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"Breathing Spell" Not Reached by Labor

IN an address before the fifty-seventh annual convention of the New Jersey State Federation of Labor at Atlantic City, which elicited the enthusiastic approval of the delegates, Spencer Miller, Jr., discussed at some length the "breathing spell" phrase attributed to Roy W. Howard, and its possible adaptability in a description of the workers' struggle toward recovery. He cited eminent and reliable authorities, taken mainly from the American Federationist, in support of his own opinion that the phrase is not adequate as a description of labor's gains, in spite of the most optimistic interpretation that can be put upon present conditions. His argument also led him to some interesting observations on the processing tax and prevailing living costs. He said in part:

"In his letter addressed to Mr. Roy W. Howard of the Scripps-Howard newspapers, President Roosevelt has indicated that the program of the New Deal is practically complete and that business may now look forward to the 'breathing spell' which it has been seeking for many months. Said he: 'This basic program, however, has now reached substantial completion and the 'breathing spell' of which you speak is here—very decidedly so.' While it is certainly true that the period of uncertainty which has been created by the experimentation of the New Deal has made business extremely anxious for a 'breathing spell,' it is an appropriate question to ask as to whether or not labor itself will be satisfied with the report that the 'breathing spell' is here.

"Let us, for example, examine the status of labor on Labor Day, 1935, as compared with that of Labor Day, 1934. The American Federationist in its monthly reports on employment gains stated in the issue of August, 1935, that 'employment gains in the first half of 1935 have been considerably below those of last year.' In the September issue that has just come from the press there appears this statement: 'Nevertheless there are more than 11,000,000 still out of work.' The Federationist further continues with this suggestive statement: 'While total employment in June was below last year by 239,000, employment in July was above last year by 87,000. Gains are too small as yet, however, to reduce unemployment for, in the twelve months since July last year, 445,000 new candidates for jobs have come into the market while only 87,000 more jobs are available in industry. Thus, in spite of the upturn, unemployment is still higher than last year; that is, in July this year there are 360,000 more who need work and cannot find it than in July last year.

Trade Union Reports Say Rise is Gaining Strength

"Trade union reports for August indicate that the employment rise is gaining strength. According to the weighted union figures, unemployment decreased from 19.4 per cent to 18.5 per cent of the membership, a larger decline than in any August since 1928. The building trades

reported a larger gain than in any other mid-summer and the building materials industries also showed an unusual pick-up for this season. Gains in clothing trades were also more than seasonal, and an unusual improvement in street transportation groups indicated that retail trade is gaining. Metal trades, theatres and water transportation also reported more at work. It appears that the August gains have been quite general throughout industry.

"The per cent of union members unemployed for August, 1934, was 21.6, those on part time, 24; for August, 1935, 18.5, those on part time 23. With the most optimistic interpretation of the figures that is possible, it is important to realize that the total number of the unemployed in the land is higher than it was a year ago when the New Jersey State Federation of Labor convened in annual session.

"In the meantime, the size of the relief rolls is alarming—16 per cent of the population dependent on public bounty. By transferring people from relief agencies to Works Progress, the men have been shifted from one Federal agency to another, but the total dependency still exceeds 20,000,000.

Living Costs Outrun Earnings

"When one comes to examine the question of wages, we discover that, while wage rates continued to rise during the first part of 1935, living costs outran earnings. In a word, as the Federationist pointed out, earnings went up 5½ per cent and costs increased 6 per cent. The Bureau of Labor Statistics similarly has pointed out that the average weekly earnings in manufacture stood at \$19.14 in 1934 and rose to \$20.43 in 1935, or a net gain of 6.7 per cent. Food prices, however, were 8.6 higher than in 1934.

"In the July issue of the American Federationist, John P. Frey, president of the Metal Trades Department, pointed out in a provocative article, under the caption of 'The Calamity of Recovery,' that labor's share in the national income was in fact proportionately smaller than it was ten years ago; that the trend of the proportion of the income going to workers has been steadily on the decline and that that whole tendency has not been interrupted. Indeed, as he observes, there has been no fundamental readjustment of the share going to labor under the recovery program, as compared with the old days of prosperity. Indeed, there has been a worsening under the so-called security wage against which labor has protested in this and every other State in the land. Thus he concludes that for labor the 'calamity of prosperity' is equalled only by the 'calamity of recovery.'

"Let us examine with a little more care another aspect of our national economy to discover the extent to which labor as a consumer is being burdened by all of the devices of indirect taxation. While it is true that in the recent tax program passed by the administration there was an unwillingness to broaden the tax base to include the people in the small income groups, it is nevertheless a fact that we do by indirect taxation what we are unwilling to do by direct taxation.

Processing Tax Becomes a "Soak-the-Poor" Tax

"Let us consider for a moment the processing tax under the Agricultural Adjustment Administration. In general labor has assumed that its economic position was independent of the farming community and that they were not affected by legislation presumably enacted for the advancement of the standards of the farming community. The processing tax is remote from the consideration and discussion in labor circles. When we begin to delve below the surface, however, we discover that the processing tax is inevitably a levy upon consumption and has in fact become a 'soak-the-poor' tax. The ultimate consumer pays the tax, whether that be levied on hogs or cotton or wheat. Bread, for example, cost on an average 6½ cents a pound before the processing tax went into effect; it now costs on an average 8½ cents a pound. While a part of this increase is due to wage increases, it is nevertheless true that the processing tax does add an indirect tax burden upon labor as the consumer, or the people in the low income group; and as the low income group represents 85 per cent of the consumer market, they pay the tax.

"In our own State the sales tax gives a very interesting illustration of the manner in which labor as a consumer bears a very unequal burden of taxation, through the rather innocent provisions of a sales tax. It has been estimated, for example, that 60 per cent of the purchases of a person with an annual income of \$1,000 or less are subject to sales taxes, whereupon a person with an annual income of \$1,000,000 pays a tax of 1 per cent per \$1,000 for sales tax purposes. The gross inequity of such a way of laying the tax burden will be obvious to anybody. Dr. Walker, a well-known tax expert, has pointed out that a tax of 1 per cent takes \$2.74 from the laborer and 8 cents per \$1,000 from the person in the high income group. Nor is this all. When a person in the State pays a tax of one penny on a 12-cent purchase, he is not paying a 2 per cent tax on sales, but in fact a tax of 8.4 per cent. A careful survey of grocery stores has revealed the

interesting fact that the average grocery purchase in the United States is 23 cents. On such a purchase a sales tax of 1 cent is a tax of 4.3 per cent. Thus it is clear that not only is the sales tax inequitable in the manner in which it lays its burden, but the percentage that it levies is also in excess of that which its proponents assert. In a word, the sales tax is a 'soak-the-poor' tax in a most aggravated form.

How Direct and Indirect Taxes Affect the People

"Years ago William Pitt, former Prime Minister of England, pointed out the relative lack of understanding on the part of labor of the realities of this indirect taxation when he said: 'If you put a two-penny tax directly on the people, you may have a revolution. But you can take the last rag off their backs and the last morsel out of their mouths by indirect taxes and you will hear only a complaint of hard times.'

"In the third place, we are in the sixth year of the depression and we have not as yet any provision for a census of the unemployed. Last spring, there was a proposal for such a census, but that has been quietly set one side, for reasons which may turn in part on political expediency. And yet from the standpoint of labor how it is going to be possible to resolve a problem, the magnitude and extent of which we do not know because we do not have the adequate statistical information?

The Position of the Wage-Earner

"In the fourth place labor is suffering from the contraction of work opportunities. As Mr. Frey also points out in his article, there has gone on a rapid elimination of workers from manufacturing industry. With the vast increase in productive capacity during this period, we find that the old problem of technological displacement which labor has faced during all these years has been greatly aggravated in its seriousness in these past months. Indeed, I quote from a paragraph in his article because I believe it is important to realize exactly the position in which we find ourselves today:

"Reports of the Federal Bureau of Labor Statistics indicate that during the two years from January, 1933, to January, 1935, the average workman's output had increased 7 per cent in leather; 13 per cent in petroleum refining; 29 per cent in crude petroleum producing; 23 per cent in rubber tires and inner tubes; 40 per cent in blast furnaces, steel works and rolling mills; 21 per cent in automobiles; 5 per cent in cement; 6 per cent in cotton goods; 29 per cent in woolen and worsted goods; 28 per cent in cigars and cigarettes; 8 per cent in anthracite mining, and 14 per cent in bituminous coal mining.

"This tremendous increase in the workman's per capita production in industry since January, 1933, would leave the country with an added army of unem-

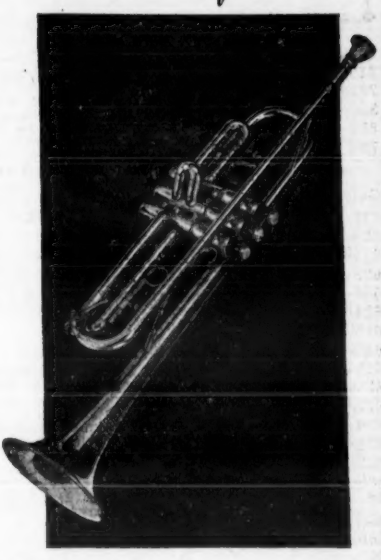



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Census of Aged for Pensions

THE announcement that the Federal Government will employ three thousand white-collar jobless to compile a national census of persons eligible for pensions under the old-age pension section of the Social Security Act brings to light certain aspects of the enormous amount of new work which the pension system imposes on the Federal Government.

The Social Security Law stipulates that the government shall assist the States in providing pensions for persons sixty-five years of age or older. The courts accept Census Bureau records as proof of age. The Federal Government has, therefore, decided to use the census records in determining the age of persons who claim pensions.

Although the Federal census is taken every ten years, it is now revealed that the 1900 census is the only one which carried both the year and the month of birth of all persons. It consequently includes a large percentage of those approaching the sixty-five-year age limit upon which payments will be determined and will be used as the basis for a national age file which the Social Security Board will require in its check list.

Going through the census records and making the age file necessitates filing the names of all persons in alphabetical order on cards with the age stated. When this is done it will require but a moment's time to ascertain the age of any person in the United States.

The age record file will be prepared in St. Louis and will require a year to complete. The wages of the three thousand white-collar workers who will thumb over the records and write the cards will be paid from the \$4,800,000,000 Work Relief Appropriation Law.

Justice for Mooney

THE reopening of the Tom Mooney case by the California State Supreme Court should mean the beginning of the end of a long and uncalled for injustice imposed on the man who is serving a life sentence in San Quentin prison for alleged participation in the San Francisco Preparedness Day bombing in 1916.

Albert Shaw, a California attorney acting as a referee for the Supreme Court, is holding a hearing on Mooney's application for a writ of habeas corpus based on the claim that he was convicted by perjured testimony.

If Mr. Shaw makes a favorable report to the State Supreme Court, that should mean Mooney's liberation. If an unfavorable report is made and the State Supreme Court sustains it that will send Mooney back to San Quentin. But it will also pave the way for a hearing on the merits of the case by the United States Supreme Court, which refused to consider it a number of months ago because of the belief that Mooney had not exhausted every resource of the California courts.

Following that ruling by the nation's highest judicial body, Mooney applied to the lower courts of California for the habeas corpus writ, which was denied. The present appeal to the California State Supreme Court is the last point in California judicial procedure suggested by the United States Supreme Court.

The shameless character of Mooney's trial in San Francisco was condemned by the 1917 convention of the American Federation of Labor, which declared that the majority of our citizens believe the conviction of Mooney was brought about "through testimony which branded some of the witnesses as perjurers and those who endeavored to procure subornation of perjury for the purpose of securing such reward as might be given to

them for their testimony." On the basis of this belief the A. F. of L. demanded a new trial for Mooney.

Judge Griffin, the trial judge, later supported the position taken by the American Federation of Labor. He said that if the truth had been told the jury and the jury had nevertheless convicted Mooney, he would have set the conviction aside as a gross miscarriage of justice. All reasonable persons drew a similar conclusion from the report of the Wickersham Commission, which very definitely showed that what the trial court accepted as evidence warranting conviction was nothing but absolute perjury.

The accumulation of indisputable data during nineteen long years warrants the conclusion that Mooney was convicted by processes which have been aptly described as "legal violence." Nevertheless the California courts have persistently refused to grant a new trial and Mooney still languishes in San Quentin Prison.

The Mooney case is not strictly limited to Mooney himself. The larger question is: Can an innocent man, sent to prison for life on what is generally admitted to be perjured testimony, be deprived of his freedom permanently by the technicalities of a State law which makes no provision for a new trial even though the irregularities and essential injustice of the original trial are beyond question?

The Supreme Court of the United States and various State Supreme Courts have many times ruled that mob intimidation destroys the due process of law prescribed by the Fourteenth Amendment. The Supreme Court of California now has to answer this question: Are not perjury and mob action equally destructive of due process of law? All persons interested in the preservation of fundamental justice in our judicial system hope that the court will answer in the affirmative and order the State of California to remove the striped suit from Tom Mooney and restore him to the liberty of which he has been unjustly deprived for many years.

Concerning Cures for Crime

THE American Legion's law and order committee has written a prescription for lessening crime.

It calls for establishment of a national crime institute, co-operation between State and National authorities, a model code of criminal procedure, a National law regulating firearms, and "continued support and development of youth activities."

That last is the only substance in the prescription which gives any real promise of curing crime. The other schemes might—or might not—curb crime, but they hardly check its development.

An enormous majority of criminals are males; and most of these got into trouble with the law before coming out of their teens. Records show pretty clearly that if a boy does not fracture the law rather seriously before he is 18 years old, the chances are strong that he never will commit a grave offense.

The boys who get into juvenile court are the raw material for the men and older boys who pass through the criminal court. Juvenile offenses in one district on the west side of Chicago dropped more than 50 per cent in one year after the opening of a boys' club in that locality. Another such club brought the lighting inspector hunting for reasons for the remarkable decline in the breakage of street lights. Crowded quarters where sections of certain streets were roped off at certain hours to serve as playgrounds showed a distinct lessening of youthful offenses.

The abolition of slums, the provision of decent places for youngsters to live and play, will prevent a large share of our crime from developing. If the Legion will turn its mind in that direction, it should get results.

Labor Queries

Questions and Answers on Labor: What It Has Done; Where It Stands on Problems of the Day; Its Aim and Program; Who's Who in the Ranks of the Organized Tolders.

Q.—What union led the nationwide eight-hour campaign for the eight-hour day in 1890?

A.—The United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners.

Q.—When was the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America organized?

A.—In 1914, at Nashville, Tenn.

Q.—Will the coming Atlantic City convention of the American Federation of Labor be the first in that city?

A.—It will be the third convention in Atlantic City. The first was held in 1919 and the second in 1925.

Q.—What charters have been issued by the American Federation of Labor this year to new international unions?

A.—International charters have been issued to unions of automobile workers and rubber workers.

Out Beyond the Surf

Where thought, un-hastened by necessity or trepidation, sometimes penetrates to truth. Here, where the shallows throw no spray, let us ponder and enjoy the lessons of the art and the work and play of life.

Why is Big Business? Why do we let 150 huge corporations control a major share of the active wealth of a nation of 130,000,000 people? Why did we allow a handful of high-toned crooks on the stock market to bring a crash six years ago whose effects are with us yet?

More and more, the American people are asking these questions; and they are getting answers, all of which contain large chunks of truth. Among those making reply is David Cushman Coyle, who was educated and practiced as an engineer before the smash, and who brings his engineering knowledge to a survey of economic conditions.

Briefly, Coyle says that Big Business exists because it has certain unfair advantages over little business.

"The notion that big plants were efficient," says Coyle in the *Virginia Quarterly Review*, "held a great vogue in the days of our folly. They were efficient, as viewed from Wall Street. The big companies could carry a more complex capital structure, and one that could be more easily milked by the wise. . . . A factory that is just large enough to swing the best modern equipment will do as good a mechanical job as can be done."

"Finance makes most of its living by riding the waves of the business cycle," remarks Mr. Coyle elsewhere, who, incidentally, says "High Finance" instead of "Big Business." He recites some of the unfair advantages of High Finance; control of prices, control of credit, control of natural resources, control of government. But not one of these things, he holds, adds to efficiency in doing the things that corporations are created to do; and if the American people want to escape Communism, they must decentralize capitalism.

Justice Brandeis has been saying much the same thing, though in gentler language, for thirty years.

It is passing strange that mankind cannot apply its experience in other matters to the problem of controlling Big Business. Nine-tenths of the history that one loves to read is the history of small countries. Athens was a little land, about the size of Rhode Island, before her fleet gave her control of some islands; and Athens produced more art, more literature, more science, more philosophy in two centuries than the huge empire of Persia produced in two thousand years.

Virginia was a one-horse colony when she produced George Washington and Thomas Jefferson. England had a Shakespeare when her population was about half that of New York City today. The cities of Italy in the Renaissance that gave the world the art of Michael Angelo and Raphael and Leonardo da Vinci were much the size of Springfield, Massachusetts, now.

Coyle holds that our big projects today are suffering from "bureaucratic narcosis," which means a poisoning from over organization. Here again, we can draw on other human experience for the sharp limits which nature has set to man's power to manage big things. Napoleon handled the little army which he first commanded so well that in that first Italian campaign, two French soldiers put an average of five Austrians out of business. But when Napoleon took half a million men to Russia, he met destruction, not mere defeat, and in the retirement, Marshall Ney held the rearguard at the Beresina with forty men.

Napoleon was probably the world's worst example of the delusions of bigness.

Ask any man familiar with railroading what were the more prosperous lines in the old days, when railroads really paid, and didn't have to borrow from the RFC. Ten to one he will name the New Haven, the Alton, the Chesapeake & Ohio. All these were small roads comparatively speaking. All were prosperous while small enough for one man or one small group of men to pay attention to every particle of the business. And all were wrecked by being thrown into big mergers and looted.

Mr. Coyle says that the laws of the last session of Congress putting the Wall Street market under public control, starting the utility holding companies to the dump, beginning social security, taxing huge incomes and inheritances, and giving the government control of banking credit, all will help to decentralize industry, and bring back some freedom of initiative. Heaven send he is right.

Local No. 6, A. F. of M., is growing old, but its vitality seems to be unbounded, and it faces the future with all the buoyant enthusiasm of youth.

On Tuesday, September 3rd, the organization celebrated its Golden Jubilee, in a manner befitting its splendid history. The occasion attracted marked attention and the San Francisco Chronicle, through the pen of Bob Purcell, depicted in colorful fashion the interesting story—and from which narration we glean some of the more salient features.

Ten charter members were given gold medals, and the night's gala affair, with the hall decorated with paintings of many of the city's historic theatres, and bartenders and old-fashioned barmaids, was conceded to be one of the most brilliantly spectacular scenes witnessed in a long time.

Mayor Rossi, Edward Vandeleur, president of the San Francisco Labor Council, and others spoke at the afternoon exercises, which culminated with the burning of the note by three of the oldest presidents of the union, Charles Cassasa, Caesar Brand and Joe Matheson.

The dean of the celebration was Isadore Franck, 88, oldest member of the union, who first began his musical career in San Francisco in 1868, and was one of the founders of the union in 1885.

"Do you remember Maguire's Opera House?" Franck asked Albert Greenbaum, president of the union. "That's where I first played in 1868. Later, the old Wigwam Theatre at Geary and Stockton streets."

But Greenbaum didn't, so he officiated at the presentation of medals to Franck and nine other members with a half-century of connection with the union. In addition, there were 76 members present who recorded more than 40 years of membership.

Among the latter group was John Allen, 621 Aggar street, Oakland, who came to the celebration in a wheel chair, with a record of 46 years' membership. Mrs. Irene Kling-Orr, who was known to the oldtimers as Irene Hamann, was another 46-year veteran.

Congratulatory communications were received from Governor Merriam, Joseph S. Thompson, president of the San Francisco Musical Association; Joe Weber, president of the American Federation of Musicians, and other leaders, as well as civic and labor groups.

Rossi paid tribute to the organization. Charles L. Bagley, vice-president of the national body, who came from Los Angeles for the occasion, extended congratulations of the national group.

Other speakers were Vandeleur, John A. O'Connell, secretary of the San Francisco Labor Council; William A. Spooner, secretary of the Alameda County Labor Council; Greenbaum; Eddie Love, secretary, and Clarence H. King, treasurer, of the union, and the pioneers.

The affair was in charge of Joe Wright as general chairman; Stephen J. Tully, honorary chairman, and E. J. McMullen, secretary. Gaetano Merola, managing director of the San Francisco Opera Company, directed an orchestra which furnished the musical program.

Four thousand people attended the evening festivities; fifteen thousand sandwiches were served, and fifty-eight barrels of amber fluid were utilized in quenching the incidental thirst of the multitude.

It was an all-day and evening affair—speeches and band concerts and lunches being the principal features. Fred W. Birnbach, member of President Joseph N. Weber's official staff, was one of the speakers. L. A. Berg is local president and Allen L. Grant, secretary.

The Local 802 Journal reports the restoration of the Symphony scale. The revision means that the weekly scale will be \$90.00 with an agreement which guarantees a minimum of one hundred men. Now that the depression has ended and prosperity has arrived a return to the original status quo is the order of the day. The Philharmonic Orchestra is a wonderful organization.

Some musical genius will some day write a symphony inspired by the glories of October.

Why is a League of Nations?

Anniversary celebrations are getting to be the fashion in Federation affairs, and properly so. Nearly every community can point to some organization which has developed with its own growth and whose members, gravitating in the direction of the pioneer class, are capable of promoting an interesting occasion. A case in point is that recently happening at La Porte, Ind., in which La Porte City Band

celebrated its fifty-sixth anniversary. A concert was played in which the program was filled largely with compositions of former band directors. The only person now living who helped organize the band is Harry Eplin, now residing in Detroit, and who still plays with the Shrine Band of that city. Among the well-known former directors appear the names of John VerWeire, P. V. Olker, C. W. Dalbey and Ira S. Loos. The present musical director is Paul W. LeResche. Our old friend, known to many national convention delegates, John P. Baer, who has been a member of the band thirty-six years, is also secretary of Local No. 421, which position he has occupied for the full thirty years of its existence. The Local still has six members who signed the original roster—Walter H. Miller, Joseph C. Smith, John K. Wise, Herbert Kliff, J. Bert Fuller and John Baer. It is the long-time stand-bys who help to attest the character of an organization and strengthen assurance of its successful future.

Philadelphia also reports better support for its Symphony Orchestra. President Romeo Cella of Local 77, in a communication to the Musician of that city, shows an increase from \$72.00 per week, to \$76.50, and for the coming season a price of \$80.00, with a guarantee of one hundred men. With such a reputation as this orchestra has long enjoyed an increase in compensation would seem to be a logical proceeding.

If the names of Boston musicians are not duly inscribed on the role of the immortals, it will not be Henry Woelber's fault. In a recent issue of the Boston Traveler we find an extended review of the artists who have won distinction both at home and abroad, and in the course of his tribute he points out—

When St. Louis wanted a leader for its symphony orchestra, she came here and engaged Zach; Baltimore did the same thing in taking Gustav Strube out of the 1st violin section; not to be outdone, Cleveland sought the services of the younger Sokoloff, who now is the general ERA music director in Washington; long before, Emil Mollenhauer had left the Boston Symphony to become conductor of George W. Stewart's Boston festival orchestra, and Boston band, which he led until his death in 1927.

Almost from the days of tender youth, these great men lived here, Boston trained, Boston reared, and all were proud of Boston. When shall we stop talking about other cities, and start bragging about ourselves a bit?

At the time of Zach's death, his Beethoven performances with the St. Louis Symphony were being discussed as models; in every orchestra in America, the "up and down" marking of violin bowings is copied after those of Kneisel; boys from the cornfields of Illinois, the coal mines of Pennsylvania, the desert in Arizona, came to Boston to study cornet with Brown, the iron man. Probably he had the greatest pair of lips ever known to a player of any brass instrument.

After Strube had written his "Cruiser Harvard" march, he had set a standard in march writing for bands which is difficult to analyze in the form of substance, originality, and solid tone.

The cultural traditions of Boston are too well established to require argument, but the cultural advances of all other sections of the country are also notable. Talent is liable to bud and blossom in most any atmosphere. The symphony orchestra idea is spreading. Musical America will eventually come to its own—"from shining sea to ocean shore."

Springfield is an interesting place to visit—with the last resting place and the imposing monument erected to the memory of Abraham Lincoln located therein it could not be otherwise.

Old-Age Pensions at 65 For Capital of Nation

Washington, D. C.—The last week in November, 1935, the needy persons in the District of Columbia who are 65 years of age or upward will be eligible to pensions, the amount of which in each individual case shall be determined by the Board of Commissioners of the District.

The law was passed by the recent session of Congress just before it adjourned and was signed by President Roosevelt.

Thirty-five States and Territories in the United States and the District of Columbia now have either State-wide mandatory systems or county optional systems of old-age pensions.

According to the District of Columbia

law assistance may be granted only to an applicant who is a citizen of the United States; has attained the age of 65 years or upward; has resided in the District of Columbia for five years or more within the nine years immediately preceding application for assistance, and who has resided therein continuously for one year immediately preceding the application; is not at the time of making application an inmate of any prison, jail, workhouse, insane asylum or any other public reformatory or correctional institution; is not a habitual tramp or beggar; has no child or other person financially able to support him and legally responsible for his support, and has not made a voluntary assignment or transfer of property for the purpose of qualifying for such assistance.

A rather drastic provision of the measure sets forth that if any "spouse, father, child, or grandchild" of a pensioner is believed by the authorities to be reasonably able to assist the pensioner, suit may be brought against such relatives to recover the entire amount of assistance provided under the law or such part thereof as the specified relative "was reasonably able to pay."

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The POLITICAL PERISCOPE

Tragedy and more tragedy stalks abroad.

With individuals and with nations we have been having a story of violent happenings.

Wiley Post and Will Rogers. Pursuing only peace, but in the ways of peace they came in violent crash to earth.

In Mexico City a deputy is killed and others are hurt, aftermath of the Calles' dictatorship.

Some Americans could have shouted that this was lack of civilization, except that four days earlier Huey Long had been shot to death in a nation which these same Americans would call civilized.

The thing called civilization has little to do with it, anywhere.

A hurricane sweeps the islands off the tip of Florida. They are called keys, though they unlock nothing. Hundreds are killed because nature goes berserk.

Across a little stretch of water that you fly in about two hours lies Cuba, where unions are outlawed unless they bow to the will of the State, and where, for a number of reasons, there is about as much repression as there ever was, although without the murderous violence of Machado.

So it seems to go. Overseas Mussolini and John Bull look at each other and they see each other across each other's pathway.

If Mussolini gets what he wants, the power of Britain must diminish.

Mussolini is not extending to John Bull that oriental greeting, "May your shadow never grow smaller."

The Italy of Mussolini, which would drive its fascism into the United States if it could, just as the Soviets of Russia would drive their communism into the United States if they could, craves empire and means to get it if possible.

Great Britain, having all she wants, dares not lose any and if the bootheel kicks the apple cart hard enough the British lion will lose more than its tail. So Britain has to take its stand—and there you are.

Listen to the other nations of Europe as, no longer able to duck the issue, they take their sides.

The stage is set for conflagration on a huge scale.

At this hour anything can happen and most prophets think it will.

The horror of 1914-1919 has faded away.

If the worst happens we shall hear slogans by the mile—but they won't mean what they say.

In a different kind of sphere, a great many employers of our own country are declaring new war on labor, heedless of the labor which declares great new rights to labor.

Power never gives up. Possessors of power want more power.

Autocracy, tyranny, despotism—these do not yield willingly and intelligently to the onward marching legions of democracy.

And so, after all of the ages of experience, the world still swings back and forth between contending violent forces, to be battered and bruised.

And meanwhile it remains peculiarly true that if freedom is to live in this world at all, here on this continent is its home and its hearth.

If this nation cannot grow and move onward in freedom and with democracy, then the world goes to the rulers. That is something for Americans—and American unions in particular—to think about.

ployed in the manufacturing and mining industries, if we should return to the per capita production of the year 1932.

"But I would emphasize, as has Mr. Frey, that the trouble is not in the increased per capita production of our industries, but rather in the question of the distribution of the income this creates. It is in the face of this fact that labor may properly raise the question as to whether the 'breathing spell' which the President has promised to business is at the same time a period of relaxation on the part of labor from the objectives toward it has set its face.

"The reply to this question is to be found in the words of Samuel Gompers who, when asked about the goal of labor, replied in these words:

"What does labor want? It wants the earth and the fullness thereof. There is nothing too precious, there is nothing too beautiful, too lofty, too ennobling but that it is within the scope and comprehension of labor's aspirations and wants. We want more school houses and fewer jails, more books and fewer arsenals, more constant work and less crime, more leisure and less greed, more justice and less revenge—in fact, more of the opportunities to cultivate our better natures, to make manhood more noble, womanhood more beautiful, and childhood more happy and bright."

To The Point

The union card stands for collective bargaining and the union label stands for collective buying. Use both of them.

The union label is an eternal strike against low wages, long hours and unfair conditions.

Judges may enjoin unions, but they can't get out an injunction against the use of union labels, shop cards and buttons.

Put a bigger "kick" in collective bargaining with a 100 per cent solution of collective buying under the union label.

Getting out of the depression has a bad effect on everybody's constitution.

The union label, shop card and button are perpetual boycotts against unfair employers.

Take no stock in anything that does not bear the union label.

Don't allow any merchant to hand you a "package." See that the goods are marked with a union label.

Union workers spend approximately 140 million dollars a week. Just think of what would happen if every one demanded union-made goods and union services!

The unions are not the only ones which have jurisdictionary disputes—Witness Ickes and Hopkins!

The jobless do not care whether the alphabetical initials are W-P-A or P-W-A; they want W-O-R-K.

When you buy of merchants and patronize business places which display the union label, shop card or button you hit the most sensitive nerve in the system of the unfair employer.

The Cherry Tree

Where with our Little Hatchet we tell the truth about many things, sometimes profoundly, sometimes flippantly, sometimes recklessly

Observe the Liberty League lawyers.

A powerful committee of "big name" attorneys, sitting in judgment on laws which have not yet been passed upon by the courts.

What a holy show.

Not because the laws are necessarily good, or because they are necessarily constitutional. They may not be good and they may not be constitutional.

It's a holy show because it is Big Business rallying to the defense of its gold and its claim on more gold.

It turns out that the guiding lights in the Liberty League committee of big shot lawyers are the lawyer for Weirton Steel and the lawyer for United States Steel.

Of course, these gentlemen are in quest of the pure truth and, of course, they cannot possibly have any other interest! Being retained as they are, how could they?

Why, we might as well assume that J. P. Morgan and John D. Rockefeller themselves have no interest in these laws except the purely academic interest of wondering whether the courts will uphold them.

Old Joe Cannon, in the days when he held the tightest reign on the House, never was more detached in his interest in what happened than are these gentlemen of the bar.

Black Jack Pershing was no more interested in seeing that the war was won in the interest of even-handed justice than is this law outfit.

Bless them, all they want is to see that the scales of justice don't tip—anyhow, that they don't tip the wrong way for them.

Of course, there is more to the whole show than shows on the surface.

There generally is.

Here is a point that the League lawyers don't tell about. Every lawyer is an officer of every court in which he is entitled to practice.

Every lawyer is bound, by the code and by the law, to uphold the law. To seek to tear down the law is to violate both.

Any lawyer may take the case of a party who alleges injury and he may seek redress for that client, under the law, not against the law.

Every Liberty League law committee member engaged in tearing down these laws by declaring them invalid in advance of court action may well enough be violating the Bar Association code of ethics—and that shows what can happen to a code of ethics when great interests are at stake.

Of course, no one will suspect that the most powerful corporations in the country have banded together to fight the Wagner-Connery Act, under the guise of a lawyer's committee devoted to the almost spiritual job of finding out how the law squares with the Constitution.
