## JOHN RAVENCROFT NAMED NEWS DIRECTOR OF WGN RADIO AND WGN TELEVISION

JOHN RAVENCROFT has been named News Director, WGN Radio and WGN Television 9.

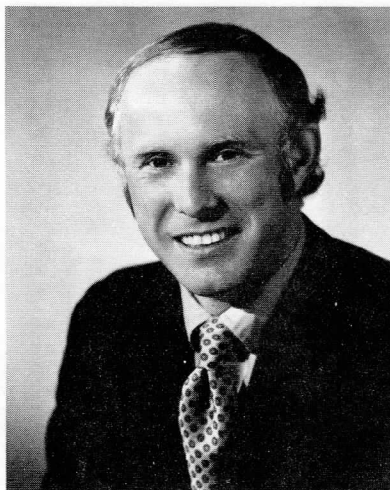
JACK P. JACOBSON, vice president and assistant to the Director of Broadcasting, WGN Continental Broadcasting Company and WAYNE R. VRIESMAN, Station Manager, WGN Radio, made the announcement.

Ravencroft, who has been the Assistant News Director since February, 1977, succeeds Mr. Vriesman, who received his promotion last month.

Ravencroft joined WGN News in 1970 as a writer-producer, coming from WHBF, Rock Island, Illinois, where he was that station's television anchor man.

In 1973, he was named Executive Producer, with responsibility over all television news programs. Under this supervision, WGN Television garnered two state Associated Press Awards; one for "best 10 PM Newscast" and the other for "best spot coverage."

A native Chicagoan, Ravencroft received his Bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of Illinois in Champaign. He is married to the former Judith Neal; they have a son, Christopher and a daughter, Hadley.

Rothers attended Grove City College in Pennsylvania, where is majored in electrical engineering, then served four years in World War II with the Naval Air Force in advanced electronics.

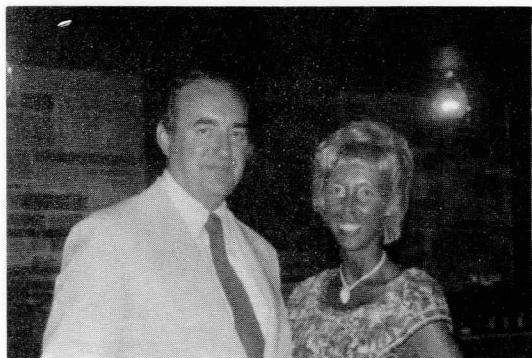
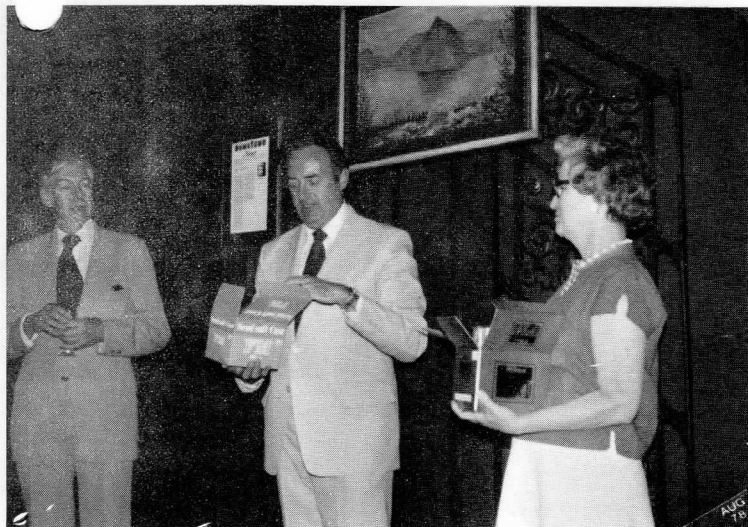
He is a member of the Society of the Cable Television Engineers.

Ed and his wife, Karen, have recently become parents of twin boys -- TODD AARON and ERIC JOHN, born on August 1st.

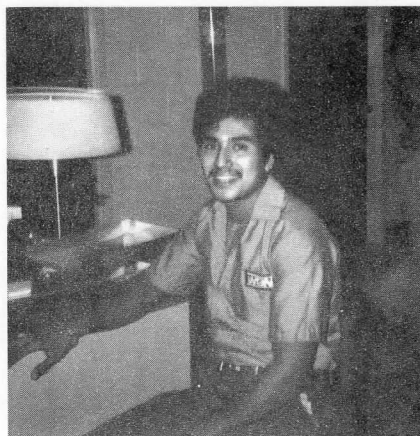

## WGN-TV TO TELEVISION BUD BILLIKEN DAY PARADE

### 49th Annual Pageant First Time Ever on TV

For the first time in its 49-year history, the "Bud Billiken Day Parade" - Chicago's largest - will be televised live on WGN Television Saturday, August 12, from 10 a.m. - noon.

WGN's Merri Dee and Floyd Brown will be on hand to commentate the annual pageant, that travels south on Martin Luther King Drive from 35th to 51st Streets.

In addition to more than 40 floats and 28 marching bands, Randy Jackson, youngest member of "The Jacksons," will lead the parade with this year's King and Queen. Other celebrities include: Berlinda Tolbert of CBS-TV's "The Jefferson's." Sam Greenlee, author/producer of "The Spook Who Sat By The Door;" Brunswick recording stars, "The Chi-Lites;" and actor/singer/dancer Rudy Lowe of "A Chorus Line," to name a few.

The Bud Billiken Day Parade, one of the most outstanding in the nation, is designed to encourage and motivate young people. The name Billiken was taken from the Chinese legend of the "Billiken," guardian angel and patron saint of children all over the world. L. C. Harper, editor-in-chief of the CHICAGO DEFENDER in 1923 selected the name for his publisher Robert S. Abbott's "brain-child," a youth organization. Since then Bud Billiken has become a symbol of hope and inspiration for hundreds of thousands of children.

Parade sponsors for the telecast are: Illinois Bell; Johnson Products Co.; Continental Bank; Jewel Foods; Chicagoland McDonald's; Coca-Cola and Church's Fried Chicken.

## CARL J. MEYERS, WGN BROADCAST PIONEER, DIES

CARL J. MEYERS, 76, former vice president and manager of engineering for WGN Continental Broadcasting Company and one of the nation's foremost broadcast pioneers, died on July 29 in St. Joseph's Hospital in Elgin, Illinois, following a long illness.

Meyers retired from WGN in 1967 after 42 years with the company, then served as a consultant to WGN until 1972.

In 1966, he was presented the National Association of Broadcasters' Engineering Achievement Award, the industry's highest such honor, primarily for his worldwide recognition as a color telecasting authority.

His innovations in the early days of radio engineering were numerous. Meyers' remote circuit design was responsible for initiating sports and special events pick-ups by WGN, including the Indianapolis 500, Kentucky Derby and political conventions. He also pioneered in early recording techniques for syndicating radio network programs which WGN originated live in the 1930's.

One of Meyers' most outstanding achievements was his development in 1929 of two-way radios for police cars, which not only brought law officials from all over to study and duplicate his system but proved to auto manufacturers that radios in private cars could also be practical.

During World War II, as a Commander in the Navy, Meyers worked on secret aviation uses for radar, television and guided missiles. Upon his return to WGN, he devoted full time to the development of television research, a project he had begun in 1927. His numerous technical developments and component designs soon became standards for the industry.

He is survived by a son, CARL JACK MEYERS, the director of Central Scheduling for WGN Radio and WGN Television; a granddaughter, Leisa; a brother William; and a sister, Alice Cunningham.

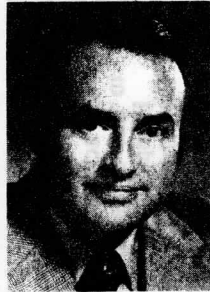

strong from the bottom of her register to the top. She is a real mezzo-soprano and I hope she will avoid all temptation to try and become a dramatic soprano, at least for a decade.

Of course she still has things to learn. Her French can be improved, as can her skill in projecting a text, but she has the basics mastered. "O mio Fernando," a fine test for the voice, was beautifully sung, and the Songs of the Auvergne were achieved with style and verve—thanks in no small part to fine orchestra playing and David Zimman's conducting. He opened the program with an unusually good account of the Schubert "Unfinished Symphony," and he closed with a lively set of Norwegian Dances by Grieg. I was impressed how well the Grant Park orchestra played after a month under his direction. Surely, as the music directors of the first rank of American orchestras step down, Zimman must be conspicuous among the younger men best qualified to take over these jobs.

Wendy White says she wants to be the greatest mezzo-soprano in the world, and I wouldn't be surprised if she manages it. Her statement, which sounds rather bold coming from a 25-year-old, must be matched against her performance at Grant Park Friday night. If her mixture of beauty, charm, vitality, a dramatic flair and a gorgeous voice don't add up to a big career, I shall be greatly surprised.

The important thing, of course, is the voice. It is extremely difficult to judge a singer through amplification, even harder when a delegation of her fans start talking as she starts singing, telling each other how wonderful it is. (The ultimate compliment to any artist is to be quiet during a performance.) Still there is no question about the quality of this voice. It is filled with warmth and lovely colors, and it is clean and

## LV resident produces Rosenberg radio show

MILT ROSENBERG is a radio talk show host who has a unique perception of the news and the history behind the news. As a professor at the University of Chicago, Rosenberg was a frequent guest on the Extension 720 talk-interview show on WGN Radio and, in late 1973, was asked to take over as host.

Reluctant at first, Rosenberg found this show to be an excellent opportunity to have an intelligent talk show, not one that is intellectual. As a scholar, Rosenberg is a quick study and a person of great inquisitiveness. This combines with his ability to present interesting guests on topics in the news, making the program one of the more interesting talk shows on the air.

"Extension 720" was originally produced by Carole Wrubel Corbett, who had worked with the former general manager of WGN Radio, Bob Henley, to develop a format of in-depth probing on subjects of public concern.

Marcia Cassidy, a Lake View resident, Rosenberg's present producer, spends hours of researching news subjects and guests to combine

the in-depth perception of the show. A new dimension of the show will be a frequent "Extension 720 Chases the News," where a headline story will be followed, gathering involved persons from all over the world to comment on a late-breaking news story. At least one international phone is placed "chasing the news" as well as national and local people who may be involved in the current headlines. Extension 720 is heard Monday through Friday at 9 p.m.
