
PEPPERS SERVED PAPERS: The Red Hot Chili Peppers face a

John Madden Football '93—commentary by the big guy himself

John Madden Football '93 (Electronic Arts, for Genesis)

Like Bo Jackson, Electronic Arts knows football. This sequel does nothing to dispel that reputation. Game play, animation and digitized scenes make this game a strong contender for best sports game available. Sticklers for real football details should be satisfied with the sheer number of teams, plays and options. There are a number of subtle improvements that make game play even better than John Madden '92, plus the big guy's voice provides the commentary.

Star Fox (Nintendo, for Super NES)

Nintendo's most hyped game of the year, so far, but *Star Fox* lives up to its considerable buzz. At the heart of this space-adventure shooter is Nintendo's new Super FX chip. Technically speaking, this is a mini-computer built into the cart itself which allows designers and programmers to create games with polygon animation, texture mapping and light source shading.

What all this techno-babble means is you get to see real 3-D graphics on the TV screen. The chip makes the high-

speed calculations needed to see not only the front of objects, but the unseen sides as well, which you'll eventually see when you fly over or around them.

In Star Fox, players assume the role of a fox—namely Fox McCloud—the leader of a band of animals. McCloud must protect the animals' planet against an evil ape who has been banished to a distant planet because of some nasty experiments. Star Fox not only looks great, the FX chip adds terrific music, excellent sound and true-to-life voices.



Road Avenger—futuristic fun

Road Avenger (Renovation, for Sega CD)

This one's set in the future. Highways have become a nightmarish hell, with roving bands of murderous gangs ready to attack anything on wheels. You are part of a special task force empowered to restore safety to the roadways. Renovation has done a great job with the graphics for Sega's CD system, particularly the 30 minutes of animation, which runs like a movie. The sound effects and music are great and add depth to the overall enjoyment of this nine-level game.

Jerry Granville's Pigskin Footbrawl (Razorsoft, for Genesis)

Here's a realistic, true-to-life football game that die-hard pigskin fans shouldn't miss—NOT! In fact, if you do enjoy football games, run, don't walk, away from this title, which has as much to do with real football as Michael Bolton does with true soul.

On the other hand, that's not to say the game isn't fun. Taken as a mindless mix of black humor and violence, *Pigskin Footbrawl* can be amusing before becoming repetitive, as the graphics and sound quality are both quite good. Game control, though unique, is mediocre. Some of us are going to shell out money for a football game and wind up disappointed. That the game features coaches bribing the refs should make endorser Jerry Granville, a real football coach, very popular next season.

Our expectations might have been too high, but Risky Woods is a mediocre game, though the idea is cool. While the graphics and music are okay, the poor control is a drag.

Bomberman '93 (Turbo Technologies, for **Turbo Duo)**

When NEC was still manning the controls of the TurboGrafx-16 platform, the original Bomberman was one of the few games we enjoyed on that system. The good news is, it's even better for the Duo.

New levels, mazes and power-ups fuel the fun. Players must find the best spots to plant bombs which will eliminate boulders and enemies. Drag some friends over, though. Bombing, like misery, loves company, and the best way to play Bomberman is via the fiveplayer Turbo Tap adaptor.

Double Dragon 3 (Flying Edge, for Genesis)



Tired of cowering as you walk through the streets of the city? Quiver with fear no more, since a quick visit to the Weapons Shop is all that's needed to arm yourself with swords and nunchakus. Players either go solo or take a friend along to even the odds as they search the world for the mysterious Rosetta Stone-no, not Sharon's sister but an ancient granite thing that helps decipher hieroglyphics. The game play is very good, and the graphics, particularly some of the foreign-country backgrounds, are quite striking.

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NEW ALBUM AND YES, NEW **TOUR FROM**

E.M. starts rehearsing for an album and tour this month in its hometown of Athens, Georgia. By August preproduction on the followup to Automatic For The People should commence, with a tentative release date of late 1994.

The tour will be R.E.M.'s first of the decade. Its last two albums did not receive the sales boost of live performance. Still, 1991's Out Of Time went Number One, a band first; last year's Automatic For The People moved twomillion copies.


The melancholy spin of Automatic. with its mandolin swirls and love dirges, may also prove more departure than trend. Sources say guitarist Peter Buck is writing fast, noisy songs. We may be witnessing the genesis of R.E.M.'s biggest phase yet.

That's me in the spotlight. - "Losing My Religion" (Out Of Time)

John Michael Stipe, 33, was born in Atlanta and lived nearly everywhere, as army brats do. "I had an unbelievably happy childhood," he told Rolling Stone last year. Young Stipe tuned into the words of beat poet Jack Kerouac and journalist Tom Wolfe. At 17 he formed a punk rock cover band in St. Louis. He also fronted a noise band called 1066, after the Norman Conquest, his favorite year in history. Stipe credits "bad sinuses" for his unique singing tone.

Episcopal Church on Oconee Street. It was cold, leaked, harbored stray dogs, and someone's grave lay under the floor. But it was a great place to throw parties and form a band. Stipe enlisted his school buds, Mike Mills and Bill Berry, on bass and drums, and on April 5, 1980, R.E.M. played its first gig. The letters abbreviate Rapid Eye Movement, a characteristic of dream-state sleep, though the band just liked the way "R.E.M." sounded.

An independent single, "Radio Free Europe," enjoyed limited release in 1981. The sound was instantly recognizable, from Buck's supple guitar jangling to Stipe's bullhorn whine and haunting melody. Before long R.E.M. landed aboard I.R.S. records, which relaunched the song to greater success two years later. Like di*Stipels*, the band's college following worshipped its first records: the *Chronic Town* EP, *Murmur, Reckoning, Fables Of The Reconstruction* and *Lifes Rich Pageant*.

Once, Stipe even ghost wrote a press release pointing out that his *Document* song "Welcome To The Occupation" urged the U.S. out of Central America.


"When something that's considered secret and wonderful is revealed to the world, it becomes a little less wonderful," Stipe once told *Spin* magazine. *Document* became the band's first platinum album, and contained its first top-ten single, a ballad called "The One I Love." What would have stirred glee in the hearts of other bands was eating at R.E.M.'s. Going mainstream, they feared, would betray their college roots. What's more, the whole genre was prone to infection from this exposure. *Alternative?* critics would have every right to ask. *Alternative to what?*


But money did not drive R.E.M., and its followers scraped beneath the pop veneer to find the band's sincerity intact. They even forgave the group its contract with Warner Bros. records in 1988, when it was decided that I.R.S. could no longer provide adequate promotion overseas.

Leave the road and memorize this life that's passed before my eyes. — "Find The River," (Automatic For The People)

News of a new tour is a surprising development in the R.E.M. camp. Neither *Out Of Time* nor *Automatic* were supported by a concert trek; both sold well. In salad days Stipe swore that R.E.M. would never play a gig for more than 12,000 people. The band's year-

long assault on hockey arenas in 1989 not only broke his promise, it proved exhausting. Although no details have been announced, a repeat of the *Green* tour is not expected.

R.E.M. seems to be enjoying a "Sgt. Pepper" phase, during which energies primarily focus on studio work. "On tour you're kind of limited to what you can do with a three-piece band, whereas in the studio the possibilities are unlimited," observes John Keane,



owner of the Athens studio where R.E.M. does its preproduction work.

R.E.M. regroups this month in its own private rehearsal hall. By August Keane expects to see the group ready to record. "The way it works is that Peter, Bill and Mike come in and put down instrumental tracks of song ideas," Keane says. "They put it on a cassette tape and give it to Michael, and he takes it home and rides around in his car listening to it. Then he comes up with lyrics and melody lines."

Buck is said to be writing livelier songs for the new album. "I know he wants to get a little more noisy," Keane says, "to get away from the acoustic sounds and a little more into distorted guitars."

Fans can look forward to at least two more R.E.M. albums before the band retires. Buck and Berry once made a pact, of which they're often reminded, to break up the group on New Year's Eve 1999, after a big party. With some of the most beautiful background screens of any game available, Ecco The Dolphin is a real treat for the eyes, and the game play holds up to the standards set by the visuals. Ecco's friends and family have mysteriously disappeared in the wake of a violent sea storm. In an effort to find them, players must use their wits to solve puzzles and avoid dangerous obstacles and foes. 



all 'em dumb. Call 'em stupid. Say they're cheesy. Say they 're idiots. It's nothing they haven't called themselves. But don't say Ugly Kid Joe are just a flash in the pan.

For the second time in less than a year, the shorts-wearing, rad California dudes are blitzing the charts, the media, their shorts (you name it, they're blitzing it), and demonstrating once again they're anything but America's least wanted. You surely recall a catchy, happy-but-hateful ditty called "Everything About You," their top-10 single from last year. The song sent Joe's debut EP, the sometimes-goofy, sometimes-funky, and other-times-metal-ly As Ugly As They Wanna Be flying out of record stores faster than you can say "I'm rich! I'm famous! Ha, ha, ha, eat your hearts out!" When all was said and done, the EP raked up multi-platinum figures and earned the Kids a place in the trivia books with the highest-selling debut EP ever.

In what seems like deja vu, the Ugly dudes are doing it again. Unless you're in suspended animation, just try getting away from their hugely popular remake of Harry Chapin's folk-rock classic "Cat's In The Cradle," at last count positioned at number 13 with a bullet on *Billboard*'s singles chart. The song's off the Kids' full-length album debut, *America's Least Wanted*, already gold and a hairbreadth away from platinum. If Joe's a flash in the pan, then it's an awfully bright flash.

Things weren't looking so rosy at first. Released back in September, *America's Least Wanted* got off to a slow start.

"We'd make a lot of jokes about it," says guitarist Klaus Eichstadt, "like, 'You guys, guess what! We're number 96 on Billboard, with an anchor!'

"We kind of thought it was funny 'cause the record company was so into the sales and money. So we're sort of into the fact that we didn't do so well because a lot of people at the record company were so confident that it

would sell a lot of records right out of the box."

For a while, it looked like our budding stars were about to join such renowned goofballs as Rick Dees and His Cast Of Idiots (remember their *unforgettable* number one hit from 1976 "Disco Duck"?) and The Pipkins (who scored big with 1970's timeless smash "Gimme Dat Ding") in one-hitwonder palooka-ville. But Harry Chapin and his cat came to the rescue just in the nick of time.

"We really didn't push this song," says Eichstadt. "It was almost sort of by popular demand 'cause all these radio stations were playing it anyway. So we said we might as well make it official and release it as a single."

So what prompted a bunch of irreverent loons known more for their high jinks than their sensitivity (you might recall singer Whitfield Crane's ejection

from Graceland last year when he was caught mooning by the pool) to redo a heartfelt ballad about a too-busy dad and a neglected son?

"It's the first song I ever remember hearing," says Crane. "I used to listen to it with my sister when I was a little kid. It's a beautiful song and it's got a beautiful message to it, and pretty much a whole generation of people have never heard it."

On another level, the song hits home even deeper for the singer. "Well, I haven't seen my dad in fifteen years," he says matter of factly.

The Kids' version also hit home with former Chapin drummer Howard Fields. "We got a letter from him," Crane tells. "It said the song sounds great, and if Harry were alive to hear it, he'd be smiling. And that was a real good vibe to receive that."

Before Ugly Kid Joe, there was Ozzy, Judas Priest and AC/DC-just some of the bands Klaus and Whit headbanged to in suburban Palo Alto, California. The two bonded after an eighth-grade dance. "I was pretty anti-social, so I was going home alone," recalls classmate Klaus. "I was riding home on my bike and I heard this, 'Hey!' It was Whit, and he goes 'You want to smoke a joint?"" The two played together through high school, after which Whit departed to Santa Barbara. There he found himself in a band with drummer Mark Davis. Under Whit's incessant urging, Klaus came down to join the pair in February, 1990. After sifting

through 90-somewhat bassists, the band found its ideal low-end man in Cordell Crockett. Guitarist Dave Fortman, a Louisianian, replaced Roger Lahr in April, 1992.

Like their debut EP, America's Least Wanted features a diverse crop of songs, everything from funky stuff to country to folk and lots of metal. There's plenty of typical Joe humor, like "Neighbor," about how the life of Mr. Average-Suburbanite is disrupted when a family of smelly, rowdy slobs (sort of like the Oscar Madison clan) moves in right next door. "Panhandlin" Prince," about homelessness, is more serious. If the album sounds a bit more polished, that's because it was recorded in two months, rather than six days like the EP, and was tracked by veteran producer Mark Dodson (Anthrax, Judas Priest).

"We were a bit nervous in the begin-

ning," admits Eichstadt, "because we knew we didn't have enough material for a full album, and that we had about ten days to get those few more songs together. But everything turned out for the better."

Except for the recording of *America's Least Wanted*, the Kids have been touring practically non-stop since October '91, including a club tour with fellow wackos Scatterbrain and an arena trek with Klaus and Whit's all-time metal hero Ozzy Osbourne. At first, Eichstadt couldn't help feeling a bit tense. "I used to puke a lot before we played, a lot, especially on the Ozzy tour," he chuckles. Having eternal prankster Ozzy terrorize Joe performances didn't help.

"He screwed with us on the tour," Klaus laughs. "He would throw stink bombs at us on stage. We'd be up there playing and we'd go, 'What is that

smell?' And there's Ozzy throwing things like a little kid. At first we were all worried about it 'cause we thought that means Ozzy hates us. But [the guys in his band] said 'No, that's a total sign of affection.' So it was like, 'Whew!' We're calling home [in mock dork voice] 'Yeah, Ozzy threw a stink bomb at us. Yeah, he likes us. It means he likes us.'

"What he started doing later is, right before our set was over, he'd go into our dressing room and throw in a stink bomb and split. And we'd come in all sweaty, you know, right off the stage, go into the dressing room, where all our towels, all that cold beer, all our Gatorade and all that stuff is. And we'd have to wait in the hall till it aired out, and we'd go, 'Ozzy's a jerk!' Once, we were in there, and the door just opened and whoosh, a stink bomb comes flying in and we see Ozzy running off.

"So we started getting wise to this.

We realized we'd better lock the door. One time he tricked us 'cause he knew we were wising up to him. He sent in this older really innocent-looking man, who was like the janitor or something, to knock on the door. So we're like, 'Oh

shit! It's Ozzy!' So Billy [crew member] opens the door just a teeny little crack. He looks and he goes, 'Oh, it's just this older dude.' He opens the door and boom! Right behind him, there's Ozzy, and he threw a stink bomb right over the guy's head. And we go, 'Damn!'''

A more annoying peril was the flap raised by several large record chains regarding the album cover to *Ameri*ca's *Least Wanted*, which pictures the band's scruffy little mascot (Ugly Kid Joe in all his cartoony flesh, the same dirt bag from their EP) posing as none other than Miss Liberty, holding a porno mag in place of our hallowed Declaration and flipping the bird to the red, white and blue. Seems the chains thought that dirty little finger would be a bit too much for America's conservative minions. So the album was released with an alternate, morewholesome-but-protest-oriented cover depicting our oppressed little beer-guzzlin' lowlife-bound, gagged, chained and with the offending finger hacked off.

How does Whit feel about having his artistic freedom impinged upon? "I don't really give a shit" he says with typical devil-may-care panache. "Oh, I'm such an *artist!* I'm real artsy. I wear a turtleneck and drink cappuccino."

Irreverent right down to the very end. Or is he just a dope? You decide.

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
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




ARRESTED DEVELOPMENT TAKES HIP-HOP ONE STEP HIGHER

by Gary Cee 'e're uplifting the era of hip-hop, says Head liner, the 25-year-old DJ Southern peace rappers, Arrested and instrumentalist for Development, "in the hope that the hip-hop community accepts it, the people accept it. the radio, the media, whoever."

They're accepting it alright. The two million folks who plunked down their bucks for 3 years, 5 Months & 2 Days in

the Life Of ..., AD's debut, can't be wrong. Nor can the fans who are pro-Pelling AD's new Unplugged CD up the charts. Nor can the glowing critics. many of whom found a place for AD's debut in their 92 Top-Ten lists. And don't forget those two key Grammy awards; the year's best rap group was also named best new artist. That's never happened before.

The group itself is clearly not in a

state of arrested development. Speech, their 24-year-old lead vocalist, says the band is so named because "too many of us, and certainly too many of our so-called leaders, seem to be struggling along at the level of weasels or donkeys. I take it to be a massive, Worldwide case of arrested development." That's exactly what the band is out to change. AD raps (and sings)

about racial oppression, the homeless, teen parenthood - social issues close to the heart. And they're the first rap group since the Funky Four Plus One to include men and women. Now comes the Lollapalooza III tour,

set to kick off some thirty-plus dates on June 18th in Vancouver, and Arrested Development will bring their Life Music" - a congruous mix of rap. jazz, reggae, funk, sampled instruments, even interpretive dance-to an eight-act bill that will also include hard alterna-rockers Alice In Chains and Primus, How are Speech (Todd Thomas), singer clothing designer Aerle Taree (Taree Jones 20), drum mer Rasa Don (Donald Jones, 24), dancer Montsho Eshe (Temelca Gaither, 18) and spiritual advisor, the sexagenarian, Babe Oje gearing up for 1993's biggest tour? We cornered Headliner (Timothy Barnwell) in Hamburg, Germany just hours after another invigorating AD celebration-that's what they call their performances

and bounced a few questions off him. How long ago were you asked to join Lollapalooza? The latter part of January or so. It was something to think about for

awhile. I can't wait. I hear there's some pretty interesting things that happen.

They've got side shows and all types of things goin' on. We've heard Arrested Develop-

ment will always go on third in the day. Is that right?

You know, if we're actually up that early, I think I'd like that, personally, cause it would give me a chance to see what's happening at these side shows. I've heard about some bizarre stuff. But I thought we might be headlining.

Are you revamping the act at all for the tour?

I think we're going to change the actual concept of the stage show and do things on a more theatrical edge, to express the music more better.

Theatrical edge? Are you adding skits?

Yes—skits, the works. We're progressing. I don't think for one second that Arrested Development wants to stay in the same vein that it was in '92.

Tell us how the group prepares for a "celebration."

Well, first we have our little moments of humor. Over here in Europe, we frown at the food or whatever, things of that nature. Then we finally get geared up for the actual prayer before the show. And then we celebrate.

What kind of advice does Baba Oje dispense?

He's our spiritual advisor, but he acts

more like a father figure to the group. Decisions that we can't seem to come upon, he steps in and simmers everything down. With seven people in the band, you have seven different personalities and attitudes going on, 24 hours a day.

For instance, we were undecided about our clothing, and we were bickering back and forth with Taree about the actual styling. So he came forth and said, chill the emotions, make a decision, you all need to wear your own clothing, and get that stuff out of the way because we have a performance to do. All this arguing doesn't make any sense.

Where are you from?

I was born in Fort Dix, New Jersey, but I was raised in Savannah, Georgia and Hilton Head, South Carolina.

Is that where you met Speech?

I met Speech in Atlanta. I moved from Savannah to Atlanta and I went to the Music Business Institute. I was in the first quarter and he was going into the second quarter. We met in the cafeteria. We started talking cause there was a flyer posted on the wall asking for DJs to audition for a group. We started out as friends.

Is he your best friend now? Oh yeah.

Does Speech write all the raps?

Yeah. Speech is our key lyricist. We both come together and do things on the musical edge, come forth with the actual sampling or whatever.

Was Arrested Development your first group together?

No, it was a group called D.L.R., Disciples of a Lyrical Rebellion. We were very rebellious but we weren't speaking about anything conscious. All of

our tunes were basically party tunes, a get-up-and-jump-around type thing.

We went from D.L.R. to a group called Secret Society. We stuck with Secret Society for a year, and then we moved into Arrested Development.

Do you hear this line a lot: "I'm really not into rap music, but I like your group?"

Yes, that happens all the time. You can't expect a person who's not familiar with something to automatically like it. It's got to be something they'll hear repetitiously so it'll absorb into their systems and they can feel the vibe.

Does it blow your mind that over two-million people in America have bought your album?

Yes, it does. When we first started out, we weren't expecting to sell more than forty or fifty-thousand copies. That was our ultimate goal. But our label understood where we were coming from as far as our concept.

We're based in the South. We're not like the rappers in New York. In New York, they talk about screeching cars and how busy things are. It's not busy in Atlanta. It's very laid back.

Has the group made a pledge to never use profanity?

Yeah. Well, we've made a pledge, but promises and pledges can be broken. But I don't think we'll ever get to the point where we're that profane.

The song "Mr. Wendal" is a touching rap about a homeless man. Was it written about anyone in particular?

There's a guy in Milwaukee that Speech had met, but his name wasn't Mr. Wendal. It's a fictitious name, but it's about a character who actually exists.

In "Tennessee," Speech talks about being severely oppressed. He travels to Tennessee to re-discover his native roots. You must meet people who are tremendously moved by this song.

We were in Manhattan, about a halfblock away from the record label. This was when "Tennessee" first came out. There was a guy in this restaurant who kept looking at us. Finally, his friend came over to the table and said, My friend is very nervous. He doesn't want to come over and talk to you. His reason for staring at you so hard is, he was in the hospital. I think he was on his last legs of life. And he said that he bought him the tape of "Tennessee." The song, I guess, inspired him to heal himself spiritually. From that point on, we knew the song was going to be somewhat of a success for us, and a success for the people. That was a good feeling

In "People Everyday," Speech is in the park with his girlfriend when they're accosted by a gang. He asks

the gang to lay off, but they persist. Finally, Speech has to "take the brother out for being rude" and the cops break it up. So sometimes you have to fight violence with violence? Is that the message?

Yes and no. In the song, we're giving off two different mentalities. We're giving off the mentality of a nigger and a nigger is not one of color. A nigger is one of ignorance. It's also giving off the mentality of someone who's aware and understands oppression. In many occasions, a person is out with another person, maybe it's a white and a black. Certain things come about and you have to ignore it. But sometimes it gets to be physical and you have to defend yourself. The woman's not going to do it, unless she is as strong as you are.

Can music really effect social change?

Of course it can. Music is a universal law in its own right. People listen to this music and there's certain things that stimulate them. If you have two of the same vibes going on at the same time, musically and lyrically, it does affect a person. But it all depends on the person in general and how they're going to filter it into their system, how they're going to regurgitate it out and how he disciplines himself to absorb the music. What is the "Life Music Foundation"?

It's based out of Milwaukee, Wisconsin. It's a paper that gives you an indepth approach on Arrested Development and how the tours are going on with us in and outside of the States.

Where does the group get all the cool duds?

Sometimes we get them from Taree. For the last couple of awards shows, we got our clothes from a store called Paragon in Atlanta.

Last question. You're a rap band who uses lots of samples. You'll be on the *Lollapalooza* tour with Rage Against The Machine, hard-line antisamplers. Might there be a conflict?

Oh I don't think so. We're not looking forward to any conflict, even though our whole album is based on samples. There's only two live instruments, an actual guitar, and something else, I can't remember. We're not looking for any fight.

Okay, Headliner. We'll see you this summer.

HOW TO PLAY LIKE

erosmith has rocketed back into the limelight with its first album of the Nineties, the scorching *Get A Grip*. Much of the band's trademark sound has always stemmed from that neverending supply of cool riffs called Joe Perry. Perry cuts to the chase with hook after devastating hook and a gutsy, rhythmic solo style deeply rooted in the blues. If you dig Slash, check out the guy he got it from.

A Boston native, Joe Perry honed his skills playing covers on the local club circuit, in many bands featuring bassist Tom Hamilton. These early groups saw Perry playing tunes by his heroes The Rolling Stones, Deep Purple, Yardbirds and the MC5. Perry and Hamilton joined Aerosmith in the early 70's.

A big Led Zeppelin fan, Perry shares with Jimmy Page a knack for unforgettable E minor pentatonic riffs. *Example 1* shows his intro to "Love In An Elevator." The scale (E,G,A,B,D) with Bb passing tone serves as the basis for this piece. Perry's big, grinding breakdown from the same song is shown as *Example 2.* It demonstrates Perry's flair for the dramatic. The chromatic movement and heavy swing make this a real head pounder.

Perry's rhythmic flair, always more accentuated than his flash, informs many "less is more" riffs including the one in "Walk This Way," a truly classic song. *Example 3* is the intro riff. Again, the E minor pentatonic scale is at work here. Perry takes a funky approach on the verse from the same song *Example 4*. The notes here outline a C mixolydian scale (C,D,E,F,G, A,Bb).

Perry's respect for the solo stylings of Jeff Beck contribute to his kick-ass lead style. When Perry wants to—and it's a rare pleasure when he does—he can take you on a wild ride with a blazing solo. Fast and agile, Joe can give you the feeling he's on the edge and out of control. *Example 5* is the first lead break from "Walk This Way." This solo illustrates a great blend of spontaneity and control. This time he uses the C minor pentatonic scale (C,Eb,F,G,Bb) with good use of the Gb passing tone.

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UNCH WITH A DINOSAUR JRR.

he publicist had supplied ample warning. "He doesn't do many interviews, and he never does them over the phone. He doesn't really talk much, you know. Writers usually come away hating him. And he'd like you to meet him at his chiropractor's."

J Mascis (say it MAS-kiss, and spell his first name with a simple J) has been singing and playing a mean guitar for power trio Dinosaur Jr. since 1985. If you've heard the ultracatchy "Start Choppin'" or "Out There" from their latest release, *Where You Been* (their third for Sire/Warner Bros.), then you're well aware of J's distinct vocal delivery. The laconic, stone-faced Amherst, Massachusetts native barely sings above a groany mumble, although he's never off-key. And he talks in the same exact manner. Imagine Droopy Dog without a night's sleep.

J was barely audible during a recent MTV interview. "It was a challenge," says audio engineer Howard Pearl, who had a difficult time balancing the sound level between the quiet J and the ebullient VJ Kennedy. "We heard he doesn't like to move his lips. Kennedy would ask him a question, and he'd just stare into the camera for about ten, fifteen seconds before saying anything. Until they started talking about soap operas. He loves the soaps."

J loves soaps, skiing, four-wheeling, record collecting, record *producing* (he recently called the shots for indie rockers Tad and ex-indie rockers Firehose) and most of all, his Fender Jazz-

guitar?

master. J's searing eccentric solos reminiscent of Neil Young's—are the meat and potatoes of Dinosaur Jr.'s blistering sonic assault. J's drummer's name is Murph, and bassist Mike Johnson joined a couple of years ago, after the group lost Lou Barlow to the band Sebadoh.

Tendonitis in the arm has brought J to Dr. Cindrich's office today. "This guy is awesome. He's Cindy Crawford's chiropractor, you know," J says in that soft voice as we make our way to a Greenwich Village coffee shop.

J orders a tuna sandwich and a side of pancakes before the tape recorder rolls. Throughout the entire forty-minute lunch, he never removes his ski cap or down jacket. But he's extremely cordial. Turns out we could've done without the publicist's warning.

So what's the J short for?

My dad's name was Joseph. I'm Joseph Junior. They used to always call me J and that's how they taught me to spell if.

Did you teach yourself how to play

Yeah. I had drum lessons and stuff. I played drums when I was little.

Did you learn the chords first?

Nah. I used to just play along with the Stones or something. I probably never would play chords. I knew the basic ones, but I could never do barre chords. They're hard and they hurt my hand. I'm just interested in playing solos.

Tell me how the band got its first record deal, with the independent Homestead label.

Well, Gerard Cosloy, who ran it, I went to school with, at U Mass in Amherst. He left U Mass to go do the Homestead thing. He was kind of managing the punk band I was in when he was at Amherst. Band called Deep Wound. He managed us a little bit. It's not like we had much to manage.

He had this label so we formed a band. It was weird cause we just made the record (*Dinosaur*, [Homestead], 1985) pretty much right after we formed. We sent it to him and he put it

out. I thought it was a really bizarre sounding record.

And the next thing you know, you're on college radio.

No, that record didn't do anything. The next record (You're Living All Over Me, [SST], 1987) was a lot better.

When did you and Murph start playing together?

Right after high school, first year of college. Murph was in high school with me. He was in another band. (All White Jury), but he was more into partying. He wasn't that into music or the whole punk-rock scene goin' on.

What did you listen to in high school? Peter Frampton?

I hate Frampton.

J Mascis, singer and ace guitarist for Dinosaur Jr., talks shop over tuna and pancakes.

But what about "Show Me The Way"? You guys used to play it a lot. You even put it on a twelve-inch.

I loved Humble Pie (Frampton's former band). I listened to that.

Did you get into the Boston scene? Like what?

The Lyres? The Neighborhoods? Nah.

What about Mission of Burma? Remember the song "That's When I **Reach For My Revolver''?**

That was a big hit. I saw 'em a couple of times. They were horrible both times. But everybody says, those were the worst shows you saw. The first show I ever saw was J. Geils and Ian Hunter.

Ever see an Aerosmith show?

Yeah. I went to a really bad one in the Jimmy Crespo days. Horrible. Mother's Finest opened for them. They were better than Aerosmith. You know, Joe Perry is God.

I went to a Kiss show, without makeup. It was brutal. It's like, put it on-where's Ace?

Let's talk about your new record and the first song, "Out There." When you sing the chorus, "I know you're out there...," are you thinking about a woman?

Oh I don't know, man.

You don't know?

I just write the songs. It's not up to me to tell you what they're about.

But something was on your mind hen you wrote those words. when you wrote those words. Sure.

So when you sing "I know you're out there," you're not necessarily thinking about a woman?

Could be. All right.

We just finished the video for that song. We did it in Whistler, Canada at a ski resort. It's just all these freaks. There's a really bizarre vibe through the whole thing. This is the only video we've made that I liked, really.

(J's distracted by the restaurant's background music: Eric Clapton's "Layla," the Unplugged version.)

I hate this song. Acoustic "Layla"? God help us. It's a travesty, a sham. It's bad enough he plays these tunes, then he goes and desecrates one of his songs that was halfway decent.

Would you like to do an Unplugged?

So I could do "Layla"? Sure, I don't care. I'll be on TV, whenever.

You've been on David Letterman.

That was cool. That was the highlight of our career, for me.

Back to the new record, your solo on "Get Me" is especially beautiful.

Is it a first take or did you labor on it? I only play, like, three takes. Can't play after that. If you don't get it, you can go back to it on another day.

How long did it take to record the whole record?

Just three weeks. We mixed it several million times, though.

Why does it take so long to get the mix down?

Because there's infinite possibilities, mind-boggling. You can do *anything*. There are so many possibilities. You try to limit them as much as you possibly can.

Your last three releases have had that same distinct handwriting on the covers. Is that your writing? Yeah.

What about the cover art on Where

You Been? Did you draw the picture of the hitchhiking, gun-toting alien?

No, that's Angry Johnny. He has a band and he does all this art stuff. He's like a punker.

When was the last time Dinosaur Jr. played in America?

Last summer, we played two shows with the Cure at the Rose Bowl.

You weren't really touring then, were you?

We were recording at the time.

You must have been offered a lot of money to do that show.

Not offered; we demanded it. Not initially, but it seemed so bizarre, us playing the Rose Bowl. Stadium rock, check it out.

We played in England a few weeks ago. It was the lamest crowds we've ever had. The energy wasn't coming back from the kids, and they're all so young. I don't know, something about the climate these days.

J, do you remember a band on the SST label called The Descendants? You remind me so much of them.

I loved them. They turned into All. I think they still play, but the singer was the best part, Milo, and he's not in the band anymore.

The Descendants were a big influence on us; they're like heroes of ours. They were poppy and accessible, like Nirvana. I always thought, somehow, they could be huge. Just wasn't the time, I guess.

After Nirvana's success, does your record company say, hey kid, can you give us another "Smells Like Teen Spirit''?

Sounds like Sony, but our label is totally different. We can do whatever we want. But Nirvana does make them think that maybe we can sell records.

BON JOVI FINE-TUNES TO THE NINETIES

EAST RUTHERFORD, NEW JERSEY

emember the Eighties? Jon Bon Jovi will never forget 'em. Everything the New Jersey rocker touched turned to platinum: the Number One singles, four huge albums and a string of music videos that still seem to be on eternalrotation on MTV. The band sold an astonishing 30 million albums worldwide.

Hard work was how they got there, but by the decade's end, the non-stop touring had taken its toll. When the world tour behind 1988's *New Jersey* album finally played its last show, the


Bon Jovi band—Jon, guitarist Richie Sambora, bassist Alec John Such, keyboardist David Bryan and drummer Tico Torres—was burnt out. They had turned into luggage. If they wanted to move, you had to carry them.

"When we hit that last chord," Sambora remembers, "it was like, whoa, we're finished. We were on a marathon for *four years*. It took months to get clear-headed again. People had just kept telling us to get back on the road. And we were kids, we kept on going and no one ever said, man, you guys are a mess.

"And we were. We were able to get it together for those two hours on stage, because of that tremendous feeling

that was happening in the audience. But for the other twenty-two hours of the day, we were zombies."

So the band took a breather. Jon scored the soundtrack for the motion picture *Young Guns* and scored a Number One single with "Blaze of Glory." Richie recorded his first solo album,

the overlooked Stranger In This Town. David scored the soundtrack for Netherworld. And the mainstream press spread relentless break-up rumors, even as band members insisted they were still very much a viable group.

November of 1992 saw the release of *Keep the Faith*, album number five. Rock fans wondered if the band could still pack a punch. After all, Nirvana and Pearl Jam were the rockers riding the top of the charts. Was there still interest in a guy who lived on a prayer, was born to be your baby and was wanted: dead or alive?


Sure is. *Keep the Faith* had a slow start on the charts, but now seems to be settling in for a lengthy run. And tonight at Meadowlands' Brendan Bryne Arena, there's not an empty

seat in sight when Bon Jovi hits the stage at 9:20 p.m. with "I Believe," *Keep the Faith's* lead-off track. These are the same five men who sold out this arena on New Year's Eve, 1986, but this year's Bon Jovi is a leaner, meaner outfit. Jon's even ditched the capes, scarves, hats, and glitter for black leather and what appears to be a snakeskin jacket. Not to mention the shorter hairstyle. "I believe we're still worth the fight, you'll see. There's hope for this world tonight." Jon doesn't have to convince this audience of anything, especially the teenaged and twenty-something women who shriek at every pelvic move he thrusts their way.

"Wild in the Streets" is next, followed by Jon's first spoken words of the evening: "Hey, Meadowlands. It's good to be home! Long time no see!"

Jon Bon Jovi sang only five of the new songs off 'Keep the Faith.' The balance of this homecoming was devoted to his greatest hits.





And now this reviewer just can't help thinking about **Brooooce. Spring**steen played this arena's first concerts in 1981, and as sure as there's gambling in Atlantic City, you can bet that Jon and Richie caught a few Bruce shows at this very venue. Jon talks a bit like the original Jersey devil, walks like him, too. He points the mic into the crowd and they sing along. Even "Wild

This is a show even Mom would love.

in the Streets'' brings Springsteen's "Out in the Streets" to mind. But that's not a bad rap. If Jon's going to cop a few moves from anyone, let it be Bruce.

"You Give Love A Bad Name" and "Born to Be My Baby" keep the crowd on their feet. Then Jon brings the mood down with a beautiful a cappella reading of Elvis Presley's "Can't Help Falling in Love" before easing into the current single "Bed of Roses." If power ballads are dead, no one's told this crowd who sing along to every single word.

Video screens embellish "Blaze of Glory" with clips from Young Guns. Then the band displays its virtuosity with the longest song Jon's ever recorded "Dry Country." Richie shines in his spotlight guitar solo, but the drum and keyboard solos should have been left back at the Fast Lane nightclub in Asbury Park. Torres and Bryan's musical exchange borders on boredom.

Medicine" bring the proceedings back up to speed. Jon strolls down one of the wings that extend into the orchestra's first ten rows and the girls are going w-i-l-d. Unable to control themselves, a few at a time somehow get past security to hop on the bandstand and grab Jon's hair, Jon's jacket, anything they can get their hands on. It's a funny sight, especially when Jon looks back and waves at his band. Lucky guy.

After the first encore, a fired-up medley of the Beatles' "Slow Down" and "Shout" (two that Lennon and McCartney didn't write), Jon and Richie strap on the acoustics for a powerful "Wanted: Dead or Alive." The best song of the night, Bon Jovi's *sig*nature, it paints the New Jersey Five as a band of roving outlaws and somehow pinpoints what the group is all about at the same time. From here, the hits just keep comin'. A spirited "Livin' On A Prayer" is followed by a "special dedication tonight," "Never Say Goodbye"

The 1993 Bon Jovi show might not be a raucous night of rebellious rock—this is a show even Mom would love—but the two-hour set is worth every cent of the admission price. Pundits can write that pop metal gets deader every day, but with a bit of fine-tuning, Bon Jovi is still a force to be reckoned with.

ALTHOUGH EVERY COMPONENT IN

a drummer's kit is important, a great snare drum can influence how a band sounds. Snare sounds range from the radio/MTV-chummy sound of Def Leppard's Rick Allen to the thunderous crack Vinnie Paul uses to drive Pantera's awesome aural assault. Many factors can influence a snare's sound, including diameter, depth and shell construction (i.e.: thickness and materials used). Consequently, there are many available snares for the snaring out there. Here's a look at some of the finest...

Darwin's snare evolution

Darwin's Performing Artist snares have evolved to offer an extensive range of dynamics, attack and response. All the manufacturer's shells are aged, six-ply maple and are kept thin for maximum attack, resonation and tonal color. Snare beds are cut for the most activated wire response with the least degree of annoying buzz. A lacquered 6.5" x 14" model goes for \$445, a covered model for \$395.

DW goes to the Edge

Drum Workshop (DW) calls its new series of Edge brass/wood snares a revolution in design. The series features a three-piece shell. Top and bottom are heavy-gauge brass, the center section is 10-ply flame maple. This construction is designed for exceptional live sound. Tommy Lee of Motley Crue, Joey Kramer of Aerosmith and Rikki Rockett of Poison all currently use Edge snares. They're available in 5", 6" and 7" models and come standard with brass-plated hardware.

Ludwig's Power Piccolo (\$375) offers the high-end crack of traditional piccolos with the body and depth of a standard-sized snare.

New piccolo will flip your Ludwig

Ludwig introduces a new concept in Piccolo snares, the Power Piccolo LX-557-XXN. This 6" x 13" drum has a sixply maple shell and offers the high-end *crack* of a traditional piccolo, with the body and depth of a standard-size snare. A P-85 snare strainer with tape attachments offers a secure and easily adjustable strainer mechanism. Ludwig classic-style double tension lugs are standard, as is a classic natural maple finish. Retail price is \$375.

Mapex strikes snare apex

The MS480H (\$559) from Mapex is a solid maple 8" x 14" snare with hightension "freedom" lugs for maximum tightening, die-cast hoops and an adjustable butt and throw-off snare strainer. Also from Mapex is the 3.5" x 14" piccolo snare (\$229). This solid steel number is similar to the MS480DH, except that the hoops are power hoops, not die cast.

Pearl's gem

For 1993 Pearl releases the MMX-5114D Master Custom 6 and the MBX-5114D Master Studio, 6.5" x 14" drums sharing the following basic features: 10 lugs, a traditional strainer, 1.7mm steel rims, Remo-coated Ambassador batter. Remo Ambassador snare head, and a 4-ply 5mm shell with a 4-ply 5mm glue ring. The difference between the pair is the shells; the MMX-5114D's is 100-percent maple, the MBX-5114D's is birch. The MMX has a rich, full sound with great attack; the MBX is brighter. Colors for both include black mist, piano black and liguid amber. The MMX-5114D retails for \$425, the MBX-5114D for \$399.

King of Slingerland

Slingerland's Radio King snares have been bashed by name drummers for generations. These one-piece, bent sugar maple drums are hand-crafted in America to the original 1938 specifications. 5.5" x 14" (SRK 210) and 6.5" x 14" (SRK 221) models atre available. Both include chrome-plated steel, stick-saver hoops and cream lacquer, black lacquer, red violin or natural maple finishes. Suggested retail price for each is \$600.

Sonor the better

Sonor introduces two new Symphony snares, the SY 1407MS (\$1525) and the SY 1405MC (\$1,220). Depths on both these brass-shelled babies reach 7.25" and 5.75", respectively. Die-cast rims, 10 tension rods per side, a Sonor calfskin batter head, Sonor SD medium snare head, tubular style tension lugs and a snap/lock tension rod system come standard. Due to the inherent properties of brass, both these snares offer outstanding response and great projection.

Tama panorama

A good, all-around size for a snare is probably 6.5" x 14". This model would have the projection of a narrower snare along with the warmth and presence of deeper drums. Having settled on dimension, Tama offers a plethora of materials for you to drum on. No fewer than six different models of 6.5" x 14" Tama snares exist, from the steel shell RS106 (\$169.99) to the maple shell AW526 (\$549.99) and the brass shell PM326 (\$549.99). An AW526 can be found in the kit of Metallica's Lars Ulrich.

Yamaha spruces up

Yamaha's 25th Anniversary 5.5" x 14" snare is constructed from a unique combination of spruce and maple to enhance resonance. It also seeks to eliminate unwanted harmonics. An allnatural shellac varnish gives the drums excellent sustain and dampening from the shell is kept to a minimum thanks to a small, brass-plated strainer system and brass small-body lugs. Its die-cast hoops remain stable in even the most high-pitched conditions. Interested? It's \$725.

DEAN DELEO OF STP, AN AXE TYPE THING


EVERY NOW AND THEN A HARD

rock band seems to come out of nowhere and grab the nation by the ear. The most recent example is Stone Temple Pilots. By cleverly combining melody, metal angst and the grunge sound, their brilliant single/video for "Sex Type Thing" carved a deservedly deep niche for the band. Rock's history book will surely feature at least a paragraph on this California quartet, in the chapter on hot rookies alongside Pearl Jam and Alice In Chains. Bets are good the writeup on STP will eventually number pages and pages.

Dean DeLeo began playing guitar around the age of nine. He learned his first few tricks, like many of us, with a Mel Bay chord book and a \$50 acoustic. Early inspiration arrived via Kiss, the Beatles, Jimi Hendrix and especially Led Zeppelin; Jimmy Page was why Dean got into playing Les Pauls.

As much as he enjoyed playing guitar as a youth, Dean never really took the instrument seriously until he was asked to join STP by his brother, Robert, the band's bassist.

Below is a transcription of the highly infectious riff to "Sex Type Thing." As you

can see, it's played solely on the low E string. The scale is E minor blues (E, G, A, Bb, B, D). To add extra balls to this already mondo riff, brother Robert's bass plays it.

Also, if you listen carefully you'll hear that Dean duplicates the riff an octave higher on a different track. This is shown in the transcription as the *Guitar 2* part. The next time you're doing some multitrack recording or just jamming with another guitarist, try this on some riffs of your own. This idea can add tonal depth and color to a riff.

COMESS: WHAT THE DOCTORS ORDERED

THE SPIN DOCTORS ARE A strange, trippy ride back to a time when the blues jam reigned supreme. Behind the grinding whirl of funky hits like "Little Miss Can't Be Wrong" and "Two Princes" sits Aaron Comess, a tight R&B drummer who helps give the Spin Doctors their unique, groovy tilt. Let's check out his meaty chops in "Little Miss."

In the intro and verse groove, Aaron plays the piccolo snare on "3&", "4" and "4&," beginning in Bar 1. He crashes into Bar 2 on "1," supported by his kick. The snare keeps the "2" and "4" beat, the high hat sounds eighthnote timing, accenting down beats. Bars 3 and 4 represent a two-bar phrase that repeats three times.

The final bar shows the fill into the verse. Aaron's high hat plays on "1", "1&", "2" and an accented "2&". The kick sounds on "1" and "3" and the snare on "2."

In *Example B*, the solo groove, Aaron crashes in on the "1" of Bar 1 and goes to slightly open quarter note high hat rhythm. The snare keeps "2" and "4" throughout, and the kick plays a two-measure phrase on "1", "3", "3&" in Bar 1, and on "1", "3", "3&" and "4&" in Bar 2.

Bar 1 of *Example C* shows an openquarter high hat. The kick falls on "1", "3" and "3&", the snare on "2", "4", "4E", "4&" and "4A". In Bars 2 and 4 Aaron goes to the crash cymbals, supported by quarter-note triplets on the kick. In Bar 3 Aaron crashes in on "1" and plays an open high hat on beats "2" and "3". His kick falls on "1", "3" and "3&". The snare sounds on "2", "3E", "3A", "4', "4E", "4&" and "4A". I've also notated a little fill, featuring a great tom sound on "4&" and "4A".


Example D, the outro, repeats a two-bar phrase. Aaron is back with a quarter-note high hat phrase, playing "2" and "4" on his snare. His kick here is on "1", "3", and "3&" in Bar 1, and on "1", "3", "3&" and "4&" in Bar 2.

Coverdale/Page is not just another cheap Led Zeppelin ripoff. Coverdale/ Page is *the* Led Zeppelin ripoff.

Not much on the debut album from legendary guitarist Jimmy Page and ex-Whitesnake singer David Coverdale is very different from your old Led Zeppelin albums. It's all here: the bluesy crunch riffs, the odd rhythms, the mystical grooves, the booming Bonham-like drums, right down to the *Presence*-like cover art. But for the brazen rehash job that it is, it's pretty darn awesome.


Page hasn't sounded this good in may years. His solo on "Don't Leave Me This Way" is a masterful showcase of emotional bluesy playing that may just equal his timeles solo on "Since I've Been Loving You." Coverdale's tough multi-ranged howl is at its soulful best. He resorts to the occasional Plant-ism, but he does it with so much conviction. And a good deal of the songs are as fine as anything Page did with Zep. Especial knockouts include: "Over Now," a seductive hypnotic-groove thing like "Kashmir"; "Whisper A Prayer For The Dying," a dramatic and heavy number about neat stuff like war and oppression; and "Easy Does It," so nething dreamy and mysterious a la Friends."

Cover lal 3/Page may not mark the rise of the Zeopelin phoenix, but it's the best one could hope for in this life.

Kiss/ Alive III (Mercury) 0 0 0 (

On Alive III, their third live (and 25th overall) album, Kiss rocks with as much sheer joy and gusto as in their halcyon days of old with guitarist Ace Frehley and drummer Peter Criss. Recorded during the legendary hard rockers' recent *Revenge* tour, they sound exceedingly muscular throughout. Drummer Eric Singer and bassist Gene Simmons keep the bottom planted firm as a Redwood. And guitarist Bruce Kulick's solos are con sistently spine-tingly.

There are a few yawns here and there (like the generic ballad "Forever," and "I Was Made For Lovin' You," Kiss's pathetic late-70s disco take), but just try sitting still through "Deuce," "I Love It Loud" or "Detroit Rock City." (Warning! Do not listen while riding public transit. You might be committed.)

Album number four and Primus is still the weirdest band on earth. Who knows what remote corner of the cosmos Les Claypool gets those deranged herkyjerky bass runs from? But whatever perverse bit of left-field noise or dissonance Claypool and fellow madmen guitarist Larry Lalonde and drummer Tim Alexander pull out of their sizable musical hats, the result is brilliant though totally surreal -like some ornery sound from a whacked-out bizarro universe. Pork-y highlights include the impossibly spasmodic "My Name Is Mud"; the bumblebee-from-hell psycho rocker "Welcome To This World"; and the demented eightminute instrumental "Hamburger Train." Plenty of fizz in this soda.

Dinosaur Jr./Where You Been (Sire/Warner Bros.)

Dinosaur Jr. is a very eccentric-sounding power trio. With their contorted wallof-distortion guitars and melodic vocal hooks, the band sounds something like a psycho Nirvana. The pivot is its slightly off-center singer/quitarist, J Mascis. There's a pain-filled intensity in Mascis's Neil Young-like whine-it seems like any second he might just start crying. And his guitar solos walk a tricky tightrope between dissonance and melodiousness. The result is an album with a

weird, deformed beauty and a raging, though not in-your-face, power.

Buffalo's Goo Goo Dolls play power pop with an aggressively punky edge. The three-piece band keeps the energy meter pinned to the breaking point on its fourth album, which features fourteen hard-hitting, highly-charged songs. Short, fast and not too complicated is their gospel. Add loud guitars, smooth harmonies, a rhythm section solid as Clint Eastwood's jaw and melodic vocal hooks that grab you like a Vulcan death grip, and you've got a Goo Goo Dolls album that might drive you gaga.

School Of Fish/Human Cannonball (Capitol)

Whereas School Of Fish's self-titled debut album aimed at hypnotizing you, their second seeks to rock you. Their sound, with its Beatle-esque vocal harmonies and swirly, distorto guitars, is still firmly rooted in Sixties British psychedelia, but Human Cannonball is rougher and more aggressive than their more polished debut. True, nothing here reaches the magical, mesmeric intensity of the first album's "Three Strange Days." Still, songs like "Complicator," "Take Me Anywhere" and "Fuzzed and Fading" pack enough hooky melodies .

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
