the castrati had on the audiences of that time.

Bach's *Musical Offering* stands as one of the great studies in counterpoint in musical history. Based on a theme provided by Frederick the Great, Bach fashioned a collection of ricercare, canons, and a sonata da chiesa that explores the contrapuntal possibilities of the theme in various ways for an ensemble of up to three instruments.

The *Musical Offering* has been recorded in a variety of ensemble situations. On this recording we have the original scoring for harpsichords, flute, violin, and basso continuo. Davitt Moroney, Martha Cook (harpsichords), Janet See (flute), John Holloway (violin), and Jaap ter Linden (violincello) give a statley, almost reverential reading of the work. The counterpoint is clear and precise, and the overall pace is unhurried, particularly in the solo harpsichord sections that frame the sonata. For lovers of the Baroque who like authenticity in their performances these two CD's from Harmonia Mundi are a must for one's library.

Profile Selling Lots of Cucumbers

What's cool and fresh and comes from Hoboken? Well it's The Cucumbers of course. The band, not the vegetable, has been pumping out a brand of music that is as fun to dance to as it is to listen to. They combine the best pop formulas of the 60's with simple, smart lyrics that can be taken as differently as the listener themselves.

The first incarnation of the group consisted of Deena Shoshkes and her then boyfriend, now husband, Jon Fried. As far back as 1981 they were playing and writing songs together. Stalled for direction, Deena and Jon packed their bags and guitars and shuffled off to Europe. Gaining their performance chops playing on street corners in such cities as Rome and Paris, the duo fine tuned their craft. They returned to Hoboken several months later determined to build on their already strong foundation. Finally settling with drummer Yuergen Renner and bassist John Williams, The Cucumbers were ready to take on the NYC club scene.

In late '83 the band released a four-song EP on Fake Doom Records. This had an immediate impact on the popularity of the group - gaining college radio airplay while increasing their price tag around town. In 1985,

"The Cukes" would get another break by winning a regional battle-of-the-bands contest. First prize was time at a recording studio, which they used to their best advantage. The resulting six-song demo caught the attention of Profile Records who immediately signed the group. The fall release of their self-titled debut album on Profile garnered The Cucumbers immediate critical praise. The single "My Boyfriend" (the first song Shoshkes and Fried wrote together) became a college radio hit, while the accompanying video earned steady rotation on MTV. Among the more outstanding cuts on the LP are "Don't Drop The Baby," "Birds" and "Shower." At the center of these and the remaining tracks are Deena and Jon's catchy, open-ended lyrics.

The Cucumbers have just returned home from a highly successful tour of the east coast and midwest. The positive response has pushed the LP back into the College Top 40 chart and has set the wheels in motion for a possible west coast tour starting sometime in April. So if you wanna be as cool as these Cucumbers, get yourself a copy of this good time recording and keep an eye and an ear out for a possible stop over in your town.

Lewis handles a little of all of this with a lot of insight and quite an ear for how songs must have sounded when they were fiddled out on the front porch in the mellow of an August evening. 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Hollywood Rock

PRACA DA APOTEOSE, RIO DE JANEIRO - The Hollywood Rock Festival in Rio brought six top international acts and six top Brazilian names to the setting where the samba schools hold their big parade each Carnival. The Festival was a smaller version of the lendarary Rock 'n Rio and was scheduled as a complement to the now-established Free Jazz Festival. Both Hollywood and Free are brands of cigarettes for British

American Tabacco in Brazil.

Hollywood Rock ran over four nights in both Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paulo, Brazil and South America's two largest record markets, presenting a mix of three acts each night.

Night one saw the Pretenders with two Brazilian acts, one of which - an inspired Titas - managed to blast the Pretenders off the stage and set the tone for the Festival, showing just how quickly Brazilian bands have progressed and evolved technically since Rock 'n Rio, allowing them to take on the "imported acts" on their own terms.

Night two had UB-40 and Simple Minds playing with the darlings of

the current Brazilian rock scene, Paralamas do Sucesso, while night three was headlined by Simply Red and Duran Duran and night four by Supertramp.

Despite being labelled as "dated" by the Brazilian press, it was still Supertramp who drew the biggest audiences, with 60,000 in Rio and 80,000 in Sao Paulo. The group, however, to impress the Brazilian press and public the most was the least-known of the international acts in Brazil, Simply Red.

Simply Red produced as near-perfect a performance as you could imagine in Rio, Mick Hucknall's vocals stunning a disbelieving audience

who had gone to acclaim Duran Duran, who were also in fine form.

Hollywood Rock was sufficiently successful that the promoters have now got a five-year contract to evolve the event over the coming years offering an excellent opportunity to major names who would like to break and promote themselves in the lucrative Brazilian market.

As an event, it certainly appealed to the public and the bands, who seemed to enjoy Brazil's relaxed atmosphere, warm weather and the chance to exchange musical ideas amongst themselves and their Brazilian contemporaries.

Aerosmith/Dokken

THE FORUM, LOS ANGELES - The party was definitely at the Forum on the evening of January 27 as Aerosmith held court for the faithful. Seemingly recovered from the various problems that have plagued the band in recent years, Steve Tyler, Joe Perry and Co. stormed through a strong, well rehearsed set that drew on material from their earliest albums and their latest Geffen release *Permanent Vacation*.

What a pleasure to have this veteran band back in the spotlight. So

much of what is vital in hard rock today owes its existence to the ground-breaking work of Aerosmith in the 1970's. But rather than becoming a parody of itself over the years by simply performing the hits of yesteryear, the band took stock of itself after several disappointing albums, tours, and personnel shifts. The band's original lineup is, thankfully, intact; on the strength of the new album and Run D.M.C.'s rap version of "Walk This Way," Aerosmith is back to reclaim its rightful place among rock's elite.

To the delight of the near-capacity crowd, the band did perform many of its classics including "Sweet Emotion," "Big Ten Inch," and the blues standard "Train Kept-a-Rollin'."

"Dude (Looks Like A Lady)," "Angel," and "Rag Doll," all from the new album, formed the core of the show around which the older classics were anchored. The crowd's most enthusiastic response was reserved for "Dream On" (lighters and matches were mandatory for this one), and the encore. The band returned to finish up with the Beatles' "I'm Down" (with Jon Bon Jovi helping out on vocals) and the timeless "Walk This Way."

Tyler, replete in Japanese robe and tights, was in fine voice and in complete command of the proceedings throughout the show. Joe Perry was spotlighted several times for his signature guitar solos; and drummer Joey Kramer took a solo that in-

cluded some bare-handed work reminiscent of Zeppelin's John Bonham.

Opening the show was L.A.'s Dokken who tried their best to ignite the crowd. They might have succeeded had they not been plagued by murky sound and lighting, the usual problems that any opening act must deal with. Their latest album "Back For the Attack" is currently on the charts and doing well. Rather than doing opening slots, they might consider headlining at smaller venues in order to maximize exposure and have control of the concert situation. All in all, though, Aerosmith/Dokken was a fine way to begin the 1988 concert season.

Rush

THE FORUM, LOS ANGELES - Class was in session when Rush performed recently at the L.A. Forum. With state-of-the-art production, but without a hint of bombast or pretense, Rush delivered a two-hour set that included material taken from their latest album *Hold Your Fire*, 1985's *Power Windows* and 1981's *Moving Pictures*.

Since recording *Moving Pictures* several years ago Rush has achieved a level of consistency and sophistication that only gets better with time. Gone are the awkward arrangements and high pitched vocals that characterized the band's sound in the 1970's. The use of synthesizers has given a smoothness and seamlessness to the overall sound and arrangements. Geddy Lee is singing better than ever having generally lowered his vocal range. He still gets up in the stratosphere, but he picks his spots carefully and, ultimately, more effec-

tively.

Doubling on bass and keyboards, Lee led the band through fourteen songs, including "The Big Money," "Subdivisions," "Time Stand Still," "Limelight," and the classics "Tom Sawyer" and "Closer To Your Heart." The instrumental "YYZ" and the drum solo that followed was one of many instances that brought the crowd to its feet. Rounding out the show was "Marathon," "Territories," "Spirit of the Radio," and from the new album "Force Ten," "Turn the Page," and "Mission." Accompany-

ing each song was a laser and video show shown on a huge projection backdrop. "Manhattan Project" featured vintage 1940's and 50's footage of Einstein and assorted nuclear detonation sequences.

Rush's music is strong enough to stand on its own; when combined with various stage devices the result is a multi-media display that would impress even the most jaded of concert fanatics.

tragically succumb, at the height of their success. After a period of self-evaluation they held extensive auditions and found Brian Johnson. They recorded *Back In Black* with the new line-up which sold over five million copies.

The following year Atlantic brilliantly worked AC/DC's back-catalogue, releasing the five year old *Dirty Deeds Done Cheap*, which had only been available on import. The album, along with the band's entire U.S. Atlantic collections hit gold and/or platinum. By November the band returned with *For Those Who Rock We Salute You*.

After a well deserved break AC/DC returned to the studio to record another top-ten effort, *Flick of*

The Switch. 1985 saw the release of *Fly On The Wall*, and in 1986 Atlantic released *Who Made Who* which was the soundtrack for the Stephen King film, *Maximum Overdrive*. The album included new tunes produced by Harry Vanda and George Young, their first work with the band since 1978.

And finally, 1987 brought the new album, and a renewed commitment by both the band and Atlantic Records to maintain the astonishing success of AC/DC. Judging by the ferocity of *Blow Up Your Video*, their "roll" will continue.

Restriction On Live Performance In N.Y.C. Lifted

NEW YORK - Musicians celebrated across the city last week as acting Justice David B. Saxe of the New York State Supreme Court struck down as unconstitutional a city law that limited the number of musicians who could perform at clubs to three. Jam sessions proliferated, as trios suddenly found themselves able to add a drummer, horn player, or vocalist.

The law has been on the books since the days of prohibition, when it was passed to clamp down on speakeasies. Clubs without cabaret licenses could not present groups of more than three. A cabaret license requires certain zoning qualifications and an annual fee. Some club owners were unable to meet the requirements because of their location. Others were unable to afford a liquor license and a cabaret license at the same time.

It's only since 1984 that the trio restriction has been strictly enforced. Sighting potential safety problems and noise complaints, night inspectors for the Department of Consumer Affairs issued fines for having too many musicians on stage at once. Many clubs changed their booking

policies. Others shut down.

In the last three years, it was not uncommon to see a drummer or bassist sit out when a vocalist did a number. It was even more common to find quartets of any sort that simply couldn't get gigs. As work opportunities shrank, musicians and club owners often complained that the law was useless and outmoded. Today, some argued, one musician with a synthesizer can make as much noise as a full orchestra; the limit of three musicians was arbitrary.

In June 1986, two musicians and the musicians' union filed a suit charging the law infringed on performers' rights. Judge Saxe agreed, contending that the law limited musicians' right to free expression, and curtailed certain musical forms - string quartets, for instance - for no apparent reason. The number of venues for live performance, as well as the variety of performances presented, will undoubtedly increase in the coming months. Club owners have been legally unable to book any large groups - from Salsa bands to rock quartets - for far too long.

allow us to obtain tickets; the record company ignored our asking on messages left on their answering machine.

Therefore, in circumstances such as seeing a great band perform, the expense of concert tickets, or the ignorance of record companies, denies the unsung promoters such small privileges.

College radio is the guinea pig of most record companies and some of the major labels act as if they are doing college radio a favor by sending them records. College radio however, has established itself as one

of the primary vehicles for the launching of many good bands career, but it is sad to say that many artists do not even know about college radio, especially those from abroad, and that is because no one told them.

A lot of respect must be given to a few groups who are firm supporters of college radio and without apology invariably verbally recognized the tremendous part college played in making them a success. R.E.M. is an example of those bands.

SISTERS - The Sisters Of Mercy have reemerged with a new album, "Floodland," and new ideas to prevent Andrew Eldritch from ever going on tour again.

He says, "We would like the Sisters of Mercy to be a franchise like McDonald's so there could be several groups around the world singing Sisters of Mercy songs and wearing Sisters of Mercy uniforms. There are so many bands who try to sound like us anyway - The Rose of Avalon and The Fields of Nephelim for instance - that they may as well be us."

Eldritch ponders if estranged former member Wayne Hussey might set up a rival chain called The Mission.

"McDonald's and Burger King can happily co-exist," he continues, "so I don't see why different franchises of music can't do the same. In the same way that McDonald's' are slightly different all over the world so as not to alienate people, we would try to get slightly Spanish featured Sisters of Mercy for South America and perfect English specimens for Japan, because they like that sort of thing."

Eldritch commutes between Hamburg and Leeds. Leeds is an incredibly dull city, but Eldritch likes it because it is very normal, and he thinks he is very normal, and it's a good place to bring up cats.

"Cats are what really make me happy. I had one called Spiggy Topes who was wise beyond its years with a very well developed sense of humor. We used to play very elaborate games, not the usual running-around-the-room in circles."

The first single from the album, "This Corrosion" (WEA) reached the top three of the charts, which no doubt annoyed Wayne Hussey, who split from the group several years ago and is still fighting over the name Sisters of Mercy.

Eldritch says, "I never see him and I will never forgive him. The more he slags me off the better it is for me, the more at-

ention I get. It's like a reverse karma theory. His lawyers are still giving me a hard time. They still send me letters saying he wants the name Sisters of Mercy. He could never write songs, that's why he left. In a few months he will no doubt be aware that we had a hit record and I'll see a new batch of lawyers letters."

CHRISTIANS - The Christians hired Gerard du Thame to shoot what was possibly the most dangerous video this year, for their track "Ideal World," which is on its way to being a huge UK hit. The Christians, named so not because of their religious persuasion but because there are three brothers in the band with the surname Christian, and another songwriter, Harry Priestman.

The awesome six-foot-four, shaven-headed lead singer Gary Christian describes the video:

"The band was taken to the highest point in the Austrian Alps that a car could travel to. Then he sent us further up on a snowcat where the temperatures were 15 below. Louis, our guide, told us we weren't allowed to light a fire in case of an avalanche, so he built us an igloo. We had to follow footsteps already imprinted in the snow. He warned us that he often found footprints that ended for no apparent reason, which meant he had to look for a body which had fallen down a crevice. We all plagued him for dead body stories the entire time we were there."

The Christians, on Island Records, have had a series of hits from their debut album which entered the charts at number two. They are due Stateside in January - look out for them.

Tokyo News

TOKYO - The total sales of audio-visual software of 26 main record manufacturers in Japan for the first six months of the 1987 fiscal year (February to September 1987 or March to October 1987) reported \$1,465 million, up 6.4% over the comparable six months of the prior year (at \$1,377 million). High growth of compact disc with 113.9% over the previous six months was the main factor for the sales increase in this period. To the contrary, albums showed a drop of 40% from the period of the prior year. Video-software indicated 14% over the previous year and pre-recorded tape showed an increase of 4%.

According to a survey conducted by the Cash Box Tokyo office, the sales during the Christmas season and the New Year period were favorable, with 20% and 50% over last years figures, respectively. According to the configurations, compact disc showed the greatest gain, followed by pre-recorded cassette tapes. Albums, on the other hand, indicated a severe drop with only a 10% share of the total sales. Hikaru-Genji reported the biggest sales growth for the season.

The song starts off with a good hint of what's to come...fine harmony with a solid beat song. It should do well on airplay. Super choice for a new single release.

OAK RIDGE BOYS (MCA, 53272) **True Heart** (3:18) (MCA, Don Schlitz-ASCAP; Warner-Tamerlane, Flying Dutchman-BMI) (D. Schlitz, M. Clark) (Producer: J. Bowen)

New lead vocal sound is immediately noticeable. The harmony is, as usual, most appealing and perfect. The song is "choked-full" of lyrics, and *has* to keep moving right along. The quick, repeating melody does not permit the *feel* that The Oaks can give a song. Still, it's a good product and should do well for them.

Darrell and Norma not only promote together...they write some super songs together. In fact, they wrote Darrell's last single "Catch 22," which went to #57 on the national charts. Darrell also wrote "Antioch Church House Choir" in 1982. That song is now a gospel standard and has been recorded more than fifty times.

The founding member of the group, Sweetwater, is out on his own. Well, let me put it another way...He is working as a single, now. He certainly isn't on his own! Darrell Holt has captured the admiration of both country music fans and associates in the past few months. I would venture to say that Darrell has *never* been alone, because of his magnetic personality.

Very recently, I had the pleasure of a pre-release "hearing" of Darrell's new single (courtesy of Darrell's promoter Mike Borchetta). Because I write the country record reviews for Cash Box, I hear nearly every new record coming out of Nashville. It hasn't become "old hat", but it does take a super product to catch my immediate attention now days. This one caught my attention in a hurry! Darrell's new record is titled "I Can't Take Her Anywhere." It was produced by Nelson Larkin, and this great song was written by John Jarrard and Walt Aldridge. You'll find it on the Anoka label, and *find* it you must! Darrell Holt's performance is proof-positive of his outstanding vocal prowess.

When Darrell decided to go solo, Mike Borchetta was instrumental in his connecting with Nelson Larkin as his producer. Darrell says, "Nelson Larkin is a genius in the studio, and he believes in my voice. He can bring about a sound like I've never heard before!"

Norma says Darrell is very even-tempered, and very patient. "He helps me with everything," said Norma. "We have seven month old twins, and we have *nine* children between us. Their ages range from 19 to 7 months." Darrell added, "I love kids, and they love me. I know I love my music in the same way."

Well, it's not only the kids who love Darrell Holt. There is a huge gathering of fans, out there, who love him too, no doubt. Darrell Holt is a talented man with a lot of humor and charisma. I think we can begin, right here, following his climb to the top.

There are a lot of Indie label groups out there, but these guys have proven to be in the superior class. This is a good country song with an appealing tempo and strong beat. The lead vocal is wonderfully unpretentious. Excellent "harp" playing and instrumentation on a positive song theme. "SS" production...simple and strong.

HANK THOMPSON (Step One, SOR-382 A) Here's To Country Music (2:08) (Hank Thompson-BMI) (H. Thompson) (Producer: R. Pennington)

This is an up-tempo narration about the good ol' days of country music in relation to today's products. Remindful of the great Phil Harris narrations from days gone by. We would have enjoyed that famous Hank Thompson voice with a little more singing. Great fiddle, and arrangements. "The more things change, the more they stay the same," says Hank. Amen!

VETTZ (Echo, E-104) The Wall (4:00) (Ashley Erin-BMI) (W. Barker, Jr.) (Producer: K. Tolley)

Sound effects, on intro, take us right into the battle scene. Song arrangement sounds much like some Gordon Lightfoot products. This is probably the strongest of the 'Nam songs we've heard. Vocal is appropriate for the subject matter..forceful and growling out the pain of the memories. It has been said before, but it *still* needs to be said, to jar our complacent attitudes.

Buck Moore has lived in Nashville for awhile now. His first cut came during his second year of living here, when David Houston cut ten of his songs. Since then, one star after another has cut Buck Moore's songs: Tammy Wynette, Billie Jo Spears, Marty Robbins, Jerry Lee Lewis, Ray Price, Merle Haggard, Conway Twitty, Gene Watson, Hank Williams, Jr., Charly McClain, John Anderson, and T.G. Sheppard. Reba McEntire has cut three that have never been released.

Buck Moore has some of the best advice for a songwriter that I have ever heard: "Don't get discouraged, get *determined!*"

The copy reads, "you can tell a lot about a game by the people who play it" – and, as Quarterback's official spokesman Elway will be doing a lot of promotions for the remainder of the year, for both the coin-op model and the soon to come home market version.

Dateline Charlotte, North Carolina, home of Brady Distg., where we spoke with sales chief Jim Frye, who passed along a lot of positive vibes about current business. "There's a good amount of outstanding product on the market," he told us. "Manufacturers are producing equipment that is earning very well and providing operators with a good return on their investment." The current Brady hit list contains many of the pieces featured at AMOA Expo, too numerous in number to name individually. However, Jim did single out "Operation Wolf" ("Double Dragon" is also still selling strong); and Leland's "Quarterback" (which earned a high of \$501. the first week at one location, dropped to a still impressive \$352. when blizzard weather prevailed, and went right back up to a nice \$505. the third week). As Jim noted, "Quarterback" is also bringing in terrific earnings at convenience stores. SNK's "Guerilla War" is

another big mover (taking in \$507 the first week on location, dropping to \$297 the second week, again because of the blizzard, but going right back up to \$402 the third week). "Tecmo Bowl" was another piece he mentioned, noting that earnings hit \$996. the first week at a shopping center mall, dropped to \$550 during the bad weather, but went right back up to \$957. the third week. Very impressive earnings! During the course of our conversation, Jim had some choice words of praise for the unsung heroes of coinbiz – the salesmen – who are out there building credibility with their accounts. "It is the salesman and, of course, the earnings of the games that dictate the winners." Stand up and take a bow, fellas!

The Dollars And Sense Of Business Promotions - Part VIII.

By Roger Sharpe

In continuing this series for the first time in 1988, it seemed appropriate to take a much broader view in terms on how to generate increased business and offer some value-added benefits for your customer base. Regarding video games, we have previously highlighted some of the options available for economically doing a number of different activities – from tournaments to leagues and even charitable competitions that could provide tie-ins with other local merchants and organizations.

Admittedly, some of these alternatives entail a great amount of detail work and coordination in order to be successful; with the ends hopefully justifying the means. Often, however, there are natural extensions that can be utilized which take advantage of general market conditions and pose a greater opportunity for success even on a limited basis.

If nothing else, what the coin machine industry has always managed to do is reflect the trends and fads that are continually impacting society as a whole. Whether it is in the graphic treatments or thematic directions taken in the creation of various games, or the inspiration for machines to be produced, the amusement game business has always tended to closely parallel many other entertainment art forms – such as movies or the record business – as well as the prevailing current events (such as Contra which immediately comes to mind).

The games business has always attempted to capitalize on borrowed name recognition value whenever possible to the extent that trends are sometimes created as a result. One need only go back to the days of Star Wars and the resulting outpouring of space game motifs for both video and pinball machines which followed.

More current, however, especially in the world of video has been the advancement and solidification of sports theme games. The latest generation of efforts feature realistic graphics and play action that have taken full advantage of the available technology. Not so surprisingly is the fascination of the general public to sports and the preeminent position they have suddenly taken in day-to-day life.

From the media hype and coverage of the Super Bowl to the World Series, the upcoming Winter Olympic Games and weekend, national network broadcasts of the other major sports, it is a category of activity that has broad-based appeal. Even an ESPN can survive and thrive as "The Total Sports Network" with programming that runs the gamut in terms of international as well as national competitions.

What becomes intriguing in this regard is the appearance of a new phenomenon that has picked up steam in most cities and is beginning to invade the suburban areas of the country. And this is the "sports bar". Most of us are aware of these locations with their big screen televisions and telecasts of events that include everything from boxing to roe racing and almost anything in between.

They're the new singles' bars of the Eighties and the immediate attraction should be to parlay this popularity of you own operate a game room, family amusement center, bar and tavern, whatever – since so many of today's most popular machines are sports-oriented.

And this goes back to the premise of this series on promotions where we have attempted to offer some guidelines for staging events that can stimulate and increase traffic on location as well as earnings in the cash box

The suggestion, here, is a simple, yet dramatic one for re-positioning your location to the degree that you can capitalize on this societal trend. And the cost to coordinate and implement the types of programs we're going to suggest is negligible compared to your potential for increasing your exposure to the surrounding audience you're trying to appeal to.

In past installments we've discussed some examples of operators who are staging different competitions on pinballs and videos; and this is really an extension of that basic premise. Take any of your football games (such as a Leland Quarterback, a Tecmo Bowl or even an old Atari trak-ball football game) or baseball games (such as a VS RBI from Atari, a Leland Double Play or World Series, a Sega Major League or even an original Nintendo VS Baseball) and put up a sign up sheet in your location offering a league for interested players. Establish some reason, or time frame, for how long the competition will last before you go into a playoff leading up to your World Series of Super Bowl.

This might be a league of 10 teams (10 players) and a season that allows for each person to play everyone else twice of even three times. And then have a playoff with the top two finishers going for the championship.

If you have a hockey game (such as a Sente Hat Trick or a more recent Konami Blades of Steel), stage your own Stanley Cup; for golf (Big Event of even Birdie King, not to mention Mini-Golf) and bowling or basketball hold your own "Classic" or "Open."

Be creative. Be imaginative and place all your sports games in the

same general area at your location. Go out and buy some inexpensive poster boards from the local art supplies store and take a magic marker in order to keep standings and schedules posted. In essence, change part of your location into an "interactive" sports emporium where people can become actively involved.

The excitement of such an undertaking for your players is going to be obvious since you're giving them an extra incentive to play as well as a reason to come in and "practice." And the only cost back to you is minimal for the posters, sign up sheets,

some markers and maybe a trophy or two.

All in all, however, the impetus is to attract players to machines that could be the staples of your location as sports continues to dominate the spotlight. And, in the final analysis, what you're doing is merchandising your equipment in such a fashion that players "perceive" added value for the coins they're putting in, as well as a competitive incentive to keep coming back and play your machines.

Over 15,000 Attend IMA

FRANKFURT - The 9th annual International Amusement and Vending Trade Fair (IMA) attracted 15,100 trade people from throughout Europe and other world markets to the Frankfurt Fairgrounds to view the latest in amusement, vending and leisure products.

The widespread participation from all corners of the globe served to underscore the growth and development of this trade show. About 21% of the total attendance represented international visitors.

Last year's trend towards more sports equipment at playing halls and pubs was again in evidence. Equipment such as dart games, billiards and interactive electronic amusement games attracted considerable interest on the exhibit floor and a number of European and world champions in the respective

sports made personal appearances and demonstrated their skills at the show.

Due to the amusement tax discussion in some federal states and other potential intervention in this leisure arena, cautious ordering was observed for amusement equipment with gain opportunities. Ordering was essentially limited to replacement of old equipment for existing locations.

IMA '88 has clearly shown the substantial growth of interest on the part of trade visitors in company management solutions and in marketing concepts for the integration of amusement equipment in the hotel and gastronomic industries. As a general observation, it can be said that entertaining sports games at playing halls will form the focus of activities in the trade for 1988.

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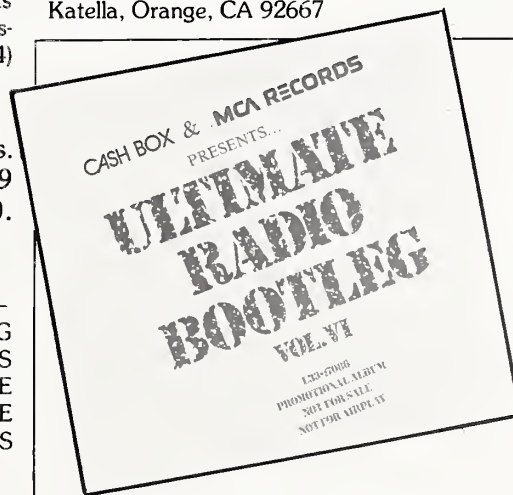
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
